As in past forms of federal aid, the sponsor would be required to own the site, and its purchase price would be considered part of the sponsor's contribution; that is, the cost of the site would be considered as matching an equivalent amount of federal funds. Therefore a community would gain nothing by delaying the acquisition of the most desirable site available at the present time. Once the site is acquired, it can be opened to traffic by merely blading off strips, with further development being added as it is required.



#### Dealers Must Sell '42 Model Automobiles to **Authorized Buyers**

Buyers and sellers of both new and used 1942 automobiles were reminded today by the Enforcement Division of the Office of Price Administration that a dealer who refuses to sell a 1942 car to the holder of a certificate who offers the ceiling price for the car is in violation of rationing regulations.

This regulation has been in effect since November, but many instances have been referred to the District Office of dealers attempting to evade the regulation by saying the car is for their own use or that it has been promised to someone else.

Dealers are required to post in a conspicuous place a complete and current list of all 1942 cars held for sale.

If a dealer refuses to sell a 1942 car to an eligible buyer he may be prohibited from selling any rationed car to anyone other than a dealer.
