Sights and Faces Seen

Somebody's got to win the war, figures J. A. The news received by Mrs. Brorman was not good—one brother had been killed in action with the German army in 1942 and there had been a total of four deaths in her family since the last letter was received; but at least she received definite news—and was able to send encouraging news from her own family. The nation-wide Junior Red Cross membership drive will get underway next Wednesday, Nov. 1 and will continue for two weeks, it was announced today by local sponsors who state that an intensive drive will be made in the schools of Hereford and Deaf Smith County.

Potato Story Good ... But Improbable

Those were good potatoes that Andy Godwin raised, but we've got to admit that they came out a little too good—or at least highly improbable—in print in The Brand last week. The story announced a yield of between 25 and 30 bushels "per acre" and followed up with the unlikely conclusion that with such a yield, an income of \$4,000 per acre could be anticipated.

Both our arithmetic and our logic were wandering, but according to E. B. Posey of the Chamber of Commerce, it is still a good potato story—if stated correctly. And he gives these figures:

That Godwin's patch measured 12 by 75 feet and produced 28 bushels of potatoes—with rows three feet in width and plants spaced 18 inches in the row. Computed on this ratio of production, an acre of potatoes, says Mr. Posey, would produce 1,355 bushels, which at \$3.00 a bushel would mean a return of \$4,065 per acre.

Confidentially, the potato-dixy editor is still figuring on this problem but after much consideration of the number of square feet in an acre, space between plants, space between rows etc., has come to the conclusion that arithmetic teachers who placed a low estimate on our intelligence were probably right. It would undoubtedly be easier—for us anyway—to just plant an acre of sweet potatoes and find out what they produce.

Two Amendments Submitted to Voters Nov. 7

Two little-known proposals will go before the voters of Texas at the General Election on Nov. 7, when citizens will be asked to accept or reject two constitutional amendments submitted by the legislature.

One of these amendments would empower the commissioners court of each county (subject to property taxpayers' approval by vote) to reallocate county tax levies, which are now rigidly governed by a section of the state constitution which provides that 25c on the \$100 valuation goes to the general fund, 15c to the jury fund and 25c for permanent improvements. The amendment makes no change in present rulings as to the total maximum rate of 80c on the hundred dollar valuation, but would permit counties to change the distribution of the tax dollar so as to provide more funds for certain purposes.

The other amendment would empower municipalities and, presumably, other political subdivisions to establish an insurance and retirement fund for their employees. The amendment does not provide for the establishment of any civil service system in these municipalities.

Fuller's Crew Flies Home With Bomb-Filled Ship

Lt. Grant A. Fuller, Jr. of Hereford was a member of the crew of the U. S. Eighth Air Force Flying Fortress, "Cargo to Margo," who risked their lives by flying home a load of loose explosives rather than jettison them on American ground troops, according to an Associated Press Dispatch dated Oct. 23.

Half the bomb load hung as the Fortress made its run over Cologne, and Lt. Donald A. Jones of Goose Creek, Tex., the pilot, ordered the bomb doors shut while the bombardier attempted to replace the pins in the live bombs. The bombardier (Continued on Page 12)

World Wide Community To Be Held Nov. 3

Hereford Women will join thousands of church women throughout the United States on Nov. 3 in the second annual observance of World Community Day, sponsored by the United Council of Church Women to enable all church women to unite in a study of their responsibility for a just and lasting peace. The local observance, which is being planned by the Federated Council of Church Women, will be held at the Baptist Church at 3:30 o'clock.

The program will be based on "The Pride of an Enduring Peace" with Mrs. Knox Kinard as program chairman. More than 100,000 women in all parts of the United States participated in last year's observance and overwhelmingly favored participation in a world organization. Votes were tabulated and the results sent to Congressmen to indicate the thinking of church women in their sections.

New Shoe Stamp Valid Wednesday, November 1

Airplane Stamp 3 in War Ration Book Three may be used for buying one pair of rationed shoes beginning Nov. 1, 1944, the OPA has announced. The new stamp, like Airplane Stamps 1 and 2 now in use, will be valid indefinitely. Announcement was made Sept. 28 that another shoe ration stamp would become valid on Nov. 1, but the number of the stamp was not made known.

As explained previously, validation of the new shoe stamp Nov. 1, continues the rationing rate established a year ago when Airplane Stamp 1 came into use. Since Nov. 1, 1943, shoe stamps have been validated at six-month intervals.

Scott Farm Sale In Vega Saturday P. M.

John Scott announces a farm sale to be held at his place in Vega on Saturday afternoon, Aug. 28, beginning at 1 o'clock, when a listing of farm machinery and household goods will go on sale. In addition to the items listed in the sale bill on page 8 of The Brand, Mr. Scott states that other merchandise may be considered. Bill Vanderwork will be auctioneer at the sale, and Archie Scott of Hereford will clerk.

With a total of \$3,032 collected and just \$586 to go to reach the \$3,600 goal, success in the National War Fund drive seemed assured this week, according to Urline Streu, chairman of the war fund committee, who urges that all rural committeemen who have not yet turned in their reports do so by Saturday or sooner, in order that the drive may be completed and all results tabulated.

Pointing to the record, Streu states that response to the drive has been generous thus far and requests that all persons who have not yet contributed leave their donations at local headquarters, the office of Elizabeth Womble at 303 North Main.

Most of the rural communities are still to be heard from, and all community leaders are reminded to complete the drive within the next two days and turn in reports at Hereford headquarters.

Money from the drive is used to finance USO and many other agencies for U. S. servicemen and also to aid war refugees in Europe.

American Music Is Presented By Music Study Club

Mrs. A. J. Schroeter was leader of the Music Study Club program Monday afternoon at a meeting held at the home of Mrs. C. C. Acker. In a study of American Music the lesson stressed the theme, "Know Your American Music," and Mrs. Schroeter presented a study of historical and patriotic music from 1492 to 1776. She explained that the true beginnings of American music are found in the rigid, narrow and often commonplace Psalm singing of New England. She brought out the fact that most of the Plymouth pilgrims had a genuine love for music but that some of them did not believe in singing. She mentioned William Billings, the tanner musician, who was the first American composer to make music his profession, and traced developments of early New England music giving a background for the appreciation of the efforts of first native composers who will be studied in succeeding programs.

Roll call was answered with "Firsts in American Music." Musical selections on the program included "The Nation's Prayer" (Cesar Franck) sung by Miss Mattie Mae Swisher with Mrs. J. C. McCracken accompanying; "Ballad of Early New England" (Burleigh) played by Mrs. C. H. Dyar and a chorus



A STATEMENT

I would like for you to have this advantage of information.

I believe the people generally of Dalhart will not insist on filling both District offices.

Please give me your consideration and I will be grateful for your help.

Conservation Exchange

News of the Deaf Smith County Wind Erosion District

Rapid progress in conservation work is being made with Deaf Smith County Wind Erosion District heavy equipment which started recently on the L. B. Godwin farm in the Walcott community. Approximately 11 miles of fence row drifts were leveled and one mile of farm road was constructed.

Godwin, a Deaf Smith County Wind Erosion District cooperator, plans to plant wheat on the land made available by the removal of the drifts. The wheat will have sufficient growth by spring to serve as a cover for the land and prevent soil erosion during the severe blowing season.

The services of the Soil Conservation Service technicians are available to farmers who are interested in this type of conservation work.

Deaf Smith County Wind Erosion District Supervisors urge all farmers interested in conservation operations such as leveling terraces, hummocks, fence row drifts, and the construction of dams ponds and diversions to make application as soon as possible in order that the equipment may be routed to all farmers needing such assistance.

Plans will be made to do all work in each community before moving the heavy machinery to another location.

Application may be made to the District Supervisors or to the office personnel at the Deaf Smith County Wind Erosion District office in the Court-house.
