A Deaf Smith County grand jury, meeting Wednesday in special session, "no-billed" Hereford farmer John Seiver after considering evidence resulting from an altercation with labor leader Jesus Moya.

The Deaf Smith County District Clerk's office said the jury met for about two hours Wednesday morning with special prosecutor Ebelardo Lopez, an assistant district attorney from the Potter County District Attorney's office.

Moya, who represents the International Union of Industrial and Agricultural Workers based in the Rio Grande Valley, had reported to sheriff's deputies that Seiver, an employee of Griffin and Brand packing shed, ran over him with a pickup truck. He said the fracus took place

with him for broadcasting his prolabor union messages to workers harvesting onions in a field just off West Highway 60 near Hereford.

The investigation of the complaint was handled by Herman Benavidez of the Deaf Smith County Sheriff's department. Sheriff Joe Brown said this morning that Seiver's version of the incident differed considerably from what Moya reported to the department.

A few days after the disagreement, in which Moya claimed to have suffered a broken finger and sprains to his shoulder and back, Moya filed civil suit against Seiver in 222nd on July 13 and that Seiver was angry District Court. Represented by at-

torneys from Texas Rural Legal Aid, Moya is asking for \$25,000 in actual and punitive damages as a result of his injuries.

Lopez was appointed special prosecutor over the Moya case by 222nd District Court Judge David Wesley Gulley at the request of Deaf Smith County Criminal District Attorney Roland Saul. Saul cited pending litigation involving himself and Moya when he asked to be taken off

While the no-bill decision means there will be no indictment against Seiver at this time, the jury could look at the case again should additional evidence be presented.

#### Rains deposit up to 2.5 inches

A band of showers swept across Deaf Smith County Wednesday afternoon, leaving up to 2.5 inches of moisture in some areas. Hereford recorded 1.1 inches of rain.

The narrow-about 20 miles wide-band of showers moved in from the Clovis area and continued on up through Dalhart. Easter had the heaviest rainfall report-about 2 inches in the Easter community and 2.5 inches reported six miles west of there.

The Simms community also had heavy rains, but it was spotted. Only three-tenths was reported at Northwest Grain, but 1.5 and 1.75 was reported west and southwest from there.

A report of .60 of an inch was recorded at Bootleg Corner, and reports of 1 inch or more came from around Walcott School. Milo Center had .90 according to one report from that area. At Dawn and east of Dawn, reports of .40 and .45 of an inch were recorded.

brought the 1984 precipitation total from 8.62 to 9.72 inches, Formby reported. The 1.1 inches represented the first measurable rainfall for Hereford since July 4, when only .03 inches were recorded.

The average amount of mositure annually received by Hereford for an entire year is 12.35 inches.

Regarding the possibility of implementing rationing last summer, Bayne this morning commented, "It never got that close. It'd look bad for a couple of days, then consumption would drop and things would look all right again."

#### Drug not helping rabies victim

HOUSTON (AP) - The pediatrician treating a comatose 12-yearold rabies victim refuses to deem the girl's case "hopeless" but concedes the child is "incurable."

"We all feel that we're dealing with an incurable situation," Dr. Dixie Swanson said Wednesday at a news conference about the Laotian immigrant. "But we all go home and hope in our private

Doctors at Texas Children's Hospital have refused to identify the girl further. The child was in "very critical condition," in a coma and on life support systems, doctors said.

An experimental anti-virus drug has had no apparent effects on their patient, Ms. Swanson said.

"So far we have seen no response," she said. "She is very far advanced in her disease."

Dr. Ralph Feigin, the hospital's physician-in-chief, said that the experimental drug ribavirin had been effective against rabies virus

### Houston to vote on gay rights

HOUSTON (AP) - Houston voters will decide next January on the fate of two gay rights measures that city council members have refused to rescind.

The council voted unanimously Wednesday to conduct the election, after denying efforts by an anti-gay group to remove the two laws, which guarantee employment rights for homosexuals.

The measures, passed June 19, ensure that the city will not discriminate against homosexuals in its Affirmative Action program and will not keep personnel records on municipal employees'

Council members were forced to call a vote on the issue after the Committee for Public Awareness, an anti-gay group, gathered 61,400 signatures in a petition drive to repeal the measures. The group needed 28,127 signatures to force the council's action.

Councilman John Goodner, chairman of the Committee for Public Awareness, said the issue should be "submitted to the people of Houston, not to the council. It is important for the council to uphold the people's right to be heard."

#### Crash kills Amarillo men

FORT LUPTON, Colo. (AP) - One of the engines on a twin-engine plane exploded on Wednesday, blowing off part of a wing, and sending the plane plummeting into a cornfield, killing the two Texas men on board, officials reported.

The Weld County Coroner identified the victims as the pilot, Beryle Brister, 56, and his son, Jerry Brister, 30, both of Amarillo, Texas, where the plane was registered.

A Weld County sheriff's dispatcher, who asked not to be identified, said the sheriff's office received the call on the crash about 4:40 p.m.

Arnold W. Scott, an investigator with the National Transportation Safety Board, said he would be investigating the crash of the Cessna

421 for the federal agency. A witness to the crash, Ean Arth, told officials that he heard an engine on the plane sputtering, and looked up and saw the engine explode, blowing off part of a wing.

#### World's Fair scam found

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - "Low-level" workers at the debt-ridden World's Fair may have stolen season passes worth up to \$150 apiece and sold them, say authorities who seized thousands of records in a sweep of the exposition's ticket sales office.

The seizure of documents Wednesday by a task force armed with search warrants came as a legislative council began its own probe of the fair, which is expected to be about \$60 million in debt when it closes Nov. 11.

The fair estimates it sold 160,000 season tickets at costs ranging from \$90 to \$150, but fair officials have been concerned that some of the money has not been reaching the exposition's coffers.

Season pass holders account for more than a fourth of the daily average attendance of 43,000.

Members of the staff of Orleans Parish District Attorney Harry Connick confirmed Wednesday that they were investigating allegations of theft and fraud in the distribution and sale of season passes.

"There are for sure some low-level employees involved. How high up it goes, we don't know," said Assistant District Attorney Eric

### Nancy Reagan prompts response

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP) - President Reagan, prompted by his wife, says he's doing everything he can to convince the Soviet Union to begin anti-space weapon talks, but a White House official maintains Moscow isn't seriously interested.

During a brief picture-taking session at the president's isolated mountaintop ranch, Reagan was asked Wednesday what he could do to lure the Soviets to the bargaining table to discuss anti-satellite

Standing outside his relatively modest, white adobe home, the president paused for a moment before answering. His wife, Nancy, standing at his side, gazed downward and mumbled softly, "Doing everything we can."

Reagan quickly replied, "We're doing everything we can." Meanwhile, back at the Santa Barbara hotel that lodges the press corps, National Security Adviser Robert C. McFarlane had told reporters that recent pessimistic statements emanating from the Soviet Union cast doubt on Moscow's intentions.

GUATEMALA CITY (AP) - Guatemala's military chief of state installed a new Constituent Assembly and promised a "free and pure" presidential election after the assembly writes a constitution.

Gen. Oscar Humberto Mejia Victores on Wednesday swore in the first assembly president, Roberto Carpio Nicolle of the Christian Democratic Party, who was elected after negotiations among the assembly's three major factions.

Mejia Victores said there will be no "official candidate" in the election and promised a "democratic government based on free and pure elections, the product of the people's search for peace and

### Mondale backers yell at anti-abortion group

Walter Mondale and Geraldine Ferraro exchanged shouts and insults with anti-abortion demonstrators when the Democratic presidential and vice presidential candidates stopped in Houston on the second leg of a two-day campaign tour in the Lone Star State.

About 500 people, many waving Texas and U.S. flags and hoisting placards that said, "Texas is Mondale-Ferror Country," waited for the candidates more than two hours Wednesday night at a private landing area at Hobby Airport.

About a fourth of the group represented pro-life groups. Many carried signs that read: "Shame On You, Geraldine!" "Ferraro & Fritz Kill Babies" and "This Catholic Mother Doesn't Believe In Abortion."

Ms. Ferraro, a Roman Catholic, has come under criticism repeatedly from anti-abortionists who disapprove of her pro-choice stance as a congresswoman from New York.

Mondale and Ms. Ferraro, who opened their first campaign swing through the South in Jackson, Miss., were scheduled answer questions from students at Houston Community College this morning before flying to San Antonio.

Mondale and Ms. Ferraro ignored the protesters, most of whom were at the back of the crowd.

Earlier in Austin, Mrs. Ferraro said she won't ask Texans for their votes, she will earn them.

"I can show that I should have the confidence of the voters of this state," Ms Ferraro told a news conference before attending a Capitol rally with Mondale.

"I've worked hard for what I've gotten. I'm not going to ask these Texas voters to give me their votes. I'm going to show them that I earn it, and come Nov. 6 they're going to give it to me," Ms. Ferraro said before attending a Capitol rally with Monday.

The two spoke to a late-afternoon rally on the Statehouse steps, a gathering that drew several thousand onlookers and which Mondale described as "one of the most encouraging" he ever attended in Austin.

Texas is considered crucial by Democratic strategists, as no Democrat ever has been elected president without carrying the state.

At the news conference, Mondale said he wanted Texans to get acquainted with Ms. Ferraro.

"I know Texas, and the people of Texas know me," Mondale said. "This state has been a source of enormous support for me, and now they will get to know Geraldine Ferraro, and I'm confident they will love her enormously.

Asked if he smelled victory in the South, the former vice president said, "I sure do.'

Congresswoman Ferraro has campaigned and won three times before. She has faced criticism before. Some of the criticism, relating to the fact that she, a Roman Catholic, approves abortion, became vitriolic, personal, even vicious.

But that was nothing compared to

For example: It is federal law - it is part of the federal government's "ethics law" - that members of Congress must reveal all financial data about themselves and their spouses. She never has.

During three terms in Congress she has filed five disclosure statements - and never did disclose anything about her husband.

Husband, John Zaccaro, inherited much money, is a successful developer of real estate in New York and derives considerable income from that; probably from other

One remembers that Idaho Congressman George Hansen was convicted by federal jury last April for failure to report his wife's assets; further was recommended by the House Ethics Committee for a formal reprimand.

Compounding the Ferraro "oversight" is the fact that she owns stock in her husband's company and is an officer of that corporation. She will not be able to claim "no knowledge" of her spouse's holdings.

And that's not all: Husband John Zaccaro owns 352 low-rent apartments in New York and is charged by the New York Housing Authority with 106 building violations in those apartments.

Why didn't she anticipate these embarrassments?

She did advise Mondale of her vulnerability on the Catholicabortion issue, but apparently did not apprise him in advance of her neglect of congressional ethics requirements.



### She'll earn those votes

AUSTIN (AP) - Democratic vice presidential candidate Geraldine Ferraro met chants of "Gerry! Gerry!" from an outdoor crowd of about 7,500 Wednesday with an equally enthusiastic "You're incredible, you're incredible!"

"Anybody who thinks Texas won't vote for a woman doesn't know anything about Texas," she shouted to spectators. "I've got a feeling I'm going to like it here, and I'm going to be back before the fight is over."

Many at Wednesday's rally on the Capitol lawn waited more than an hour in the hot sun to see Ms. Ferraro and presidential nominee Walter the state. Mondale even considered Mondale, who flew in from Jackson, two Texans - Sen. Lloyd Bentsen Miss., for a news conference and the

They spent the night in Houston, raro. and planned to campaign today in Houston and San Antonio.

State Treasurer Ann Richards, the only woman among Texas' statewide elected officials, introduced Ms. Ferraro by poking fun at cheerleaders who presented western-style hats to President Reagan and Vice President George Bush here on July 25.

"We don't have any cheerleaders - we've got a woman on the ticket," said Ms. Richards, adding that State Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower "told me Ronald Reagan thinks 'gender gap' is a town south of Lubbock."

In reference to Mondale's choice of the New York congresswoman as his running mate, Ms. Richards said, "The Democratic Party and Fritz Mondale opened the door to the future, and a woman walked through

Ms. Ferraro and Ms. Richards hugged and shook hands after the introduction, which touched off the waving of yellow ribbons by women in the crowd.

Ms. Ferraro described Texans as "confident, tough, can-do people who don't make excuses but get results." She added that "that's the kind of vice president I'm going to be."



"I'm so proud of the kids," she said. "If we had taken more, I think we would have qualified at least seven more. But of a lot of the kids had conflicts.

'That's something that's going to happen, and it's one of the great things about summer track-you can miss a meet and you're not kicked off

the team." In summer track programs, each person may participate in each track meet, regardless of his abilities, Duvall said. Some restrictions are placed on the number of events each person may enter, however, depending on the particular track meet,

Q. This is more curiosity than problem right now. I've noticed, occasionally, cars spewing clouds of smoke of various colors - white, gray, black, etc., and wonder what problems are connected with each. A. It's a good idea to check your exhaust smoke occasionally. It can warn you in advance of trouble. White smoke on a cool morning is perfectly normal. However, billowing clouds of white exhaust smoke when the temperature isn't cold is a sign of water in the engine, possibly due to a faulty head gasket, warped cylinder head or cracked block. Blueblack smoke could be a sign of worn piston rings allowing excess oil into the combustio chambers. Black or gray smoke after the car is warmed up is not as serious, but shouldn't be ignored, either. It usually indicates improper air-fuel mixture in the carburetor, and may call for anything from a simple adjustment to

# United States Olympians continue to pull in medals

LOS ANGELES (AP) Americans continued to pile up precious medals as authorities reassured Southern California of the eventual return of the familiar heavy traffic, smog and tourist dollars so strangely absent during the 1984 Summer Olympics.

The United States won gold medals in cycling and wrestling Wednesday. The women's gymnastics team won the silver in a strong showing, and the U.S. pentathlon team also earned a silver. Going into today's finals in swimming, shooting, weightlifting, fencing and men's gymnastics, the United States had 18 gold medals and 29 overall.

Jim Birakos, deputy director of the Air Quality Management District here, said the Los Angeles economy is paying for the unusually clear air and light traffic. He said many companies have cut back operations 50 percent to ease industrial and highway pollution during the fortnight of the Games.

However, Birakos said, planners are carefully watching the temporary trends for clues to whether people are willing to give up their cars to improve air quality. "We'd always assumed people were married to their cars," he said. "As we move toward tougher standards, we're going to have to look more and more at such options."

Traffic was still down slightly from normal levels Wednesday, but authorities said it was sure to increase Friday. "Black Friday," they're calling it, because it marks the beginning of the track and field events that will bring up to 90,000 fans to each of two daily sessions at the downtown Los Angeles Coliseum.

The Los Angeles visitors bureau said there were nearly 7,000 vacant hotel rooms in the city this week. Business was off as much at 25 per-

#### **Traces missing persons**

### Shulman inspires ABC

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Here's a case of life imitating art and art imitating life: an old radio show, "Mr. Keen, Tracer of Lost Persons," inspires Lloyd Shulman to become a missing persons investigator and he in turn inspires an upcoming ABC series, "Finder of Lost Loves."

Shulman, 55, has spent 24 years tracking lost persons - most specifically, lost loved ones. He reunites mothers and sons or brothers and sisters who haven't seen each other for decades. He estimates he's found more than 85,000 persons.

"I look for clients with an emotional need to get in touch with somebody," he said in a telephone interview. "A lot of people don't know where their mother or brother or daughter is. I solve so many of these problems and every time I do I get a tremendous personal feeling."

Shulman said he began by tracing missing persons for banks and insurance companies but found it too

Shulman was the inspiration for "Finder of Lost Loves," according to Sal Ianucci of Aaron Spelling Productions. But, he said, the detective played by Tony Franciosa is not directly based on Shulman.

He said loved ones usually become lost because of divorce and broken families or because someone leaves home after an argument.

Shulman said he traced people with the help of 10 staffers. He also has numerous contacts around the

A simple case that's quickly solved costs about \$500, he said. Tougher cases can run to \$2,000, but the average is less than \$1,000. Shulman said clients pay 10 percent of the estimated cost in advance and nothing more until the person is found.

"If I don't find him," he said, "they don't pay."

Shulman added: "If everyone knows where everyone they care about is, that's a good feeling.'



gaining wider recognition as an investigative tool - a way to bring witnesses' memories into sharper focus or recall fogotten numbers and facts.

Lt. Jim Casper of the criminal investigation division of the Smith County Sheriff's Department, returned recently from a school sponsored by Texas A&M on forensic and investigative hypnosis.

"I see hypnosis as playing an even greater part in the investigative process," Casper explains. "Hypnosis is only a a tool. It can't take the place of a good investigation."

Teachers at the 50-hour school included Travis D. McPherson, who is considered the "father of investigative hypnosis in Texas," Casper says.

Other instructors included Dr. Walter Stenning, chief psychologist for law enforcement at Texas A&M; detective Lt. Jerry Smith of the Odessa Police Department; and Bill McKoy, who holds degrees in criminal justice, human relations and curriculum development.

Texas law does not provide specific guidelines for hypnosis during trial and testimony, but officials expect a case of first impression to be set soon - possibly in this pending rape-murder

Some states forbid admitting any testimony stemming from hypnosis, while others have set guidelines on how it may be used in an investiga-"One of the biggest

arguments against hypnotism is that it doesn't allow says.

If a precedent is set soon, officials expect the guidelines in Texas to include videotaping and recording the hypnosis session, requiring the hypnotist not to have any prior knowledge of the case and assuring he does not lead

In other words, the investigator may ask for a description of the suspect, but he does not suggest a height or hair color, Casper explains.

The videotape could be played for jurors, who would actually see the witness living the moment again.

"They (defense attorneys) don't want the jury to hear the testimony of a rape vitim (under hypnosis) because she's going through it," Casper adds. "It becomes a reality."

Under hypnosis, the subject recalls the incident just as it happened and remembers it clearly after he or she becomes fully conscious.

Investigators also learned how to remove the fear or danger to a subject, and they can end the session if it's too painful.

"I can carry them back to that event, put them in a movie theater and let them stop and start a film, let them experience it as a third party seeing what's taking place without the eminent threat," Casper says. "Witnesses may have

repressed memories. They can give information that may be vital such as a license number. They can freeze that moment. They may have just glanced at something, but it's in the subconscience. Casper became interested

in hypnosis while he was an investigator with a Harris County police department. He saw a subject was hypnotized to remember a license plate number.

Since then, he has read books, taken courses, hypnotized subjects and then hypnotized himself.

Casper helped one Smith County detective find an expensive watch which was lost, and he helped another remember where he had seen a license plate.

### Bullock gives up Governor goal

that he sketched what he would - and would not do as governor.

He said he expected Gov. Mark White to run for reelection, but predicted he would win. Bullock said he was twice as good an administrator as White, or anyone else in statewide elected office.

A race against Bullock would tax nerves and. resources, and when one major White supporter was asked how White would run against the indomitable comptroller, he responded, "The governor would run scared."

On Monday, however, in a one-page statement, Bullock said he was quitting the governor's race because Texans just didn't want him. The dream had died, his lifetime quest for governor was over.

"I found that there just wasn't any demand for my services, frankly," Bullock, 55, told a reporter.

He also spoke about the cost of a campaign, as high as \$10 million, and said it also would be expensive just to hold office.

It seemed a quiet way to bow out for a man who 10 years ago used a credit card and long solo miles on the road to win his first race for comptroller, and has since exerted more power in that office than anyone else.

In an interview in his office last month, Bullock was reminded of his vow in January 1983 to make White a one-term governor, and he was asked if he was still "dead certain" that he would run in 1986.

"I don't know - I wouldn't necessarily, that's what I want to do," Bullock said.

Although it has been seven years since Kathryn Chapman and her husband, Jack, returned to the United States from a two year mission term with the Mennonite Brethren Church, the memories of a difficult but very fulfilling experience are still vivid.

"It was the most blessed time of our lives, but also the hardest because of all the changes. We were constantly changing from modern city to a very primitive lifestyle," remembered Kathryn.

The couple spent the major portion of their mission term in Panama at the request of the Choco Indians, whom Jack assisted as agricultural advisor. They had an apartment in Panama City and traveled into the jungle by small airplane for two weeks at a time, carrying their beds, mosquito netting, clothing and food for the entire two weeks. The Chapmans often traveled in dugout canoes to reach isolated areas.

As they were only able to take 25 pounds each, which included the beds and all other items, normally simple tasks such as meal planning became challenges for Kathryn. Since there was no refrigeration, only foods that would not spoil could be taken. Food preparation techniques were also quite different under these conditions.

Following their service in Panama, the Chapmans took over the operation of a rescue mission in Flagstff, Ariz., for a brief period before coming to Hereford.

Jack is presently an agronomist with Center Plains of Amarillo. He was a field man for a fertilizer company in Yuma, Ariz., where they had resided for 18 years prior to their mission service, and before that he was a county agent in Illinois, where both he and his wife are from originally.


