Swift workers set for union vote Friday

After weeks of hard-fought campaigning, employees at Hereford's Swift Independent Packing Co. plant go to the polls Friday to determine whether or not they want labor union

representation. The United Food & Commercial Workers Union, Local 540, has been campaigning here for months through union organizers from Dallas and a hard-working in-plant committee. UFCW lost an election

here last year by a narrow margin. SIPCO has responded with talks by plant manager Bud Nary and daily information postings which tell the company's side of the story. The Hereford business community has

also taken an interest in the election, with a newspaper ad Wednesday urging defeat of the proposal.

Mike Carr, executive director of Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce, said he didn't think there was much doubt on how most of the community feels about the election. "This union has hurt our community very badly. It shut down the plant when it was owned by Armour without allowing an employee vote.

Four hundred employees lost their jobs and many lost their homes and left the area."

Carr said the business community doesn't "want that kind of hardship again." He added that he had spoken out last year that the union didn't deserve another chance, "and I think those reasons are as valid today."

SIPCO officials here have focused heavily on what they term the union's failures at the bargaining table the past few years, including an example of the SIPCO plant in Dumas where employees took a 68-cent per hour cut in wages last April. "Why should employees vote for a union that has the record of UFCW?" asks Nary.

While admitting the union has a "hard core" of support at the plant, a one of the items," said Nary.

company worker Wednesday said he felt employees would turn down the union proposal by a 2 to 1 margin.

"Fighting union organizing is like trying to catch a phantom," said Nary. "The organiziers promise everything under the sun to win votes. If you tell employees that it's just a so much talk, some will not

believe it." Nary claims the company developed a way to prove that the union promises were just "hot air" that could not be backed up. They asked the union to back up the verbal promises with guarantees in writing, listing 12 benefits claimed by the union. "The UFCW has not signed our certificate or guaranteed even

Houston attorney Charles R. Houssiere filed the suit, which could total \$100 million, in Galveston federal court Wednesday on behalf of five individuals and two companies that own oil-blackened property along Galveston's west end.

The limitation action seeks a ceiling on any liability to the value of the vessel and its pending freight, estimated at \$3.8 million, V.D. Vickery, a Houston attorney retained by the shipping company, said Wednesday.

Vickery said he was unaware of the suit at midday and refused comment. He could not be reached at his office later Wednesday.

The suit alleges that beachfront owners' properties were damaged because of gross negligence on the part of Lloyds Leasing, Alvenus Shipping and Conoco.

"We think it is interesting to note that the defendants had offers from various individuals and companies to help in the cleanup and that was refused," Houssiere said.

Houssiere said the suit seeks \$10 million in actual damages, \$10 million in punitive damages and plaintiffs reserve the right to increase the amount to \$100 million depending on "what the experts

Houssiere said he expects his clients to win "at least \$20 million" in

"If damages pass \$20 million, then we don't want to be caught unprepared," he said. "There's no telling how much damage is involved. It's amazing."

The cleanup, estimated to cost in the millions, has been continuing since the first tarballs and oil slicks began washing ashore in the Galveston area on Friday. Officials have said it could take up to four weeks to clear the mess.

Coast Guard spokesman Gary Stark said the tons of tainted sand were being hauled to a land area along the Galveston seawall before being removed by a contractor.

Parents of kindergarten and first grade students entering school for the first time should provide a birth certificate when registering. All students entering HISD for the first time should bring immunization and any other records available from a previous school.

Police look into 262 crimes

Two hundred sixty-two criminal offenses were committed within city limits last month, according to the Hereford Police Department's July report.

The most frequent crime was theft, of which there were 38. Other incidents investigated included 19 aggravated assaults and disorderly conducts, 17 harassments, 12 burglaries and 10 cases of criminal trespassing. A total of 186 offenses were cleared, though several of those were from previous months.

The 87 adult arrests were paced by 29 for driving while intoxicated and 28 for public intoxication. There were also 11 traffic-related arrests and six for criminal trespassing. Of the 12 juveniles picked up, five were charged with burglary, three theft and two possession of

Forty motor vehicle accidents occurred within city limits last month, 34 on public roadways and the rest on private property. Three resulted in injuries, none of them fatal.

Moving violations in July totaled 460, with there also being one citation issued apiece for parking violation and dog allowed to run loose. In court, 414 people pled guilty to those charges, 42 cases were

dismissed and six were nolo contendere. Police patrol cars accumulated a total of 22,338 miles last month,

Four charged with smuggling

EL PASO, Texas (AP) - Bond has been set at \$50,000 apiece for three Mexican nationals and one U.S. citizen charged with conspiring to transport illegal aliens in what a U.S. Border Patrol official says was a "large scale smuggling ring."

The four men arrested near Ysleta in El Paso's lower valley were arraigned Wednesday before U.S. Magistrate Janet Ruesch.

Border Patrol agents, operating on a tip from a source they declined to name, nabbed the four about 3 a.m. Tuesday after they and 66 illegal aliens crossed the border and were trying to leave in three vehicles, said Bill Harrington, assistant chief patrol agent for El

He said those charged allegedly were "arrangers" of a "large scale smuggling ring that has been operating for a long time with the same people.'

Harrington said the aliens told agents they had paid 10,000 pesos -about \$50 - to be brought across the border and to harvest fields in

'They also said they had to pay \$500 more once they arrived" in North Carolina, Harrington said.

Power agreement made

HOUSTON (AP) - Houston Lighting & Power reached a \$1.3 billion agreement to buy excess power from Diamond Shamrock in a move that HL&P claims will stabilize consumers' fuel costs, company officials said.

The 10-year co-generation pact will provide the first guarantee on the amount of power the HL&P will receive, HL&P chairman Don Jordan said in a news conference Wednesday.

Under the agreement, effective immediately, the utility will buy 225 megawatts of electricity generated at a Diamond Shamrock chemcial plant in Deer Park, a Houston suburb, Jordon said.

Jordan said the pact will save HL&P money by allowing the utility to buy power at prices far cheaper than building and fueling a new

The cost will be even lower because the charge is based on the cost of generating electricity at lignite-burning plants, a cheaper and more stable rate than that based on natural gas, Jordan said.

Doggett selects new manager

AUSTIN (AP) - John Scanlan, a long-time friend of Democratic U.S. Senate candidate Lloyd Doggett, will manage Doggett's campaign this fall while former manager James Carville will continue to map political strategy.

Doggett announced the change Tuesday, and aides said it isn't a demotion for Carville, who becomes campaign chairman.

Scanlan, 44, an Austin lawyer, will be in charge of day-to-day operations, said Doggett aide Paul Begala.

What we have here is not just a political campaign, it's grown to be a large organization. It's quite an enterprise," Begala said. Carville, 39, managed Doggett's primary victory over U.S. Rep.

Kent Hance and former Congressman Bob Krueger. A former aide to the mayor of Baton Rouge, La., Carville served as Sen. Gary Hart's southern coordinator and was campaign manager for Democrat Dick Davis' U.S. Senate bid in Virginia.

Scanlan, a former Harvard Law School professor, is partner in an Austin law firm. He was appointed to the Lower Colorado River Authority by both Republican Gov. Bill Clements and Democratic

Mondale makes comparison

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) - Walter F. Mondale says the Reagan administration's upcoming estimates of federal budget deficits will be like the story of Pinocchio, bringing with them "the longest nose you ever saw in your life."

Mondale invoked the classic story of the little boy whose nose grew longer when he told a lie as the Democratic presidential nominee spoke at a reception for hundreds of South Carolina Democrats on the lawn of the state governor's mansion Wednesday evening.

After attacking Reagan relentlessly for huge budget deficits and for failing to present a plan to reduce them - Mondale warned of what might be in an administration report revising deficit projections, which is expected out this week or next.

"You know the story of Pinocchio, how that nose kept getting bigger? When that report comes out, I think you're going to see the longest nose you ever saw in your life," Mondale said, drawing laughter from the crowd.

"And I'll tell you, the American people know better. I'm telling it straight. I'm telling the truth, and that's what the American people expect of leadership."

Riot hit Massachusetts town

LAWRENCE, Mass. (AP) - Nearly 40 state troopers in riot gear helped city police quell a late night street disturbance in this northern Massachusetts town that left nine people injured, six shot with buckshot, authorities said.

The cause of the disturbance could not be learned immediately, but Police Officer Willie Arleque said it was under control at about 2:30 a.m.

He said state troopers and officers from other communities were called in to help quell the disturbance in the northwest part of the city, located 30 miles northwest of Boston.

A nursing supervisor at Lawrence General Hospital who would not give her name said six people were brought there with wounds from "small buckshot." She said one person was treated for a broken shoulder, one man was treated for abrasions and a woman was treated for cuts.

Britain to help clear mines

Britain has agreed to join the United States in clearing mines from heavily traveled Red Sea shipping lanes where explosions have damaged at least 13 ships in the past few weeks.

The United States, responding to an Egyptian request, is dispatching special helicopters to the Red Sea to drag the waterway with devices designed to detect and destroy mines. The helicopters are expected to arrive by early next week, along with a U.S. support ship.

Britain, also asked by Egypt for assistance, said Wednesday night it would help clear mines from the Gulf of Suez, at the Red Sea's northern end. It said minesweepers and a support ship now in the Mediterranean would arrive in seven days, but gave no other details.

Governments in the West and in the Red Sea region have not said who they think is responsible for the explosions, although anonymous callers last week told news agencies in London that the extremist Islamic Jihad (Islamic Holy War) group placed at least 190 mines in Red Sea waters.

Iran on Tuesday credited Islamic Jihad with the minings as a

strike against "arrogant" Western nations.

"The White House has some reason to believe they can hold some funding level on El Salvador through the conference," a Senate Republican source, declining to be quoted by name, told reporters.

A State Department official, also insisting on anonymity, said, "The administration remains hopeful of getting funding in this fiscal year."

In a foretaste of battles still to come, the House Appropriations subcommittee on foreign operations approved \$123 million in Salvadoran military aid for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1, rejecting by a 6-5 vote a move to slash the funds by one third. William L. Schneider, undersecretary of state for security assistance, indicated the administration would continue to press for its

original request of \$132 million. The Senate passed its version of the supplemental spending bill for this fiscal year, totaling \$6.9 billion, by a vote of 62-32 after defeating Sen. Daniel K. Inouye's amendment to delete the funds for El Salvador. The Hawaii Democrat argued that the

administration had not exhausted the \$126 million Congress had already appropriated for the purpose in this fiscal year.

Sen. Robert Kasten, R-Wis., responded that the additional money was needed to buy 230 trucks, eight helicopters and other equipment the Salvadorans need in order to track Marxist-led guerrillas to their hideouts. Kasten is the chairman and Inouye the senior Democrat on the appropriations subcommittee that screens foreign aid requests.

Senate rejected a move by Sen. Christopher Dodd, D-Conn., to freeze foreign aid spending in the rest of the fiscal year to current levels, slashing Salvadoran military assistance to \$25.5 million. "What in the world are they going

Federal agents arrest record number aliens

DALLAS (AP) - In a two-day dragnet-style operation, federal officials surprised and arrested 760 suspected illegal aliens at several Dallas-Fort Worth businesses.

Traveling in caravans and accompanied by buses and a helicopter, agents from the Immigration and Naturalization Service and U.S. Border Patrol surrounded construction and manufacturing sites during roundups Tuesday and Wednesday.

Local INS officers joined 14 Border Patrol agents in the raids, yielding "a combined two-day record for us this year," said William Noland, deputy district director of the INS Dallas-Fort Worth regional office.

Two of the largest raids took place at a mobile home manufacturing plant near Saginaw, north of Fort Worth, and an aluminum products company in Irving, officials said.

At Melody Homes, the agents swooped in about noon Wednesday. With the help of a helicopter used to spot anyone running from the plant; officers searched a number of buildings and the surrounding area for more than an hour.

A total of 110 workers who could not show proof of citizenship were herded onto the buses and a van and taken to a detention center in the area, said John Page, field supervisor.

Bill Norris, president of Melody Homes told The Dallas Morning News the company does not require proof of citizenship and requests only a Social Security card.

'We don't seek them (illegal aliens) out," he said.

Norris said he considered it unfair to selectively require certain

vacation for students and teachers since it is Memorial Day.

Page said INS officials would check the records of those workers who claim citizenship. He said it is a misdemeanor for naturalized citizens not to carry proof of citizenship. Those found to be without proper documents would be deported, Page said.

Noland said the week's raids were among several major roundups conducted this year. He said it wasn't unusual to bring in support help during such operations.

business and industry; let me recite

my experience with and observations about them. In my office the other day was a meeting of executives from General Mills and their advertising agency. Women executives outnumbered

men executives, 4 to 1. It might sound gratuitous for me to label these women executives as 'altogether as efficient as men executives." The truth is, they're better than that. The product which they are responsible for making and marketing is outselling all others!

The Center for Research on Women at Wellesley College in Massachusetts has surprised itself with the discovery that women managers generally have an easier time in blue-collar settings.

In factories and mines where supervisors are judged by how well they know machinery and technology, "those who show they are competent will be respected and may be more accepted than whitecollar women managers who are judged on a lot of intangibles."

Here is a dichotomy. Kane Parker and Associates polled women nationwide and found that 39 percent perferred a male boss, 16

percent favored a woman boss and 43 percent said it made no difference. The chief reason given for preferr-

ing a male boss was that women are 'petty, envious, power-mad and too aggressive." Separately Kane, Parker interviewed women who presently have

women bosses; they regarded their

superiors far more favorably than

did men with male bosses. When the EEOC declared quotas of women workers in upper management positions, few were properly prepared.

In the years since it is my observation that women have "worked harder" at succeeding. And while they are still short-

changed, the average woman worker receiving only 60 percent of what a man gets for the same job, her greater challenge now, in politics and in industry, is to prove herself and to sell herself to other women.

DEAR EMBARRASSED: I can't imagine what kind of medical magazine would publish such erroneous information. First, it would be impossible for a gynecologist to examine you without using a speculum. Second, virginity is a matter of sexual conduct, not clinical status. If you have not engaged in sexual intercourse, you are a virgin.

Your anger at having restrained yourself "for nothing" raises some questions about your interpretation of moral conduct. Saving one's self for marriage should mean more than an unruptured hymen.

Lewis leads United States to sweep in 200

LOS ANGELES (AP) - When Carl Lewis lunges and Greg Louganis plunges, they inevitably come up No.

Lewis, still running in high gear on the road Jesse Owens traveled 48 years ago in Berlin, dived across the finish line Wednesday to lead a 1-2-3 United States sweep in the 200-meter sprint and win the third of his prospective four gold medals. Saturday he anchors the 400 relay.

Louganis, barely creating a ripple by expectedly running away from the field in the three-meter springboard diving, set his sights on Sunday's platform competition and an unprecedented two diving golds by one man in one Olympics.

He hadn't tried for a world record Monday night in the long jump and many in the crowd reacted angrily. When I got the boos, at first it was shocking," he said, "but then I wasn't really disappointed."

Bates, a second-year player from Tennessee, is trying to win the starting strong safety job this year from incumbent Dextor Clinkscale.



American men win volleyball gold medal

United States overpowered Canada 15-6, 15-10, 15-7 Wednesday night to earn a berth in the championship match of the men's volleyball competition at the Olympic Games.

The American men, who never before have earned a medal and now are assured of the gold or the silver, will face Brazil for the title at 6:30 p.m., PDT Saturday at the Long Beach Arena.

The Brazilians bounced back from a first-game loss to defeat Italy 12-15, 15-2, 15-3, 15-5 in Wednesday night's opening semifinal match.


Canada and Italy will square off with the bronze medal at stake at noon Saturday.

The Americans and Brazilians will be meeting for the second time in the Games. Brazil earned its way into the medal round by thrashing the United States 15-10, 15-11, 15-2 Monday night in the final pool play match.

The Americans blew open the first game of its match with Canada by scoring six straight points to turn a 5-4 lead into an 11-4 advantage.

After the Canadians scored two points, the Americans got four more in a row to end the game.

Canada took a 5-0 lead in the second game and led shortly later 7-2. However, the U.S. then exploded, running off seven consecutive points to take a 9-7 lead.

Olajuwon emerged as a collegiate star at the NCAA Final Four tournament at New Orleans three seasons ago and then led the Cougars to the championship game the next two years. Houston lost to North Carolina State in 1983 and Georgetown in 1984.

Q. I've noticed in the spring and summer a puddle of fluid accumulates on my garage floor under my car after it's been driven. I can't locate any low fluid levels. What's my next step?

A. First, determine what the fluid is by placing a newspaper under the car where the puddle usually appears. Chances are that it's water. Determine if this happens after hot weather driving when you've been running your air conditioner. If it is water, and if the water is rusty, it's from the cooling system. Check for a leaky hose, loose fittings or, possibly, a leaky radiator. If the water is clear, it's condensation from your air conditioner condenser, and nothing at all to worry about.

If passed, the new resolution will make it illegal to "consume from or possess an open container of alcohol in any public place." In short, the new ordinance would give Hereford police the power to arrest anyone

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP) Headaches might seem to be a peculiarly adult disorder, aggravated by the stress and complexities of the daily routine.

Yet headaches are surprisingly common in children, according to Dr. David Rothner, chief of child neurology at The Cleveland Clinic.

At a recent meeting in Scottsdale, Ariz., of the American Association for the Study of Headache, Rothner said a Swedish study of almost 9,000 children found that one child in five has had migraine or tension headaches by age 15.

Children's headaches can be frightening to parents, who may jump to the conclusion that eye are responsible.

"A common misconception is that eye problems are a common cause of headaches in children, and that is not true," Rothner said. Tumors, likewise, are rare.

Even so, headaches themselves can have serious consequences for children, said Dr. Joel Saper, director of the Michigan Headache and Neurological Institute, a private clinic in Ann Arbor,xx"Ultimately, chronic pain in childhood can permanently affect the child's life and the way he-she relates to the world," Saper has written.

Headaches commonly occur in children who are sick and have fevers, Rothner said. Those headaches will disappear as the children recover. So will headaches caused by ear and throat pain, he said.

In adolescents, improper use of acne medication can sometimes trigger headaches. Overdoses of Vitamin A, a common acne treatment, and the use of the antibiotic tetracycline after its expiration date can cause a condition called pseudotumor cerebri, Rothner said.

That condition mimics the behavior of a brain tumor. It boosts pressure in the head, even though no tumor is present, and often causes headaches. Pseudotumor cerebri is sometimes found in young women who are slightly overweight or who have irregular menstrual periods.

The most common causes of headache in children, Rothner said, are psychological and emotional problems. The headaches are not necessarily a sign of a serious psychological problem, he said, but can be due to the anxiety associated with adolescent adjustment pro-



Hatfield: wife earned money

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. Mark Hatfield says his wife, Antoinette, legitimately earned the \$40,000 she received from a Greek entrepreneur and denies allegations linking the payment to his support of a trans-Africa oil pipeline.

"My wife conducts an independent real estate business," the Oregon Republican said Wednesday.

There was not, is not and never will be any connection between her real estate dealings and my senatorial responsibility, including my support for a trans-Africa pipeline," he said.

Hatfield's comments came in response to a published report that former associates of the man who made the payment, Basil Tsakos, have told the Senate Ethics Committee a different story about the money

Meanwhile, the FBI is moving to investigate the payment, according to reports in today's editions of The Washington Post and The New York Times.

The Times said that officials in the Justice Department's criminal division discussed the Hatfield situation

Wednesday with officials of the FBI, tempting to drum up support for the which will conduct the inquiry. The issue for the FBI, said the Post, is whether the \$40,000 payment could constitute an illegal attempt to influence Hatfield's official actions.

Quoting acquaintances of the former Tsakos associates, the Times said sworn statements claim the payment to Mrs. Hatfield had little to do with Tsakos' purchase or renovation of an apartment in Washington's Watergate complex. The paper's sources refused to be identified.

The four payments made to Mrs. Hatfield by Tsakos, the sworn statements reportedly claim, may have been made as compensation to Hatfield for the senator's efforts on behalf of a \$10 billion trans-Africa oil pipeline.

In 1982 and 1983, Tsakos was at-

does not technically need backing from the U.S. government. Authorities have said, however. African nations might be more inclined to favor the pipeline if it were sanctioned by the United States. Hatfield confirmed earlier that he

privately financed pipeline, which

had met with several federal and foreign officials to press them on behalf of the pipeline.

But he said the money paid to Mrs. Hatfield was not connected with his lobbying effort. "These allegations are erroneous, but for some reason continue to receive front-page credibility," Hatfield said, adding they were apparently "from anonymous third parties who live overseas."


