Israel swears in new prime minister

JERUSALEM (AP) - Former opposition leader Shimon Peres was sworn in as Israel's eighth prime minister today and his bipartisan government promptly turned its attention to Israel's worsening

In interviews with three leading newspapers, Peres was quoted as saying his first priority will be to revive the economy and seek financial aid from the United States.

Both Peres, leader of the Labor Party, and former Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir, leader of the rightwing Likud bloc, are expected to travel to Washington in the next few weeks. Shamir will serve as foreign minister and deputy prime minister in the new unity government, then switch places with Peres halfway through the 50-month term.

Peres formally presented his 25-member Cabinet, the largest in Israel's history, to President Chaim Herzog this afternoon, but no Cabinet meeting was scheduled.

The unprecedented bipartisan government includes one former president, two former prime ministers, three former defense ministers and two former military chiefs of staff.

Peres' Labor Party and Shamir's Likud bloc, neither of which emerged Parliament, Peres offered to hold from the July 23 lection with enough seats in the 120-member Parliament to form a government independently, Jordan for a special invitation.

Legislator Mordechai Vershubski. who had opposed his three-man Shinui Party's entry into the coalition, abstained from the vote of confidence and 12 members of the 120-seat Knesset, or Parliament, were absent.

Following the vote, Peres and his Cabinet members rose to the podium one by one to take verbal and written oaths of office.

Peres ended the debate shortly after midnight with an emotional appeal for a national effort to resolve Israel's economic difficulties and to help end the Israeli occupation in Lebanon. he pledged to bring Israeli forces home from Lebanon and to renew efforts to improve Israel's troubled relations with Egypt.

But he said his first priority was domestic: An economy headed toward 400 percent annual inflation, a foreign debt of \$23 billion, and rising unemployment.

Presenting his Cabinet to the peace talks with neighboring Arab states, singling out King Hussein of

Bond unavailable to tight-lipped duo

HOUSTON (AP) - A federal judge refused to set bond for a couple jailed for refusing to testify before a grand jury weighing whether to charge their teenage son with capital

U.S. District Judge James DeAnda on Thursday denied a motion for bond for Bernard and Odette Port, saying the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals had already ruled on the matter and he would not "upset the status quo.'

However, he took under advisement a motion for a writ of habeas corpus and told attorneys he would rule Monday whether to free the Ports from a contempt of court citation.

\$20,000 bond in the killing of Debora Sue Schatz, 23, a mail carrier slain as she made her rounds June 7.

The Ports contend they are unjustly jailed "because they exercised a valid parent-child privilege which precludes the state from compelling them to testify involuntarily against

According to transcripts of grand jury proceedings, the foreman said the panel was attempting to decide whether to indict Young Port for murder or capital murder, as well as wehther there were other suspects.

Assistant District Attorney Brad Beers declined to specify the grand jury's intentions. "We're trying to get all of the facts before them. If that results in a capital murder in-

dictment, then that's what the facts he was "comfortable that they will will suport," Beers said.

David Port waived an indictment by the grand jury and pleaded innocent earlier to a murder charge in an effort to prevent his parents from being forced to testify.

"If all they were investigating was murder then waiver of an indictment would preclude any further investigation. This gives them (prosecutors) an excuse to keep the grand jury proceedings alive because a defendant cannot waive a capital murder indictment," said the Ports' attorney, Randy Schaffer.

State District Judge I.D. McMaster ordered the Ports to jail Aug. 28 and fined them \$500 each for refusing to testify.

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed McMaster's ruling this week, revoking the appeals bond. The Ports surrendered Wednesday.

Schaffer contends the Ports should Schaffer said he hadn't talked to be exempt from testifying against the Ports since Wednesday and that their son for the same reasons against each other.

Conservationist likes change of pace here

After growing up on the East Coast and attending one of its largest universities, working in U.S. Army Intelligence during the Vietnam War and spending 10 years learning about the wine industry in Australia, a fellow just might find life a little dull in the Texas Panhandle.

But David Webster, who lived through all those things and more before beginning a second career with the Soil Conservation Service, said exactly the opposite is true.

"I can honestly say I've never been happier," he said. "I'm lucky enough to have a job where I'm paid for doing what I love."

As for living in West Texas, Webster said he has always resided in small towns and prefers the country life. "I can allow myself to enjoy Hereford because I've seen a lot of the rest of the world. I have something to compare it to."

Webster took over as SCS District Conservationist on Aug. 6. He replaced David Reed, who took a job with the PCA in LaGrange. His job is to supervise the staff of four soil conservationists and technicians and work closely with the Tierra Blanca Soil and Water Conservation

While a degree in forestry from Penn State University prepared him for work with the SCS, Webster chose to earn a master's degree in soil and plant science from Texas Tech University. He began those studies

while working at the SCS office in Littlefield and is now just six hours short of the degree.

"One reason I went back to Texas Tech is that it is extremely important to get a local education. I had studied soils, but you need local experience for any job."

The SCS provides a free service to the farmers of Deaf Smith County: helping them learn to preserve the precious resources of soil and water.

"The farmland is such an asset," Webster pointed out, "not just for the people who own it, but for the entire country."

Webster has high praise for many of the local county's landowners. "There are progressive farmers here, ones who are taking risks to learn ways to conserve the soil and water. There is actually original research going on right here."

Webster owned vineyards during his stay in Australia and also helped maintain a winery. He has enjoyed working with Hereford farmer Art Reinauer, who is watering a vineyard with drip irrigation and plans to build a winery within the

"I had the unique opportunity to start a second career," Webster said with a smile. "It's all very exciting. I like Hereford a lot."

AUSTIN (AP) - High school coaches who criticize school reforms that prohibit athletes from playing if they are failing any course should spend more time worrying about students' classroom performances, Gov. Mark White said.

"I'm frankly tired of seeing some coaches come out and say, "Why don't you let our kids flunk one course?' Some of them are more concerned about winning ball games than about teaching kids," White

The governor, who pushed a \$2.8 billion school reform bill and tax hike through a special legislative session this summer, said any coach who puts games ahead of studies is standing squarely in the

"Those that are ought to get their priorities straight. We're going to win some ball games, but I've found that smart ballplayers win more than dumb ones," White said.

CORPUS CHRISTI (AP) - Despite objections from two federal agencies charged with protecting wildlife, a U.S. Army Corps of Engineers official said he plans to grant a permit for construction of a controversial, multi-million dollar oil rig servicing port near Cor-

Developers of Baker's Port say the proposed terminal for servicing deep-water oil rigs will employ thousands of people and be a boon

Federal law requires ocean-going rigs to be serviced regularly, but there are no terminal facilities on the Gulf Coast handling the big rigs. Baker's Port is designed to fill this service gap, developers

Conservationists and two federal agencies have been fighting the project for more than two years.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the National Marine Fisheries Service maintained the development on Live Oak Peninsula would destroy wildlife habitat and fisheries.

Police eye young female suspect

BENBROOK, Texas (AP) - Tarrant County authorities are considering the case of a 12-year-old girl who turned herself in to police in connection with the shooting death of a girlfiend.

The girl - "a young child who had no knowledge of firearms," Police Chief Bob Richardson said Thursday - said "she was showing her the gun when it accidentally went off."

The body of Kerry Ann Thomas, 11, was found about noon Wednesday in the suspect's backyard, officials said. She had been missing since Saturday.

Richardson said the 12-year-old gave them a statement Wednesday night in which she said the shooting occurred Saturday afternoon. Thomas' body was discovered hidden under some debris.

A neighbor found the body after detecting a foul odor. Police and neighbors had searched throughout the neighborhood since Sunday. Thomas was struck in the face and killed instantly by a single blast, at close range, from a long-barrel 12-guage shotgun as she

drank from a glass of mild inside her friend's house, police said.

Wholesale prices show decline

WASHINGTON (AP) - Wholesale prices, falling for the first time in nine months, dropped 0.1 percent in August as gasoline prices staged their steepest decline since March of 1983, the government

Food prices, off slightly after a sharp climb in July, fell for the fourth time in five months.

The overall drop left inflation at the wholesale level running at a mere 2.4 percent, calculated annually, for the first eight months of

Today's surprising good news provides some of the best evidence to date that the unexpected economic resurgence has not, as many analysts feared, led to a renewal of the inflationary spiral.

"Inflation remains exceptionally well under control," said Michael K. Evans, a private economic consultant here, in advance of

Gasoline prices plummeted 4.2 percent, with the decline attributed largely to plentiful world supplies. Normally, gasoline prices rise during the peak-driving summer months. But, this year, those prices have fallen throughout.

North Carolinians assess damage

WILMINGTON, N.C. (AP) - Torrential rains pounded a "terribly damaged" North Carolina today as thousands of coastal residents emerged from shelters to view Hurricane Diana's more than \$25 million swath of destruction and workers tried to restore electricity to nearly 45,000 people.

As Diana rapidly lost intensity Thursday and was downgraded to a tropical storm, Gov. Jim Hunt asked President Reagan for federal assistance because adequate cleanup from the season's first Atlantic hurricane is "beyond the capability of state and local governments."

In this southeast coastal city, Diana's 110-mile-per-hour winds toppled trees and power lines that clogged many streets, blew roofs off homes, swept boats off trailers on land and smashed and sunk many boats. Many streets in coastal towns throughout the area were still flooded today.

There were no drownings, but the storm indirectly caused two deaths - one by heart attack and one by traffic accident," officials

"We've been lucky thus far even though these people have been terribly damaged and it has been bad for them," Hunt said Thursday as he toured Wilmington.

Blacks still may not vote

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) - After two weeks of black riots and a fresh spate of bombings, P.W. Botha was sworn in as state president today under a new constitution that still denies the vote to South Africa's black majority.

Botha, prime minister since 1978, was the architect of the new system creating separate houses of Parliament for the Asian and mixed-race minorities to sit alongside the existing white chamber. The Parliament convenes Tuesday.

In the coastal city of Durban, six non-white opposition leaders sought by security police remained at the British consulate today, where they took refuge on Thursday, British diplomats said.

Chief Justice Pierre Rabie administered the oath of office for state president, which replaces the post of prime minister, to Botha at a morning ceremony in Cape Town at the Great Church, near Parlia-

Mondale pooh-poohs polls

News Roundup Reagan says deficit fault of Democrats

President Reagan, attacked all week by Walter F. Mondale for large federal budget deficits, is insisting that the Democrats are responsible for the record red ink under his administration, while Mondale is shrugging off the polls showing him far behind the president.

"You can stuff those polls," the Democratic presidential candidate said to reporters asking about the surveys showing him trailing Reagan nationally by 12 to 16 percentage points.

As the two debated at a distance, negotiators for each have agreed to hold two televised presidential debates this fall, with a third debate between their running mates, Vice President George Bush and Democrat Geraldine Ferraro, according to sources familiar with the discussions.

More talks were set for today, and sources said an announcement was close.

New York Gov. Mario Cuomo, meantime, responded Thursday to Catholic leaders who have been critical of Democratic politicians, including himself and Ms. Ferraro, for backing the right of women to choose abortions while personally opposing abortions.

Cuomo, speaking at the University of Notre Dame in Indiana, said:

"To most of us, the manipulative invoking of religion to advance a politician or a party is frightening and divisive."

And, he said, "There is no church teaching that mandates the best political course for making our belief everyone's rule, for spreading this part of our Catholicism."

Mondale was in St. Louis today after a rip to Mississippi and Tennessee on Thursday, when he accused Reagan of "trying to almost destroy the Medicare program" and said in a second term Reagan "is going to savage Social Security."

Reagan was back in the White House today and planning no more political trips until next week.

The president was also in Tennessee on Thursday, traveling to

Nashville for events that included a visit to the Grand Ole Opry for the 81st birthday celebration of country music singer Roy Acuff.

The birthday party became a political rally as Acuff gave the president a rousing endorsement, telling the audience, "Please go to the polls and csat your votes for Ronald Reagan....

And Reagan used his Opry speech to blast his Democratic opponents: 'They probably couldn't perform here because all they can do is sing the blues."

Before leaving Washington, Reagan again condemned Mondale's new plan for cutting the federal budget deficits through higher taxes and spending cuts.

"We don't need more politicians insisting we have deficits because you're not taxed enough," Reagan said. "Those deficits ballooned from an economy that didn't grow enough and from 50 years of government spending too much.

"Since they (Democrats) have been approving deficit spending for, with just a few exceptions, virtually

50 years, and 42 of which they have dominated the Congress, I would have to say they can't remove themselves from the blame," he

Mondale has been hammering away at Reagan on the deficit issue. On Monday he unveiled a \$177 billion program to reduce the red ink. It includes \$85 billion in tax increases, most of which would affect highincome taxpayers, and pledges the higher tax revenues would go into a special fund for erasing the deficit, not for new spending.

Reagan proposed and won from Congress substantial reductions in federal income tax rates in 1981, but he has also seen the annual federal budget deficits increase substantial-

In 1981, the year Reagan took office, the federal budget deficit was nearly \$58 billion, according to the Office of Management and Budget: for 1984, the OMB estimated the deficit at \$184 billion.

Reagan said Thursday that the deficit this year "could be \$50 billion less if the Congress, the House of

Representatives, had agreed to the cuts we asked for beginning in 1981."

House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. promptly responded that the figure corresponded with the cuts Reagan proposed in Social Security.

"When it comes to deficit reduction, Social Security has always been the president's primary target," O'Neill said.

Mondale encountered some hostility in Tupelo, Miss., where boos and shouts of pro-Reagan sentiment were heard amid the crowd at a high school gym. Mondale faced questions from the audience on abortion, gay rights and religion.

In his speech, Mondale said that Reagan's "plan on Medicare is nothing short of official cruelty."

"If he is re-elected," Mondale added, "he is going to savage Social Security. I won't cut Social Security and Medicare. He did and he will."

Ms. Ferraro was at her home in New York today before heading to Buffalo. Bush was heading to New York to address a Jewish Republican group and the New York Conservative Party convention.

Cuomo addresses abortion controversy

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP) - New York Gov. Mario Cuomo, saying most Americans find the use of religion for political gain "frightening," staked out a position for Roman Catholic political leaders who are at odds with the church over the abortion issue.

"What we're arguing about here is not what to get done but how to get it done," Cuomo said Thursday night during a question-and-answer session after his address at the University of Notre Dame.

Cuomo said the way to stop abortions in the United States is "not by trying to make laws for others to live by, but by living the laws already written for us by God."

While Catholics in politics might accept church doctrine in their lives, those who don't agree "aren't a ruthless, callous' alliance of anti-Christians determined to overthrow

our moral standards," said Cuomo, a Catholic who delivered a rousing keynote address at the Democratic national Convention in July.

Cuomo's speech came at a time when he and Democratic vice presidential candidate Geraldine Ferraro, another Catholic New Yorker, are embroiled in a dispute with New York Archbishop John J. O'Connor over their refusal to work for anti-abortion legislation while personally opposing it.

"Unless we Catholics...set an example that is clear and compelling, then we will never convince this society to change the civil laws to protect what we preach is precious human life," Cuomo said in his speech on the relationship of politics and religion, which has become a major issue in the presidential campaign.

Cuomo said most Americans find the "invoking of religion to advance a politician or a party frightening."

President Reagan, who has said "religion and politics are necessarily related," has courted Catholics and Protestant fundamentalists with his backing for tax credits for private school tuition and firm opposition to abortion.

His Democratic challenger, Walter Mondale, in turn, has accused Reagan and his allies of a policy of "moral McCarthyism," which rejects opposing views as unchristian.

Cuomo, however, avoided any specific attack on Reagan's alliance with evangelicals such as the Rev. Jerry Falwell, something the governor has done in the past.

"The American people need no course in philosophy or political science or church history to know that God should not be made into a celestial party chairman. To most of us, the manipulative invoking of religion to advance a politician or a party is frightening and divisive,"

"I think our moral and social mission as Catholics must begin with the wisdom contained in the words 'physician, heal thyself," Cuomo

"Despite all the effort at defining, our opposition to the sin of abortion, collectively we Catholics apparently believe, and perhaps act, little differently from those who don't share our commitment," he said. "Are we asking government to make criminal what we believe to be sinful because we ourselves can't stop committing the sin?"

"Governor Cuomo's speech was not a radical speech, but was that of a very conservative Catholic," Daniel Maguire, a Catholic theologian at marquette University, said in Washingon, D.C.
