## UWDSC will extend effort

The 1988 campaign of the United Way of Deaf Smith County will be extended one week, through Oct. 31, to give campaign workers enough time to collect on about 300 as-yet uncollected pledges and to give persons who have not received UWDSC pledge cards an opportunity to contact UW volunteers or the UWDSC office.

At Monday's report meeting, volunteers reported that \$56,851.65 had been received. That is \$7,753 above the 1987 campaign after five weeks, and UW officials were ready Monday to begin a

final push toward the goal of \$123,500.

"Our United Way campaign reminds me of our football team last Friday night," said UWDSC executive Wayne Amstutz, referring to the Herd's rallying 32-26 win over Dunbar. "Our football team had its back to the wall two or three times and kept coming back and coming back."

"Our United Way campaign is at the same point, and I think we should go out and do the job just like our football team went out and did the job last Friday."

"Maybe we should do that as a tribute to our kids, our young people."

"I think we should extend our campaign one more week, until Oct. 31, then set a Victory Party for Nov. 7," said UWDSC President LaJean Henry. "We have some people who have worked really hard, and I would bet our Agriculture and Golden Age divisions reach 100 percent. All of our workers need to be congratulated, and I hope we can celebrate reaching our goal."

Amstutz praised local utilities, including Energas, Southwestern Public Service, West Texas Rural Telephone and Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, for being 100 percent companies.

"Sometimes we get down on these folks because of having to pay utility bills or what-not, but they are all contributing to our campaign," Amstutz said. "They're to be commended for their willingness to listen to us and their encouragement of their employees to be apt of the campaign."

Amstutz said that employees at some businesses and industries, for various reasons, will not be receiving UWDSC pledge cards this year. Employees who have not received pledge cards may contact the UWDSC office at

344-5220 or get in touch with any UWDSC division chairman or other volunteer to obtain pledge cards or to make a donation.

## Langley likes Hereford crowds

Jeff Langley, reader representative for the Amarillo Globe-News, wasn't received with open arms at a Hereford Rotary Club meeting Monday, but the man said he knows a Hereford crowd is eager to make comment while others are mute.

"I'll admit I get a little nervous when I come to Hereford, but it doesn't really bother me when they criticize the paper," said Langley. "I've been to some civic club meetings in other towns and when I ask them for input on how the paper's doing, they just sit there. I know I can always get good criticism from Hereford."

Langley is one of only five ombudsmen representing major newspapers in the United States, a position created at the Globe-News to bridge the readership with the newspaper after the newspaper printed 38 articles in a series called "Hereford and the Hispanics" in October 1987, causing wide-spread revolt.

The furious voices were quickly organized into a group called Panhandle Citizens for a Better Amarillo Newspaper (PCBAN), headed by Paul Engler of Dumas with many Hereford citizens in tow.

Langley, former managing editor at The Pampa News, even has two columns a week, on the Thursday and Sunday editorial pages, for any criticisms or accolades he has for the newspaper.

As far as my position goes, a lot of people say I'm just a mouthpiece or an apologist for the newspaper. I can understand that, but whenever I had a criticism of the newspaper in my column I've never been censored. I think I've even ripped the newspaper a couple of times and never got edited," Langley said.

Langley said his beef about the paper for this Sunday's column will center on the Globe-News' Scramble Name Game winner who was pictured holding \$500.

"I don't think that's right," Langley said. "Our (Globe-News) promotions shouldn't be handled any differently than any other promo-

tion. If someone called up wanting the paper to print a picture of their promotion winner, we'd probably say 'No, that's not news.'"

Rotarian Mike Bowles questioned Langley about the newspaper's pledge in mid-September to give \$1 of each month's subscription to the United Way campaign only a few days after subscription rates jumped from \$20.85 to \$22.50 on Sept. 1.

"I'm sure management would say one has nothing to do with the other," said Langley. "I think the management takes pride in giving to the United Way. Gareth von Netzer (assistant general manager and executive editor) sits on the United Way campaign board and he's dedicated to the cause."

District Attorney Roland Saul asked Langley if he had ever taken a stand on anything controversial at the newspaper.

Langley said that he wrote a series of columns concerning an education reporter's dealings with West Texas State University's underground newspaper which is critical of the school's administration.

The reporter was assigned to cover WTSU, but it later was discovered that when the reporter attended WTSU he had a key to the post office box for the underground newspaper.

"It took me several columns to get the whole story straight because there were so many aspects to the

story. The only tie to the underground newspaper which I could confirm was that he had the key to the post office box and that he knew a lot of the people involved. And why wouldn't he? He was the editor of The Prairie (WTSU's student newspaper) for two years," Langley said.

The reporter later was taken off the WTSU beat.

Langley said he receives about 50 calls a week about the Amarillo newspapers.

"The response has been overwhelming. So many people are concerned about the newspaper and want to see some changes," he said.

The calls haven't been for naught, said Langley, because the newspaper has started listing crude oil futures prices and racing results, and more coupons will be available in Sunday's paper because of readers' comments.

The newspaper formerly cut television program listings off at midnight, but because of some of the gripes received the listings have been extended into the morning hours and more channels have been included.

"We very rarely get any complaints — mainly complaints," Langley said. "But I think the people really appreciate having someone at the paper to talk to. Most just want to see something done differently."

### County arrests five

## Brown moving senior project

Hereford property developer Ruck Brown has switched plans to build a retirement village in the Bluebonnet Division, and instead will build his new development next to the Hereford Senior Citizens Center at 426 Ranger Avenue, the Hereford City Commission learned Monday.

Brown originally requested that the commission rezone the area east of Bluebonnet Elementary School from a single family district to a multi-family district in order to build the retirement village.

But local residents, fearing that the complex would become crime-ridden, low-income housing, requested that Brown sign a deed restriction making the apartments a retirement village for 50 years even though Farmers Home Administration, who is to fund the project, stipulates that the property remain a senior housing project for only a minimum of 20 years.

"We tried a number of times to agree on something," said Brown. "We even filed a deed restriction

(saying that if the property were not used for senior citizen housing, Brown would request the zoning be reverted to single family.) It was just a business decision to build over there (next to the senior citizens center)."

Brown said the project should be funded in 60 to 90 days and that street construction is the priority before any housing construction begins.

The new location is already zoned for multi-family housing.

J.W. McMorries, one of the residents who petitioned that the property remain a retirement village for 50 years, said he liked Brown's decision to move the development.

"There is a deed restriction (on the Bluebonnet Division) that lasts for eternity saying that the zoning could not be changed from a single family district anyway," said McMorries. "He (Brown) wasn't aware of that restriction which was placed there in '63 and I had thought it expired. But it's there forever."

The commission also voted to request \$251,000 from the Pan-

handle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) to pave several blocks of dirt streets in southeast Hereford, with the city picking up 20 percent of the amount.

John Kiehl, a PRPC representative, said the city would stand a much better chance of receiving the funding if it were willing to match 20 percent of the amount.

In January, regional and state boards will evaluate about 40 similar requests for funding in the Panhandle. The boards will allot points to each application depending on need.

The city asked for funds to pave these streets in 1984, but the application was rejected.

The streets available for paving include two blocks of Knight Street, all of North Street, Harrah Street and South Texas Avenue from Bradley Street to Lake Street.

PRPC will divide \$1.112 million among about six projects.

In other action, the commission voted to establish the east side of Avenue F from Union Avenue to Grand Avenue as a no-parking

zone between 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. because of the congestion caused with school bus loading and unloading.

The city's group hospitalization rates from Blue Cross-Blue Shield will rise 18 percent over last year's premiums.

Last year, the employee-only rate was \$53.56 and for next year the rate will rise to \$63.20 — \$57,638 for 76 employees which is \$8,900 more than last year.

"As bad as 18 percent sounds, it's really pretty good (compared to the county who had a 43.9 percent increase on its medical insurance)," said Commissioner Jerry Walsh.

The commissioners also: —Awarded a janitorial bid to Lupe Villarreal for \$595 per month for cleaning City Hall; —Signed a contract with the Economic Development Council stipulating that the city would partially fund the council for \$48,000;

—Reappointed members to the Planning and Zoning Commission and the Board of Adjustment.

Then Tommy Lasorda did his imitation of Jesus and Lazarus, sending Kirk Gibson to the plate to pinch-hit.

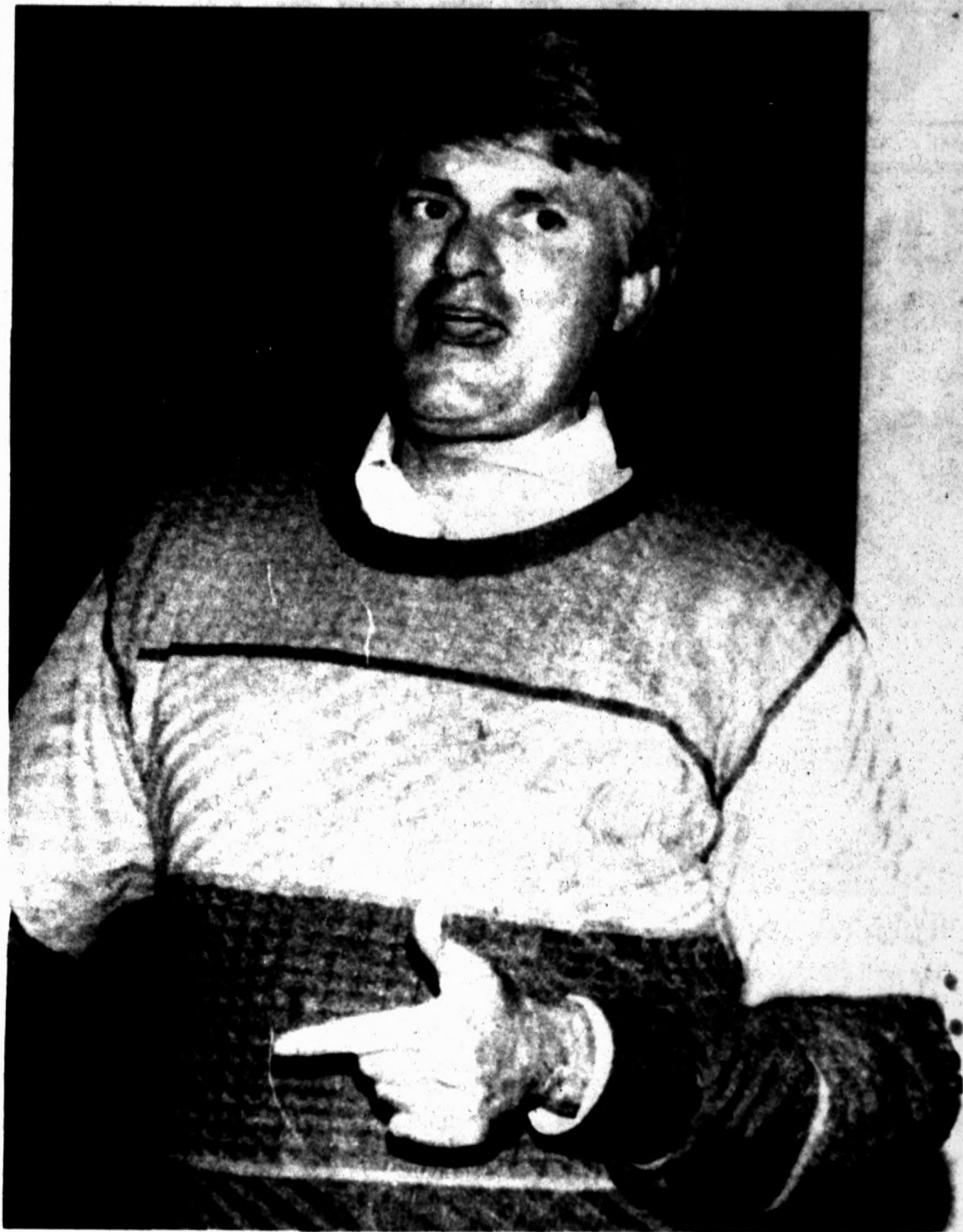
Gibson had spent most of the game wearing nothing but strange underwear while getting treatment for both legs in the training room.

## Dukakis, Bush pledge fight to the finish

George Bush, buoyed by his widening lead in the polls, charged that rival Michael Dukakis is unable to comprehend the role of the nation's military. The Democratic nominee accused his Republican opponent of ignoring the industrial states while they faltered.

With three weeks remaining until Election Day, Dukakis appealed to working class and black voters in Ohio — a state the Democrat desperately needs for a Nov. 8 victory — by criticizing Bush for sitting "on his hands while America's industrial heartland has been fighting for its life."

"I am fighting for the values I believe in, the values that are the core of this campaign," Dukakis said Monday during a campaign day that included a visit to a metal factory, a diner and bowling alley.

In Columbus, at a rally with black voters, Dukakis took a swipe at Bush, telling the crowd, "Something is very wrong when a presidential candidate calls Jesse Helms a hero, and Jesse Jackson a hustler."

Bush used a tour of a Martin Marietta defense plant in Littleton, Colo., to emphasize his understanding of the military's role in securing world peace and to ridicule Dukakis' defense stand.

The vice president is not letting up on his attacks on Dukakis despite a 17-point lead in the latest nationwide poll. The Bush campaign is releasing

three new television ads today, including one incorporating news footage of Dukakis driving a tank, said spokeswoman Sheila Tate.

The Washington Post reported today that the Bush campaign has saved more than \$30 million of its advertising budget and will target the airwaves in California, New Jersey and Ohio.

The newspaper said the information was based on an internal campaign document obtained by the Post. The Bush campaign had no comment on the report, said Ms. Tate.

The GOP nominee is expected to hammer at that theme today when he delivers a foreign policy speech in Fulton, Mo.

Dukakis was meeting with families at a uranium plant in Columbus, before traveling to Kalamazoo, Saginaw and Detroit, Mich.

Democratic vice presidential candidate Lloyd Bentsen was campaigning in California, the biggest Electoral College prize with 47 votes, while his Republican counterpart, Dan Quayle, was concentrating on Illinois with its 24 votes.

Meanwhile, an NBC-Wall Street Journal poll showed Bush leading Dukakis, 55-38 percent, among 1,378 likely voters surveyed Friday through Sunday. The poll had a margin of error of plus or minus three percentage points.

Almost three-quarters of those polled said they expected Bush to win the election, including half of

Dukakis' own supporters.

But the Democratic nominee and his running mate disputed the survey's results.

"This business of polls is really having a terrible effect," on the process, Dukakis said. "I can only tell you that there are other polls that say very different things about where we are and where the race is."

Bentsen said he didn't believe the poll was accurate, and said, "You see wide fluctuations among those polls. That's what's happening."

For his part, Bush said only, "Run like you're 17 points behind."

The vice president, who campaigned in Colorado and Illinois, pledged his support for new missile systems and criticized Dukakis for opposing continued ballistic missile flight testing.

"We need to modernize. We need to test. And we can't defend America with blueprints," Bush said.

At a rally in Skokie, Ill., Bush pledged his support for a strong U.S.-Israel alliance.

The vice president also picked up the endorsement of the Teamsters union, which broke with the umbrella AFL-CIO's endorsement of Dukakis.

However, union President William J. McCarthy stressed the endorsement applied only to Bush personally, not Quayle, President Reagan or the Republican Party.

Asked about the slight, Quayle told reporters in Midland, Mich., "the important thing is that they endorsed George Bush and that's good news for me."

## Nancy's million-dollar wardrobe under fire

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal ethics office will review its 1982 finding that Nancy Reagan need not disclose borrowing expensive gowns and jewels, following reports that she has worn more than \$1 million worth of such items since then.

"We will look at it again to see if we made the right decision," ethics office spokesman Donald Campbell said Monday.

Elaine Crispin, the first lady's press secretary, denied that Mrs. Reagan has kept any of the expen-

sive items she obtained from designers and jewelers. She said in a statement late Monday that "Mrs. Reagan regrets that she failed to heed" the advice of White House counsel in 1982 to report such transactions, but that this was not technically required under the Ethics in Government Act.

Mrs. Crispin noted that the Office of Government Ethics had ruled in 1982 that "loans of apparel to Mrs. Reagan need not be reported on the president's financial disclosure

forms. No paid-for apparel need be reported on any forms," the spokeswoman's statement said.

Campbell, a spokesman for the Office of Government Ethics, said the issue was first raised in 1982, when then-White House counsel Fred Fielding sent a letter to the ethics office detailing the situation at the time.

Campbell said Fielding concluded that this "was not something that needed to be reported" on Reagan's financial disclosure form. The forms

are required under the Ethics in Government Act of 1978.

J. Jackson Walters, then-director of the ethics office, agreed with Fielding's conclusion at the time, Campbell said, adding that Mrs. Reagan has been operating under that guidance since then.

Mrs. Crispin said Mrs. Reagan did report such transactions anyway on her husband's form in 1982, about six months after the question arose.

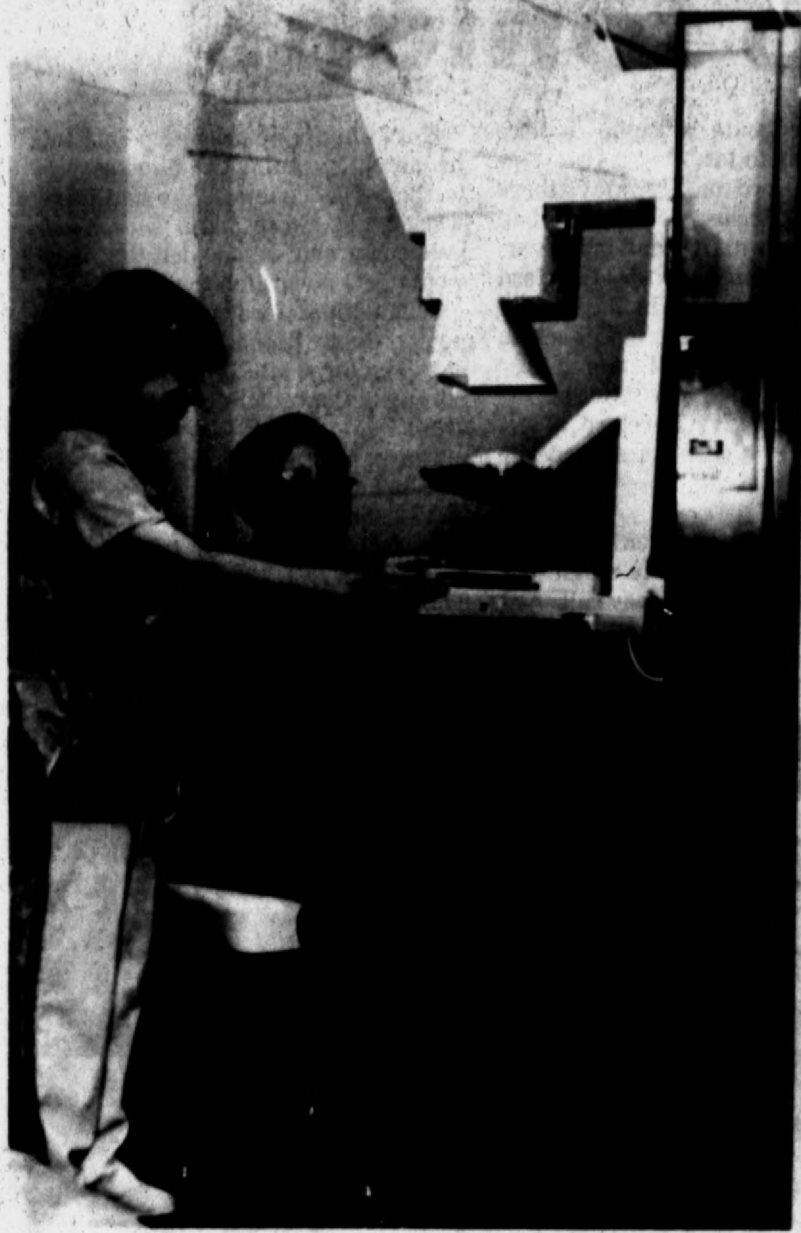

The author of *Lonesome Dove*, Larry McMurtry, has a new book available this week entitled *Anything for Billy*.

It is a novel about the life and times of Billy Bone, better known as Billy the Kid. The legendary outlaw and gunman makes his first appearance here at the age of 17, dressed in an oversized dirty black coat, and has a reputation for violence that far exceeds his actual ferocity.

His charm may be a more potent weapon than his Colt, with which he is a deadly marksman. Billy kills because he or the other fellow is in the wrong place at the wrong time, and because he can't think of anything else to do. For those of you who enjoyed *Lonesome Dove* I think you will find this story equally entiling.

*Laughing Till It Hurts*: the complete life and career of Carol Burnett by J. Randy Taraborrelli is a con-

tinuation of Carol's life picking up where *One More Time* ends. *Laughing Till It Hurts* details a career responsible for the creation of sketches and characters that still live in the imagination.

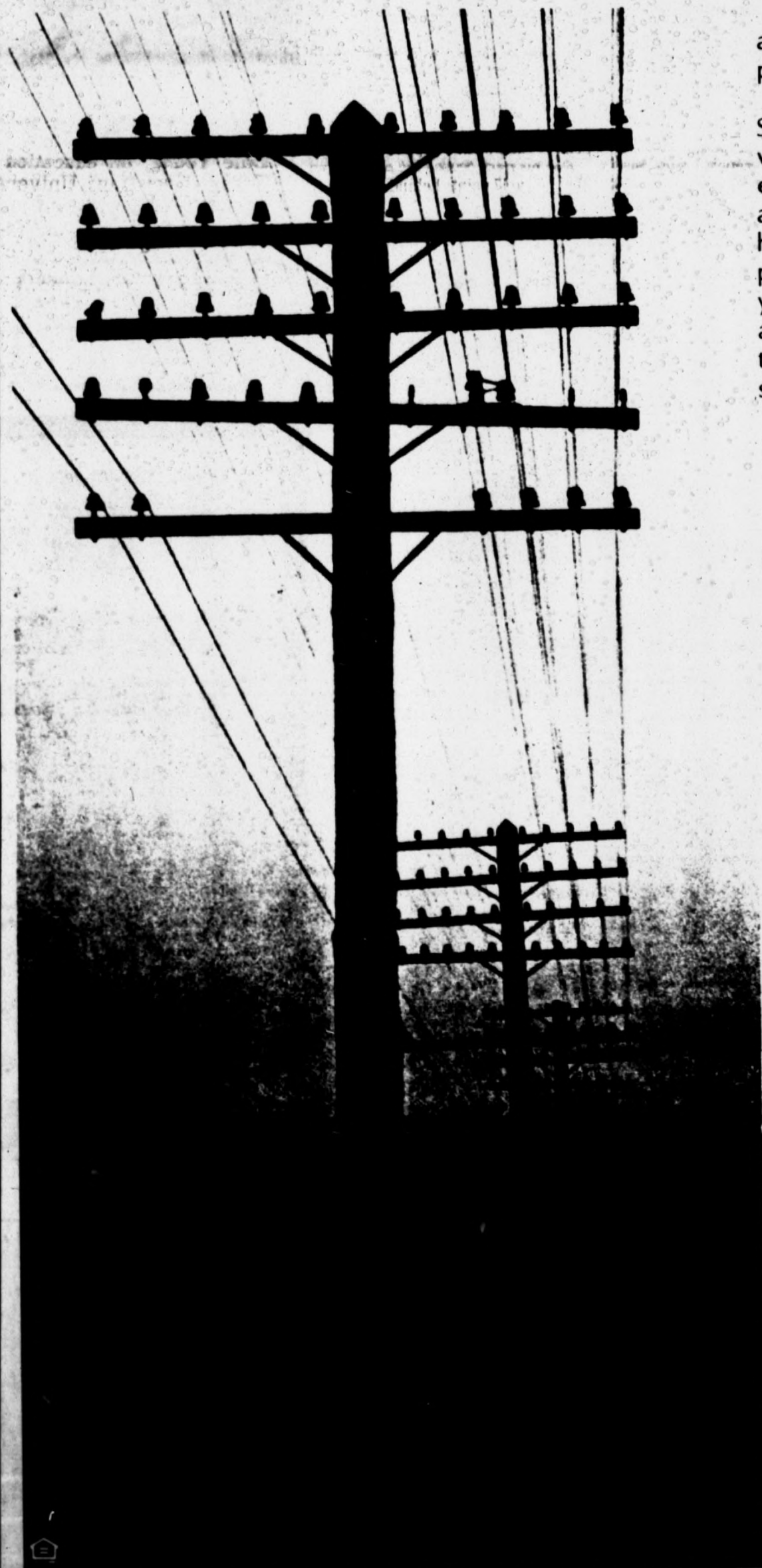

The A's, trailing 2-0 in the best-of-seven Series, take on Dodgers left-hander John Tudor, who has pitched just once in the past 27 days and admits to being somewhat demoralized by the long layoff.

"It is a little disheartening having to go out and throw on 15 days' rest and then nine days and have myself and everyone else expecting me to do the job," Tudor said. "I'm not in any kind of rhythm now. I hope I get in one real quick."

At the same time, Dodgers slugger Kirk Gibson, unable to start either of the first two games because of leg injuries, was getting worse instead of better.

"I'm sorer today than I was yesterday — much sorer," Gibson said at Monday's workout.

With Bob Welch, a former Dodger,

going for the A's, Game 3 features a matchup of two pitchers who have struggled in postseason games.

Tudor, 10-8 during the season, was traded from St. Louis to Los Angeles last Aug. 17 for Pedro Guerrero. He was 4-3 with the Dodgers but did not start in the regular season after Sept. 18. He didn't pitch again until Oct. 9, when he gave up four runs on eight hits in five innings against New York in the playoffs.

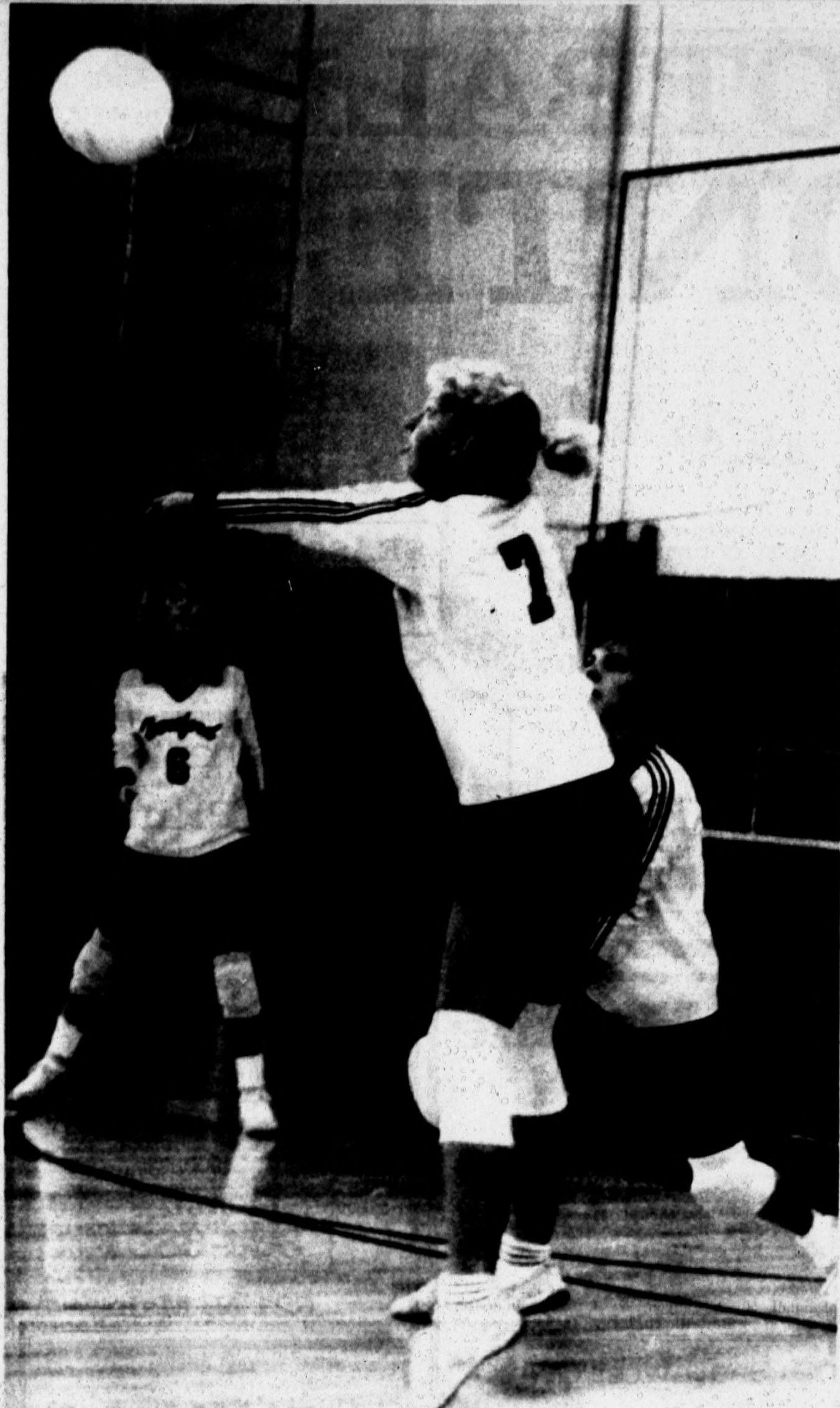
That gave Tudor a career playoff ERA of 3.00. His World Series ERA is 4.03.

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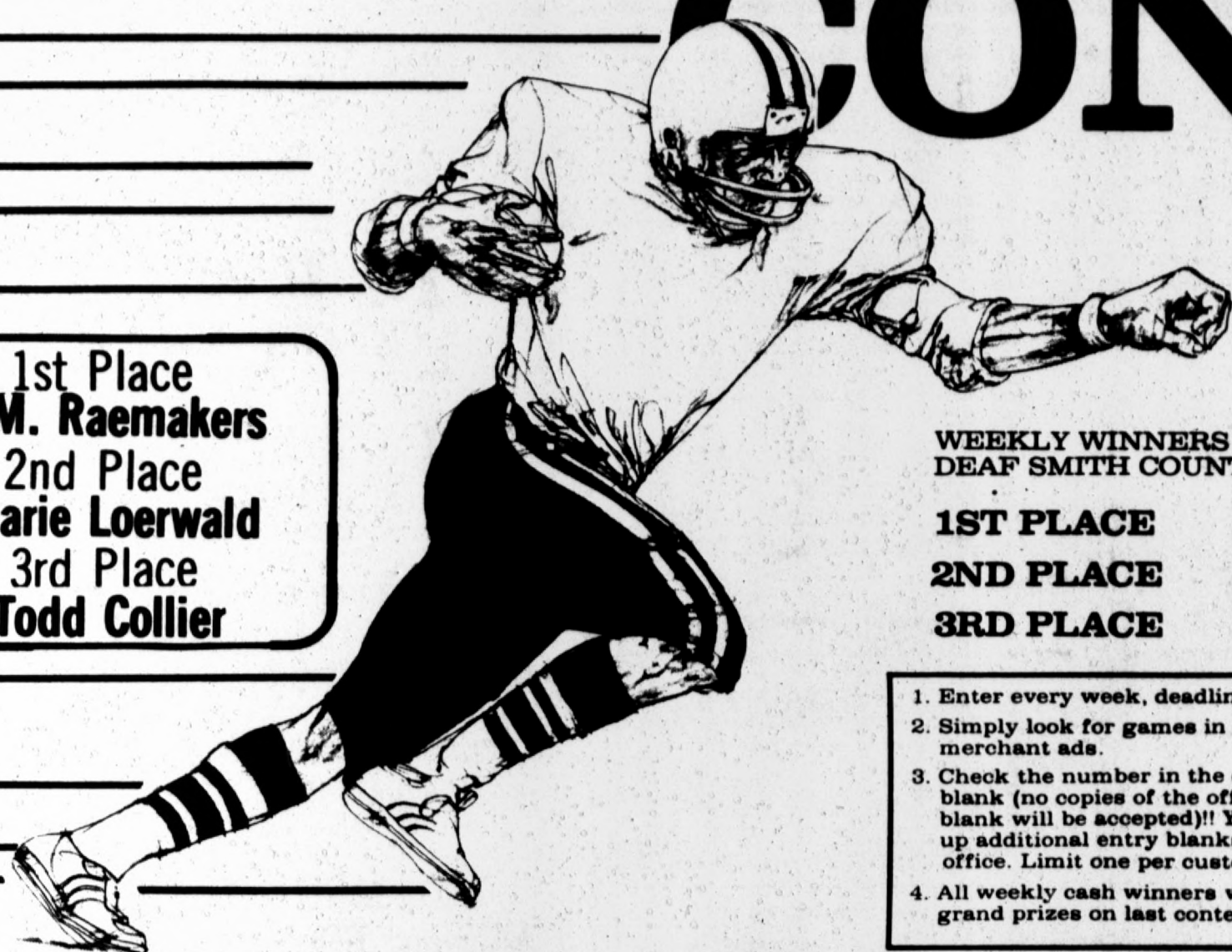
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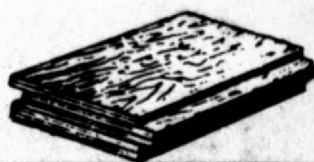

# Extension News

## HOW TO PRESERVE GOURDS

If you planted gourds this summer, you should now see literally the fruits of your labor. The gourd is a fruit that is highly decorative and will last for years if properly cured. The most exciting and rewarding part of your entire gourd growing experience lies just ahead.

Now is the time to see if our gourds are ready to harvest and to be cured. This curing process usually takes about three weeks.

How do you tell when to harvest gourds? The usual way is when the gourds stop increasing in size and start drying, and the leaves begin turning brown and discoloring.

To harvest gourds you need a sharp knife or pair of pruning shears. Cut the gourd loose from the vine leaving a stem one to two inches long. Wash the gourds in warm, soapy water and then rinse them in clean water containing a little household disinfectant. This will remove any soil-borne bacteria clinging to the shell that might cause discoloration or rot. Dry each gourd with a soft cloth to avoid bruising or scratching the skin.

The next process takes about a week and is called surface drying. Its purpose is to dry and harden the outer skin and set the color. Many gourds have beautiful colors and markings which may fade or become discolored if not preserved.

A good way to handle the small type gourds is to string them like

beads through the stem and hang them up to dry. Take care they do not touch. If desired, the small gourds may be handled exactly like the large ones.

The large gourds are too heavy to suspend on a string so much be laid on a floor or table on several thicknesses of newspaper. The room or shed should be a warm, dry place with good air circulation.

Turn the gourds daily and replace any newspapers made damp by the curing gourds. Some gourds may begin to shrivel. Some may develop soft spots. Discard all of these, they are immature and will never cure properly. Left with the others, they may develop molds which will spread to the others. After about a week the surface should be well dried and the colors set.

The next process is internal or final drying. This takes two to three weeks. About the only difference in this drying process and the previous one is that it should be done in darkness to prevent fading of the color. You still need a warm, dry place with good air circulation to go with the darkness. Heat encourages rapid

drying and darkness holds the color. Dryness discourages molds and mildew.

After about three weeks of curing the final step is decorating. For this you need to unleash your artistic talents. Gourds may be displayed in their natural state but often can be greatly improved by decorating.

One way to enhance the natural beauty of gourds is to wash and buff them with a soft cloth to produce a soft, shiny surface with highlights.

Another way is to coat the surface with liquid plastic to give a hard, glossy finish.

Still another way to prepare gourds for display is to paint them. This is especially true of gourds that have a poor, dull color. Use spray paint or a brush to apply. You can paint the entire gourd by suspending it by the stem, or you can set it on the rim of an empty can while painting.
