### Castro, Parmer Counties Over Top USO Drive

Northwest Texas with twelve "over the top" counties is maintaining its lead for successfully completed drives in the Phinney, state campaign chair-Texas USO campaign, Col. Carl L. Phinney, state campaign chairman, announced in Dallas today.

This week five counties were added to the list which already includes Castro, Motley, Ochiltree, Throckmorton, Childress, Wichita and Roberts Counties, Colonel Phinney said.

The new counties and their chairmen are Parmer, H. Y. Overstreet, Farwell; Floyd, Cecil Hagood, Floydada; Baylor, O. C. Harrison, Seymour; Hemphill, Tom Abraham, Canadian; Swisher, J. Ross Noland, Tulla.

The Texas USO campaign has now reached the half-way mark with 53 per cent of its quota raised, Colonel Phinney reported. Ten Community Chests which included USO in their quota have successfully finished their campaigns, and 30 separate USO drives have turned in completed reports.

The campaign throughout the state is off to a slow start as the appeal in many communities will not be made until January or February of 1947 because of conflicting drives at the present time, the USO state chairman said.

"We are confident, however, that Texas will not fall in this important project. Texas' share in the \$19,000,000 National USO goal for 1947 is \$800,000. Texas' men among the million and a half still in hospitals, overseas or beginning training approximate 25,000. We cannot let them down," Colonel Phinney said.

### Plainview Oil Well Test Looks Like Producer

PLAINVIEW, Nov. 26—Stanolind geologists and operators are hopeful that the Blackmon No. 1 test this firm is completing on Section 13 Block DT, HE & WT survey, in Hale county, will be a flowing producer. "It sure looks good for the time being," said a Stanolind employee. The well flowed 257 barrels B&SW in 14 hours on the first day, 104 barrels of oil and one barrel B&SW in seven hours on the following day.

The pay is from the Clear Fork, the same structure that yields oil in the Anton pool five miles to the southwest. This test is an offset to the Lee Irish No. 1, Hale discovery well. A Pure Oil Co. well northwest of the new Stanolind test flowed briefly but had to be placed on the pump.

Casing has been set on Stanolind's No. 1 Fisher, Sec. 5, Block CL, with pipe set at 4,358 feet, and the test will continue to 7,000 feet or production.

McLEAN, TEXAS (Special)—The former Prisoner of War Camp here will be the scene of a sale of \$300,000 worth of lumber, plus quantities of plumbing, heating, electrical wiring and 20,000 feet of critically short supply pipe, starting on December 16.

McGee stated that purchases would be limited to veterans seeking to obtain materials to erect or to complete one five room individual dwelling, or to contractors seeking to obtain such materials to build a 5-room home for sale to a veteran.

HH priority certificates may be applied for by veterans at the nearest Federal Housing Agency office to their homes, and farmers seeking certification for erection of farm buildings should make application to the Agricultural Extension Service.

Immediate application should be made by those interested in securing the required HH priority certificate to insure having it by the opening date of the sale, Dec. 16.

More than 300 buildings at McLean POW Camp have been taken down and the materials stockpiled in preparation of the opening of this WAA sale.

Prices of clothing and textiles are expected to continue increasing in the next few months.

**MARKETS**

Southwest markets saw improved holiday demand up the price of livestock, eggs, cotton and sweet potatoes to offset the lower tendency taken by most grains, turkeys and some vegetables last week, USDA's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Thanksgiving found plenty of turkeys at southwest markets but demand slow and prices weak. Young toms brought mostly 23 to 25 cents per pound and young hens 34 to 37 cents. Demand for chickens was brisk. Heavy hens held steady at 22 to 25 cents per pound and fryers at 37 to 40 cents.

Egg prices strengthened as fresh supplies were too small to meet the increased holiday demand last week. Current receipts ranged from 45 to 50 cents per dozen, depending on market locale.

Light cattle receipts accounted for the active trading at most southwest markets last week. Prices were steady to stronger under the pressure of improved demand. Small offerings of medium and good slaughter steers brought \$17.50 to \$21 per hundred at Wichita and \$18.75 to \$24.50 at Denver. Medium and good steers and yearlings ranged from \$15 to \$18.50 at Oklahoma City. Good slaughter steers and yearlings realized \$20 to \$25 at Fort Worth while cutters and common lightweight yearlings and steers brought \$9.50 to \$11 at San Antonio. Houston sold common and medium steers and yearlings \$11 to \$15.

Keen competition for small hog receipts carried prices higher at most markets last week. Top price for good and choice butchers was \$25 to \$25.25 per hundred pounds at Fort Worth, Oklahoma City and Denver, \$25.75 at Wichita, and \$25 at San Antonio.

Sheep and lamb prices were steady to strong at most southwest markets last week. Medium and good lambs with No. 1 and 2 pelts brought \$17 to \$17.75 per hundred pounds at San Antonio. Medium and good fat lambs realized \$17.50 to \$21 at Fort Worth and \$20.25 to \$22.25 at Wichita. Good and choice slaughter lambs sold at \$23.50 to \$24 at Denver and \$22.50 at Oklahoma City. Domestic wools remained quiet. Buyers showed little interest in offerings.

Farmers' stock peanuts sold mostly at the CCC support level last week and rice moved quickly under urgent demand at maximum OPA ceilings.

Grain markets were unsettled at the week's close due to the uncertainty of the effect the coal strike will have on transportation and industry. Wheat

held about steady sorghums lost sharply and oats, barley and corn slipped some after the holiday.

Spot cotton prices advanced about \$5 per bale last week as demand from all sources improved. Southwest offerings though small, were larger than the week before, and insufficient to meet the demand.

Bad weather hindered movement of Texas vegetables and citrus last week. Good demand for peppers held prices firm, but dull demand for tomatoes caused prices to weaken. Moderate onion and potato offerings from Colorado shipping points moved slowly at steady to lower prices, at both shipping points and consumer markets.

**Tascosa-Dodge City Trail**

The Tascosa-Dodge City Trail had a combination of uses in its busy existence from about 1876 to 1888. Texas and New Mexico cowboys drove large herds of cattle over it. It was a freight route over which teamsters laboriously urged oxen, mules and horses hitched to lumbering wagons filled to the brim with tons of merchandise and feed. Prior to this period it was a military supply road connecting Fort Dodge near Dodge City, Kansas, and Fort Bascom in New Mexico. In its earliest days it was referred to as the Fort Bascom-Fort Dodge Trail and then as the Fort Dodge Trail. When colorful Tascosa became the Canadian River open range Texas round-up town, a prong, which started from Tascosa's main street and joined the old Fort Bascom-Fort Dodge Trail some eight miles from Tascosa, overshadowed the original trail. It was then that the Tascosa-Dodge City Trail became better known than any of its predecessors.

The Tascosa-Dodge City Trail had a strong rival in the freight business in the two-pronged Tascosa-Springer Trail. Both of these roads to the railroad spearheads carried a load of merchandise and feed for Tascosa and its rambling empire that annually ran into hundreds of thousands of dollars. In their meandering routes both covered about 200 miles. Creeks, sand, great distances between water and the general ruggedness of the country were obstacles to both freighters and cattle drovers. Quick changes in weather, so typical of the Southwest, was another problem, but both the cowboys and the haulwheeler mastered these difficulties and brought cattle and freight through.

In pioneer Tascosa one of the big general mercantile firms asked 25 cents for a crochet needle. A customer complained, saying, "The usual price is five cents."

"Think of the freight," was the reply.

The Tascosa-Dodge City Trail's 242 miles was logged as follows: Tascosa to Little Blue state station, 35 miles; Little Blue to Jim Cator's place, "Zulu," 30 miles; Cator's place to Horseshoe's ranch, 40 miles; Horseshoe's ranch to Jim Lane's on Beaver Creek, 35 miles; Lane's to Hines Crossing on the Charron, 40 miles; Cimarron to Hoodoo Brown's on Crooked Creek, 20 miles; Brown's to Dodge City, 42 miles.

# Thanksgiving Gatherings Mark Holiday Here

## Family Reunions Feature Day In Hereford Homes

Thanksgiving Day, 1946, found Hereford enjoying the season's holiday with traditional activities.
