

## **Bovina police seek** clues in child deaths

BOVINA (AP) - Seven children under the age of four have died since on Oct. 8, 1980, babysat 6-week-old somebody came to my work to tell me 1976 while in the care of a woman who is now jailed in Kansas.

But police in this Texas Panhandle town say clues about the children's

deaths are few. 'Nobody wants to talk about anything," said Castro County Sheriff's Deputy Jerry Bailey. "(People) didn't suspect anything at the times of the deaths and they still

don't." Diana Lumbrera, who is being held in a Garden City, Kan., jail on a \$50,000 bond, has been charged with the first degree murder in the smothering death of her 4-year-old

son, Jose Antonio Lumbrera. Ms. Lumbrera carried her gasping son to the emergency room of a Garden City hospital May 1. The boy died as medies tried to revive him.

Garden City police said an autopsy showed the death was caused by 'asphyxia due to smothering.'

Ralph Earlmann, an Amarillo forensic pathologist concluded that Melinda died from "acute heart failure due to increased taxation on a case of congenital heart disease."

Earlmann ruled out any criminal actions relating to the child's death. Melissa Lumbrera was three when

she died in October 1978. A death certificate lists the cause of death as "asphyxia due to aspiration of stomach contents."

Jose Lionel Garza was 14 weeks Maria Aleman, Ms. Lumbrera's old when he died in February 1978 in a Lubbock hospital. No death records were immediately available.

Joanna Lumbrera was 15 weeks old when she died in November 1976 in Bovina. A death certificate shows death was caused by "strangulation due to asphyxiation due to convulsive disorder.'

Because there weren't any police investigations at the time of the deaths, authorities have had to start from scratch, said Johnny Actkinson, Parmer County district attorney.

## Couple rides out twister in bathtub

ANSON (AP) - When they knew a twister was headed for their house, Jesse and Mindy Hill took cover - in their bathtub.

A tornado moving across Jones County destroyed a mobile home then cut across a pasture toward the Hills' residence about 6 p.m. Monday.

The couple jumped in their bathtub and pulled a mattress over themselves for protection. The cyclone destroyed their house and flung them about 100 yards into a shallow creek.

Afterwards, they were bruised and shaken, but not seriously hurt.

"We drove up just as they were getting ready to get into an ambusaid John Thomas, a newsman for KTAB-TV in Abilene. 'They were covered with mud. They looked like coal miners.'

All that was left of the Hills' home was a cement slab, Thomas said.

"There was debris all over the place. There was a pickup truck tossed near the creek. It was demolished, and there was a car tipped up on its side. It looked like it had been rolled over a few times."

On the north edge of Anson, Thomas and his television crew reported offices of Buckeye Supply Co. in rubble. It appeared to have taken a direct hit, he said.

The twister hit several homes Monday evening and caused a few injuries, all minor near Anson, about 25 miles northwest of Abilene, the Jones County sheriff's department

"We've had quite a few houses destroyed out of town, to the northwest of us," said Tracy Daniel, a jailer with the Jones County sheriff's department.

Several mobile homes were reported destroyed on Lake Fort Phantom Hill about 15 miles northeast of the center of Abilene.

Power lines were down through the area.

Daniel said there was heavy rain, hail up to baseball-size and high winds. He said several accidents were attributed to the storm.



I am bisexual. A year ago, I had unprotected sex twice with a man who is gay. He is the only man I have ever been with, but I am aware that he has had many partners.

Six weeks after our last encounter, I experienced extreme fatigue, flulike symptoms and a rash that lasted for several weeks. Knowing that these were symptoms of AIDS, I went for a test. It turned out negative. I was told that the test was 99 percent accurate after three months, but in order to have total peace of mind, I went for a second test 90 days later. That, too, was negative.

After the second test, I decided I was safe and married a wonderful woman. We are extremely happy, and she has no idea that I am bisexual. I recently learned of studies that show-some cases of AIDS were not detected for longer than six months after exposure. Now I am scared to death that I may indeed have the virus, and what is worse, I may have passed it on to my wife.

Please check with your experts, and tell me what they say about this. No city or state, please. Just --Terrified and Anxious

**DEAR TERRIFIED:** I contacted Dr. Anthony Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, one of the world's foremost authorities on AIDS. This is what he said:

Your correspondent, having had homosexual sex, has put himself in the high risk category. But the fact that he had a negative antibody test for HIV three months after the first encounter and then again three months later puts him in a category of 95 percent safe. I am a little

DEAR ANN LANDERS: As I concerned, however, about the symptoms he described six weeks after the last encounter.

> There is one more thing he can do. Get a polymerase chain reaction (PCR) analysis to determine if he has a latent infection that is not inducing

you tell your wife of your history and ask her to get tested. He also suggested that you practice safe sex.



### **McWilliams** might be receptive to demotion

AUSTIN (AP) - University of Texas football coach David McWilliams indicated on a radio talk show Monday he would consider a demotion to assistant coach if 1990 is no better for the Longhorns than last year, when they went 5-6.

McWilliams' response came to a question during a KFON-AM radio talk show about whether he would consider staying on the staff if he were replaced as head coach.

"My No. 1 consideration would be my family and how best to take care of my family," he added.

McWilliams left an assistant's job at Texas to take the head coach's job at Texas Tech, then was hired as UT head coach when Fred Akers was fired in late 1986 after a 5-6 record, the Longhorns' first losing season in three decades.

McWilliams directed Texas to a 7-5 record his first year at the helm, but the Longhorns finished 4-7 in 1988 and 5-6 in 1989, giving McWilliams a 3-year record of 16-18.

Before recording losing records in three of the past four seasons, Texas had 29 consecutive winning seasons - all 20 years that Darrell Royal was head coach and nine of the 10 years that Akers was head coach.

Royal took over after Ed Price's team went 1-9 in 1956. Royal's teams 1957-76, including national championships in 1963 (11-0), 1969 (11-0) and 1970 (10-1). Akers was 86-31-2 in 10 seasons from 1977-86.





"Many Americans believe that air bags will protect them in a crash, even if they don't buckle up," said George R. Gustafson, coalition spokesperson and president of Texas Safety Association. "They're dead wrong. The air bag and safety belt are made to work together."

## Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: I am a 48-year-old male and have a high cholesterol. At my last test it was 207. However, my HDL-cholesterol was only 36. My family doctor told me to exercise hard to bring up my HDLcholesterol. Then when my annual physical came due for my employer, I asked that doctor how to raise my HDL-cholesterol and he told me that it would probably not go up very much no matter what I do. Is there any way to bring up my HDLcholesterol?

DEAR READER: I would agree that it is sometimes difficult to raise the HDL-cholesterol. But it is important to make the effort because new studies continue to show that the HDL-cholesterol level may be the most significant measurement concerning your possible risk of a heart attack. Your total cholesterol level is, quite satisfactory, but more recent studies suggest that even if your total cholesterol is low - and yours is that a low HDL-cholesterol may still significantly increase your risk of a heart attack.

The only way anyone ever knows what will work in a specific patient is to try it. Exercise is a very good way to raise the HDL-cholesterol in many patients. Losing excess body fat is also helpful as well as changing to a proper diet.

Beyond that, there are a number of medicines that will also raise the HDL-cholesterol level in many patients, but some medications to lower total cholesterol actually lower the HDL-cholesterol level. Mevacor (lovastatin) will raise the HDLcholesterol level in some patients. So will nicotinic acid.

To understand the meaning of your normal total cholesterol of 207 and your low HDL-cholesterol read, Special Report 44, Understanding Cholesterol and Triglycerides, which I am sending you. Others who want this report can send \$2 with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope for it to THE HEALTH LETTER/44, P.O. Box 19622, Irvine, CA 92713.

Usually, the lower your HDLcholesterol, the higher your LDLcholesterol, from the type of fattycholesterol particles that lodge in the wall of arteries and cause heart attacks.

DEAR DR. LAMB: I am addicted to cigarettes. I have tried and tried to stop, but I just can't get through two days in a row without the filthy habit. It isn't that people don't know that cigarettes are harmful, the problem is how to quit.

I have heard there is a medicine used to treat high blood pressure that can control the urge and help you stop smoking. True? If so what is it and what can I do about it?

DEAR READER: Partially true. You have probably heard about clonidine (Catapres). There are conflicting reports about its benefits in stopping smoking. It has been useful in the management of alcohol and opiate withdrawal.

Dr. Victor Villagra at the Geisinger-Medical Center in Danville, Pa., reported that about one in four smokers his group treated with skin patches of clonidine remained off cigarettes for six months. Other investigators who used only clonidine for a short period of time did not notice any benefits.

The difference is probably that Villagra's group used clonidine as part of counseling and psychological support or behavior modification program, whereas other studies just used clonidine without an overall program.

So it is worth a try as part of an overall program to stop smoking. Ask your lung association, heart associa-


