City May Get **Buildings** for Labor Camp

A solution to Hereford's critical transient labor housing problem appeared possible this week after a three day conference in Fort Worth last week between Mayor W. E. Dameron and officials of the Federal considerable number of buildings at the Hereford Prisoner of War camp.

The Federal Housing Au-thority, which exercised a No. 1 priority a few weeks ago to claim all buildings at the campsite, has agreed to return all buildings outside the four prison compounds, with the exception of 9 buildings, to the jurisdiction of the Federal Land Bank of Houston with the recommendation that they be allotted to the city of Hereford.

Officials of the Housing Authority told Mayor Dameron that their agency had no power to allot buildings for any purpose except federal housing, but pose except federal housing, agreed to release part of camp buildings to the I Bank which can, in turn, n disposition of them to and other agencies.
