#### Heavy Fog Is Blamed in Fatal Crash on Amarillo Highway

J. O. Lytle Jr., 19, was killed instantly, and Joy Seale Jennings, 27, died in a Canyon Hospital as the result of an automobile crash on fog-shrouded Highway 60 three miles north of Canyon last Saturday night.

Five other persons and two children escaped with minor injuries in the two-car crash, occurred on a stretch of the recently completed four-lane highway near the Canyon airport, three miles north of the city, at 9:50 o'clock Saturday night. The injured were Tom and Jesse Barrett and Mabel Gilbertson, all of Hereford, who were riding in the car with Lytle and Miss Jennings; and Robert E. McLoughlin, driver of the other car, his wife and two small boys of Quitaque.

#### Hereford Woman Injured in Car Crash at Clovis

Mrs. Audrey Drumgoole of Hereford was injured Sunday in Clovis, New Mexico, when an automobile in which she was riding crashed into a tree. The accident occurred when the car, the driver of which was not identified, swerved sharply to miss a small child who ran into the street, went out of control and crashed into a tree in a nearby yard.

There were no passengers in either car, and the drivers were not injured. Damage to the two machines was estimated at about \$600 for the Pontiac, \$350 for the Chevrolet, the patrolman said. Neither machine was traveling at high speed.

AUSTIN, Sept. 30 (Special)—T. E. Siegler, Jr. prominent Deaf-Smith County good roads advocate, has been chosen Chairman of the Deaf-Smith County Good Roads Amendment Campaign Committee, it was announced today by Charles E. Simons, executive vice-president of the Texas Good Roads Association.

Appearing on the ballot in the November 5th General Election as Amendment Number three, the Good Roads Constitutional Amendment guarantees the availability of motor vehicle registration fees and gasoline taxes exclusively for road purposes, with the exception of one-fourth of the gas tax which will continue to be allocated to the Available Free School Fund.

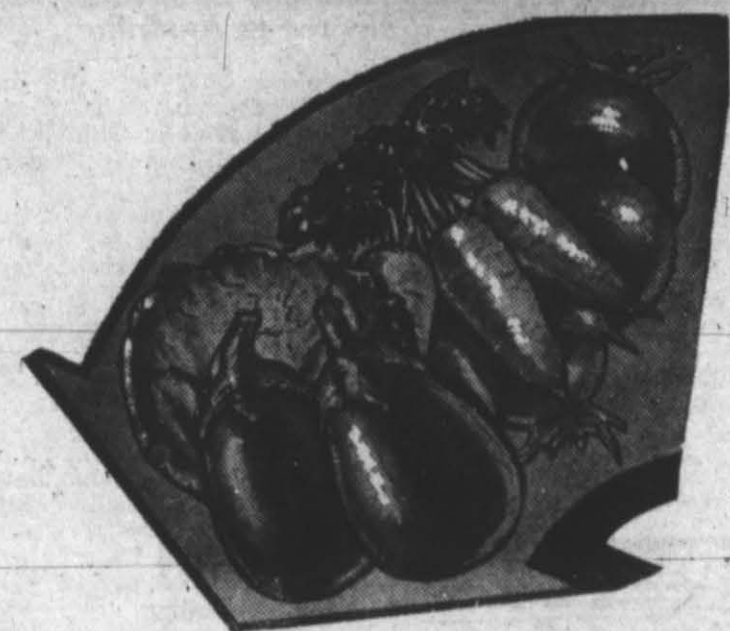

**The Bench Warmer**

As District 1-A teams swing into their conference schedule this week, most sportswriters over the area are picking the Hereford Whitefaces as the team to beat. Coach Stanton would probably be just as happy if he spotlight were turned in some other direction. There are at least a couple of teams in the conference who might take the suggestion seriously.

From this corner, on the basis of early-season games, there doesn't seem to be too firm a foundation for such a theory. The Whitefaces are the title holders, its true, but the team that takes the field this season is not the team that won the

pennant last year. The Herd is fielding a better-than-average team, and barring further injuries, has a better-than-average chance of winning the District title again—but we're not nailing any pennants to the wall at this early date.

The most obvious conclusion to be drawn from the scores of these early non-conference battles is that whoever the District 1-A titleholder may be, they're very likely to take a sound drubbing in any bi-district play-off. There's not an undefeated team in the loop, and Phillips, Perryton, and Panhandle, the Big Three of District 2-A, each hold a pair of one-sided victories over District 1 teams.

The Dalhart Wolves, who probably should be rated among the top teams in this district, have lost to both Phillips and Perryton by top-heavy scores. In the only comparison which can be drawn thus far, and its a bit far-fetched to call it a comparison at all, the Dumas Demons have lost to Perryton by a somewhat smaller margin than Dalhart, and to Panhandle by a somewhat greater margin than Hereford; which, on paper, makes the Whitefaces a little bit better than either of these conference rivals. The scores involved, if you're interested in the form sheet, were Dalhart 6, Perryton 39; Dumas 6, Perryton 28; Dumas 6, Panhandle 34; and Hereford 7, Panhandle 19. The Tulla Hornets, incidentally lost to Phillips by a score of only 20 to 6, which makes them, on paper, a touchdown better than Dalhart (who lost to the Blackhaws by 28 to 6), and following this involved reasoning about on a par with Hereford.

The Hornets, however, have lost all three starts so far—to Canadian (6-0), to Floydada (7-6) and to Phillips in that order. The Canyon Eagles, after losing their opening game to somebody the BW can't identify at the moment, have won two one-sided but unimpressive victories over the Spearman Lynx (39

to 6) and Price College (48-12). The (weak) Lynx subsequently retired from football, having lost their opener to Dumas 40-6, which makes Canyon, on paper, at least as strong as the Dumas Demons.

The other teams in the loop, Friona and Dimmitt, aren't rated as contenders this year. The Friona Chiefs, after losing two bad ones (to Morton 25-0 and WTHS 52-0) finally won a game last week over Lockney 12-6. The Bobcats have yet to score a victory, having lost to WTHS 13-0, tied Morton 13-13; and lost to Springlake 28-14.

District 1-A teams tangle in their first conference games this week-end, Friona at Hereford, Dumas at Tulla, and Canyon at Dimmitt; while the Dalhart Wolves take on another non-conference opponent, the White Deer Bucks. That whirl will clear the air a bit.

## Veterans in Farm Training Resume Subsistence Pay

The recent veterans administration interpretation of Public Law 679 which sharply reduced subsistence allowances to veterans enrolled in farm training has been rescinded, VA's Dallas Branch has been informed by the Administration's Washington Office.

"Farm trainees can now resume training under the original plan and with full subsistence payments," William T. Murphy, Director of education in the Dallas Branch advised.

"The order is retroactive to the date on which the much protested reduction interpretation went into effect. If a veteran has had a deduction made from his subsistence, VA will repay him. This is good news for some 7,500 veterans in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi. It means they will get their full 65 and 90 dollar allowances from VA as they did in the past. The order rescinding the earlier interpretation has been wired to all VA Regional offices throughout the three states. We are instructing all regions to resume operations under the original full payment plan."

According to Eldon F. Fuller, Chief, Vocational Rehabilitation and Education of the Lubbock VA region office, this new ruling will materially effect approximately 1,000 West Texas veterans enrolled in County Vocational Education Schools.

## Farm Bureau To Hold Meeting In Amarillo Oct. 8

A series of 13 district Farm Bureau meetings will be conducted throughout the state of Texas during the month of October. It has been announced by J. Walter Hammond, state Farm Bureau president.

## Southwest Markets Up for Grains; Poultry, Eggs, Cotton Says USDA

SEPTEMBER 30 (USDA)—Southwest markets reported higher prices for cotton, grain, poultry and eggs last week, stronger trends for livestock, and a weak undertone for most vegetables, according to USDA's Production and Marketing Administration.

Southwest fruits and vegetables picked up strength near the close of last week at central markets because of the Jewish holiday. Louisiana and Texas sweet potatoes moved in light volume at steady prices. Kansas honeydew melons were slightly weaker; but apples held steady.

14 percent, which brought about disparity between agriculture and other groups.

Principal topic for discussion at the forthcoming farm meeting, will be the proposals of officials of government and other groups with reference to the future of agriculture. "A careful study of agriculture's program as proposed by these people," Hammond said, "will reveal that they are the same plans offered and adopted following the first World War which led the nation into depression that not only wrecked agriculture but brought ruin to business, finance, and industry. The present-day trend is toward cheaper prices for farm products."

New Mexico moved apples and carrots at about steady prices but onions remained dull and weak. Oklahoma apples and turnip greens found fair demand at firm prices. Colorado out-ranked most states in heavy shipments of onions, potatoes, cabbage, cauliflower, tomatoes, peaches and pears. Shipping point prices ranged from steady on cabbage to dull and weak on onions.

Prices of most grain moved higher last week as supplies began to tighten. Wheat gained one to two cents a bu., oats and corn three, and barley two cents. Sorghums lost gains made early in the week but closed higher. Feed was unsettled.

Cotton jumped about \$4.50 a bale this past week to reach a new 26-year high. Farmers sold freely and received prices un-

usually high in relation to central market prices. Sales in the 10 spot markets totaled 172,500 bales last week compared with 129,500 bales a week earlier and 142,200 bales for the same week last year.

Domestic wools were active in Boston and producing areas due to a rumor of a price increase. Rush of buying took 10 million pounds of Texas wool. Adult mohair sold at 61 cents.

Spring lambs and aged sheep were generally up 25 to 50 cents a cwt. last week over the previous week's close. Southwest markets reported active trading for light supplies. Good and choice springers realized \$17.75 to \$18.25. Wichita; 17.75 to \$18, Denver; \$17.50 to \$18, Oklahoma City; and \$17, Fort Worth. Most ewes showed up at San Antonio where common and medium kinds sold at \$6.50 to \$7.

Meager supplies of hogs brought ceiling prices at all markets.

Most southwest cattle markets reported light receipts last week

with heavy runs of stockers. Active trading cleared most offerings at steady to stronger prices. Houston quoted stocker steers \$13.50 and canner and cutter cows 50 cents higher at \$6.50 to \$8.50 a cwt. Medium and good cows brought \$10.50 and stocker calves \$14 to \$15.65 at San Antonio. Medium and good slaughter steers and yearlings realized \$15 to \$18, Fort Worth and \$15.2 to \$17.25, Oklahoma City. Denver sold common and good stocker and feeder steers at \$10 to \$16. Wichita moved medium and good light stocker steers and yearlings at \$14 to \$16.

Poultry and eggs found only fair demand last week despite meat shortage. Most dealers attributed this to rising prices. Current receipt eggs ranged from 40 to 45 cents depending on locality. Heavy hens brought 40 to 41 cents a lb., New Orleans; 28 to 30, Fort Worth, 26 to 30 Denver and 26 to 28 Dallas.

dition, Blevins is contracting four Parker Brothers three. Choice of contractor is up to the individual veteran, subject only to the requirement of the Veterans Administration that any contractor must meet the minimum standards and maximum costs allowed under the program.

# Whitefaces Rout Whitedeer 51-0 in First Home Game Here Friday

## Worrell Turns Gridiron Into Race Track

Hereford's Whitefaces stamped last Friday night to smash the Whitedeer Bucks 51-0 in a non-conference game on the home field.

The Herd showed flashes of the smooth precision which sparked their T-formation to victory over the Sudan Hornets in the opening game three weeks ago, but still lacked the close coordination and timing which their tricky T demands, and made fumbles which would have been costly against a more powerful team.

Big Jim Worrell, Whiteface fullback, accounted for six of the eight Hereford touchdowns on long brokenfield runs which averaged better than 37 yards. Freddie Close rang up one counter, and the final score of the game came on a 10-yard pass from Johnnie Rogers to Raymond Lueb, which

was completed on the 10-yard stripe, Lueb crossing the goal line standing up for the score.

The Herd scored twice in the first period, three times in the second, once in the third, and twice in the fourth.

The Bucks, although they outweighed the Whitefaces on the line, were badly outclassed, but never stopped fighting and played an aggressive game until the final gun.

Whitedeer threatened only twice. The first time was in the third quarter, when Hennington's fumble was recovered on the Hereford 13 yard line; but the Whiteface line tightened and held. The final Whitedeer drive was halted by the timer's gun after the Buck's had driven from their own 35 yard line to the Hereford 8.

Worrell touched off the scoring early in the first period when he crashed off tackle on the familiar "touchdown play," got excellent blocking in the secondary, and was loose in a broken field for a 65 yard trek to pay dirt.

Worrell scored again a few minutes later after the Herd had recovered a Whitedeer fumble on the 38 yard line. Finding his intended hole at

Worrell counted again after intercepting West's pass on the 30 yard line, and dashed down the sideline to score.

The Whitefaces rang the bell again in the third period when Worrell took the ball on a lateral from Rogers and swept around end for 48 yards to score; then passed to Lueb for the extra point.

Worrell did it again in the final round, going off tackle for a 44-yard broken field run to pay-dirt.

Raymond Lueb made the final score of the game, taking Rogers' pass on the 10 yard line and racing into the end zone for another touchdown.

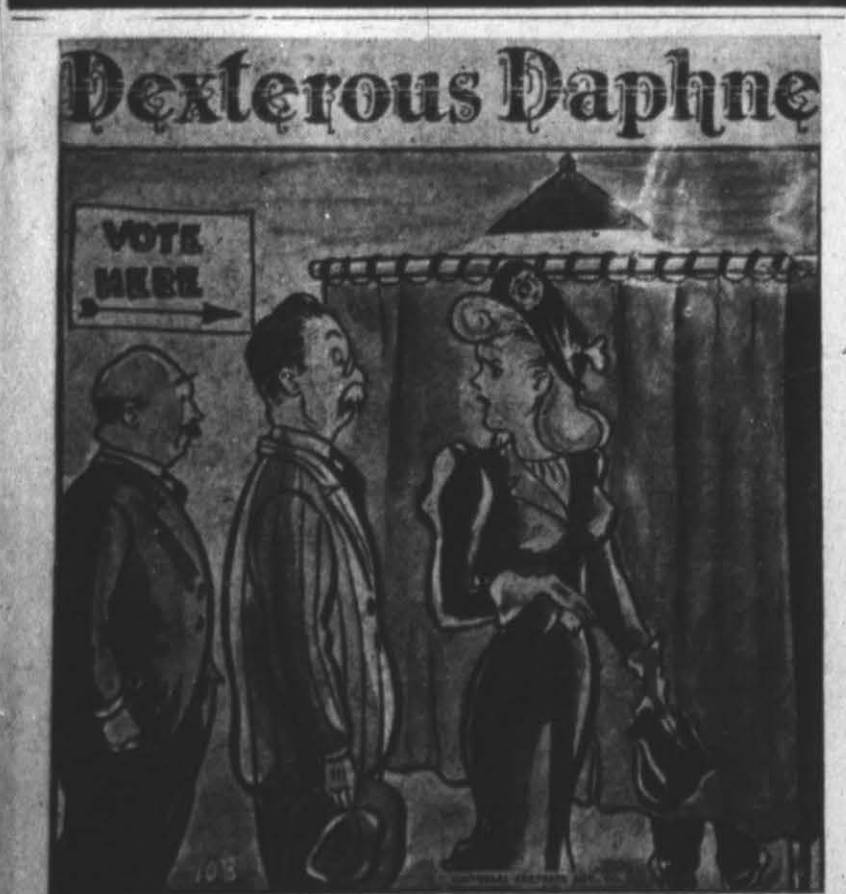

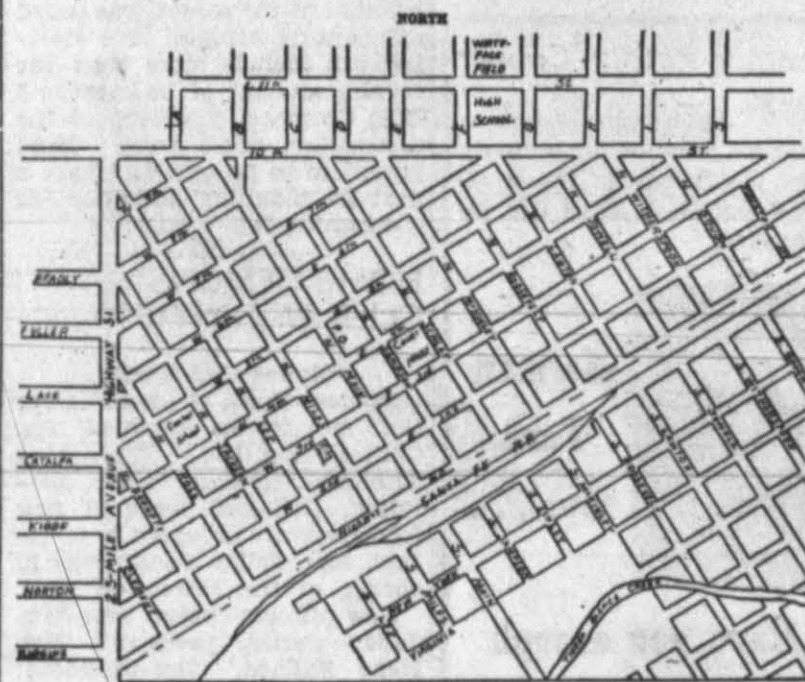
