Sights and Faces Seen

Kelly Gray, world-famous authority on prairie dogs, says it is about time that he stepped in and settled this business of the first wheat crop in Deaf Smith County. Kelly says the late J. O. Womble planted the first wheat crop here in 1900. He says that they mowed the wheat and then raked it into piles and Mr. Womble got a little thresher which delivered the stalk and wheat through the same chute back of the thresher. He recalls that the crop averaged 21 bushels to the acre and had to be run through a fan mill to blow out the straw. He says the entire crop was sold for seed.

"In the fall of 1900," Kelly continues, "wheat was planted by J. F. Ward, Jim Farley, L. A. Arnold, R. C. Pansteel, J. T. Rutherford and myself. We used a little 30-inch drill which was pulled by a mule." Furthermore, Kelly says that Troy Womble is all wrong and says he made Troy admit that he planted his first crop in 1908, right after Troy quit the ice business. The first thresher was owned by Troy Womble, Bill Borden, Henry Farmer, and Kelly Gray—and it was pulled by 14 horses.

Kelly adds that he has been growing wheat ever since 1900 and says he made more with the 30-inch drill in 1900 than he will since the hail storm this year.

Many farmers in Deaf Smith, Castro and Parmer counties who had wheat crops completely hauled out in Sunday's storm are planning to seed considerable acreage in vegetables under contract to the new canning plant which will go into operation in Hereford this summer, according to Worth Ware, manager of the plant.

The plant is offering to furnish seed to all farmers who want to plant, and will contract for the entire yield, Ware said.

Although the plant, which will operate under the trade-name of Deaf Smith County Food Products, Inc., had planned to confine its planting to Deaf Smith County, the disastrous hail storm which wiped out many farmers in neighboring counties Sunday night brought about an immediate change in policy.

"We have decided to extend aid to all who want it this year," Ware said, "by offering a cash crop which can be marketed this summer."

Enough black-eyed peas to seed 1500 acres arrived in Hereford Tuesday in response to a hurry-up call by Ware Sunday night, and additional seed for planting carrots, beets, and green beans should arrive this week, he said.

"We don't expect to be able to use the yield from all this acreage this year," Ware said, "but due to this emergency, we intend to buy the entire crop and market the surplus on the fresh vegetable market."

The plant is trying to stagger planting of vegetable crops so that a harvesting schedule can be worked out. Black-eye peas, Ware pointed out, can be planted.

Forty-Nine Graduates Will Receive Diplomas At High School Commencement Exercises

Memorial Service For Capt. Wedel Here on Sunday

A divine worship service in memory of Captain Louis Karl Wedel will be conducted Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the Methodist Church. The Rev. Martin J. H. Hartenberger, pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church of Amarillo, will conduct the service and deliver the sermon. The public is invited to this memorial service.

Capt. Louis Wedel is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry T. Wedel and was a member of Emmanuel Lutheran Church here in Hereford.

He volunteered for military service in September of 1940. Since March of 1944 he had been stationed in India and China with the 20th Air Force, 792nd Squadron. On August 20, 1944 his B-29 bomber was set on fire by enemy gunfire over Japan. Captain Wedel was ordered to bail out of the plane as it flew over the China Sea and has been reported missing in action since that date. The government recently notified his wife, Mrs. Inez Wedel, that her husband is now officially presumed dead.

He was born April 30, 1916 at Hereford. On October 29, 1916, he received the Sacrament of Holy Baptism in the local Lutheran congregation, and confirmed his Christian faith on October 16, 1932 when he was received into communicant membership.

He was married at Tucson, Arizona on July 6, 1943 to Inez Miller. Captain Wedel is mourned.

Mrs. LeGrand is survived by three sons, George F. LeGrand, Louie L. LeGrand, and Eugene A. LeGrand, all of Hereford, and eight grandchildren. Also surviving her is one brother, S. T. Milling, of Tyler, Texas.

Estimate Loss Near Million Dollars Here

A disastrous hail storm that cut a 15-mile wide swath across the Parmer, Deaf Smith, and Castro, county wheat belt last Sunday night caused damage to crops estimated at a million dollars.

Estimates place the prospective wheat yield destroyed in the three-county area at half a million bushels. Probably 40 to 50 thousand acres of wheat was wiped out.

Only a small percentage of the destroyed wheat was insured, a check-up discloses, and most farmers in the hauled-out area report a total crop loss.

The hail started locally in the northwest part of Deaf Smith county, and swept southward in a wide arc to the south and east into Parmer and Castro counties, the central path of the storm lying between Summerfield and Friona and fringing both communities.

The T. E. Seigler farm, 27 miles northwest of Hereford, was approximately the northern limit of the storm, and the hail cut a 15-mile wide path southward from that point to a distance of at least 20 miles, wiping out virtually everything in its path.

Farms lying on the east edge of Summerfield community, and west of Friona, received only light damage.

Although 40 inch of rain fell in Hereford, and half an inch of sleet was reported at Dawn during the storm, little moisture accompanied the hail storm to the west.

The storm which struck this tri-county area was according to reports, part of a major hail storm which started at Tucuman, New Mexico, and swept in a southeasterly direction into the southeastern part of Hale county.

Ben Taack, one of the bigger operators in Deaf Smith county, reports 3500 acres of wheat completely wiped out, and estimates a total loss of \$1,000,000.

Bonus On Wheat Brings in 14,000 Bushels in County; More to Come

The 30-cent bonus offered by the government for wheat delivered before May 25 in an effort to relieve the immediate demand for famine-relief abroad has brought 14,000 bushels of "hidden grain" in to the local elevators, F. C. Collier, secretary of the Deaf Smith County ACA, reported this week.

At least 13,000 bushels more are still stored in the county, Collier said, and more may still be scattered in various small farm granaries. The county committee was surprised at the amount of grain turned in, since the county wheat stocks were thought to be virtually exhausted.

A 13,000 bushel cache is still being held out in this county. Wheat turned in for the bonus must be in the elevators before midnight Saturday, May 25, when the bonus period ends.

With the 30-cent bonus, and the 15-cent per bushel raise in price recently granted by the OPA, wheat is now bringing slightly more than \$2.00 per bushel at the local elevators. The present ceiling price on wheat is \$1.72 per bushel.

Practically all the wheat crop in the Summerfield, Rance, and Black communities was reported to be a total loss.
