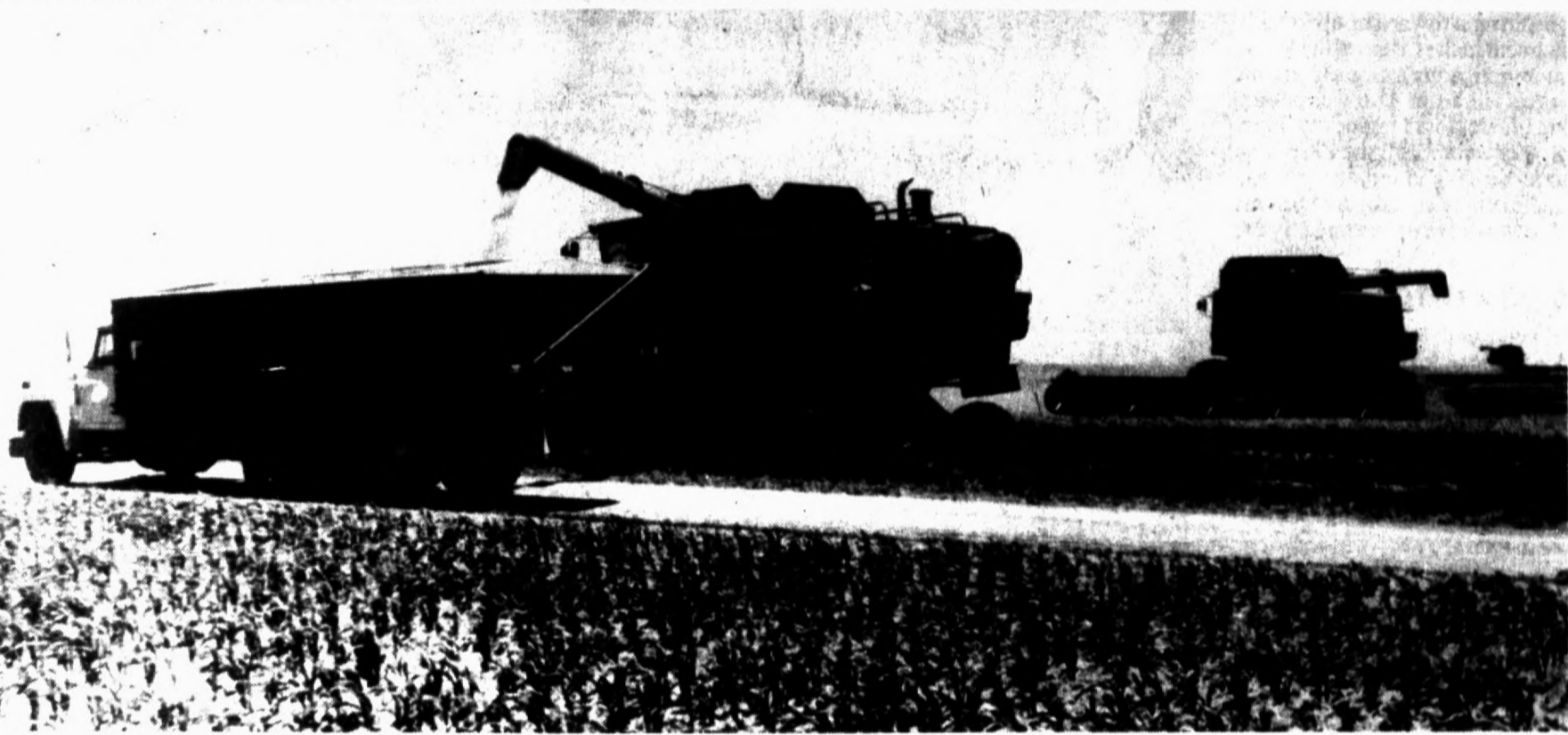

Neighbors cut wheat for Frische

Several neighbors took time away from their own wheat harvest in the Dawn area to give a neighbor a helping hand. Carl Frische, who lives three miles north of Dawn, suffered a debilitating stroke two months ago. On Monday, his neighbors gathered to cut his 100-acre wheat crop and haul the grain to the elevator. "We're happy to do it," said Joe Grotegut, one of five persons who pitched in to cut Frische's crop. "Carl would have done the same thing for us," Grotegut said. "He's always been a good neighbor to us, and this is the least we could do to help." Others cutting wheat included Carl Kleuskens, Billy Wimberly, Galen Friemel and Richard Friemel. Their spouses and other family members drove trucks to haul the grain to the elevator.

City okays funding for fireworks

A 30-minute fireworks display, climaxing a day-long July 4 celebration in Hereford, got a boost Monday night when the city commission voted to contribute \$2,500 to the fireworks cost. After hearing from Mike Carr, Hereford Chamber of Commerce executive, about plans for the day, the commission approved the expenditure, equal to the contribution made last week by Deaf Smith County. Carr said the fireworks will be staged by an Oklahoma company which specializes in fireworks. In addition to \$2,500 each from the city and county, private donations are being taken for the remaining \$2,500 of the \$7,500 total cost. The fireworks display at Veterans Park concludes a full day of activities, beginning with a parade during the morning on July 4. During the abbreviated commission meeting, a new contract for a juvenile probation officer and juvenile peace officer was approved. Participants in the agreement are the City of Hereford, Deaf Smith County and Hereford Independent School District. The commission also approved the first of three ordinances required for paving assessment on Kingwood Street in northwest Hereford. City staff was directed to prepare specifications for taking bids on a new "bursting" machine, used to break down computer printouts of bills.

Schools plead for relief

AUSTIN (AP) - The state should fund its schools as well as it does its roads, said a lawyer for wealthy school districts challenging Texas' new school finance law. "We have the best highway system in the country and some of the poorest schools. It does us little good in the long run to have ignorant people driving on good roads," said Austin lawyer Jim George, who represents a group of wealthy school districts led by Palacios. He said 97 percent of Texas students attend schools that are funded at substantially less than the national average. A lawyer for other rich school districts challenging the law, Earl Luna of Dallas, said wealthy school districts would be "devastated" by the new law. The measure is designed to shift hundreds of millions of dollars in property tax money to their poorer counterparts. Al Kauffman of the Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund said school districts could recoup property tax losses under the bill. He represents poor school districts that filed the original, and ultimately successful, 1984 challenge to the way Texas pays for public education. "All of the tears are for naught, because all they have to do is raise their taxes to the level which others have already done," Kauffman said. And Assistant Attorney General Toni Hunter, representing the state, said, "The property wealthy districts are upset because they're losing their advantage over the property poor school districts." A hearing in the case began Monday before State District Judge F. Scott McCown and may last a week. McCown said he would consider tax issues, including whether the law's countywide property tax system is constitutional. But the judge delayed consideration of several other questions, including whether the law provides equity and adequate funding, and whether it affects minority voting rights. McCown said he has yet to decide whether he even has jurisdiction over the adequacy of school funding. State lawyers have said lawmakers have discretion over that issue. The new law, passed in response to a Texas Supreme Court order to even out school districts' access to funding, creates regions drawn largely along county lines to impose a minimum property tax rate. School districts in each county education taxing region will share the revenue from the minimum tax. Local school districts also may tax more, without pooling the revenue, to enrich programs and for construction. The state guarantees every school district a certain amount of money, in state and local funds combined, for each penny of property tax, up to a certain level. Unless overturned, the law takes effect for next school year. Wealthy districts say the law creates an unconstitutional state property tax, and unconstitutionally transfers local tax money from one school district to another. Because the school finance law provides for each county education taxing region to be governed by an appointed panel of school board members, they also argue that the law dilutes the voting strength of minorities. The state says the law is constitutional, and that it has no discriminatory effect on voting rights because county education boards have only ministerial duties. Besides tax questions, McCown said he would consider in this hearing a contention by some wealthy school districts that the law is a "local and special bill" that regulates the affairs of school districts in a way not allowed by the Texas Constitution. As to the delayed issues, McCown said he would consider them at a separate trial, after lawmakers meet in special session this summer to write a state budget that will include education funding. That later trial would include an effort by some poor school districts to get more money for school construction, he said.

US evacuates naval base

MANILA, Philippines (AP) - A Navy flotilla steamed toward Subic Bay today to help speed an American exodus, and Filipinos devastated by Mount Pinatubo complained that their government failed to prepare them for the volcano's fury. "We were really caught flat-footed. They had not expected anything of this magnitude," said Gov. Bren Guiao of Pampanga province, where about 120,000 refugees were seeking help. More than a week of eruptions have covered the countryside with ash and debris, contaminating water supplies and knocking out almost all services in some areas. Food and fuel were difficult to find for many Filipino victims. The Red Cross reported at least 146 deaths from the volcano, about 50 miles northwest of Manila, and warned that disease could spread. Relief workers also feared more landslides could increase the number of homeless. An estimated 200,000 Filipinos have been forced from their homes, many of which collapsed under the weight of rain-soaked ash. Scientists said today that Mount Pinatubo appeared to be calming after a series of huge explosions Saturday that collapsed sections of the 4,795-foot mountain, which burst to life June 9 after more than 600 years of dormancy. At least three minor earth tremors were recorded today and a small eruption dumped fresh ash on Clark Air Base, which is 10 miles east of the volcano and is among the largest U.S. military facilities overseas. About 15,000 troops and their families evacuated Clark last week to Subic Bay naval base, which was subsequently blanketed with about a foot of ash. On Sunday, all 20,000 military dependents in the Philippines were ordered out of the country. Military officials are attempting to remove all the dependents by the end of the week, and more ships have been pressed into service. Eight Navy vessels, including the aircraft carrier Midway, were bound for Subic Bay today to help with the evacuation.

Persons who will participate in Saturday's ceremony should call HCR Real Estate at 364-4670 so arrangements may be made for the program. Persons who can't be there Saturday may pick up their medallions and t-shirts at HCR Real Estate.

Congress debates women in war

WASHINGTON (AP) - The exemplary performance of female warriors during Operation Desert Storm is posing a serious challenge to the U.S. military's 43-year-old policy of excluding women from combat. Of the 540,000 U.S. military personnel assigned to the Persian Gulf region during the war, 35,000 were women. Eleven of them died - five in hostile action. The women's performance did not go unnoticed in the House, which last month approved a provision to the 1992 defense budget that would permit the Air Force and Navy to use female pilots to fly combat missions. The measure has become one of the hotly debated issues of the military bill and was being explored today by the Senate Armed Services manpower and personnel subcommittee. Defense Secretary Dick Cheney met Monday with the service chiefs and the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Gen. Colin Powell, to discuss the legislation, government sources said. One source, who declined to be identified, predicted that no major shift in policy would be announced at the hearing and that the officials would offer to look at opening more positions to women once the legislation is passed. The Senate will decide in late July or early August whether to include a similar or more far-reaching provision than the House in their version of the defense budget for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1. Called to testify today were Christopher Jehn, the assistant secretary of defense for force management and personnel; the service chiefs from the Army and Air Force, as well as the commandant of the Marine Corps and the chief of naval operations; officers and enlisted personnel; and Becky Costantino, who heads the Defense Advisory Committee on Women in the Services. A senior military officer, who spoke on condition of anonymity, predicted Monday that the services would come up with varied responses to any change in the law. "Based on their past record, the Air Force will prove the most progressive, the Navy and Marine Corps will collectively clutch their throats in terror and wonder what to do next, while the Army will probably work out some kind of compromise," the officer said. Gen. Carl Vuono, the outgoing Army chief of staff, said last week that he saw no immediate change in the Army ban on women in combat. Vuono's likely successor, Gen. Gordon Sullivan, told the Senate Armed Services Committee at his confirmation hearing that women should not fly in combat aircraft. Under current law, women in the Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force are barred from serving in combat jobs. The Army is not covered under the same statute, but has written its own regulations in line with the law. Defense Department spokesman Pete Williams reiterated Monday that the Pentagon approves of the legislation "because it gives us the ability to make the decision, and we like that." However, he added, "that doesn't automatically mean that there will be a change in policy. ... We want to emphasize that women performed extremely well in the gulf... but any changes would have to be made with combat effectiveness in mind."

### World, National

**WASHINGTON** - The exemplary performance of female warriors during Operation Desert Storm is posing a serious challenge to the U.S. military's 43-year-old policy of excluding women from combat.

**WASHINGTON** - Children who live in households with smokers are much more likely to be in fair or poor health than are children never exposed to cigarette smoke, a government study reported today.

**PITTSBURGH** - When University of Pittsburgh President Wesley Posvar negotiated his retirement, he arranged a \$3.3 million package that would be the envy of many corporate executives. But after a storm of public outrage, Posvar's golden parachute is collapsing and the school's image is in a free-fall.

**TOPEKA, Kan.** - Steve Wiard had to make one of the toughest choices of his life: continue as a high school government teacher or run for re-election to the Legislature. Wiard and other "citizen legislators" in states with part-time legislatures are finding the demands high and the pay low.

### Texas

**SAN ANGELO** - Residents in this defense-minded West Texas city are hoping their banners, balloons and ballyhoo will keep today from being D-Day for Goodfellow Air Force Base. Two members of the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commission have scheduled a public hearing this afternoon on Goodfellow's future.

**AUSTIN** - Civil and minority rights groups criticized Gov. Ann Richards after she allowed the state House and Senate redistricting plans to become law. The Mexican American Legal Defense and Education Fund, Texas Rural Legal Aid and the Texas Civil Rights Project allege the legislative redistricting plans fail to ensure enough minority representation that reflects the state's minority population.

**WASHINGTON** - Texas dairy farmers battered by the lowest milk prices in more than a decade are rapidly sliding into financial ruin, says Rep. Jim Chapman. "They're calling the bank and saying 'Send out the trucks and load up the cows, we can't hold on any more.'" Chapman will testify today before a House committee investigating options for managing the nation's milk supply.

**AUSTIN** - The agency responsible for the federal savings and loan bailout has given away 15 properties that officials say cost too much to keep up. The City of Austin and six non-profit organizations on Monday received 13 houses and two vacant lots from the Resolution Trust Corp. The properties were assets of failed savings and loans assumed by the agency.

**AUSTIN** - More than 155 years ago, a battle at a former mission in San Antonio grew into a legend in Texas' fight for independence. Now Texas officials want what could be a flag that flew over the Alamo during the 13-day siege between 5,000 Mexican troops and 187 Texas volunteers.

**NEWTON** - A high school principal who asked a black student and his white date to leave a senior prom has been reprimanded by the school board in this Southeast Texas city. Lidney Thompson's reprimand by Newton district trustees Monday followed a closed-door session with the guardian of the male student asked to leave the prom.

**CANADIAN RIVER** - When New Mexico decided to enlarge Ute Reservoir in 1984 to act as a de-silting spill basin for overflow from Conchas Lake, the legal reverberations began. The state decided on the Ute expansion in 1984. Texas and Oklahoma sued in response. The U.S. Supreme Court ruled Monday that New Mexico may not store more than 200,000 acre-feet of water.

Aerocare, an airborne critical care transport service, will present a seminar Thursday for the Hereford EMS and the police, fire and sheriff's departments.

The seminar will review procedures and requirements for air evacuation of patients, according to L.V. Watts, Hereford EMS supervisor.

Deaf Smith General Hospital and Hereford EMS have used Aerocare in the past to transport burn victims to Lubbock's Methodist Hospital

Burn Treatment Center, the only burn treatment center in the area. Occasionally, cardiac patients are transferred by Aerocare.

Watts pointed out that Hereford is about a 30-minute flight for Aerocare for transports to Methodist Hospital or St. Mary of the Plains Hospital. "For most of the flights to Lubbock, Aerocare uses a helicopter. For longer flights, they use a fixed-wing plane, but both air units are equipped and staffed as mobile intensive care units," Watts said.

The EMS supervisor said the personnel on all Aerocare flights include a registered nurse who has at least three years experience in critical care and an EMT-paramedic with at least three years experience using the advanced life support unit. Other patient care specialists--such as a physician, neonatal nurse practitioners, or respiratory therapist may be on board if the situation demands it.

Gary Moore, DSGH administrator, said the purpose of the Aerocare system is to provide rapid transport

from one hospital to the other and minimize the time the patient must spend outside of a regular medical facility.

"We see this level of cooperation between rural and urban hospitals as part of the trend of medicine in the future," said Moore. "Our goal is to provide the level of care which is most commonly needed in Hereford and to call on outside sources such as Aerocare to expand the medical capabilities that the situation requires."

## Taylor's crypt opened for tests

**LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)** - Kentucky's medical examiner said tests on tissue samples taken from President Zachary Taylor's crypt should settle once and for all the question of whether he was the victim of arsenic poisoning.

The white marble crypt was opened Monday and a coroner took samples of the 12th president's remains.

The exhumation was conducted at the request of Holder, Fla., author Clara Rising, who is researching a book about Taylor and theorized he was poisoned by political foes in 1850 for opposing the spread of slavery into the Southwest.

Ms. Rising contends the symptoms of Taylor's sudden illness and death resembled those of arsenic poisoning.

The tissue samples will be tested at two laboratories, and arsenic poisoning would be clear, even after all this time, experts said.

"The toxicology analysis from what we obtained should be

definitive," said Dr. George Nichols, state medical examiner. "There will be a 'no' or 'yes' rather than a continuing question mark."

Findings should be out in about two weeks, he said.

Taylor's death was ascribed at the time to gastroenteritis.

Nichols said two sets of samples of nails, hair, bone and other tissue were taken during a four-hour autopsy. Taylor's body was reinterred with military honors in the crypt 200 yards from his boyhood home.

The state medical examiner's office will examine one set of samples. To ensure accuracy, the other set will go to a lab yet to be chosen, Nichols said.

The Soviet Union exchanged captured American U-2 pilot Francis Gary Powers in 1962 for Rudolph Ivanovich Abel, a Soviet spy held by the United States.

## State jail proposal may be presented

**AUSTIN (AP)** - Gov. Ann Richards is hoping to revive legislation that would settle jail crowding lawsuits brought by counties forced to hold state prisoners, aides said.

All 13 counties involved in lawsuits against the state would have to agree to the plan by midnight last Sunday for it to become law. Harris County scuttled the plan by refusing to drop its lawsuit.

But Richards' staff said Monday that they wanted to resume negotiations.

"Our negotiator here remains somewhat hopeful," said Chuck McDonald, the governor's deputy press secretary. "This issue isn't dead."

The Legislature convenes July 8 for a special session on the state budget. Richards could add the prison bill to the session's agenda if a deal is struck with Harris County.

Travis County Judge Bill Aleshire said he hopes to see "Harris County come to its senses and realize the mistake they made, and ask for

another chance to do right."

Travis County, which agreed to the proposal, is one of 12 counties seeking payment for housing state prisoners through a lawsuit filed in state court.

Harris County was involved in a separate, federal lawsuit, in which the state already has been ordered to pay \$750,000 for housing prisoners and moving them to less-crowded jails in other counties.

Aleshire said the Legislature also could allow the other 12 counties to settle their lawsuit, accept the compromise bill and leave Harris County to deal with the state on its own.

The legislation, which lawmakers insisted was a one-time offer, would have committed the state to building 28,000 prison beds over the next four years.

In the meantime, the state would have paid counties \$30 a day for each state prisoner kept in their jails.

Harris County officials wanted access to more prison beds and more money to move felons.

To attend, students must make a reservation by phone of mail, bring an official transcript, bring a copy of the ACT/SAT scores and plan to take an entrance exam.

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
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

## King selected as new Hereford tennis coach

Hereford Athletic Director Danny Haney has hired Kim King as the coach of the Hereford High School tennis program. King replaces Ed Coplen, who served as interim coach after Luis Zavala was reassigned March 7. Coplen will return to his previous duties as an assistant to the varsity football team and girls' track team.

King, who won state tennis championships as a player for Nazareth High School in 1973 and 1974, comes to Hereford from Claremont College in California, just east of Los Angeles. She was an assistant professor and the women's head tennis coach for eight years. While at Claremont, she took the tennis program from being relatively unknown to being ranked as high as tenth in the nation.

"I was ready to come back to Texas," she said of her reasons for the move, "and I was ready for a change from California.

"It was also an opportunity to work with a boys' team. I've worked with women; I wanted to work with both boys and girls."

She also said that the success of

the program in the past, the support of the athletic director and the assistants were reasons she took the job.

"Hereford has a strong program. Danny Haney wants the program to improve," she said. "I'm really impressed with Danny Haney. The athletic director at Claremont--in eight years he never went to a match. It's really nice to see that kind of interest."

She also said she is looking forward to working with her assistant coaches: Lee Seman and new assistant Natalie Sims, who has been teaching elementary school physical education in Hereford.

King's coaching philosophy is to "work on the things we can control," she said.

"We have control over our fitness level. We have control over our actions on the court--I'm big on discipline. We need to have the best strokes we can have in drills and match play."

Whether playing or coaching, King has had success with tennis at several levels. After a stellar athletic career at Nazareth--she played basketball as well as tennis--King played tennis at Texas Tech for one year and finished

her college career at Texas A&M.

"I went to Tech my first year to play under Emily Foster, who was one of the best coaches in Texas. When she left, I chose to go to A&M."

After graduating from A&M in 1978, King took a tennis coaching job in Alvin. While there, she got to meet the town's No. 1 citizen. At that time, Nolan Ryan had pitched four of his seven no-hitters and had less than 3,500 strikeouts, so he was only a minor legend.

"I met him in a gas station. I was using a rag for a gas cap, and he went in and got a gas cap for me," King said. "I didn't know who he was. The attendant said 'Do you know who that was?'"

King also said she instructed Ryan's kids at a tennis camp.

"He was the nicest man you could ever meet," she said. After Alvin, she coached at River Road, then worked as a women's tennis assistant at West Texas State University while she earned her master's degree in counseling and physical education. She also worked at the Amarillo Town Club before going to California.

King is the daughter of Joe King, the men's and women's tennis coach at WTSU.

## Hereford drops twin-bill

Hereford's team in the West Texas Summer Baseball League was swept by Coronado in a double-header Saturday. Hereford is winless in six games but tries again today at 6 p.m. at Whiteface Field against Plainview.

In the first game, Coronado used a four-run third inning and a five-run fifth on the way to an 11-5 win. In the second game, Hereford fought back from a 6-4 deficit to tie in the seventh, only to lose 7-6 in the eighth.

Hereford led the second game 4-2 after four innings, but in the fifth, they gave up four runs--one on a throwing error on center fielder Richard Sanderson and one on catcher Russ Watts' passed ball. The other two runs scored on clean singles.

Hereford came back in the last-chance bottom of the seventh to tie it at 6-6. Tab Hathaway started the rally by reaching on an error by the Coronado right fielder. Ralph Holguin singled, putting runners on first and second, and a pair of wild pitches allowed Hathaway to score and Holguin to reach third. Holguin scored on Jake Head's pinch hit ground-out.

Coronado came right back and scratched out a run in the top of the eighth. The leadoff man got an infield single, went to second on a passed ball, went to third on a ground out and scored on a single.

Hereford played well early in the game. Starter Andy Kalka gave up single runs in the first and fourth innings, both times on a pair of singles. Coronado gift-wrapped a lead for Hereford in the bottom of the first inning, when Fonzie Enriquez singled and the Coronado pitcher walked the next five batters: Jerry Rincon, Hathaway, Kalka, John Nava and Matthew Gavina, in order. Hereford

added a run in the second on Hathaway's RBI single after Enriquez' single and stolen base.

In the first game, Hereford let the game get away in the third, got back in it in the fourth and let it get away again in the fifth.

Coronado led 1-0 after one inning and broke it open in the third. They started with a walk off Hereford pitcher Richard Rodriguez, then executed a perfect hit-and-run to put men at first and third. Coronado tried a double steal, and this time Hereford executed perfectly--except when catcher Vince Castillo dropped the ball in a mild collision at home. Three more runs scored on two groundouts and a double, and Coronado led 5-0. Hereford came back in the bottom of the fourth to come within one run. Enriquez and Rincon started the rally by each reaching on errors. Enriquez

came home on Hathaway's single. Rincon scored on Rodriguez' infield single and Hathaway scored on Ralph Holguin's single. Rodriguez got caught in a rundown between second and third, but stayed alive long enough to allow Watts to score.

In the fifth, the first Coronado batter walked and a second reached when third baseman Hathaway couldn't field a dribbler up the third base line. One run scored on a single, another on a double steal and one more on a single. A wild pitch and a groundout scored the fourth run of the inning, and a fifth came home on right fielder Watts' error.

That made the score 10-4, and each team scored once in the seventh for the final score. Coronado's run came on four straight singles and Hereford's came when Rincon's double to the left-center gap plated Rene Cano.

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# Stewart uses a little luck to capture Open

CHASKA, Minn. (AP) - Champagne, courtesy of Champ Payne, flowed after the U.S. Open, but plain water made the difference.

There would have been no bubbly, no tears of joy streaming down Payne Stewart's face, if his tee shot on No. 8 in the playoff Monday hadn't plunked into a pond, struck a shallow rock and popped back out onto dry land.

He might still be playing with Scott Simpson, each of them trying to cope with the vagaries of wind-blown, sun-baked Hazeltine National, if Simpson's tee shot on No. 17 had not ricocheted into a tiny water trap.

"To win championships, you have to have some good breaks," said

Stewart, who celebrated in a style reminiscent of the late Champagne Tony Lema by wheeling cases of bubbly into his press conference.

With a little luck and a lot of gutsy golf, Stewart beat Simpson 75 to 77 to claim his second major title.

"It wasn't outstanding golf, but the golf course was very difficult today," said Stewart.

Stewart rapped his knuckles on a table and said the greens were that hard.

Stewart's first lucky break came on No. 8 when his tee shot struck a submerged rock in the pond and popped out onto the rough amid cheers from the huge crowd.

Thankful not to have a penalty stroke against him, he chipped out

nically to the green but two-putted for bogey when his first putt from 3 feet lipped the cup and spun out.

Meanwhile, Stewart was showing more emotion than usual as the match wore on, dropping his putter in disgust a few times and kicking his iron after going over the green into the rough on the 8th to set up a bogey.

They drew back to a tie at 2-over on the 10th as Simpson missed a putt for par from 4 feet.

Stewart reclaimed the lead briefly when Simpson bogeyed the 13th by three-putting from 45 feet, but gave it back on the 14th with a bogey to Simpson's birdie on a 20-foot putt from the fringe.

Another bogey by Stewart on the 15th - his four bogeys this round was

one less than he had in the previous four days - put him down two strokes with three holes to play - exactly the same place he'd been in their duel Sunday.

This time, the ballad of Hazeltine brought a birdie from Stewart on the tough 16th - his first birdie in 30 holes - and three straight bogeys by a wilting Simpson.

Stuck behind the large, intimidating tree that leans over the 16th fairway, Stewart began his charge by lofting his second shot over the branches and putting it 20 feet from the pin. Then he read the green perfectly and sank the ball to put all the pressure on Simpson.

Simpson simply couldn't handle it, three-putting to bogey the hole for the third day in a row and the fourth time in five rounds here.

Simpson's final undoing came moments later when his tee shot bounced off a grassy knoll and into the water. He took the penalty and saved bogey with superb chip shot onto the green that he putted in.

"Obviously, I'm pretty disappointed, especially after being ahead and then losing," Simpson said. "I probably wouldn't have been as disappointed if I just got snuffed out."

Stewart knew then he had the championship within his grasp.

"After I hit my first putt down

there," he said. "I told myself, 'For you to be a champion, you've got to stand up there and knock this one in. Believe you're going to make it.' And I did."

He talked to himself again on the 18th after blasting out of sand trap and hitting into the rough 60 feet from the pin.

"When I got over my chip shot, I said, 'You practiced this shot. Stand up there and execute it, because that's what it's going to take for you to be the champion.'"

Stewart chipped beautifully 4 feet from the pin, and after watching Simpson struggle to another bogey, drilled his final putt straight into the hole.

## O's snap Twins' streak

The Minnesota Twins knew they had to lose eventually. They probably didn't expect it to happen so suddenly.

The Twins, who won four one-run games and two in extra innings during a team-record 15-game winning streak, were three outs away from going 16-for-16 in June. Instead, relief ace Rick Aguilera allowed a sacrifice fly to Joe Orsulak and a two-out, two-run double to Randy Milligan to give the Baltimore Orioles a stunning 6-5 victory Monday night.

"It was inevitable," a philosophical Kirby Puckett said of the loss. "It's like living and dying. We're all going to die one day, we just don't know when. We didn't know when we were going to lose, and we hoped it would be later than sooner, but today was just the day for it to happen."

It didn't look that way until the bottom of the ninth, when the law of averages caught up to the Twins.

Two singles, a sacrifice and Orsulak's fly ball produced a run. Manager Tom Kelly then defied conventional baseball wisdom by ordering Aguilera to walk hot-hitting Cal Ripken - putting the winning run on base.

Aguilera got ahead of Milligan 1-and-2, but Milligan hit the next pitch into left-center and both runners scored easily.

"That's the right thing to do, I

believe," Kelly said of the walk to Ripken. "Rick just put the pitch right down the middle of the plate."

Puckett, the Twins' center fielder, knew instantly that the ball was out of his reach.

"I knew as soon as he hit it, it was right in-between Dan Gladden and I," Puckett said. "There was nothing you could do about it."

The Twins overcame a two-run deficit in the fifth on Chuck Knoblauch's RBI single and Puckett's run-scoring grounder. They took a 4-3 lead in the seventh on Puckett's two-out double and Kent Hrbek's run-scoring single, then added what appeared to be an insurance run in the eighth on Al Newman's RBI single off Mark Williamson (1-2).

All that became meaningless when Aguilera (2-3), who pitched three innings on Sunday and got the win in a 4-2, 10-inning victory over Cleveland, couldn't get the last out.

Rangers 10, Royals 9

The longest winning streak in baseball again belongs to the Rangers. Texas, which won 14 in a row last month, won its seventh straight after making up a 9-4 deficit against the visiting Royals.

Ruben Sierra hit a three-run homer in the eighth and a game-tying two-run single in the ninth before Gary Pettis won it with a bases-loaded bloop single in the 10th off Jeff Montgomery (1-3).

Texas made four errors that led to four unearned runs. Gary Thurman's two-run single in the seventh snapped a 4-4 tie and Carmelo Martinez gave the Royals a seemingly safe 9-4 lead with a three-run homer in the eighth.

Mike Jeffcoat (2-1) pitched two scoreless innings for the win.

Angels 4, Red Sox 2

California averted its first four-game sweep at Fenway Park since 1967 as Mark Langston allowed six hits in seven innings.

Wally Joyner's two-run double off Greg Harris (2-7) keyed a four-run fifth inning. Jack Clark singled home two runs in the bottom of the fifth off Langston (9-2), but that was all the Red Sox could manage. Bryan Harvey, the Angels' third pitcher, got the last four outs for his 16th save.

Brewers 5, Athletics 0

Don August pitched a five-hitter for his first shutout in two years and Billy Spiers and Jim Gantner sparked a five-run fifth inning with two-run singles.

August (5-2), backed by four double plays, won his fifth straight game, but first since May 28. The right-hander recorded 20 ground-ball outs in pitching his first shutout since a 6-0 defeat of Baltimore in June 1989.

The Brewers batted around in the fifth off Mike Moore (8-5), who allowed only one hit in the first four innings. Spiers' single broke the scoreless tie and Gantner's capped the inning.

## Drabek beats jinx, Padres

That Cy Young award jinx everyone was talking about a month ago is taking a beating now.

Doug Drabek won his fourth straight decision and pitched well for the fifth consecutive start as the Pittsburgh Pirates maintained its six-game lead in the National League East with a 3-2 victory at San Diego Monday night.

In his last five appearances, including a no-decision, Drabek has allowed only four earned runs in 36 innings for a 1.00 ERA.

"Things have been going better, plus I've gotten a lot of help offensively and defensively," said Drabek, the 1990 Cy Young winner. "The big key is I've started to throw my pitches instead of trying to make them work."

Drabek (6-7) beat Bruce Hurst (7-4) for the second time in 11 days with relief help the last two innings. Drabek was a 1-0 winner over the Padres June 7 in Pittsburgh.

Drabek got offensive help from another slow starter, Gary Redus, who homered for the first time this season and doubled twice.

Redus, who has only two multi-hit games this year, said manager Jim Leyland gave him a pep talk before the game.

"I've been struggling most of the year, hitting around .200," he said. "I'm the type of person who doesn't get down a lot. But when we were in San Francisco I was feeling kind of low. Jim came up to me and said, 'Don't worry about it, just keep hustling. I know you'll give me 100 percent.'"

"That kind of gave me a lift. I'm a veteran, but still, you need to hear something every once in a while."

Morgan was charged with three more runs in the ninth, two on a single by Dunston off Tim Crews, before Crews got the final out for his fourth save.

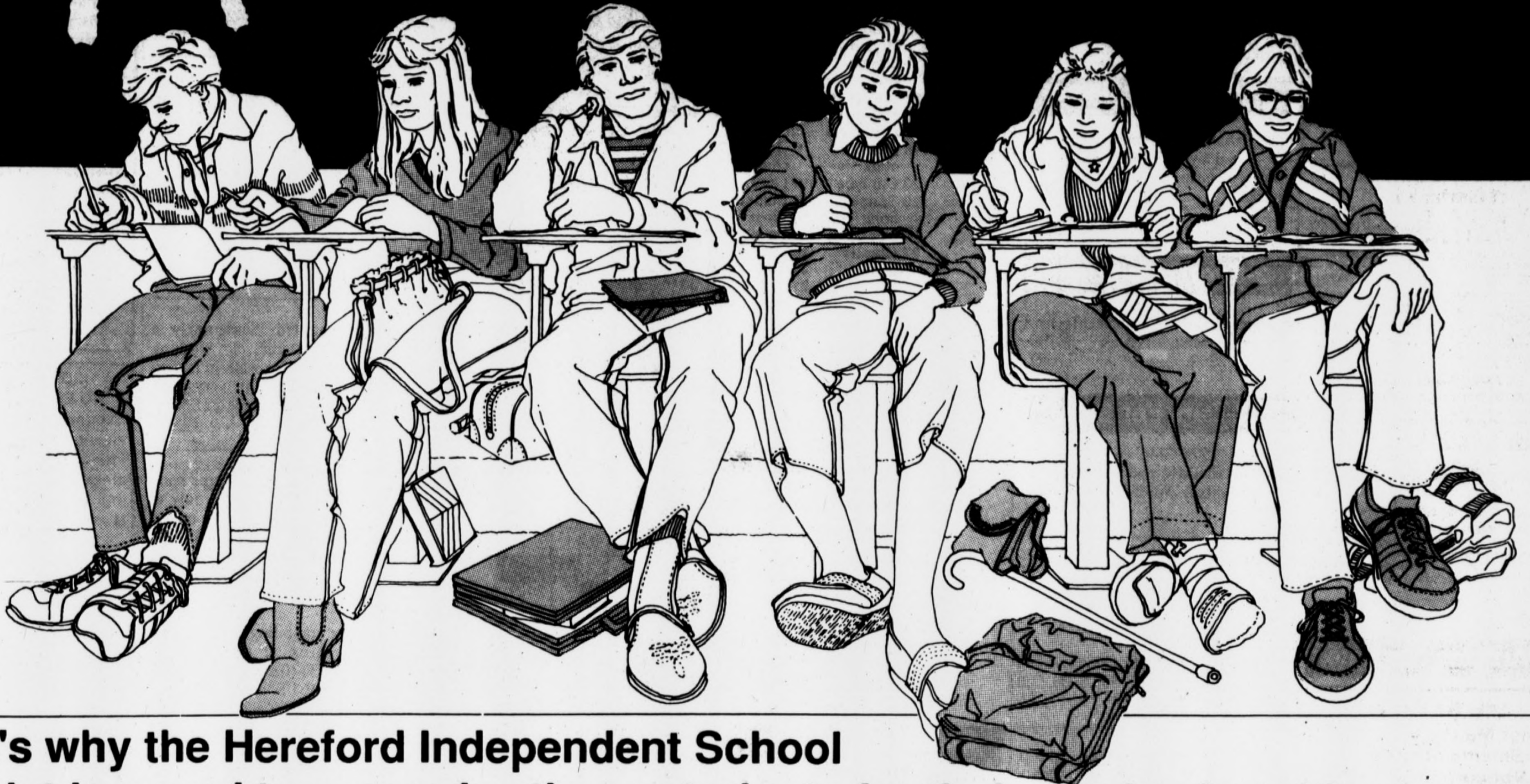

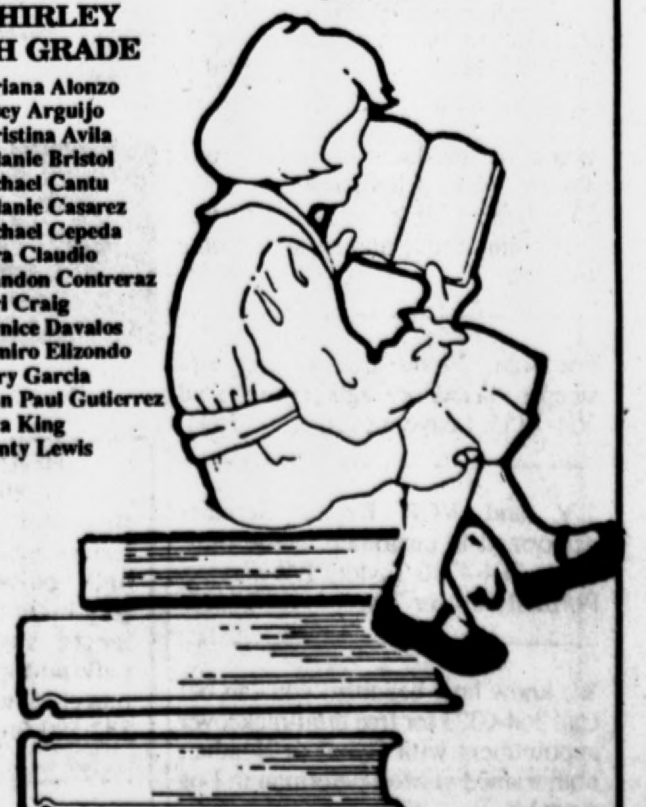

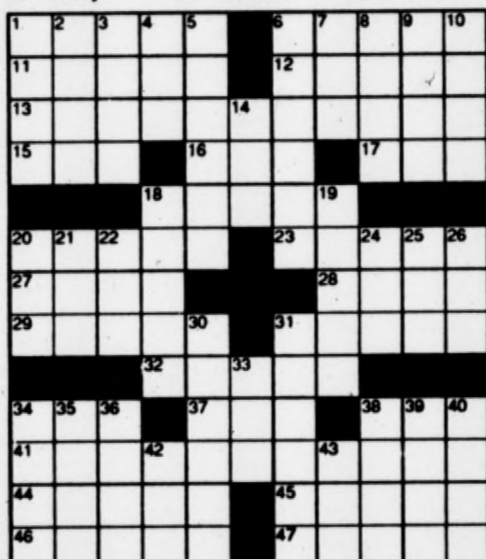

Few people realize that the asparagus is a member of the lily family. If allowed to grow, the asparagus tips would throw out tall stalks and crown them with six-petaled flowers, the trademark of the lily.

## Social Security

Social Security claimants represented by an attorney or other person in pursuing a Social Security claim will be able to pay the representative under a new Social Security rule. The rule permits the parties to agree on a set fee prior to the approval of the claim.

Under the present "fee petition system," after a claim is approved the attorney must submit an itemized bill for services, which must be approved by the Social Security Administration. A maximum of 25 percent of back benefits could be paid with appropriate documentation.

Under the "fee agreement" process, the agreement is automatically approved if it is no more than 25 percent of the back benefits, or \$4,000, whichever is less.

Under this process, no itemized bill is necessary. The new rule gives claimants the advantage of knowing exactly how much they will be charged in pursuing their claims. Both the claimant and the representative may appeal the amount of the approved fee.

A claimant may be represented by the person of his or her choice in any business with Social Security. However, the representative cannot charge or collect a fee without written permission for Social Security. Any representative who charges or collects a fee that has not been approved may be subject to criminal prosecution and may be disqualified from representing Social Security claimants.

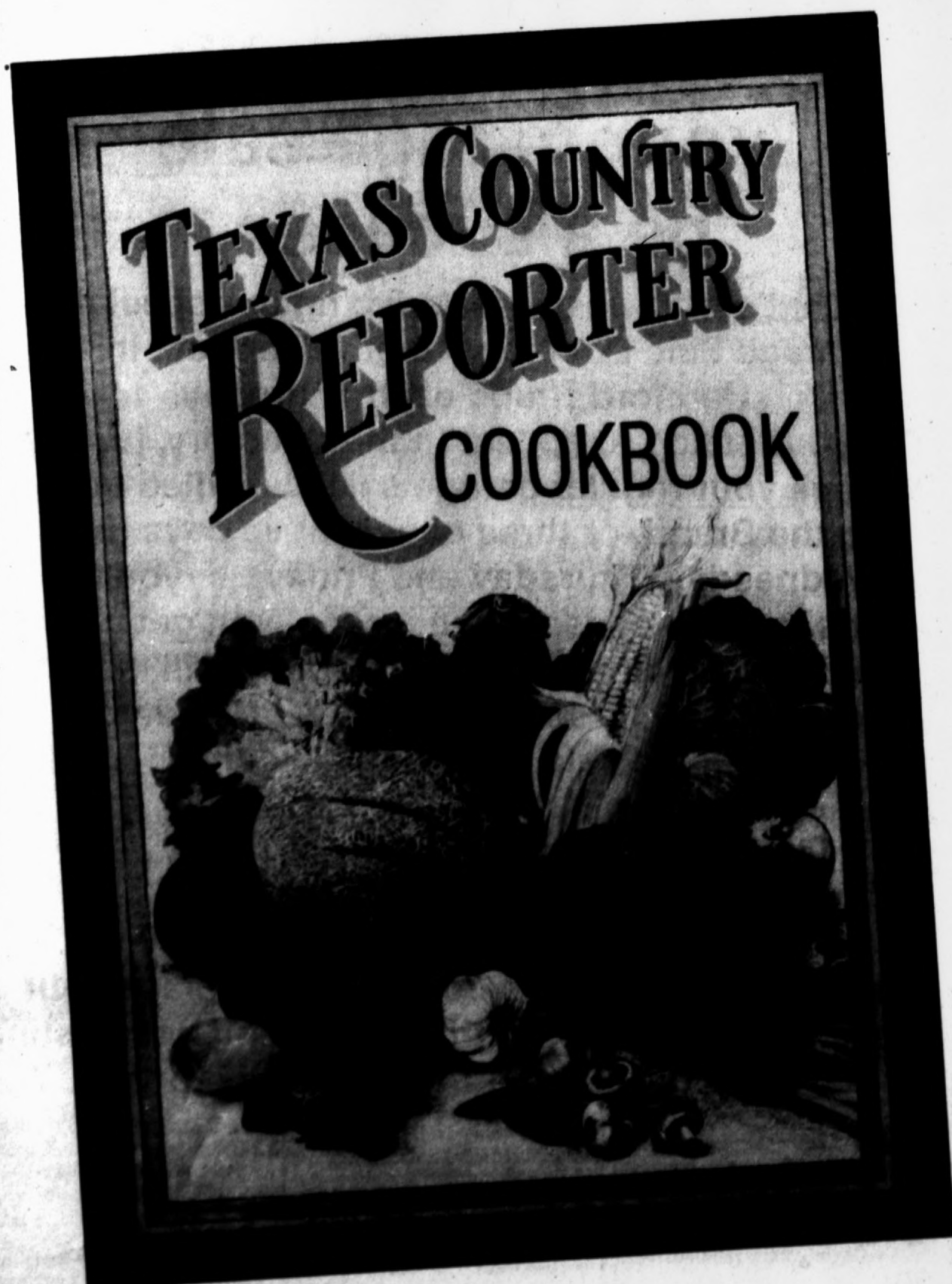
