## **Astronauts facing** shuttle repair job

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) - A loose seal on a cargo bay door presented an unexpected chore today for NASA engineers on the ground, as well as the prospect of a spacewalk for two Columbia astronauts. A long piece of weatherstripping came loose along the edge of a door

covering the bay during launch and landing. The 60-foot-long doors must close tightly for the fiery re-entry into the Earth's atmosphere or the shuttle could burn up. If the doors close properly, but the loose seal causes a gap, the shuttle could be damaged. Engineers have studied the problem since it was discovered shortly after Wednesday's launch and are considering sending two of the seven

astronauts on board out to fix it. National Aeronautics and Space Administration engineers planned to duplicate the problem today on the shuttle Discovery at Kennedy Space Center in Cape Canaveral, Fla.

"There are no real concerns that we couldn't today, right now if we needed to, crush that seal and latch the doors down," NASA flight director Randy Stone said Thursday. "But it's always the better part of valor to

analyze things in their entirety.' Several white blankets of insulation also came loose in the payload bay, probably at the same time the seal was loosened, in a rush of trapped cargo bay air into the vacuum of space.

If the crew can close the doors tight enough, a spacewalk may not be neccessary. But if need be, astronauts James Bagian and Tamara Jernigan could take a spacewalk as early as Sunday, Stone said. They would either snap the seal back in place or snip it off. It should take about 1 1/2 hours.

Bagian is part of the four-member research team conducting comprehensive medical tests in Spacelab, a compartment the size of a small bus stored in the bay and connected by a tunnel to the shuttle's crew compartment.

The astronauts worked in the lab for the third day in a row today, collecting blood samples from each other and monitoring other bodily functions to determine the effects of weightlessness on humans. They also moved urine samples from a Spacelab refrigerator back into a middeck refrigerator that got too warm Thursday night and had to be emptied.

AUSTIN - ClayDesta National Bank, owned by former gubernatorial candidate Clayton Williams, has been ordered to pay more than \$1 million in restitution after pleading no contest in connection with an insurance

AUSTIN - Lawmakers may have another stab at ethics, but not until they finish writing a state budget, Gov. Ann Richards said. Richards defended the ethics bill passed by the Legislature, but declined Thursday to say whether she would sign it into law.

EL PASO - While El Paso Electric Co. was being served with a warrant this week in an insurance investment scandal, the utility's attorneys were in Austin asking for a \$131.3 million customer rate hike.

FORT WORTH - Chances for saving Carswell Air Force Base appear to be dwindling. Staff members of the base-closing commission agreed Thursday with plans to shut down the base, including its hospital.

# **NASA** saves station other programs cut

WASHINGTON (AP) - The House pulled the \$30 billion space station program back from the brink of financial death, but NASA might have to pay dearly for the victory through cuts in its other programs.

A 240-173 House vote Thursday restored nearly \$2 billion in space station funds that had been deleted in committee from a massive appropriations bill for housing, veterans and space.

But unless more money can be found later in the budget process, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration would have to find the funds among its own science, technology, aerodynamics and other endeavors.

"It would be a very, very difficult problem for us," said NASA Administrator Richard Truly.

The vote was a victory for President Bush, who had lobbied hard for the space station. The National Space Council said its chairman, Vice President Dan Quayle, even called House members while on a trip through Eastern Europe.

Salvaging the station was NASA's space agency has "many programs that don't make sense" without it, Truly said. Loss of the station would leave the program "totally fractured," he said.

The orbiting laboratory, seven years and \$5.6 billion in the planning, is the centerpiece of America's space effort for the rest of the decade and well into the 21st century. Without it, some supporters claimed, there might not be a U.S. manned space said Rep. Jack Brooks, D-Texas. program after the mid-1990s.

'Americans aren't willing to let some other space-faring nation lead the quest for this next frontier," said Rcp. Bill Lowery, R-Calif., co-author of the winning amendment which

allows \$1.9 billion to be spent on the space station in the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1.

The amendment by Lowery and Rep. Jim Chapman, D-Texas, reversed a decision by the House Appropriations Committee to cut nearly all money from the station. It passed only with strong backing from Republicans.

The station and the \$13.9 billion NASA budget were part of an \$80.9 billion spending bill. It also included \$32.6 billion for the Department of Veterans Affairs and \$24.4 billion for the Department of Housing and Urban Development. The bill next goes to the Senate.

"With Space Station Freedom, there can be no serious debate that we will make scientific discoveries, make medical breakthroughs, improve technology," Chapman said.

But Rep. Bob Traxler, chairman of the appropriations subcommittee that handles NASA spending, saw a darker picture.

"You are funding the station at the most important issue because the expense of every other NASA program," said Traxler, D-Mich. "It means space science programs are

virtually wiped out.' After six hours of debate, Republicans voted for the station, 133-27, while Democrats split 145-107 against.

"If we aim to become a second-class nation, then we should go ahead and kill the space program, kill the space station and kill it all."

Opponents denounced the withholding of help for veterans, the poor, the environment for the sake of a program that Rep. Dick Zimmer, R-N.J., called "a budgetary black hole in space."

# Local Roundup Texas farmers request relief

USDA spokesman Albert Maruggi said the agency was doing everything possible to help farmers affected by weather, and is being flexible when

> Rep. Larry Combest, R-Lubbock, said West Texas cotton farmers also are approaching disaster as each day passes without rain and planting time

'Dryland producers on the Texas Plains are suffering significantly, said Combest. "Dry, hot windy conditions like we have had on the South Plains during the past weeks threaten disaster for 75 percent of the dryland cotton in the western and southwestern South Plains counties."

Combest, who represents the nation's largest-cotton producing district, said 880,000 acres on the High Plains need a good rain for planting. He is co-sponsoring legislation that would provide disaster assistance to producers of all crops affected by extreme weather in 1991.

Joe Rankin, president of the Texas Farmers Union and a cotton farmer from Crosby County, urged Congress to pass a disaster act this year. He told the committee that a failure to plant 1 million cotton acres around Lubbock would result in the loss of \$500 million to the regional economy.

"We're at the bottom of the line," said Rankin. "A lot of people out there don't have any crop and zero crops means zero income.'

'This is a national disaster," said Michael V. Dunn, vice president-legislative services for the National Farmers Union.

But Dunn acknowledged a tough fight ahead in convincing Congress and the administration to support a disaster relief bill.

# Long eclipse expected

HOUSTON (AP) - The longest total solar eclipse for the next 140 years will occur July 11 in a 160-mile wide strip, stretching from Hawaii across the Pacific Ocean to Baja, Calif., and across Mexico and Central America to Brazil, astronomers from the Johnson Space Center say.

"Originally, we thought it would be the longest eclipse of the century. But it's much more significant than that," said Paul Maley of the Johnson Space Center Astronomical Society in Houston.

'It will be visible for about three hours, in various stages, along that stretch that runs primarily through Mexico," Maley said. "The eclipse paths are very long - 6,000 miles in length - but the width of the path is

very narrow - about 160 miles wide." An estimated 40 million people are expected to witness the moon pass in front of the sun, casting the area in total darkness, Maley said. And millions more, like those in Texas and southern California, will be able to see a partial eclipse.

Bank pleads no contest

AUSTIN (AP) - ClayDesta and court costs. National Bank, owned by former gubernatorial candidate Clayton Williams, has been ordered to pay more than \$1 million in restitution after pleading no contest in connection with an insurance scheme which prosecutors said the bank had planned to take statewide.

The Midland bank was convicted Thursday of a misdemeanor charge of criminally violating the state insurance code under a program in which customers seeking car loans were forced to buy costly life

ClayDesta, founded by defeated Republican gubernatorial nominee Williams in 1982, was ordered by Travis County Court at Law Judge David Puryear to pay up to \$1.13 million in restitution, plus a \$500 fine

The sentence followed terms of an agreement the bank negotiated over several months with Travis County officials. Wayne Merritt, president of

ClayDesta for the past six months, hailed the end of the Travis County investigation. "As far as I'm concerned, this is

the conclusion of the matter, and we're very pleased that it's going to be over so we can lift this cloud that's been placed over the bank and go back to doing what banks do," he

ClayDesta pleaded no contest to a charge of contracting with car loan broker Lloyd Williams Jr. of Houston, who prosecutors said "unlawfully solicited, marketed and required credit life and disability

transactions" and was not licensed to act as an insurance agent. Under the scheme, high-risk

insurance in hundreds of

customers were required to purchase expensive credit life insurance policies, underwritten by Service Life & Casualty Insurance Co. of Austin, as a condition of obtaining car loans from ClayDesta, said Travis County Attorney Ken Oden, who prosecuted

Such insurance would pay off the loans if the buyer could not pay because of illness or death. State law allows a banker to require such insurance, but it bars a lender from dictating where the insurance must be purchased.

The bank received 50 to 85 percent of the \$900,000 in premium payments, Oden said.

Manuel T. and Mary Ann Cantu of



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

"It's just a matter of emotion. I certainly didn't try to taunt anybody. I think he took it out of context, misunderstood what I was doing."

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

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

But West Mesquite loaded the bases in the bottom of the sixth on pitcher Ronnie Teaff.

Chad Southard relieved Teaff, and a walk, groundout and fly ball brought in three runs. With a runner on first, Jeff Boatner singled to right field and the ball rolled under Shane Brister's glove to the fence with the baserunner and Boatner scoring.

A walk and infield error put two West Orange-Stark runners on in the seventh with one out, but Chris Knowles lined to second for a double play, ending the game.

Southard, whose record was not available, was the loser. Michael Taylor (13-2) was the winner, allowing eight hits over seven innings.

West Orange-Stark had four errors, and twice botched plays at second after a runner had been caught off first. West Mesquite erred five times.

That game ended and the next one started with the temperature on the artificial turf about 115 degrees, peaking a few degrees higher.

**DEAR ANN LANDERS: This is** for the Indiana interpreter for the deaf who was incensed at the TV station's unwillingness to use a "singer" or closed captioning. The station manager said the viewers would be beach and around swimming pools. distracted and complain.

I work for the Family Service Association in Dayton, Ohio, a nonprofit social service agency that offers community services for the deaf. For years our clients complained about the lack of access to local news. The problem was accentuated when there was a major train car derailment in a nearby community and noxious fumes spread from the overturned tanker car.

Although the local television stations provided outstanding coverage and emergency evacuation plans, it was not closed-captioned or interest in the subject. You will be signed. For the thousands of deaf residents, it was a scary moment.

Soon after, we did research on closed-captioning and began a campaign among our deaf community, families and friends. We sent petitions to local stations asking them to consider closed-captioning their broadcasts.

Our dream was realized after meeting with Phil Stolz, former general manager of WDTN-TV 2 in Dayton. Here was a general manager who, along with a compassionate staff, understood. The station agreed to have a signer in the corner of the screen and then purchased the necessary equipment for closedcaptioning local news.

The response was overwhelming. The station installed a TDD (Telecommunication Device for the Deaf) Jay Leno says he had no idea his so it could receive phone calls from the deaf. The calls poured in. In 1990, WDTN-TV was recognized by the governor's office of Advocacy for People with Disabilities for its contribution to the deaf community. The corporate responsibility of WDTV has resulted in better ratings.

My advice to our Indiana colleague is -- don't give up. Work with local agencies that serve the deaf and encourage them to mobilize their clients, their families and friends to demand access from their local stations. Grassroots advocacy worked for us and it can work for

you. -- Karen DeMasi, Family Service Association, Dayton, Ohio
