American said to have interfered with election

SAN SALVADOR, EI Salvador (AP) - A U.S. senator and a right-wing vice presidential candidate accused the American ambassador. here of trying to manipulate the upcoming presidential runoff and asked that he be

Ambassador Thomas Pickering has "taken actions which support only one candidate" in the election and 'must be immediately replaced," vice presidential candidate Hugo Barrera said Wednesday, quoting from what he said was a letter from Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C.

The dispute flared on the final day of campaigning before Sunday's runoff election, which pits Roberto d'Aubuisson of the rightist Republican Nationalist Alliance against moderate Christian Democrat Jose

Salvadoran ambassador

Napoleon Duarte. Barrera is d'Aubuisson's running mate.

Helms, in a letter to President Reagan, said Pickering is trying to engineer Duarte's victory, according to a Washington congressional source familiar with the letter. "The U.S. is supposed to be neutral down there and should cling to that," the source quoted Helms' letter as saving.

Helms accused Pickering of helping the Christian Democrats by encouraging Salvadoran election officials to retain questionable voter registration lists, said the source, who declined to be identified.

U.S. Embassy spokesman Greg Lagana denied the charges, saying the United States has been "completely neutral" during the cam-

But American officials have said privately they would be concerned if d'Aubuisson

D'Aubuisson has been linked with rightist death squads and his victory would make it even more difficult for the Reagan administration to obtain military aid from Con-

Pickering, 52, is a 25-year veteran of the foreign service who has served in Europe, the Middle East and Africa.

Helms is the secondranking Republican on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and an advocate of tough measures against left-wing rebels in El

Helms did not release the text of the letter, but Barrera said excerpts were read over

Unlike some of the previous debates, there were no sharp exchanges between Mondale and Hart. Instead, much of the attention focused on Jackson and his association with Farrakhan.

At issue is Farrakhan's declaration in a March radio broadcast that Washington Post reporter Milton Coleman was a "Judas" for reporting Jackson's ethnic remarks against Jews. "One day soon we will punish you

with death," Farrakhan said. Farrakhan, who heads the Nation of Islam, a Black Muslim offshoot, is a longtime Jackson supporter who has campaigned with the

civil rights leader and once provided him

bodyguards. During the debate, Jackson was asked what the late Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. would have said about Farrakhan's remarks

"Redemption as opposed to punishment," said Jackson, recalling King's Christian

philosophy and forgiveness. 'Those without sin should throw the first stone," said Jackson, invoking a biblical

"You have not repudiated that message of Louis Farrakhan," said Vanocur. "I disassociated myself

from the message but not the messenger," Jackson said.

Jackson said that because Farrakhaan's words were taken out of context, "There

has been a lot of exaggerated reaction to that statement." Mondale said Farrakhan's

words were "poison." "You are coming on as sort of self-righteous," Jackson reported

"I don't think it is selfrighteous to repudiate a statement which threatens the life of a reporter," said Mondale.

Hart then said threatening the life of another person, whether or not he is a reporter, is illegal. "I don't understand why the authorities haven't moved on that." he said.

Jackson, appearing to grow uncomfortable under his rivals' criticism, said he hoped the debate would go on to other issues. In a previous debate, Jackson complained that the two other candidates

Agency acts before asks

Red Cross volunteers do not take the time to decide if a family is really eligible for. or deserving of, their services. When they get a call, they go.

"My years with Red Cross have taught me not to judge," Betty Hensen said recently. "If they need help, they need help.

Hensen has been director of the Deaf Smith County Chapter of the American Red Cross since 1979. Before that, she was a volunteer. And her mother, Nell Culpepper, was one before her.

Hensen said she has helped flood victims who constructed their houses, against the advice of others, on a flood plain.

Also, she has found fire victims a place to stay after their homes burned to the ground. They have been nice homes, built with practically every penny owned by the families, who have been uninsured.

But Hensen pointed out regardless of the circumstances, despite an apparent lack of good judgment, disaster victims need clothes to wear and a roof over their heads. The 200 or so people in the county who donate their services as Red Cross volunteers are ready, night and day, to provide those things.

"It involves a good chunk of time, money and effort to be a volunteer," Hensen pointed out. "Participation is good in this county.'

Culpepper could not remember what year she joined the ranks. It was more than 20 years ago, because she has a service pin to prove it. Stately and young-looking at 73, she smiles a lot, like her daughter.

Culpepper says that happy outlook came in handy when she implemented the range of motion exercise program at Westgate Nursing Home a few years ago. "Staying cheerful for over an hour

County's Red Cross chapter

(leading the exercises) is depleted really hard work," she admitted. "But it's really necessary, and if you can't smile about it, you might as well not go out there.'

says the range of motion program has been the most rewarding of her varied Red Cross experiences. She especially remembered a woman who had suffered a stroke and made little if any recovery in more than a year's time.

"She was without hope," Culpepper explained. "She did nothing but lie in bed and was completely paralyzed on her right side.

Culpepper and her therapy team convinced the woman to start moving--and think positively. Now, Culpepper said, "This lady is a productive person.

"I like to think our greatest achievement has been at Westgate," she said. "Those exercises are so important to a stroke patient."

Hensen said the Red Cross is only required to do two things: render assistance in disaster situations and provide services to military personnel, veterans and their families. But that is not all they actually do.

With the service people, it is usually an emergency such as a death in the family, disease or a financial crisis. When a soldier asks for emergency leave, the situation is verified through the Red Cross in that person's home town.

Hensen said there are a lot of young people from the county in the military and the local chapter handles at least two or three requests a week. On a national level, Hensen

pointed out that expenditures have exceeded income for the past three years. Red Cross programs depend on donations-locally they are United Way funded--and disaster services have everywhere.

"There seem to be more disasters, with more people involved in each one.' Hensen said. "There's cur-The longtime volunteer rently a nationwide public relations campaign to raise

What does Hensen like most about the work? "The most rewarding part is when someone saves a life, or really makes a difference in someone's life, by using the skills we've shared with them," she said with one of her biggest smiles.

Texans plan trip

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A Texas delegation, including four state Legislators, will make a week-long trip to Central America for a first-hand look at the troubled region and to show Mexico that the Lone Star state wants to be a good neighbor, a legislator says.

Astronauts, engineers eager to try rescue

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) - Astronauts and engineers at the Johnson Space Center, confident they can rescue two crippled communications satellites trapped in aimeless orbit, are waiting for someone to pay for the salavage operation.

Space engineers have developed a plan to retrieve two communications satellites that are stuck in useless orbits, but NASA officials said the salvage attempt will be made only if the owners of the two satellites ask the space agency to attempt the task.

"You've got an eager crew and an eager bunch of space engineers who want to try this," said an engineer who asked not to be named. "Everybody is waiting in the starting blocks ready for the word to go."

The two crippled satellites are the Westar, owned by Western Union, and the Palapa-B, owned by the Indonesian government. They were placed in low Earth orbit last February by the space shuttle, but were later failed to reach their planned high orbits when secondstage rocket engines failed.

The satellites cost \$75 million, but are useless in their current orbits. NASA would like to recover the craft and return them to

NASA engineers have developed preliminary plans to attempt the rescue during a November mission called 51-A. But the mission cannot be attempted until Indonesia or Western Union ask the space agency to try the retrivial.

NASA Administrator James Beggs said both Western Union and Indonesia has been offered an "attractive price" for the rescue.

Engineers who have studied the problem believe that both satellites could be snared in orbit by the space shuttle and brought back to Earth for refurbishment and

Both satellites have armed second-stage engines on board and also have full loads of fuel for their attitude control jets.

A NASA engineer, who asked not to be named, said that a tentative plan now worked out calls for the satellites to be commanded to harmlessly burn off the fuel in the second-stage engines and then use the attitude control jets to lower their orbits to about 300 miles, within range of the shuttle.

If the satellites are placed in the low orbit, that a crew commanded by astronaut Frederick Hauck would be launched in the space shuttle to attempt the salvage. Included in the crew would

Each of the salvage efforts would follow the same plan.

The space shuttle would rendezvous in orbit to within 300 feet of the target satellite. One of the spacewalkers would then fly out to the satellite using the astronaut jet pack.

The astronaut would carry a special tool, similar to an expansion bolt, that he would insert into the nozzle of the satellite rocket engine. The tool would lock inside the nozzle, forming an anchor for a grapple fixture.

Hauck would move the shuttle closer, enabling the craft's robot arm to snare the grapple fixture and place the satellite in shuttle cargo bay.

The engineer, who is working on the project, said the mission could be ready to fly by November, but it would require "some very fast work." He said it would be possible only because both Allen and Gardner have been extensively trained in spacewalk techniques.

Several officials said the successful salvage last month of the Solar Max satellite has given NASA a great deal of confidence in their ability to perform orbital repair tasks.

"We're all eager to do it," said the engineer. "It's another notch in our handle."

Airline accuses vandals

HOUSTON (AP) - Striking pilots made death threats, burned property, jammed aircraft radio transmissions and even hurled the petrified head of a slain elk into a working pilot's home, Continental Airlines has claimed.

The allegations were made in a complaint filed in December and partially unsealed Wednesday by U.S. Bankruptcy Judge T. Glover Roberts, a visiting judge from Biloxi, Miss.

The complaint accused the Air Line PIlots Association and eight striking pilots seven in Texas and one in California — of conspiring to harm Continental and its employees in an attempt to shut down the airline's flight operations.

Continental, which filed for reorganization in September federal bankruptcy law, has sought \$330 million in damages and accused striking pilots of engaging in vandalism against the carrier and its working employees since ALPA went on strike Oct. 1. Esperison Martinez, an ALPA spokesman in

Washington, D.C., denied the allegations. The petition "demonstrates tonio. tal is willing to inject volatile

Jackson opened the debate by calling on the Democratic Party to reform its delegation selection process under which he said he will receive fewer delegates than he earned in the popular vote.

"I have won 18 percent of the popular vote, but only 7 percent of delegates," Jackson said. Mondale, meanwhile, will get 50 percent of the pledge delegates earned with 39 percent of the

"He (Mondale) has 11 percent more delegates than his popular vote warrants, I have 11 percent less," said Jackson.

Later, after the debate, Jackson said the three candidates should meet before the Democratic National Convention in July to discuss the various disputes over delegate selection.

"Our mission is to expand the party and heal the party," Jackson said in the opening moments of the debate. He repeated his call for an







There were approximately 10,000 entries from several states as well as Canada at the annual contest, according to Ms. Cansler.





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



Q. Lately, my car has had a tendency to continue to run after I've turned the the point that the engine will run - ignition off - for almost a minute. What causes this?

A. Dieseling or after-running, as the condition is known, is caused by either incorrect idle speed and/or high engine temperature. High idle speed increases the inertia of the crankshaft and flywheel, causing dieseling. Adjusting the idle speed is the simple answer here, either by carburetor adjustment or ignition timing. Enriching the idle fuel mixture will also decrease the dieseling tendency. You might also try using a higher octane gasoline and decrease the heat range of the sparkplugs. Allowing the engine to return to idle speed before shutting it off and in automatics, turning off the engine while in gear may help dieseling.

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World's fastest sprinter

Cowboys draft speedster Lewis

DALLAS (AP) - Carl Lewis, perhaps the world's fastest sprinter, has never played football, but the Dallas Cowboys say they hope to coax the University of Houston athlete into joining them as a wide receiver after he competes for the United States in the 1984 Olympics.

Dallas drafted Lewis with the third-from-the-last pick in Tuesday's National Football League draft.

It brought back memories of the Cowboys' signing of Bob Hayes, who gave up track for pro football and brought a new dimension to the league with his lightning speed, which converted into long-distance touchdowns as a wide receiver.

Lewis, who could win three gold medals at this summer's competition in Los Angeles, has never given any indication he cares about playing football. But the Cowboys' management is excited about the prospects.

"If he can't outrun the defensive back, he can jump over him. He's a two-pronged player. A runner and a jumper. He's got so much potential, and he's a class guy. He's really an unbelievable athlete," Gil Brandt, the Cowboys' director of player development, told the Dallas Morning

Unlike previous track and field stars who turned to pro football, such as Hayes, Renaldo Nehemiah, John Carlos and Jimmy Hines, the 22-year-old Lewis has no football background or inclina-

"I'd have to learn how to take hits, which I'm not interested in getting," Lewis said Wednesday in Houston.

Lewis, who is from Willingboro, N.J., added, jokingly, "I was hoping the Eagles would draft me. I said a long time ago I was not interested in football. Then I get picked by the Cowboys, no less. It's a first-class organization, but it's one you like to hate. Maybe they drafted me to boost attendance."

Cowboys coach Tom Lan-

dry said he left the Cowboys' draft room about 8:30 p.m. Monday, but had an idea that Brandt and club president Tex Schramm might have a surprise for him when he returned for Tuesday morning's start of the draft.

"When you leave them on their own, you don't know what's going to happen," Landry told the News. "All I know about Lewis is he's fast."

Brandt said drafting Lewis was Schramm's idea.

"Maybe a man with his skill, playing football would come naturally," Schramm said. "I know you better get a good start covering him. We took him just on the chance he might want to give it a try. We will pursue it.

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

NFL selects 40 SWC players in draft

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -When Mossy Cade heard on television that the San Diego Chargers, as expected, had chosen him in the first round of the National Football League college draft, the University of Texas cornerback let out a scream of joy.

"Thanks to the man upstairs," said Cade, one of 17 Longhorns drafted during Tuesday's daylong proceedings.

In all, 40 prospects were plucked from the Southwest Conference, including world class sprinter Carl Lewis, a University of Houston athlete on whom the Dallas Cowboys spent their last pick as a possible wide receiver - a la Bob Hayes.

Five other players from Texas colleges also were drafted.

Four SWC players, including Cade, went in the first round. The Dallas Cowbovs chose Texas A&M linebacker Billy Cannon, and the New York Jets grabbed Southern Methodist defensive back Russell Carter and Arkansas defensive end Ron Faurot.

University of Texas officials say the choosing of 17 Longhorns makes 1984 the biggest draft class ever for the school - surpassing the

12 who were taken from Texas' strong senior class two years ago.

The showing more than doubled the draft picks of any other school in the land. Next best was eight from East Carolina and Penn State. Seven were taken from national champion Miami. The league also led the nation. The Big 10 was next closest with 35, five behind the SWC.

The only Longhorn seniors not drafted were halfback Mike Luck, tight end Mike Chapman, offensive tackle Casey Smith and defensive end Mike Buchanan, all of whom are free to sign as free agents.

One other Longhorn, center Mike Reuther, was lured away by the Los Angeles Express of the U.S. Football League earlier in the year.

NFL clubs drafted five players from Texas A&M and Houston, although four of those taken from Houston didn't come until the final two

Other SWC schools, and the number of players drafted, are Southern Methodist University 4, Baylor 3, Texas Christian 3, Arkansas 2 and Texas Tech 1. No one was drafted from Rice.

The draft also featured two

selections from Texas-Arlington and one each from Southwest Texas State, Texas A&I and East Texas State.

"It turned out pretty good," said Texas linebacker Ed Williams, who along with Texas offensive guard Doug Dawson went in the second

The New England Patriots drafted Williams, who said New England contacts told him they "want to use me as a pass rusher."

Dawson said, "I was getting a little anxious. I was just ready to be picked. I was ready to go."

Quarterback Rick McIvor and cornerback Fred Acorn were the fourth and fifth Longhorns to be selected. They went in the third round McIvor to St. Louis and Acorn to Tampa Bay.

"This is what I've been looking for for a long time," Acorn said.

"It's a dream come true. I'm really happy with the whole situation," McIvor




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Hoyt misses perfect game by one pitch

It was a perfect pitch ... but it cost LaMarr Hoyt a perfect

It came with one out in the seventh inning Wednesday night after Hoyt had mowed down the first 19 New York Yankee batters.

"He jammed me, that's all," Don Mattingly said. "All his pitches were working good. I think I hit a slider."

Mattingly popped it up to short left field where a 14-mile-an-hour wind carried it just out of the reach of diving shortstop Jerry Dybzinski for a fluke single, the Yankees' only hit and only baserunner. Steve Kemp followed with a double-play grounder and Hoyt faced the minimum number of 27 batters in hurling Chicago to a 3-0 victory over the Yankees, the team that traded him to the White Sox in 1977.

"If the wind isn't blowing, it's a running catch," Dybzinski said. "But I knew I was going to have to dive to make

the play. I wasn't thinking about anything else, but I kept running and running and couldn't catch up with it."

Nor could the Yankees, who have lost seven of their last eight games and were shut out for the sixth time, catch up with Hoyt.

"This game is played by humans, not machines," said Chicago Manager Tony LaRussa, "so I'm always surprised that a man can go from the first inning to the ninth without a mistake and he did."

In other American League games, the Boston Red Sox edged the Detroit Tigers 5-4, the Cleveland Indians outlasted the Baltimore Orioles 9-7 in 16 innings, the Oakland Athletics nipped the California Angels 7-6, the Toronto Blue Jays shaded the Texas Rangers 7-6 and the Minnesota Twins downed the Seattle Mariners 8-6. The Kansas City-Milwaukee game was rained out.

Hoyt, who struck out eight, seemed to be the only

"I don't think when you throw a one-hit shutout you should be disappointed," said the burly 29-year-old righthander. "The chances of throwing a perfect game aren't very good anyway. Hoyt was in such command that he threw a strike on the first pitch to 19 of the 27 batters and never went to a three-ball count.



Rehnquist says arguments vital

HOUSTON (AP) - Criticizing lawyers who make unclear and unnecessarily long court speeches, Supreme Court Justice William H. Rehnquist said a poorly argued case is likely to be a poorly decided one.

"So long as oral advocacy is practiced, it ought to be practiced in the best traditions of the profession," Rehnquist told lawyers Wednesday at a three-day civil law confernence.

'My colleagues and I may disagree among ourselves about many legal questions," Rehnquist said. "But I think we would all agree that a poorly presented case is apt to be a poorly decided case."

About 300 attorneys attended the Federal Civil Practice Institute sponsored by the Houston chapter of the Federal Bar Association and South Texas College of Law.

Rehnquist said a court argument should serve the same purpose as movie preview, which "selects dramatic or interesting scenes that are apt to catch the interest of the viewer and

He also advised lawyers to 'know your court" and warned them against reading their court arguments from written statements and quoting long strings of court deci-

"When it comes to oral argument, the more flesh and blood you can insert into it, as opposed to a dry recitation of principles of law or decided cases, the more interesting and effective that argument can be," Rehnquist said.

After all, he said, a lawyer is not "presenting his case to some abstract, platonic embodiment of appellate judges as a class, but to three, five, seven or nine flesh-and-blood men and women.

Court arguments are more mportant in the Supreme Court than in other U.S. appellate courts, he said, because a lower court decision appealed to the Supreme Court "is a genuinely doubtful one."

"A good oral argument is in the finest tradition of our profession," he said. "It confers a benefit upon your client and upon the court."

Rehnquist was appointed to the Supreme Court in 1972 by former President Richard M.

Mrs. Hajjizadeh recited the Rosary before the movie was aired Monday night and then cried during the show. "I was just blessed" that their pictures were chosen.


Police found the children living with their father in Burleson, 12 miles south of Fort Worth. Juvenile officer Doug Allen said a man who did not want to be identified called Monday night.



Chief Justice refuses to block Texas courts

Chief Justice Warren E. Burger has refused to block courts in Texas from taking part in a case that focused on the role of interracial marriages in child custody fights.

Burger on Wednesday denied - by ignoring - an emergency request by Linda Sidoti Palmore, of Seffner, Fla., to bar Texas courts from standing in the way of her Florida court battle to regain custody of her 6-yearold daughter, Melanie.

The chief justice, however, returned Mrs. Palmore's case to the Florida courts immediately rather than on



May 20, the date when a Supreme Court ruling in Mrs. Palmore's favor normally would take effect.

On April 25, the high court overturned a ruling that had stripped Mrs. Palmore, who is white, of custody of her daughter because she married Clarence Palmore, a

Mrs. Palmore's exhusband, Anthony J. Sidoti of

Bryan, Texas, was awarded custody of Melanie in 1982. Sidoti, who is white, is married to a white woman.

Hodel, in Houston Wednesday to tour a Shell Oil Co. refinery during a campaign trip, said he opposes the bill pending in the House of Representatives.

"I think it's going to be a tough fight" on the House floor, Hodel said. The bill, sponsored by Indiana Democrat Phillip Sharp, was approved in committee April

"But I think eventually we'll have a better bill than the Sharp bill," Hodel said. He said the bill amounts to a new set of controls which would result in higher prices of natural gas by cutting the

The bill aims to reduce high prices negotiated during severe gas shortages several

Hodel cautioned that the United States must bear in mind the plight of energypoor allies like Japan in the event traffic is closed in the Persian Gulf.

He said the United States may get only 3 to 5 percent of its oil from foreign sources, but countries such as Japan import as much as half their

'If somebody tries to cutoff the Gulf, we have to take into account" the needs of such allies, Hodel said. The Persian Gulf, particularly the Strait of Hormuz, has been a point of contention in the war between Iran and Iraq.

DEAR DR. LAMB - As you know, most older men have problems with their prostate gland. Does enlargement of the prostate have anything to do with the ability to enjoy sex as much as a younger man? Will it affect his ability to have an

erection? Does the absence of sex for three months because of an enlarged prostate have anything to do with his ability to have an erection? Can sex be enjoyed after the prostate gland operation? I've heard the use of zinc tablets help maintain a

healthy prostate. DEAR READER There's no good evidence that prostate gland problems really cause difficulty in erections. Sometimes men are told that's the reason for impotence, but there's usually some other reason.

a prolonged period can affect an older man's ability to have an erection. It depends on his general health and why he was inactive. Remember, some illnesses naturally reduce a person's interest in sex. The prostate gland usually enlarges because of benign tumors inside the gland.

recipes to food-processor recipes? - LAURA

Processor 'does' bread DEAR POLLY - I'd like to make my favorite bread recipes in my food processor. Do you have instructions for

converting traditional hand-mixed and kneaded bread

DEAR LAURA - Bread baking becomes a snap when you have a food processor handy to do the mixing and kneading. In fact, it's so fast that once you try it, you just might be persuaded to make all your bread yourself. There are as many methods for making bread in the food

processor as there are special processor cookbooks. However, I make almost all of my bread in my processor using a very simple technique. I place all the liquid called for in the recipe (at the specified temperature) in the processor bowl. then add the yeast. I usually let this sit for a few minutes to give the yeast time to dissolve, but this is not absolutely Then I add all other ingredients such as dry milk powder.

eggs, shortening, butter or oil, (no need to melt solid shorten-

ing or butter; just cut it into small pieces and put it right into the processor bowl) plus a cup or two of the flour and process again for 30 seconds or so. I continue to add the remaining flour, a cup at a time. processing for a few seconds after each addition until the dough is the correct consistency and is well-kneaded. After all of the flour has been incorporated, the final kneading time is usually no more than 30 seconds. After a few loaves,

you'll be able to judge easily how long to process the dough. I've found that you can use a little less liquid (or a little more flour) when preparing traditional bread recipes in the food processor. Also be sure the quantity made from a recipe does not exceed the capacity of your food processor. Most processor instruction manuals specify the maximum number of cups of flour in a bread recipe that can be safely accommodated in that specific machine. Happy baking! -POLLY

DEAR POLLY - I need a recipe for making french fries to freeze from home-grown potatoes. Is there any reader of your column who could supply a recipe for the above?

DEAR PAULINE - It's difficult to freeze potatoes (either cooked or raw) of any kind; they tend to turn watery when thawed. The only real exception to this is baked potatoes which turn out a little more successfully.


However, you might try the following technique for homefrozen french fries. Cut peeled potatoes into the size sticks you prefer, then soak in ice water for 15 to 20 minutes. Drain blot on paper towels so the potatoes are as dry as possible. Heat vegetable or peanut oil in a deep fryer to 375 degrees (or on the stove using a deep frying thermometer), then fry the potato sticks in small batches just until they are soft, but not brown. Remove from the fat, drain on paper towels until cool, then pack in freezer bags or containers to
