People Favor More Gas Tax For Farm-To-Market Roads

AUSTIN, Nov. 23.—Seven out of ten Texans are willing to tax themselves an additional penny on each gallon of gasoline they buy in order to improve their farm-to-market roads.

The Texas Poll, in its latest state-wide sampling, finds the idea expressed in the following question has the approval of all important segments of the population: "Would you be for or against paying one cent more per gallon on the gasoline tax to be used for building roads from farms to markets?"

The need for better rural roads was an issue emphasized by practically every candidate in last summer's Democratic primaries. Most of the office seekers, however, failed to specify how they would raise the money. Attempts will likely be made to place the problem before the next Texas legislature when it convenes in January.

Analysis of the questionnaires collected in the survey shows that automobile owners — who would pay the additional tax and use the roads — are more in favor of the proposal than people who have no cars. Farmers, naturally, are the most enthusiastic over improved county roads. Tabulations by auto and farm ownership follows (percentages):

Army Will Try For 'Shooting Stars'
 WHITE SANDS, N.M., Nov. 23. —The army is making plans for its first night shoot of a German V-2 rocket on Dec. 17 in an effort to create tiny manmade shooting stars.

Aleman Takes Mexico Reins Next Sunday

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 23. (P)—Miguel Aleman, lawyer and politician, will be Mexico's first civilian president when he takes office Dec. 1 in the marble Palacio de Bellas Artes, showplace of Mexico built by an art-loving president, Gen. Porfirio Diaz.

Aleman was elected July 7 in what many Mexicans described as the first "honest election" ever held in this country, where more often than not pistols have ruled the ballot boxes.
 President Manuel Avila Camacho, who ends his six-year term Sunday, kept good his promise for an equal opportunity for every voter at the polls. There were many charges of fraud, of stuffed ballot boxes and of coercion, but the supreme court found no reason to dispute the results of the Aleman landslide.

Many observers believe Aleman, because of his support by the powerful government party (PRI), could have won the election without making a campaign speech or leaving his swivel chair.
 However, from the start of the campaign Aleman was on the stump speaking in every state of the union. He came in contact with as many people as possible, supplementing his speaking tour with round table discussions in various parts of the country on nearly every phase of national life.

It was upon information gathered during the round table talks that he built his six-year program which calls for expanded industrialization of this essentially agrarian country, better farming practices, with more machinery to produce bigger crops, a sound labor-management plan to give the industrialization impetus, a vast farm-to-market highway program and better rail facilities to improve the nation's agricultural economy, and an efficient, honest government.

GI Survivors Given Special Federal Help

At 20, this young woman was a widow with three children to support.

Her husband, who had been discharged from the Navy in good health, had died a month afterwards in an accident. He was in farm work and thus was not covered by Social Security benefits. The Veterans Administration could not participate because the husband had been discharged in good health.

For the time being the Red Cross and other welfare agencies could help. Then on Aug. 12, 1946, an amendment was signed to the social security act which opened a new avenue of relief to the young mother and her dependents.

In effect, under terms of the amendment, the veterans' average monthly wage of \$160 toward old-age and survivors insurance benefits was established. Although this certainly did not put her on easy street, it did open a means whereby she and the dependents will receive \$63

monthly. When each child reaches the age of 16, benefits will stop in that particular instance. When the last child reaches 18, the widow's benefits cease also, but when she is 65 years of age, if she has not remarried, benefits will be resumed.
 This is typical of the benefits open to survivors of deceased GIs under terms of the amendment. In case of veterans who died before Aug. 10, 1946, benefits are retroactive to time of death provided claims are filed with the nearest social security office (San Angelo) before Feb. 10, 1947. Application on account of veterans who died since Aug. 10 or any application filed after Feb. 10, 1947 are retroactive for only three months.

Decision Due On New Air Service For Big Spring

Pioneer Airlines officials Saturday advised the local chamber of commerce that they expect action to be taken within the next few days on the company's request to begin a new east-west service through Big Spring.

Previously, a trial examiner for the Civil Aeronautics Board had recommended that Pioneer be authorized to institute a new line from Midland and Odessa to Big Spring and on eastward to Abilene and Dallas. Intermediate stops listed in the original application included Sweetwater, Breckenridge, Mineral Wells and Fort Worth.

Pioneer also has submitted application to begin service on proposed new lines from Abilene to Wichita Falls, from Abilene to Austin, one via Tyler and another via Temple. Other West Texas franchises being sought by the company include a route from Lubbock to San Angelo, via Midland and Odessa.

He had a flair for playing the music the public loves to hear, including popular selections and such classics as Debussy's Clair de Lune, Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue, Chopin's Polonaise and Warsaw Concerto, all with Rubinoff arrangements for the violin.

The musician will bring here for his concert his Stradivarius violin, which he reputedly insures for \$100,000. The instrument is said to possess beautiful tonal qualities.

T&P Adds Through Sleeper Service To West Coast

A new sleeping car service connecting Big Spring with Los Angeles goes into effect today, with the first train carrying the new pullman due to leave here at 6:05 a.m. Monday, the Texas and Pacific railroad has announced.

Arrangements have been completed for adding a pullman with 12 sections and one drawing room to train No. 7 from Dallas west-

ward. G. L. Brooks, general agent for the Big Spring division, said. Los Angeles scheduled at 9:25 a.m., Pacific Time.

The new service also includes reserved seat chair cars from Dallas to Los Angeles, Brooks said.

The west coast service of train No. 7 is in addition to sleeper and coaches already carried by the Sunshine Special, which leaves Big Spring at 11:50 p.m.

Union of California No. 1-F Mrs. A. C. Means estate in Andrews county flowed oil to pits for six minutes, partially cleaning itself, after shooting with 180 quarts of nitroglycerin from 4,615-90 feet. It had 600 feet of oil in the hole when cleaned out to 4,675.

The test is in the C NW NE 1-A 46-pl, two miles south and slightly west of production in the Means field and 1 3/4 miles north-northwest of the town of Andrews.

Shell and Texaco No. 4 Ratliff & Bedford in southwestern Andrews flowed 101.24 barrels of oil in eight hours, with six per cent acid water and four per cent basic sediment. It had acidized the Devonian with 6,000 gallons through casing perforations at 8,874-9,008 feet. The well, which also indicated production from the Ellenburger, is near the C SW NE 15-A42-pl, 1,765 feet southwest of No. 2 Ratliff & Bedford, a producer one quarter mile south of the discovery.

Samson No. 1 J. B. Robertson marked a 3-4 west-northwest extension to the Robertson pool in Gaines county by establishing a natural daily flowing potential of 314.96 barrels of oil from pay at 6,355-6,430 feet. It is in the C SE SE 20-A24-pl.

Argo No. 1 Mrs. Dora Roberts in southeastern Reeves county, bidding for discovery production at a record depth in the Delaware Basin, recovered some new oil in swabbing after treating from 9,898-10,875 feet with 2,000 gallons of mud acid. The section is believed to be the Wolfcamp, basal Permian. No. 1 Roberts is in the C NE NE 294-12-H&GN, 13 miles northeast of Balmorhea.

A northwest extension to the Slaughter field in Cochran county, Mid-Continent No. 1 M. C. Ellis in labor 13, league 63, Midland county school land survey, was finaled from acidized pay at 4,806-30 feet with a daily flowing potential of 612.44 barrels.

The three sections are out of block 33, Esp. 1-S, T&P survey. This transaction ran the week's warranty deed total to \$176,560, and moved the year's aggregate up to \$3,113,408.

Tests Near For Explorations In Mitchell

Two northwest Mitchell county explorations were nearly the test stage at the end of the week. Five-inch casing was cemented in the Sun Oil No. 1 Allen Jameson, northwestern Coke county, a Pennsylvania wildcat which promises production. In southeastern Dawson county, Ray Albaugh slugged his No. 1 O. H. Morris, a projected 4,000-foot rotary test, at around 3,500 feet with no shows. The wildcat, four and a half miles north of Ackerly, was 1,980 feet from the north and west lines of section 32-34-3n, T&P. The Sun No. 1 Jameson cemented casing at 6,205 feet with 200 sacks after recovering 500 feet of sweet, green 44-gravity oil on a 45-minute drill stem test from 6,202-30 feet. It is in the C SE SW 1A, H&TC, one mile southeast of Old Silver. Sun reportedly paid V. McCabe \$40 an acre for his lease on sections 231 and 232 in block L-A, H&TC, in Mitchell county, about two miles north of No. 1 Jameson. Pay was thought to be from the crinoidal (trawn) zone. In Mitchell county, Tobe Foster No. 1 John Womack, section 6, Cuthbert strip, waited on pumping unit after cleaning cut from shot. Norman & Roche No. 1. R. Coleman, the discovery well which was shot after previous acidization, cleaned out to 2,765 and swabbed 75 barrels. Norman & Roche No. 2 Cole-

man, also in section 70-97, H&TC, drilled at 1,725 feet in lime after topping the section at 1,660 feet. Tobe Foster No. 2 Womack set 12 1/2-inch surface string at 65 feet. Doswell & Morgan No. 1 S. R. Coleman, section 8, Cuthbert strip, set six-inch string at 2,581 feet and waited on cement to set. J. B. Tubbs et al No. 1 Chester Jones, extreme northwestern Mitchell exploration, seeking Vincent pay, in section 60-20, LaVaca, was at 1,560 feet in anhydrite and salt. Humble No. 1 Mary E. Turner, Midland county deep wildcat, recovered 210 feet of gas-cut mud on an unsatisfactory drill-stem test from 11,350-394 feet, but the testing tool was said to be clogged with cuttings. Drilling continued at 11,396 feet in Devonian lime and chert. The Texas company staked No. 68-A J. E. Mabee, 3,341 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the east line of section 32-39-2n, G&MMB&A, a 5,000 exploration in the Mabee field of northwestern Martin county. E. J. Gray staked No. 1 T. J. Ellis et al 2,310 feet from the north and east lines of section 11797, H&TC, for a 1,800-foot Sharon ridge test in Scurry county. C. W. Guthrie staked his No. 1-A TXL, 330 feet out of the southeast corner of the southwest quarter of section 43-30-1s, T&P, a 3,500 exploration between the Snyder and Chalk pool of the Howard-Glassecock field. It is nine miles south of Coahoma. A 2,000-foot operation a mile and a quarter from the Sharon Ridge pool and five miles southwest of the Dunn community has been staked by John Ostriel, Snyder, in Scurry county.

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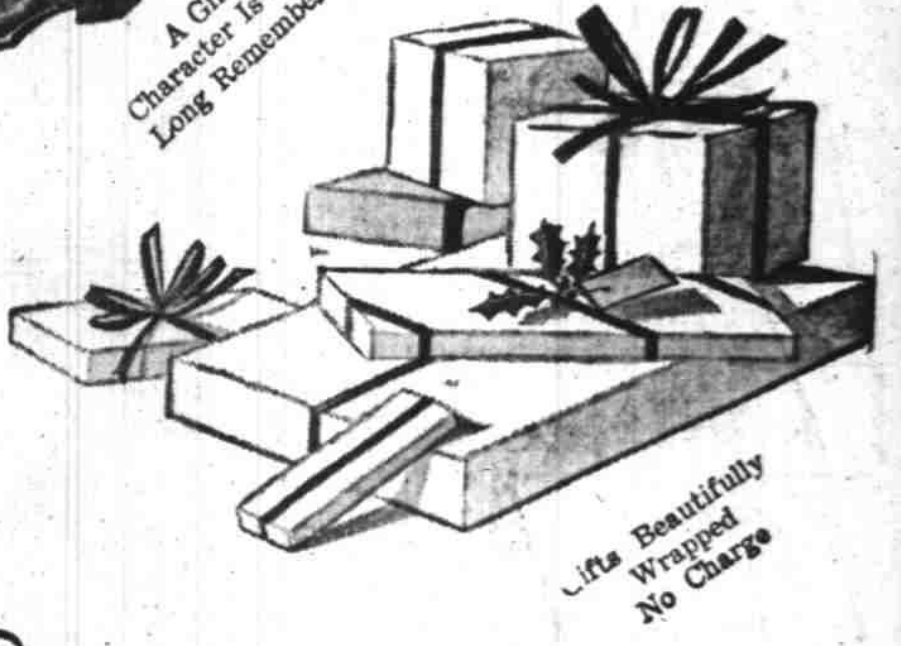

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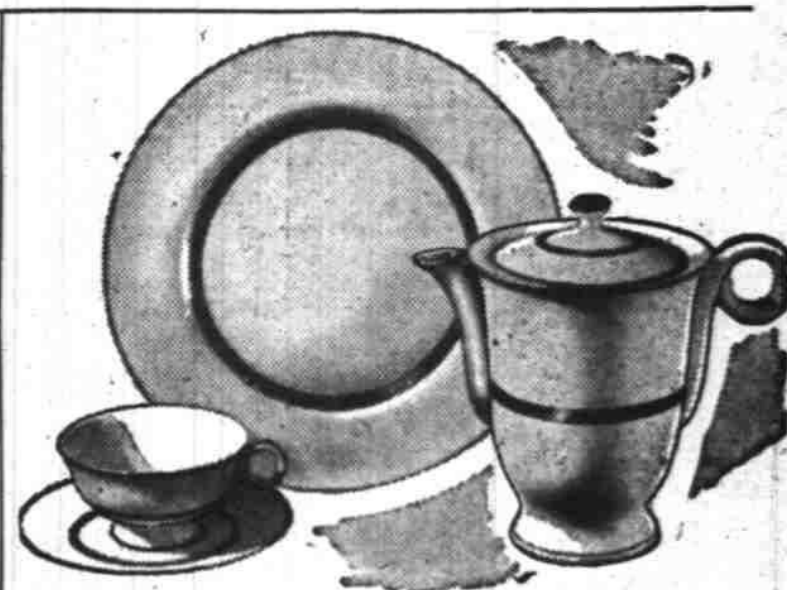

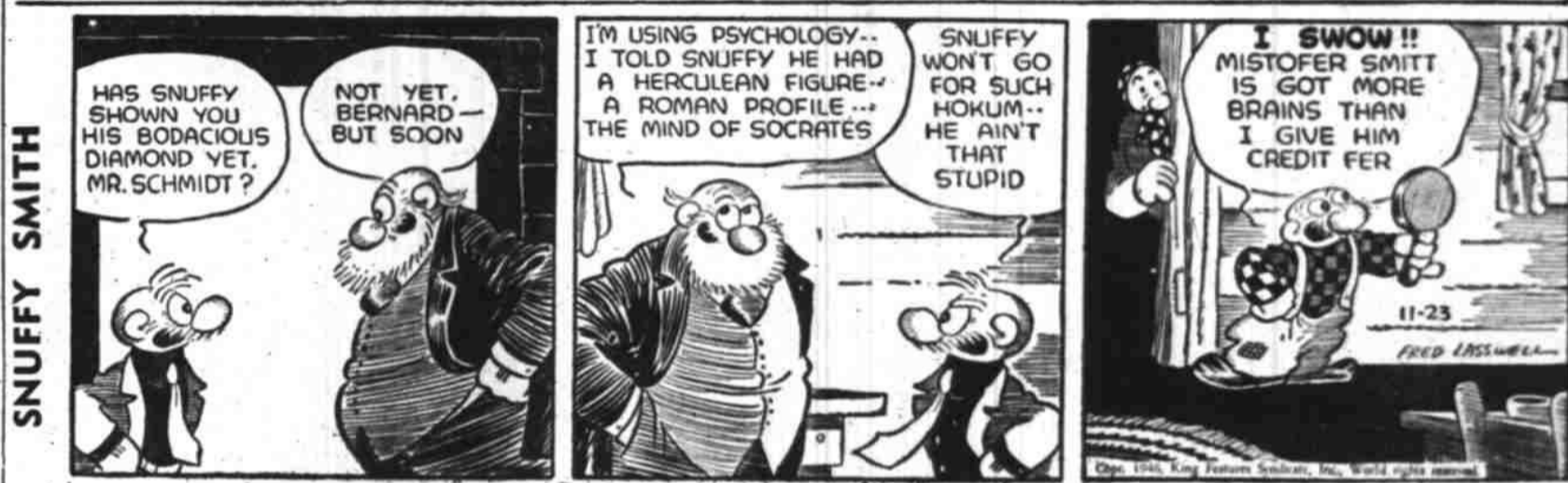
