# Former Comrade Writes Family Of Death of Pfc. Clyde H. Whitaker

Pfc. Clyde H. Whitaker, who was reported missing in action in Belgium last January, was killed by machine-gun fire while on patrol near Butenbach, Belgium, on January 2, 1945, according to a letter just received by his mother, Mrs. G. H. Whitaker, from a former buddy, Walter Ballin of California, Missouri, who was an NCO in Whitaker's company at the time of his death.

No official report of the details of his death has ever been received from the War Department by members of the family, Mrs. Mary Anna Whitaker, his widow, told The Brand.

The letter from Mr. Ballin follows:

Dear Mrs. Whitaker, I received a letter from you some time ago asking about your son, Clyde. I am very sorry to have to tell you that your son was killed on a patrol on the 2nd day of January, 1945, at Butenbach, Belgium. I don't know just where the cemetery is, but he is buried somewhere close to the town.

"He was killed instantly by machine-gun fire. He was a good soldier, and we all missed him very much. The boys, as well as myself, all liked him very much. We knew that he thought of his wife and sons most of the time, for that's all he talked about."

"Extending my sympathy to you and his wife and sons, I remain, Sincerely yours, Walter Ballin."

Pfc. Whitaker was with a First Army Infantry division when he was reported missing. He had enlisted in the army on February 6, 1944, and landed overseas on November 26 of that year.

He had attended Hereford High School, and had been engaged in farming and the trucking business here before entering the service.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Whitaker, and his wife and two sons, Clyde Jr., age 3, and Jerry Don, age one and one-half years, all live in Hereford. Mrs. Whitaker and the boys are living in the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Thompson.

Two brothers, G. H. and Woodrow Whitaker, have both been discharged from the army after serving overseas in the European theater.

A Jersey cow owned by Chester Elliff of Tulla, a former 4-H Club member, has been announced by the American Jersey Cattle Club as the national senior three-year old milk and butterfat champion, according to G. G. Gibson, dairyman of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

The cow, Welcome Volunteer Tiff, produced 19,416 pounds of milk and 1,077 pounds of butterfat in her third lactation period. Her previous records are 586 pounds of butterfat in 307 days as a two-year old and 752 pounds in 305 days at the age of two years and 11 months.

## Cultivation of Pastures Improves Forage Yield of Native Grasses

COLLEGE STATION, Jan. 28—Cultivation of pastures shows promise of increasing the production of forage from solid stands of bermuda and native bunch grass in established pastures and meadows, according to R. R. Lancaster, pasture specialist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

Experiments underway since the spring of 1941 at the U. S. Department of Agriculture Red Plains Conservation Experiment Station at Guthrie, Oklahoma, where grass sod was disked lightly every other year in March, caused an increase of 26 per cent in the yield of bermuda grass, he said. The same treatment resulted in an increase of 6 per cent in yields from native bunch grasses.

The tests were made on thin or poor stands of grass. It was found that bermuda would respond to heavier disking than the common native grasses. Tillage seemed to prevent the grasses from dying in the center of the clumps and increased the decay of the plant residue.

"Even if the cultivation does not bring increased yields, the results of the Oklahoma experiments at least indicate that established pastures may be disked without injury before applying phosphate fertilizer and sowing seed," Lancaster said. "This is especially important since Texas farmers and ranchers are now applying large amounts of TVA and commercial phosphate to grassland."

was postponed until the next session of the court, Judge Baird indicated, to give the commissioners an opportunity to sound out public opinion.

The only way in which the county can turn the property over to the Veterans organizations for any purpose is through a public sale, the judge pointed out. If the pavilion is sold, it will be necessary for the county to provide storage space elsewhere for safekeeping of maintenance machinery which is now kept at the pavilion. The commissioners indicated to the Veterans Committee at the meeting Monday that if the pavilion is put up for sale, the minimum bid specified would probably be just sufficient to cover expenses of providing sheds and land for the maintenance equipment.

Judge Baird said that he and the commissioners would like to hear expressions of opinion from the people of the county before a final decision on the sale is made.

The pavilion, the judge pointed out, is one of the best livestock sales yards in the Panhandle, but its location near the center of the city has been a source of many complaints from adjoining property owners.

Veterans argue that the proposed remodeling of the building would be a great asset to the city, in that the appearance of the structure would be greatly improved, the value of the

surrounding property increased, and new building in that section encouraged; and point out that the central location is excellent for a Community center.

Tentative plans for the building, if it can be obtained, are to rock veneer the outside walls, and completely remodel the interior providing office space for headquarters of all clubs and organizations on the lower floor, a dance hall and banquet room upstairs, and a public swimming pool on the grounds.

At a joint meeting of American Legion and VFW members Monday night, finance committees were appointed to begin the drive for funds. Working for the VFW are Roy V. Smith, chairman, W. B. Wilson, Robert C. Wood, Rice Hughes, and Walter D. Lomax. For the Legion, the committee members are Ralph Smith, chairman, C. C. Acker, Cecil Williams, Harry Taylor, Herschel Miller, and Claud Ricketts.

Local service clubs and civic organizations will be asked to help the Veterans in providing the Community Center.
