Others throughout the county are asked to take their worn hose to the place where they purchase new ones. A hosiery collection depot will be stationed at each point of purchase and the hose will be picked up from time to time and sent out as collected.

## Block Plan For Civilian Defense To Be Organized

Organization is under way for the adoption of the Block Plan or Area Plan by the local Civilian Defense Council, the purpose being to carry forward civilian war activity quickly and effectively, to get vital war information into every home rapidly and accurately, to collect information which may be needed for community war planning to bring back to the homes answers to questions which have been raised, and to promote a spirit of cooperation in neighborhood enterprises, such as block discussion meetings, rallies, car-sharing plans, the sharing of scarce mechanical and household equipment, and any other activity of the community's war services.

It is the plan of the Civilian Defense Council to name a person in each area or each block of Hereford as a Block Leader. In the rural communities, the Victory Leaders will act as community leaders.

## Place Orders For Soy Bean Sacks Now

The approximately 20 soy bean producers in Deaf Smith County have been offered a market by West Texas Cotton Oil Company of Littlefield. However, farmers were reminded again this week that soy beans must be sacked before they can be marketed and the county AAA office announces the following plan for farmers to get the necessary sacks.

In addition to Lieutenant Smother's talk, other items on the program will be a reading by Miss Katherine Kirby—Edna St. Vincent Millay's "Murder of Lidice," and County Judge A. J. Schroeter will discuss the local civilian defense set-up, pointing out the increased possibilities for civilian participation in the war effort.

"We feel that this program will be interesting to everyone in the county," Mrs. Brady states. "And we hope to have a good crowd to hear Lieutenant Smother, to find out from Miss Kirby's reading just what War has meant to the people of conquered Europe and to discover things that the ordinary civilian can do to help win the war."

## Victory Concert Set For Tonite

The second of the scheduled season of "Victory Concerts" will be played tonight at the high school auditorium starting at 8:15. Ralph Smith, conductor of the high school orchestra, announced today.

The "Victory Concerts," sponsored jointly by bond sales committees and high school musical organizations all over the country, got off to a good start last month when more than \$143,000 worth of war bonds and stamps were sold throughout the United States. Sales in Hereford amounted to more than \$300, Mr. Smith reports.

After long months of struggle in an effort to improve and beautify the cemetery grounds, the Board of Directors of West Park Cemetery have arrived at what they think is the best plan to secure additional revenues sufficient to carry on the work of caring for the grounds, paying the salary of a care taker and making necessary improvements as the cost of maintenance increases.

## Motorists Sign Up Saturday for "A" Gas Books

Registration of motorists for gasoline rationing, now scheduled to begin Dec. 1, will take place in Deaf Smith County at the Hereford High School from 8 until 6 o'clock, Saturday, with teachers of the public schools in charge. Motorists were reminded again this week that they must bring with them their registration receipt or certificate of title for each passenger vehicle to be registered, and that they must have the serial numbers of the five tires—four mounted, one spare—allowed for each passenger car.

Any person who feels that he may be entitled to the supplemental ration of a "B" or "C" book, may secure an application form at the schoolhouse. This form should be turned in to the gas rationing panel of the county war price and rationing board at the commissioner's court room in the courthouse, which will pass on all applications between the registration date and Dec. 1, when rationing goes into effect.

Motorists not entitled to a supplementary ration will receive the basic "A" book, which will be good for approximately four gallons of gasoline a week. The gasoline rationing panel—Frank Gyles, Henry Hastings and E. S. Ireland—will be in session tomorrow, but as yet no definite schedule of meeting dates has been set.

## Patriotism Is Theme Of Program

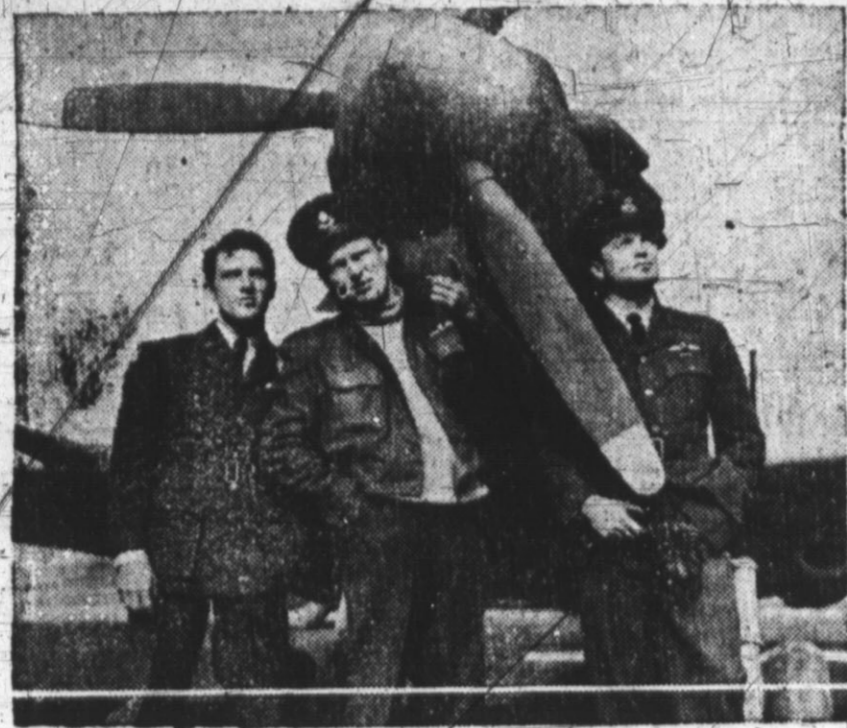

cut plants close to ground after first killing frost. See that stems are well dried to prevent stem rot. When digging leave some soil with the clump and trim off slender ends of roots. Put away from heat and cover after several days with soil or sacks. If plants seem too dry in winter sprinkle lightly and re-cover."

**Let's Cook Something**

Here is another of Mrs. Rosa Speer's recipes and one look at the recipe will tell you why it has been a family favorite for many years. One good bit of news mixed in with food ration lists, is that there is going to be plenty of apples and we should all serve them often for they are brimful of health-giving goodness.

For a simple recipe you will find this unusual and one that can be used for any meal. Try serving Cinnamon Apples some Sunday morning with broiled sausage links topped with eggs poached in milk.

**CINNAMON APPLES**

- 8 or 10 good apples (deep red preferred)
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup white Karo
- 1 1/2 cups boiling water
- 2 tablespoons red-hot

Peel and core the apples and drop in syrup made by boiling the above ingredients for five minutes, and cook slowly in open kettle, turning often, until tender. Lift carefully from syrup, place in a shallow pan and pour remaining syrup over them. Place in a hot oven for a few minutes until apples are glazed.

**CHDA NOTES**

One 4-H Club member and the Club sponsor at Wyche have winter radishes in fall gardens. Mrs. H. H. Caraway has the large white variety, Chinese Celestial. These grow to enormous size as does the Black Spanish in both long and short types. Mrs. Caraway also shared mixed greens, hot peppers, lettuce, and parsley from her garden.

Swiss chard of the rankest growth is found in the G. E. Theile garden. The surplus leaves are used as salad for the hens. Green feed and mineral are necessary for the formation of hard egg shells.

Mustard-Spinach (Tender green), mustard low in sulphur content, broad leaved mustard and purple top turnips are "Knee deep in November" at the Doc Roberson garden.

One is told that the Fred Henry's have the best turnips in Wyche, but we have not seen a sample.

The home food supply in wartime will be of little concern to the Claude Bogle family at Simms. In 1942, Mrs. Bogle's club report indicates that they sold more than \$600 worth of food from the farm, while they purchased about \$50 worth of fruit. They produced for home use more than a thousand pounds of meat. There are thirteen varieties of vegetables included in the quart grown and canned.

In October, 100 strawberry plants from the Glenn Hetler garden were set out. These should produce an early spring crop. The strawberries to be planted next spring in a new garden plot should not produce before July. An order for small fruits will include grapes. These usually produce on and after the second season.

Lenoir or Black Spanish grapes at the G. E. Theile home were photogenic as grown this season. The Dry Land Field Station at Woodward, Oklahoma, supplied three plants of each of fourteen varieties for a trial planting. An unthrifty variety was replaced after the first season with plants of Caco, a very sweet grape. Chemical analysis indicate a 25 per cent sugar content.

Grapes may be grown from cuttings. These should be made during December and buried in bundles until planting time in spring.

The following quotation was taken from a talk "How Well Fed Can we be in 1943" made by Dr. Hazel K. Stiebeling, at the National Outlook Conference in Washington:

"In 1941, millers and bakers began to produce 'enriched' white flour and bread, thereby contributing to the thiamine, niacin, and iron content of diets of those families that read the labels and choose the enriched product. The resulting difference is important for those low-income groups depending heavily on refined grain products for their nourishment."

If you don't know or have advantages, ask in the office of the CHDA for the bulletin "Twenty Questions on 'Enriched' Flour and Bread", which is put out by the U. S. Bureau of Home Economics.

In a collection of flower seeds planted last spring, one package bore the patriotic name of Liberty Bell Flower. It was so

thrifty that Mrs. Ray J. Coleman, Messenger, wrote to the distributor and asked for the correct name which is Moluccella laevis, Shell Flower, Molucca Balm.


