They list their product as DEAF SMITH COUNTY WHEAT FRESHLY MILLED. Apparently, this wheat isn't bleached, but is merely stone-ground and put on the market with each pound of wheat turning out a pound of flour. Their price list gives trial shipments of five pounds for \$1.00, plus postage; contracts for 50 pounds call for \$7.50, plus postage. Shipments to California are highest, running \$1.50 for five pounds, postpaid; Texas buys for \$1.35 for five pounds, postpaid, and the average would likely be around \$1.28 for five pounds, postpaid. This is a basis of 20c a pound. Our local mills sell high patent flour for around four cents a pound after going through a complicated milling process.

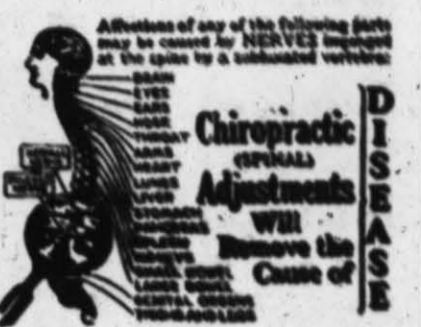

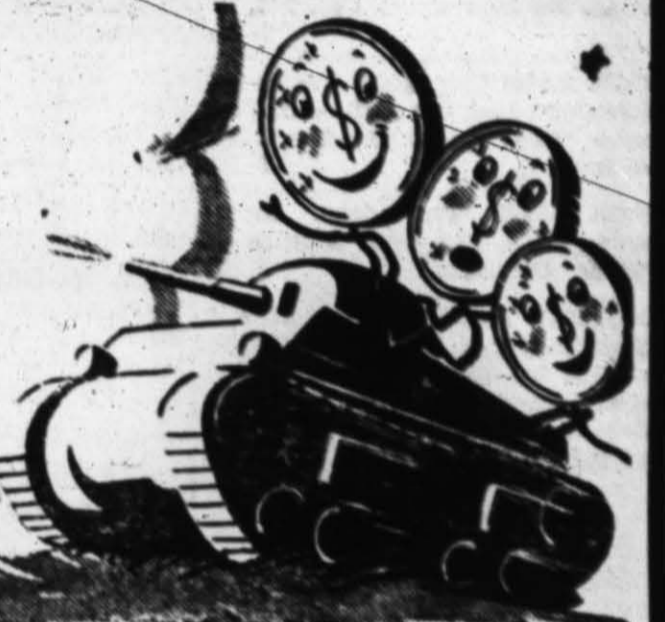

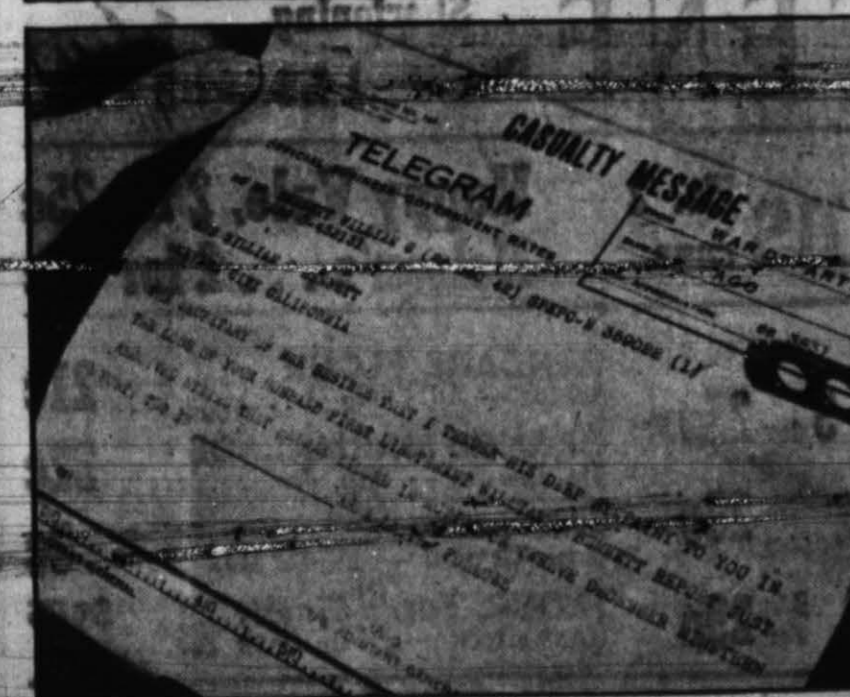

copy of tokens will not permit the grocer to exchange them for more stamps than are needed for the purchase, and grocers will not be permitted to change stamps for tokens where no bona fide purchase is made. Eliminate Buying Rushes.

Stamps will be valid for a period of 12 weeks with a new series of stamps and should eliminate the buying rushes incident to the expiration of short validity periods.

Consumers are urged to familiarize themselves with the use of tokens, and to cooperate in every possible manner with the retail grocer in distributing them.

The attention of housewives is called to the fact that it will still be necessary to present their war ration books to the grocers and to tear the stamps out of the books in the presence of the grocer. Loose stamps may not be accepted by the grocer.

Consumers' war ration books should be carefully safeguarded, as War Ration Book Four will probably have to last for the duration and will be difficult to replace if lost.

Air WAC Recruiting Party To Visit in Hereford

Hereford women this week are being offered the opportunity to don the insignia of the Army Air Forces and enlist for a station of their own choice, according to a news release received from the Pampa Army Air Field, which will send a recruiting team, headed by Lt. Ewan K. Shelby to Hereford sometime between Feb. 21 and Feb. 26.

Lieutenant Shelby urges all women between 20 and 50, who are physically qualified, to investigate this new opportunity for Air WAC enlistment.

Although previous civilian training has much to do with the type work to which Air WACs are assigned, civilian occupational and educational background are not always a sure guide to the job which may be found for women in the air forces. Hidden abilities are often discovered, and women with no particular profession or trade may be found to possess capabilities which will make them valuable to the Army Air Forces.

The opportunity for Air WAC enlistment and assignment to a base of the recruit's own choice, is said to be open for a short time only.

Women interested in further information concerning service in the Women's Army Corps should see Mrs. W. J. (Bill) Smith, who is WAC recruiting chairman for the county.
