Religious right knocked by Mondale

Walter F. Mondale says a Republican victory on Tuesday could bring on an "orgy of intolerance" by the religious right, while President Reagan is warning his supporters against overconfidence even as his staff keeps talking about a 50-state

From the president's entourage to Republican campaign officials on Capitol Hill, the talk was of how big a victory Reagan would score on Tuesday and whether it would bolster GOP ranks in Congress.

"Things are breaking wide open for us," said Ed Goeas, campaign director for the House Republican campaign committee. He said the undecided vote is coming in solidly Republican.

Sen. Richard Lugar of Indiana, chairman of the GOP Senate campaign committee, said he would ask the president to add a Nebaraska stop to his closing campaign swing to help Republican Nancy Hoch in her effort to upset Democratic Sen. James Exon.

Mondale drew the largest crowd of his campaign on Thursday, a throng

the Democrats for failing to condemn' anti-Semitism in their party

The Democratic challenger called the president's criticism made in a speech in New York last week "false and contemptible" and added: "The president has accused me of being soft on anti-Semitism. I resent it. It is despicable. I think it is inexcusable."

From the Garment District, Mondale went to a synagogue in Brooklyn where he warned of the influence of the Rev. Jerry Falwell and other conservative fundamentalist

'Some of his (Reagan's) friends threaten an orgy of intolerance in our land and I don't want them to have any influence," Mondale said.

Mondale was campaigning today in Ohio, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania and Michigan. Reagan's schedule included stops in Michigan, Ohio, Illinois and Arkansas.

At every stop on Thursday, the president sounded the same theme: beware of confidence.

In Rochester, N.Y., Reagan said polls showing him way ahead of Mondale "are scaring me to death because I have a feeling that maybe some people are looking at them and saying, maybe we don't have to'

In Washington, a nonpartisan group predicted Thursday a record turnout on Tuesday in excess of 95 million people or about 55 percent of adult Americans.

Four years ago, the total vote was 87 million for a turnout rate of 52.6

Curtis Gans, director of the Committee for the Study of the American Electorate, said, "A large number of people have strong feelings, either pro or con about the Reagan administration, but a perceived (Reagan) landslide could depress turnout.'

Vacancy procedure on ballots Third article of series on amendments

Editor's Note: Following is the third of four articles describing the eight amendments to face Texas voters Tuesday. Information for the series voters. has been chiefly obtained from "Analyses of Proposed Constitutional Amendments," a booklet compiled by the Texas Legislative Coun-

How a vacancy of the state's lieutenant governor position should be filled is the topic of Amendment 5, one of eight proposed state constitutional changes to be considered Tuesday by

Amendment 6, meanwhile, cerns insurance purchases by

political subdivisions. All eight amendments, plus the 11 placed before Texas voters last fall. were proposed during the 1983 regular and first sessions of the 68th Texas Legislature. People passed each proposition in 1983 except one which would have made certain veterans' and fraternal organiza-

tions tax exempt.

vacancy occur in the lieutenant governor's office, the senate president pro tempore fills the position. Should a new president pro tempore be chosen, the replacement would also assume the lieutenant governor duties until he is superseded or a general election is held.

Amendment No. 5 calls for senate members to appoint one of their ranks as acting lieutenant governor until the next general election. The selection would be independent of the president pro tempore, who would still be chosen when the legislative branch is convened or adjourned.

One argument favoring No. 5, according to the Texas Legislative Council, is the person appointed president pro tempore is not necessarily qualified to fill in as lieutenant governor. Also, "The permanent selection of an interim lieutenant governor will provide for continuity in that office in the event of a vacancy.

One further "pro" point offered by the council is an appointed replace-* right on time for a lunch reservation ment would not feel the pressure at the local fast-food eatery. from fellow senators to maintain the position. "A state senator should be free to act in his role as senator in the interests of his constituency without other undue political constraints."

"Con" comments by the council include, "There is no reason to assume that a state senator selected as president would not be competent to serve as lièutenant governor." The senate should not be denied its right to change its mind about the selection, the council also lists as an argument.

"Convening the senate when a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor occurs would be expensive," the council offered. "This cost is not incurred under present law."

Public funds could be used to pay premiums on nonassessable life, health or accident insurance policies and annuity contracts if Amendment No. 6 passes Tuesday. The contracts, however, must be issued by a mutual insurance company authorized to do business in the state.

"Since the amendment continues the prohibition on the purchase of mutal insurance with a liability," the council wrote in support of No. 6, "the original constitutional policy continues to be served. "The amendment simply widens

the marketplace in which political subdivisions can shop for insurance, with the resulting benefits that competition brings both for the political subdivision and the mutual insurers.

"The amendment may be of significant benefit and poses no

Pesticides hearing completed

AUSTIN (AP) - A consistent criticism of the way new state pesticide rules were drawn up pervaded two days of public hearings by the House Agriculture Committee.

The hearings were completed Thursday after more than 50 witnesses either for or against the Texas Department of Agriculture's proposed pesticide controls.

There was criticism from legislators and members of affected industry alike that they had not been given a say in preparing the new

Commttee Chairman Rep. Robert Saunders, D-LaGrange, said he felt the extended hearing had convinced TDA officials that some modifications were needed in the rules before they become effective. "I think we have shown some changes should be made," said

Saunders, "We have given everyone a chance to have their say." "We are still willing to make changes," Deputy Agriculture Commissioner Ron White said during the hearings.

Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower did not attend the sessions in the House chamber.

Inmate found dead in cell

DENTON, Texas (AP) - A 23-year-old jail inmate being held in the slaying of a North Richland Hills teen-ager killed himself in his cell by fashioning a noose out of his socks, a preliminary investigation by the Denton County district attorney's office shows.

The death Thursday of Mark Robert Matthys, who faced capital murder charges, came only one day after he was shot in the neck by authorities in an escape attempt, a sheriff's official said.

"After interviewing all witnesses, indications are that he died as a result of suicide," said Marty Travelstead, sheriff's communication

A final ruling will be made based on findings of the Dallas County medical examiner's office, he said.

Travelstead said Matthys, who had no cellmates, was discovered dead by jailers at 5 p.m., only an hour and a half after his parents had visited him.

"He was hung with his socks. They were tied together," Denton County Sheriff Kenneth George said. "He was checked at 4:15 p.m., and we believe he took himself between 4:15 and 5 p.m."

Multiple slaying trial starting

DALLAS (AP) - A jury has been empaneled, setting the stage for today's first day of testimony in the murder trial of an unemployed waiter accused of gunning down six people last June in a north Dallas restaurant-club.

Abdelkrim Belachheb, 39, is charged with six counts of murder and one of attempted murder in a June 29 shooting spree at Ianni's.

The last of the jurors were selected Thursday. Testimony was scheduled to begin at 9:30 a.m. today before State District Judge Gerry Meier.

The trial should last about two weeks, the judge said. "I tried a capital murder case that only lasted six days, so this may go quickly," she added. Belachheb's attorney, Frank Jackson, asked prospective jurors if

they had a bias against a planned insanity defense of his conclusions on the case based on hearsay or news coverage.

Eleven of the 12 jurors told lawyers they had heard on read something about the shootings, but remembered few details. They said any opinions they had would not affect their ability to be "fair and impartial jurors."

Soviet allegations cause anger

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Reagan administration has denounced as "absurd and irresponsible" Soviet allegations linking the Central Intelligence Agency to the assassination of Indian Prime Minister Indira Gandhi.

Official protests have been delivered to the Soviets in both Moscow

and Washington. A senior State Department official said the administration is particularly upset about the allegations, not only because they are false, but also because they are dangerous.

"It feeds into a situation where there is a potential for violence and threatens to endanger American lives," said the official, who spoke on the condition he would not be identified.

But the Soviet attempt to link Washington to the assassination apparently isn't derailing administration efforts to improve relations

The State Department is trying to arrange a meeting between Secretary of State George P. Shultz and the No.2 Soviet leader, Nikolai A. Tikhonov, while both are in New Delhi for the funeral of Mrs. Gandhi.

FBI dismantles coup plot

MIAMI (AP) - President Roberto Suazo of Honduras was reported to be under guard by 800 soldiers today after the FBI cracked a U.S.-based exile group and foiled what authorities said was a

cocaine-financed plot to kill Suazo and overthrow his government. Eight men were arrested here on Thursday and a warrant was issued for a ninth, Gen. Jose Bueso-Rosa, the Honduran military attache in Chile.

An FBI agent who infiltrated the plot was to be paid \$300,000 to put together a team that would go to Honduras and kill Suazo, said Joseph V. Corless, head of the Miami FBI office.

The exiles, who called themselves "staunch anti-communists," were going to finance the operation through the sale of more than \$10 million in cocaine seized by authorities on Sunday, the FBI said. The group included a businessman who lost more than \$7 million when his business was nationalized by the Honduran government, authorities said.

Walesa criticizes strike call

WARSAW, Poland (AP) - Lech Walesa says he disagrees with a call by other Solidarity activists from his hometown for a one-hour strike Saturday to protest the murder of pro-Solidarity priest Jerzy

The strike call, which urged workers to end their "passivity," was the first such appeal by prominent union activists since Nov. 10, 1982, when Solidarity's underground leadership unsuccessfully sought a nationwide strike to protest the banning of the independent trade

"I think the climate is unfavorable for such actions," said Walesa, contacted by telephone in the Baltic port of Gdansk. "It is not my

point of view. Walesa, who helped found Solidarity in 1980, said he was not consulted about Thursday's call for a one-hour strike and added that he "stands by" his earlier appeal for calm and restraint in the wake of Popieluszko's kidnap and murder.

Death toll put at 200 in aftermath of Ganhdi

NEW DELHI, India (AP) - Mob violence triggered by Indira Gandhi's assassination continued across northern India today despite curfews and orders for security forces to shoot rioters on sight. More than 230 people reportedly have been killed.

Much of the violence - including lynchings, beatings and arson - has been directed at Sikhs by Hindus seeking to avenge the prime minister, whose assassins have been identified as two Sikh members of her security guard.

One of the guards was killed immediately after Wednesday's attack on Mrs. Gandhi. The wounded survivor was under heavy guard at a New Delhi hospital today and reported in "nearly critical" condition.

Dr. J.P. Singh, the hospital's surgical superintendent, said constable Satwant Singh had undergone surgery to remove bullets and was not yet in condition to be interrogated by police.

"We are fully conscious of the importance of this man for the nation. Doctors are straining every nerve to keep him alive," the surgeon said.

Mobs set fires in several New Delhi suburbs today after crowds of Hindus had roamed the streets in some areas through the night, ignoring a

24-hour curfew. Curfews were imposed today in Kashmir and Bihar states, in addition to the more than 30 cities already under curfew. The United News of India said a hand grenade thrown into a building in Kashmir killed 16 people.

In New Delhi - where some Sikhs were reported burned to death - and five other cities, police were told to shoot rioters on sight. Hindu mobs also were reported to have lynched and beaten Sikhs, and burned their shops, cars and homes. Some Sikhs huddled together for protection.

The assassination was claimed by anonymous Sikh extremists as revenge for the Indian army attack on the Sikhs' Golden Temple in Amritsar last June to flush out Sikh separatists.

The Sikhs number 13 million, a small minority in a country of 730 million, but they hold many prominent posts in the army and government. President Zail Singh is a Sikh.

Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi, the 40-year-old former airline pilot who succeeded his mother, met with opposition leaders and they issued a joint statement that said: "This madness must stop."

Connally predicts Gramm to triumph

Former Texas Gov. John Connally says Republican Senate candidate Phil Gramm will win Tuesday's election by 250,000 votes, but opponent Lloyd Doggett remains undaunted.

"I think Phil Gramm has it won," Connally said Thursday at a fundraising luncheon in El Paso where he appeared with the Republican. "I think he's going to be the next United States senator from Texas."

ed from the Democratic Party to the Gramm, front-runner in pre-GOP, criticized Democratic Gov. Mark White, who has been predicting a Doggett victory.

"Now I'm just an ex-governor, and I don't have anything like the influence he has," Connally said. "But I'm going to make a prediction to counter his."

"I don't think Doggett is going to win," he said. "I think Doggett's go-

ing to lose. ... I'm going to make a prediction that Phil Gramm's going to win by a margin of 250,000 votes, a quarter of a million votes.'

Connally told about 300 people at the fund-raiser to contact friends and relatives and urge them to vote for Gramm "Voting Republican is not all that

cataclysmic," he said, "I came out (after voting Republican the first time) and that sun was shining and I felt a sense of great relief. It's as if Connally, who like Gramm switch- I'd been purged of all my sins."

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

"We're really not keeping statistics on this. We're doing it for the good of the people and we don't care about numbers," Kraemer said.

Speltz acknowledged that some priests do not agree with the policy and that its application will be uneven, "but we hope it might gradually reverse a trend.'

New acne medication, powerful cause of birth defects, implicates vitamin A

from Vitamin A, is a powerful cause posed to megadoses of Vitamin A of birth defects, suggesting that before birth are being born with a massive doses of Vitamin A itself spectrum of severe malformations may cause fetal malformations, a resembling those caused by Acnew study concludes.

"Compared to other teratogens (substances that cause birth defects), that's high - very high," said Lammer, of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control.

Accutane, introduced in September 1982, is the brand name for an acid form of Vitamin A called isotretinoin. It is supposed to be used only for severe cystic acne cases, but it is so effective that Lammer said doctors may be overprescribing it and patients may be demanding prescriptions.

defects in animals before it was approved for human use and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration designated it as a teratogen, Lammer said.

Since the medication was introduced, some 150 pregnant women have used it, despite warnings from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration against its use during pregnancy, said Lammer.

More than half of those women elected to have abortions, Lammer said, but of the remainder, at least 25 gave birth to infants with severe birth defects consisting of facial malformations, misshaper skulls, heart defects and immune system irregularities.

"It's tragic - these are preventable birth defects," Lammer said. Lammer, who has collected data

on the cases with the help of Accutane's manufacturer, Hoffmann-La Roche of Nutley, N.J., said doctors "have a responsibility to inform their female patients about the risks of teratogenicity and to perform a pregnancy test" before prescribing the medicine.



"Being in the Cotton Bowl would be nice, but after four years of pure hell, it'll be a thrill to be in any bowl besides the toilet bowl," said TCU safety Byron Linwood.

It was Linwood's halftime speech that was credited with TCU rallying for a 38-28 victory over Baylor last week

TCU is a field goal choice over Houston, which was knocked out of first place in the SWC race by Arkansas last week.

In other games, the No. 2 ranked Texas Longhorns are 14-point picks over Texas Tech in Lubbock; Southern Methodist is a 13-point favorite over Texas A&M at Texas Stadium; Arkansas is a 30-point selection over Rice; and Baylor is a

touchdown choice over New Mexico in Waco, the final non-conference matchup of the year.

"We have found we can play with anyone," said TCU running back Kenneth Davis. "There is no goal that's out of our reach right now, except being 11-0."

TCU's only loss was to SMU earlier in the season.

Horned Frog Coach Jim Wacker is wary of the Cougars.

"There stands Houston a super football team and one that's probably madder than a hornet after their game in Arkansas last week," said Wacker. "When Gerald Landry gets that Houston Veer to humming, it's a sight to behold. He is a magician."

The Monterey Plainsmen are scheduled to arrive in Hereford today to battle the Hereford Whitefaces in a District 3-5A football clash at Whiteface Stadium.

The game takes on different significance for both teams. Monterey, 3-5 overall and 3-3 in district play, look at the game as a stepping stone to reaching the .500 mark in 1984. If the Plainsmen can win the remainder of their games, they'll finish at 5-5.

The Herd (5-3, 4-2), on the other hand, enter the game riding a four-game winning streak, including a 17-16 win over previously unbeaten Plainview last week. Hereford football coach Jerry Taylor said the Whitefaces must win to stay alive in the playoff picture.

The Whitefaces must concern themselves with the running of Monterey tailback James Goolsby. Last week, Goolsby gained 115 yards in a 10-0 Plainsmen victory over intracity rival Coronado. For the season, the sophomore has rushed 177 times for 741 yards.

The Plainsmen run from a double tight-end offensive front much of the time, Monterey football coach James Odom said. The offensive line for the Plainsmen was a pre-season plus for Monterey.





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

OAXACA, Mexico (AP) -Up in the mountains where the clouds touch the treetops. peasant farmers grow marijuana - forced to do so by traffickers who threaten to kill them if they refuse, Roman Catholic bishops in

the area charge. "Those who inform are killed; those who stop are killed," says a report issued by the Roman Catholic Bishops Conference for the Southern Pacific Area of

Mexico. "With the power of money, with the power of arms, El Patron and the mafia represent nearly total control of the life of the people. They

manipulate the authorities of these communities." El Patron is the term for those heading the drug trafficking organization, referred

to in this area as "the mafia." Although marijuana has been grown for generations here, the church report indicates new concern about the role of organized crime

and its coercion. The report said "a perfectly organized network" controls marijuana growing on thousands of acres in Oaxaca and neighboring Chiapas state to the south and that "aided by authorities in isolated rural communities, foreigners persuade campesinos to plant mari-

juana." Mexican drug agents estimate at least 700 tons of the marijuana are harvested each year, with Oaxaca the No. 1 growing area in Mexico. They say the majority of the marijuana finds its way to the
