6 License Tags Now on Sale at Sheriff's Office

New 1946 automobile license plates are now on sale at the county Tax Collector's office. The new plates were received last weekend, and the collector's office began issuing them immediately.

Two thousand six hundred and 90 plates of all types have been allotted to Deaf Smith County. Of this number, 1590 are for passenger vehicles, 250 commercial, 750 farm, and 100 trailers.

The new plates have cream numerals on black, to contrast with last year's black-on-orange combination, and are the same size as the old ones. Again this year, only one plate will be issued for each car.

Deaf Smith passenger license tags are again in the BS series. Farm trucks RD-1 and RD-2, commercial plates are MF-5, and trailers TC-2.

Vehicle owners must bring their certificate of title and last year's registration receipt with them to the collector's office when the new plates are issued. April 1 is the deadline for getting the new plates on all vehicles, but owners may start using the 1946 license plates at any time now. A few are already making their appearance around town.

Mayor Ireland to Retire; Will Not Run In April

Mayor E. S. Ireland, who has served five terms as Mayor of Hereford since he was first elected to that office in 1924, announced this week that he would not be a candidate to succeed himself in the coming city elections, which will be held April 2.

"My reasons, already known to a number of citizens," Mr. Ireland said, "are first: My physical well-being demands that I be relieved of all possible responsibility; and second: with the completion of my present term, and the 7 and one-half years I served from 1924 to 1932, I will have served altogether nine and a half years as Mayor of Hereford, long as anyone should care to serve and as long as any citizen should be expected to serve, for it means a sacrifice to anyone."

"I have served as best I could," Mayor Ireland said. "Many things remain undone that should have been done; yet much has been done... more perhaps than most people realize. There has been some criticism, some justified and some perhaps due to lack of understanding of difficulties with which we have had to deal, but in the main most people have understood and been considerate and made allowances for which we are grateful. To serve as Mayor of Hereford is an honor, and it is the duty of any citizen chosen, to accept the honor and serve to the best of his ability. There is much to be done in Hereford, and I hope we can unite in electing a Mayor and City Commission who have the best interest of the town at heart, and then get behind them in any reasonable program for the development of our town."

"Having devoted all my time to the job, naturally I have given much thought to needs of the city, and later, without presuming to dictate what should or should not be done, I may outline some things I have in mind."

Red Cross Drive Will Start Here Friday, March 1

Annual membership drive and Fund campaign of the American Red Cross will start on March 1, Mrs. Elizabeth Womble, county chairman, announced this week. Deaf Smith County's quota for 1946 is \$4,875, and Mrs. Womble announces that the local committee will confine their appeal to a single day, Friday, March 1, and attempt to raise the county's quota during that time.

Workers for the drive will be announced next week, the chairman said. The job ahead for the Red Cross is a big one, Mrs. Womble points out. The public must realize that the job during the next year will consist of work with wounded soldiers in army and navy hospitals, continuing service with men still in the armed forces, and assistance to the veteran and his family.

Also a part of the Red Cross program are peacetime services that have, during the war years, been overshadowed by the greater effort. Instead of being a war-time organization, the American Red Cross has a program that has served, is serving, and will always serve the people of the Nation and the world.

Gets Degree in June
Allen G. Plummer has enrolled at Texas A & M College for the spring semester while he was a senior student before entering the Army-Air Force. He will complete his work for a degree in rural sociology in June.

Allen spent 25 months overseas with the 13th Air Force and recently received his discharge. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Plummer.

More than 13,000 dimes rolled into the tills last month as Deaf Smith County people responded generously to the 1946 March of Dimes drive to aid victims of infantile paralysis.

Preliminary totals show that \$1349.55 has been contributed to the fund from all sources in this county during the drive. W. B. (Woody) Wilson, county chairman, announced this week, topping last year's contributions by nearly \$500.

The President's Birthday Balls, held last Thursday night, netted \$577.35. Debbs Knox and Jack Gilliland, members of the dance committee, were personally responsible for the sale of \$422.00 worth of tickets, and the County Federated Womens Clubs sold the remaining \$145.35.

The Hereford schools contributed \$114.65 during a one-day collection sponsored by the student council which brought 109 percent cooperation from the students.

Patrons of the Star and Texas Theaters contributed \$494.87 during collections made at the two shows, and the March of Dimes Collection boxes brought in an additional \$140.68. The balance, \$12.00, was received by the committee from donors by mail.

The Junior Red Cross, under direction of Mrs. Sam Hoch, aided the drive by making the collections at the theaters. "The

Grand Jury Picks Foreman; Out After Half Hour

County Grand Jury convened Monday, concurrent with the opening of the February term of District Court, and adjourned within half an hour after finding no charges requiring investigation.

Homer Ewton was elected foreman of the Grand Jury. Court opened Monday morning with a heavy docket of divorce cases set for trial. Of the 73 civil cases scheduled to come before the court, 35 are divorce actions.

Only two criminal cases have been set for trial to date. The case of Herbert Frieml, charged with cattle theft, is set for trial on February 18. This is a new trial, ordered after appeal to higher court reversed a previous conviction.

The case of Claude Calson, charged with the murder last summer of Robert Grant, who died on July 11 as result of injuries sustained in a fight at a Hereford rodeo on July 1, is set for trial on March 4.

Presbyterians Call Pastor; Will Hear Missionary Sunday

Rev. E. Wilson Cole of Paris, Texas, has been asked by the First Presbyterian Church of Hereford to accept the local pastorate, the pulp committee announced this week.

Rev. Cole conducted services here two weeks ago, and the call was issued by the Church at a meeting of the congregation last Sunday.

Rev. Cole has recently been released from the U. S. Army, where he has served as a chaplain.

Sunday morning, the Rev. Charles A. Clark, veteran missionary and acting president of the Theological Seminary of Korea, will conduct services at the Presbyterian church.

Rev. Clark went to Korea as a missionary in 1902, and has returned to the United States only five times... the last by invitation of Tojo. He has traveled widely in Japan and China.

The highest previous figure was 1955 paid poll taxes and 31 exemptions issued in 1944, the last general election year... and never passed the 1800 mark prior to 1944.

Initiations To Be Held by Knights Of Columbus Here

Ferd J. Kinane of the Austin Post, state deputy of the Knights of Columbus, will be presiding officer for the exemplification of the major degrees, to be sponsored by the Hereford Council of the Knights of Columbus on Sunday, February 10.

This initiation is the first to be held in Hereford since 1938. The degree work will commence with mass and communion at the eight o'clock mass, with Fr. Albert Heald, chaplain of the local council, as celebrant of the mass.

In the evening, beginning at 7:30 o'clock, there will be a banquet in St. Anthony's school hall. Mr. Kinane will be the principal speaker for the occasion.

Hereford council has 12 candidates for the initiation. Other candidates will be sent from Amarillo, Umparger, Nazareth, and Slaton councils, and the total is expected to be approximately 25.

The banquet will be served by the wives of the members of the local council.

Kinane is head of the state insurance department of the Knights of Columbus, and is an authority of K of C insurance plans.

First National Bank Will Move Quarters Monday

That the First National Bank will be open for business in the old First State Building on Monday morning, Feb. 11 was today announced by E. B. Hedrick, president, who said that contractors will in the near future start remodeling the present First National building. The bank will be open through Saturday in the present location.

In making the announcement, Mr. Hedrick said that the present bank quarters will be remodeled throughout and modernized, including new equipment and fixtures in most departments. The remodeled building will extend through to the alley, giving a floor space of 25 by 140 feet and when completed will feature many improvements which will be of convenience to patrons.

Among changes in the new building will be a much larger lobby. Present vaults will be replaced and moved to the rear of the building and more safe deposit boxes added. Other improvements will include a personal loan department and a night depository.

The Collins Bank Fixture Company of Dennison, Texas, are architects and designers on the building, with Baker Bros., Dallas, as contractors.

"We realize that we will be in cramped quarters in the temporary location and that service will be greatly impaired during the time we remain there," Mr. Hedrick said. "However, we believe that your temporary inconvenience will be well repaid when we are able to return to the remodeled quarters—and to give you real, modern banking service."

Veterinarian Begins Testing Cattle In County This Week

A government veterinarian, Dr. L. D. Chedester, is in Deaf Smith county at the present time testing cattle for tuberculosis, according to F. C. Collier of the ACA office.

Dr. Chedester is making tests on all cattle in the county in order to re-accredit Deaf Smith County for tuberculosis. He will notify all cattle owners as to what time and date he will be able to test individual herds. There is no charge for the service.

Whitefaces Lose to Friona Cagers Here Last Monday Night

After having gone down in defeat Monday evening after a tussle with the Friona Indians, the Hereford Whitefaces under the direction of Coach Johnny Guyer are working harder this week in preparation for a game with the West Texas State High Calves to be played Friday afternoon at Canyon.

With Lueb as high-point man for the Whitefaces with 9 points, the A team was defeated by a score of 38 to 28 Monday night. In the last half of this game, Hereford outscored Friona by ringing up 19 points to the opponent's 16. Lacey of Friona was highpoint man of the game with 15 points, 10 of which he scored in the third quarter.

In the B team's game, Friona won by a score of 23 to 11, and Harvey scored the most points for the Whitefaces.

More than three thousand Italian prisoners of war were sent from the local Prisoner of War Camp to the Los Angeles Port of Embarkation last week end for repatriation to their homes in Italy as the Hereford Prisoner of War Camp prepared to close operations.

Only a skeleton staff of officers and enlisted men remain at the camp, with Capt. Julius H. Davenport now in command. Capt. Davenport succeeds Col. Ralph Carvouth as commanding officer of the camp. Col. Carvouth has been transferred to Fort Bliss.

No information is available now as to when the camp will be officially closed and the local garrison transferred to other duty, Capt. Davenport said.

Three thousand and 99 prisoners of war were shipped to Los Angeles from the camp here on four special troop trains, the last trainload leaving Saturday.

Included in this number were more than 200 prisoners recently transferred here from the Dalhart camp, which is now closed.

The Hereford Camp was placed on the surplus list by the War Department effective February 1.

Among the prisoners here was one Italian general, and 693 officers. Many of the prisoners had been at the Hereford camp since it opened, having been captured in the initial battles of the North African campaign.

Final disposition of the Hereford camp is still unsettled. No further developments regarding the proposed establishment of an agriculture experiment station.

Clovis Chamber of Commerce Boosts POW Camp Plan

A resolution supporting the proposed establishment of an agriculture experiment station at the Hereford Prisoner of War camp, to be operated by A & M College, was published by the Clovis (New Mexico) Chamber of Commerce last week.

The resolution stated, in part, that "there is much evidence that many useful services and economic benefits would accrue from the P. O. W. Campsite if converted into an Agriculture Experiment Station, and that these benefits would directly aid business, ranchers, small farm operators, 4-H clubs, and all types of agricultural associations of the entire region."

"We resolve," the article stated, "that the War Department make the transfer (of the campsite) promptly through proper federal agency without declaring the property surplus on the competitive market; and we endorse the efforts to hold these lands and buildings as the nucleus for the development of an Agriculture Experiment Station which will foster the knowledge and technical investigations... which are important to the future of Eastern New Mexico, West Texas, and western Oklahoma."

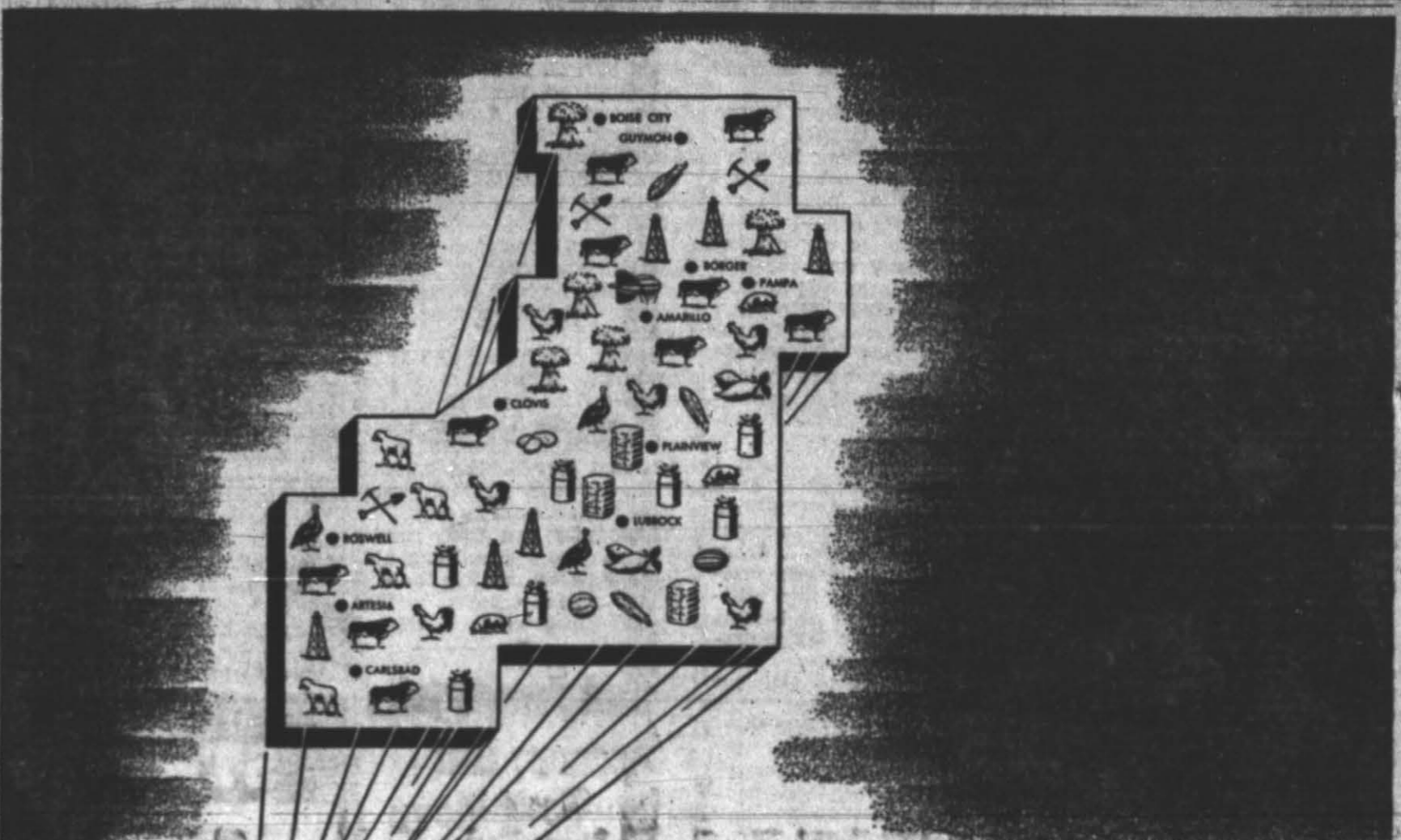

The awards will be presented by Lt. Commander Harold C. Benedict of State Selective Service Headquarters, acting on behalf of Governor Coke Stevenson.

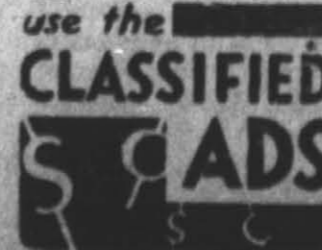

Navy Ups Limit On Package Size For O'Seas Mail

Regulations governing mailing of packages to Naval personnel overseas have been changed to conform with the regulations set up by the army recently. Postmaster J. R. Lipcomb announced this week.

Effective February 1, the regulation sets the maximum size of packages for overseas mailing at 42 inches in length, and combined length and breadth of not over 72 inches. Maximum weight of each package is increased to 11 pounds.

No request is necessary to mail packages to Naval personnel. This regulation governs all personnel overseas in Navy, Marines and Coast Guard.

Spuds Top Carload Shipments by Rail From County in '45

Shipment of potatoes from Deaf Smith County have nearly tripled in the last three years. Santa Fe records show, fifteen hundred and 75 carloads of potatoes were shipped from this county during 1945, as compared with 599 carloads in 1943.

Wheat took a drop this year to a total of 1,024 carloads, as compared with 1562 in '43, but was balanced by the big increase in spud shipments.

Three thousand six hundred and 86 carloads of produce were shipped over Santa Fe during 1945. In addition to the spuds and wheat, carload shipments included 1 car of rye, 372 carloads of Milo, two cars of can seed, 2 carloads of sudan, 316 carloads of cattle, 146 carloads of hogs, 19 cars of barley, 45 cars of sheep, 148 cars of flour, 4 cars of scrap iron, 3 cars of scrap tin, 2 carloads of implements, 5 cars of canned goods, 3 carloads of onions, and 2 cars of eggs.

But the strangest cargo is the two carloads of that good Deaf Smith county water exported to California.

No figures are available on the amount of livestock and produce shipped from the county by truck during the year.
