C. R. Anthony to
Open Store Here
In New Building

Construction is already underway on a new business building on Main Street, just south of Cave's Variety Store, which will be occupied by C. R. Anthony Company Department Store.

The new store will open on July 1 if the building is completed on schedule, according to M. A. Lyons, vice-president of the firm, of Oklahoma City, who was in Hereford Wednesday.

The building is being constructed by Francis Hardwick. It will be of brick and tile construction, Hardwick said, and will be 40 feet by 140 feet with a 50-foot mezzanine and offices above the show windows. The building will be air conditioned and wired for fluorescent lighting throughout.

This will be the 75th store opened by C. R. Anthony, Mr. Lyons said. Fifteen are in Texas. The company already has stores in Amarillo, Plainview and Clovis. General offices are in Oklahoma City.

The new department store will carry a complete line of clothing for both men and women and children.

"We will employ all local people, with the exception of the manager and, possibly, the assistant manager," Lyons stated.

Mr. Lyons was accompanied by F. H. Zhan, company engineer, also of Oklahoma City.

"Cease Fire" Order Issued to Fire
Cracker Tossers by City Police

Numerous complaints have been made to the city Police department and the Sheriff's office regarding the tossing of firecrackers in town during the past several days, according to Educe Wooddell, city officer.

Several near accidents have occurred in which personal injury or property damage could have been very serious as a result of the local surge of firecrackers, Wooddell said.

For example, the car of youngsters who threw the lighted firecracker into a filling station while the attendant was servicing a customer's car might have exploded the exposed gasoline and caused a serious fire, possibly at the cost of burns or even the life of some innocent person.

Two school elections are scheduled Saturday. Elections have been ordered on Saturday, April 6, for both county and rural district school trustees and for the Hereford Independent School district board of trustees.

The Hereford board election will be held at the county courthouse, polls opening at eight o'clock in the morning and closing at seven o'clock in the evening. Election judges are Claud Ricketts, John Patton and W. R. Scheffgen.

Three trustees must be elected. The names of D. H. Alexander, Cliff Hicks, and Louie LeGrand, the three members whose terms are expiring, will appear on the ballot for re-election.

No other nominees were received before the March 26 deadline, when all petitions to place names of candidates on the ballot were required to be turned in.

In the county board elections, two members of the county school board and eight district trustees are to be named.

Polls will be set up Saturday in each of the common school districts in the county with election judges appointed by the presidents of the Board in each district. Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

County trustees whose terms expire on April 30 are G. W. Wilson from precinct 1 and E. H. Norton, trustee for the county at large.

District trustees whose terms are expiring are L. H. Lookingbill in District 1 (Summerfield); Carl Wimberley in District 2 (Dawn); Dock Robinson in District 4 (Wyche); M. C. Kaul in District 5 (Westway); Edwin Morrison in District 6 (Bippus-Walcott); Zerrell Thomas in District 7 (Ford); Fred Saltzman in District 8 (Ward) and George Messenger in District 10 (Messenger).

Blanton Are Named on City Commission

Veterans to Give Away Jeep on "X-Day"

W. E. Dameron was elected Mayor of Hereford and Lyle Blanton and J. C. McCracken were named City Commissioners, in the municipal election Tuesday.

With only one commissioner place contested and no opposition to Dameron's candidacy for Mayor, there was little interest evidenced in the election and only a light vote cast. Only 188 ballots were counted when the polls closed at seven o'clock Tuesday evening.

Dameron polled 183 votes for the Mayor's office. One write-in ballot was cast for Homer Fox, who had refused to have his name placed on the ballot after being nominated for the Mayor's office in a last-minute petition last Thursday.

T. W. Alderson was the defeated candidate for Commissioner.

McCracken, the only candidate for re-election, polled 163 votes in the commissioner's race. Blanton received 104 votes, and Alderson trailed with 98.

The date for the newly elected officials to take office has not yet been definitely set. Terms of the present administration will expire officially on April 30, but retiring Commissioner N. E. Gass has indicated that the administration may be turned over to the new mayor and council at an earlier date.

Gass and Mayor E. S. Ireland had refused to be candidates for re-election this year.

Election officials were W. E. Witherspoon and W. E. Dunlap, judges, and Mrs. Nona Jewell and Mrs. Earl Phillips, clerks.
