

## Strain given seven years probation, fine

Despite the defense attorney's plea Robert Strain's cooperation with law enforcement officers was an indication of his innocence, jurors sided with witnesses for the state and found the Hereford man guilty of felony theft Thursday.

The 222nd District Court jury sentenced the 52-yearold farmer to seven years probation and assessed a \$5,000 fine, the maximum allowable fine for the charge. of third degree felony theft over \$200 and under \$10,000.

Strain was being tried by a seven-man, five-woman jury on one of 17 indictments issued against him last Sept. 1 by a Deaf Smith County grand jury. The district attorney's office this morning was not ready to make a statement as to what would be done about the remaining 16 indictments, and defense attorney Travis Shelton has not yet indicated if an appeal will be filed.

The state rested its case on Wednesday after calling some 33 witnesses, including law enforcement officers, farmers whose belongings had been taken and later found in Strain's barn and. two men who said they sold stolen merchandise to Strain after telling him the stuff was

for the defense, including Strain's wife Sallie, former president of the Hereford Independent School District board of education. Mrs. Strain testified her husband went to "many, many sales" and had collected things for as long as she had known him. The couple has been married since 1955.

Shelton and Deaf Smith County District Attorney Roland Saul each took about one hour for closing arguments, with District Judge David Wesley Gulley dismissing the jury at 6 p.m. to eat dinner and begin deliberations. The guilty verdict was announced by jury foreman Werner Koelzer at about 7:10 p.m.

The punishment phase of the trial lasted less than an hour, with the jury taking just under two hours to make up its mind about the sentence.

"If you convict someone of a crime and don't punish them, you haven't accomplished anything," Saul told the jury in his closing remarks. "If you're going to do anything about theft, you're going to have to do something about the fence."

Saul asked the jury to assess the maximum punishment: 10 years incarceration in the Texas Department of Corrections and a \$5,000 fine. Shelton asked for probation

for his client, who had never been convicted of a felony.

Shelton claimed that Strain had already been punished, just by going through the ordeal of a long trial and by the fact that as a convicted felon "he can no longer vote, obtain a passport or serve on a jury." Shelton said perhaps hardest for Strain would be the fact that he would have to "go about his business in the community, looking his friends and neighbors in the eye as a convicted felon."

"It's not the appropriate penalty to say to Bob Strain that 'you ought to go to Huntsville'," Shelton said to the

Earlier, Shelton asked jurors to think carefully before considering the testimony given by Thomas Martinez Sr. of Lubbock and Joe Angel Martinez, his nephew, of Hereford.

The men have both been convicted of theft in connection with items that turned up after Strain's barn was raided last Aug. 15. The older man has been named as a major supplier of the stolen goods found in the barn.

"I don't know whether you can believe Joe Angel Martinez or not." Shelton told the jury panel. "Apparently Joe Angel and his uncle got together." Referring to tinez that Robert Strain had broken their agreement not to tell on each other if one got caught, Shelton attempted to cast doubt that the agreement has ever been made.

"Martinez is anxious to get even with Mr. Strain," he said. "I say to you he's willing to fudge a little if he's mad at Strain.

"Remember that accomplice witnesses are people whose testimonies you have to scrutinize closely,'

Gulley told jurors they must also be convinced that Lindsey was the owner of the property in question, that the property was stolen when Strain got it and that he knew it was stolen, and that it was worth over \$200 and under

#### **Local Roundup** POWER encourages comment People Opposed to Wasted Energy Repositories

(POWER) is urging area citizens to write letters protesting the proposed tenfold raising of acceptable radiation leakage amounts.

The Environmental Protection Agency, POWER said, is allowing public comment on the proposal, given in the May 8 federal register. The 1,000 percent increase deals specifically with radiation from high-level nuclear waste repositories, for which Deaf Smith County contains one of nine candidate sites.

Written comments are due by May 29, though POWER said there is a chance those received late will be con-

"It seems to us that once again citizen input is nearly eliminated by the lack of adequate response time," a POWER press release stated. "It seems unreasonable to expect private citizens to have the time to respond to such an important issue in less than one month, even if it were possible to receive notification more quickly.

"We urge everyone to send a statement, even a postcard, objecting to the relaxation of the standards for radiation releases from nuclear waste dumps. We know that such releases of radiation are a planned part of the repository system. We musn't sit by and allow 10 times as much radiation to contaminate our atmosphere and ex-

The GOP has received \$6.06 million from the U.S. Treasury to stage the convention on Aug. 20-23. A local group is trying to raise an additional \$4.4 million by Aug. 1. About \$2 million of that amount would be used for security.

#### Woman shot during divorce court

NORWICH, Conn. (AP) — A woman gunned down by her estranged husband in a crowded divorce court had earlier in the day expressed fear he would harm her, but was put at ease when her keys set off a courthouse metal detector, her lawyer said.

Kenneth Spargo, 53, and Priscilla Spargo, 44, were in Norwich Superior Court on Thursday, to dissolve their 23-year marriage on Spargo's claim that his wife had committed adultery, court records said.

As the judge looked on, Spargo, described by his lawyer as a religious fanatic, calmly walked up to his wife, "bent over and whispered something to her, then stepped back and said, 'You bitch,' and bang, bang, bang," said Robert Murphy, who witnessed the shooting.

#### Hard hats bid farewell to furnace

DUQUESNE, Pa. (AP) - Wearing black arm bands humming "Taps" and fighting back tears, grizzled steelworkers toiled their final shift at Dorothy Six, an award-winning blast furnace whose fires fell victim to the industry's hard times.

"I saw Dorothy being built when I was a kid. She was special to us. She was our bread and butter. It's something you hate to see die. She was part of the family," said Joe Procacina, 43, a steelworker for 17 years.

"There were a lot of guys with tears in their eyes. It's a dead, empty feeling. It's sad. The place is like a graveyard," said Procacina, a maintenance man with a wife and three children but no job.

U.S. Steel Corp., which lost \$1.2 billion last year, shut down Dorothy Six on Thursday as part of a nationwide retrenchment announced Dec. 27. The closing and other cutbacks mean the loss of 1,150 jobs at the Duquense Works in the ailing Monongahela River Valley east of Pitt-

#### FBI helps with murder conviction

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) - Help from FBI experts and pressure from the U.S. Embassy appear to have been instrumental in convicting five former national

guardsmen of murdering four American churchwomen.

The convictions Thursday were among only a handful of guilty verdicts issued against members of El Salvador's

powerful military and security forces in recent decades. More than 43,900 civilians are among the 52,000 victims in the 4½-year-old war between leftist rebels and the U.S.-backed government. Human rights groups blame most of those deaths on security forces and rightist death squads said to be tied to the military.

With four of the defendants pleading innocent and the confession of the fifth not allowed as evidence, the nuns' murder case relied heavily on initial investigations by two U.S. Embassy officials and on the work FBI agents who quietly collected testimony and evidence.

#### Speculators put pressure on peso

MEXICO CITY (AP) - Financial analysts here say that speculators, prompted by rumors of a new devalua-tion, are putting heavy pressure on Mexico's battered peso. But the experts say they doubt the government will value the currency at this time.

"Another devaluation would make investors lose even more confidence in the peso," said Roberto Figueroa, an economist formerly with Banco de Mexico, the central

Figueroa, now a partner in a private firm, and other nalysts agreed that if the government does decide to evalue the peso, it will not be a sharp devaluation. Inead, they said, the government might try to ease ressure by increasing the sliding rate for the peso now in

The peso suffered three sharp devaluations three times tember 1963, the government established a ide rate for the pesos of 13 centavos daily. There are 100 tavos to a peso.

## Lucas says he can't forget

KAUFMAN, Texas (AP) -Henry Lee Lucas says he tries but can't forget that 14 years ago he repeatedly stabbed to death a 26-year-old elementary school teacher because he wanted "mostly sex."

On Thursday, Lucas pleaded guilty to the murder of Linda Jane Phillips, and State District Judge Glen Ashworth sentenced the drifter to life in prison under a plea bargain arranged by prosecutors and Lucas' court-appointed attorney.

"He told me, 'There are just some things so terrible that you can't forget them.' He apparently has a phenomenal memory," said Kaufman County District Attorney William Conradt.

Lucas told The Dallas Morning News he killed Ms. Phillips after "passing her car several times, along the highway (I-20)," then forcing her vehicle off a Kaufman county road he followed her

He said his motive was "sex - mostly sex." Lucas said he killed the woman because "I decided I couldn't leave her as a witness."

Lucas said he felt no remorse over the killing at the time and "didn't think any more about it until I got arrested (in June 1983) and started clearing up my cases."

Lucas has claimed to have killed more than 350 people in 17 states during the years he drifted from coast to coast.

In January, he led authorities to the site where Ms. Phillips' body was found in 1970. Conradt said Lucas signed a confession "including details that only a participant in the crime could know about."

Authorities discovered the body of Ms. Phillips Aug. 10,

Lucas has already been convicted of three other Texas murders and received sentences of death by injection, life in prison and 75 years in prison. He was convicted in Michigan in 1960 of killing his mother.

"We're all fairly confident that he did kill Linda Phillips," said Conradt. "I asked him, 'How in the world can you remember the details?' because you start to think maybe he's just confessing to any dead body that turns up."

Lucas, 47, was indicted in January for the murder. He was flown from his jail cell in Georgetown, in Central Texas, by helicopter to Kaufman, about 40 miles southeast of Dallas.

By an unofficial count, Lucas is charged with at least 17 other killings, most of them in Texas. The Texas Department of Public Safety is coordinating law enforcement handling of the drifter.

Ms. Phillips' father, Jimmy R. Phillips, said the past four months since Lucas' confession have been torturous for

"I don't suppose you ever get relief from something like this," Phillips said. "The hurt is in what happened."

The DPS task force initially believed Ms. Phillips was Lucas' first victim in Texas, Conradt said. But a Lubbock grand jury recently indicted him for a killing less than two weeks after his release from a Michigan prison on June 30,

Lucas was sentenced to death April 13 for the Halloween 1979 slaying of an unidentified female hitchhiker near Georgetown.

WASHINGTON (AP) -Final congressional action on emergency military aid for El Salvador is being put off until next month, giving the White House time to try to overcome House rejection of aid for Nicaraguan rebels.

#### Robert Walker new 'star'

Rep. Robert Walker, star of the Capitol Hill soap opera called C-SPAN, is not the stuff of which matinee idols are made.

But the lanky, baby-faced Republican, already a fixture in many of the 17 million homes wired for cable television, catapulted into an even broader spotlight with last week's House antics over camera angles.

"I was not at all embarrassed. I was awfully surprised," Walker said, recalling the moment he realized television cameras had shown viewers the deserted House chamber he had been addressing with such vigor.

"The real embarrassment is so many empty seats in the House. I'm there doing my job," added the unflappable Walker, whose district is based in Lancaster, Pa.

Many Democrats are not convinced that stinging partisan speeches to a television audience and a vacant chamber after the close of legislative business con-





HOUSTON (AP) - Ralph Sampson, the top pick in last year's National Basketball Association draft, had little competition for the Rookie of the Year award.

All 76 sports writers and broadcasters voting Thursday cast their ballots for the Houston Rockets' 7-foot-4 center, making Sampson the first unanimous winner since Kareem Abdul-Jabbar in

Sampson led his team in scoring, rebounding and blocked shots and averaged 21 points per game to lead all first-year players.

He will receive the Eddie Gottlieb Trophy, named after the coach of the NBA's first championship team and one of the league's founders.

"I really didn't know what to expect, so I guess I am pleased with what I've done," Sampson said in assessing his rookie year.

"Everybody was looking at me to come out and do it every day, but I never said that I'd be able to do it all the time or do it alone, and that's the way I approached the season," said the three-time collegiate Player of the Year from the University of Virginia. "All I can do is play like I can and listen to the coaches and adjust. I think I've done that."

Sampson ranked fifth in the NBA in rebounding with 11.1 per game and third in shotblocking with 2.4 per game in helping Houston improve from 14 victories in 1982 to 29 wins last season.

Said Rockets Coach Bill Fitch: "He's like the rich kid on the block who has been taught the fundamentals of the game very well.

"Now he has to learn to play the street game, the one they play in New York with chain baskets and cement. He missed all that. Ralph has a lot of maturing to do because he still makes a lot of errors, but he's going to be a great, great player.'

had to do something to relieve the pressure on our guards and the one thing we did was concentrate on pushing the ball upcourt before their defense could get set.

#### **Heart murmurs**

DEAR DR. LAMB - I'm 69 years old and I'm so worried about my heart. I went for a thorough physical and my doctor kept saying everything was fine.

I got an electrocardriogram yesterday. When he showed me the chart I sure got scared. He told me I had heart skips that were common for my age and gave me some medicine to fix the irregular beat. He said not to worry. I'm a very nervous person. Could this be the cause of the skips?

DEAR READER Rejoice that your doctor doesn't think you have any-

thing to worry about. It's true that extra beats, premature beats or heart skips are common. They increase in frequency with age. But they occur occasionally in almost everyone. I've seen many records of pilots and even astronauts who had skipped beats. The point is, they commonly occur even in people who have no heart disease at all.

Now, they can be important. It depends a lot on the other findings. Some types predispose a person to hav-ing serious heart irregularities. That's why doctors try to control them in patients in the hospital with a recent

heart attack. Yes, being nervous can increase the likelihood of having such irregular beats. Adrenaline, released under stress, seems to store in the heart and makes the heart more unstable in terms of regular rhythm.

I doubt you smoke, but smoking increases the tendency. So does caffeine, found in coffee, tea, colas and other sources. It's a good idea to eliminate these if you're aware of such beats. I've discussed the various

Food and Drug Administration approval is expected this summer and the drug should be on the market in the fall, Pak said.

About 96 percent of the patients showed a reduced rate of stones formed, said Pak, professor of internal medicine at the University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas.



Citrate, a substance normally found in urine, is an "inhibitor" of kidney stone formation, Pak said. Patients with hypocitraturia, lacking citrate, are prone to forming calcium stones. In those people, potassium citrate increases urinary citrate and thus reduces stone formation, he said.

The drug should be effective on half of the 330,000 Americans who require surgical treatment of their stone disease, Pak said.

About 660,000 suffer from some form of kidney stone

Pak said his research suggested, but has not proven, that the drug may reduce the size of existing kidney stones.

An inexpensive form of potassium citrate is being made in a slow-release pill under the name Urocit by Mission Pharmacal Co. in San Antonio, Pak said. Usage of the drug would cost about 50 cents per day, he said.




