summer, we have very summer, we have
little dryland cotton," ded Irwin. "As we expec ted, we have a very good
micronaire and high turnout in the irrigated cotton, and the very isolated dry land areas that received moisture. Fiber quality, which is determined in the last 25 days of the maturity of the cotton boll, has been very good, as the weather
has been ideal for cotton. In fact, in some places, we have produced an excellent quality cotton.
"The 1979 year proved

quality, but a lot of the $\quad 80$ crop is in the premium range. And, some of the
