A detailed report on post war planning, with plans submitted for all major fields of economic and civic life, has been prepared by the Hereford Chamber of Commerce and is printed on pages 9 and 10 of this week's Brand. War Bond Dollars Ore

The percentage of tax collections—a phenomenal 94.45 per cent is the single outstanding fact about the comparative statement of financial condi-tion of Deaf Smith County published this week, according to County Auditor E. C. Eubanks, who says that the 5.55 percent-age of taxes delinquent is certainly one of the lowest such

figures ever shown on an aud-

itor's report. The entire indebtedness the county stands at \$15,000, according to the auditor's report; and an ample balance is being collected in the funds for hospital maintenance and road and bridge building.

"This reserve valuable to the county," Mr. Eubanks points out, "Because if will help to provide a backlog of employment after the war.

Altogether, the county auditor believes that Deaf Smith County has one of the best financial reports in the state and could top the financial ratings of many counties with a much greater amount of taxable wealth. The report is published on page 2 of The Brand,

Report of Post-War Planning . . . to the People of Hereford and Deaf Smith County

CITIZENS:

Your Hereford Chamber of Commerce has the honor and privilege to submit the following report on post-war planning as gathered from letters, questionaires and recent Chamber of Commerce "What To Do and How to Do It" contest. In submitting this report the Chamber of Commerce recognizes the fact that it cannot do the work necessary for community progress without having a well-informed citizenship as well as local civic clubs and other organizations in any post-war activities.

This study is concerned only with the area in and around Hereford and Deaf Smith County. This municipality is geographically located in a natural center which has attracted the attention of the entire nation to its possibilities for future development in agriculture and industry.

Hereford and Deaf Smith County are located in the very heart of a natural mineral rich soils terrace which is approximately 50 miles in diameter and it is within this diameter where we find the soils and other elements which have already given Hereford its remarkable reputation for excellent health among its people.

Within this radius we find more acres of those wonderful soils than we find in a similar circle centered any other place on the plains. Our soils are rich in calcium, phosphorus and other necessary elements for the building of healthy, strong bodies.

Our shallow water area is considered the largest, finest and purest of all underground water resources in America, and with the end of the war when additional irrigation equipment, pumps, etc., are available—instead of 50,000 acres under irrigation—there will be available 150,000 acres producing diversified crops. Climate conditions throughout the greater part of the year are excellent—for health and the growing of all commercial crops.

In order to carry out the original intent of this report—(to determine the post-war work pile)—the Chamber of Commerce has had to make certain assumptions from our survey as follows:

- 1. That the future development of Hereford and Deaf Smith County will depend a great deal apon its civic improvement development, i. e. the trend will continue to be residential increase as well as smaller farms and more of them.
- 2. That the general characteristics of the population will remain similar to that of the present i. e. the population will contain a large percentage of young and middle age people who desire the same civic improvements as other areas of less opportunities.

- 3. That the district is suitable for the development of large industries and that the general policy of the district will be favorable to such development.
- 4. That there will be a demand for better recreational opportunities, improvement of parks, ample playgrounds, picnic areas, sanitary improvements, street improvements and others which will be listed later in this report.
- 5. That the tendency will be to increase dairy production, diversified farming and the growing of commercial vegetable crops on a large scale and an increased production of high grade beef.
- 6. That the farmers will demand better farm-to-market roads and maintenance, as well as state highways.
- 7. That the businessmen should make every effort to join together in a spirit of closer cooperation and in addition be willing to give a part of their time to assist and promote the future welfare of our city and community.
- 8. That the Hereford Independent School District be enlarged, buildings improved and expanded to meet the need of the city and community which it now serves.
- 9. That the County Government and the City Government cooperate in every way possible to promote such improvements desired.
- 10. That Taxes be increased if necessary to carry out such necessary improvements deemed easential throughout the city and county.

The assumptions are fully supported by letters, meetings, questionaires and expressions from individuals and organizations. The following specific problems are here presented separately with suggested possible procedure.

CIVIC IMPROVEMENTS

There comes a time in the life of each municipality when civic improvements must be anticipated and provided for. Unless property is secured and the rights of way obtained while available at a reasonable cost, the growth and systematic development of the area will be slow and expensive. Any municipality which fails to recognize the rights of its citizens to live in pleasant surroundings and with adequate recreational facilities will just become another main street. There is a moral obligation to recognize many improvement facts, and to preserve the unique natural advantages of

How Financed or Promoted Agriculture

Most of us believe that for advancement, we must have more farmers, but there may be various methods of getting them. Now, no locality has any enterprising armers to spare, and so it will be our duty and privilege to make some.

Project More People-More

We give the people of Hereford area this report so that every one will know what is generally thought and talked by its citizens, in doing so we hope that everyone will give some of these matters deep consideration and that a part of this program will materialize.

FINANCIAL CONDITION OF DEAF SMITH COUNTY DISTRICT The financial condition of the district is excellent. It is believed that the total bonded indebtedness of both the City and County does not exceed one-half of one percent of the actual value of the land and improvements within the district.

NOTE—The over-all income program (including manufacturing etc.), represents an annual income to the Deaf Smith County District of some \$25,000,000.00.

CONCLUSIONS:

FIRST—The first and most important conclusion is, "That after the war that Hereford will provide and have sufficient employment for all of our returning soldiers and for our permanent residents through a period of two to five years.

SECOND That this employment can be accomplished with the promotion of many of the needed blic improvements.

THIRD—That Hereford is a good place to live the year through and that business could be increased with individual investment, such as Hotels, Auto and Motor Courts, Housing Projects, Nutrition establishments and other needed enterprises.

FOURTH-That the district should be made attractive to all classes of residents by better than average schools, recreational advantages for children and young people, public parks planned, and maintained, fountains, swimming pools, wading pools, and by encouraging planting of more trees and shrubbery in an attractive way.

FIFTH—That an increase in taxes are not necessary to obtain many of the improvements necessary

but should be increased if necessary to obtain the kind of town and community in which we want SIXTH—That our financial structure is such that a great many of the proposed projects can be plan-ned and carried through as post-war works pile and that a very large majority of our citizenship

will approve a good and well-planned program. Your Chamber of Commerce recommends that a committee be appointed by City, County and other organizations to make a study of the following: Civic improvements; schools and recreational areas for children and young people; Parks and plazas; landscaping and planting of trees and shrubbery, city sanitary clean-up, and housing.

The answer to the problem is planning NOW for jobs and a better community to which Johnn may return. The problem of the civilian in Hereford and Deaf Smith County is one of stewardships. we are holding a trust for the men who are fighting our battles; and we have faltered in our true if we buy our bonds, pay our taxes, support the Red Cross—and think we have done our duty for now and the future. Ours is a trust, and unless this trust is brought home to the people, and action is taken before the end of the war, we have failed in our stewardship. We will deserve the locality of the state of which our community will suffer if our returning servicemen do not return to stay.


