The Highlanders and Whitefaces will pull out all the stops tonight in their Regional clash, with the winner advancing to the state \$A quarter-finals against the Lewisville-Ft. Worth Eastern Hills matchup slated for tomorrow night at Texas

"Samaniego is the key to their whole team," Herd mentor Don Cumpton said. 'He makes them go."

And, go the Clan has. Bel Air has a 44-1 mark over the past five years in regular season play, and they own the
District 2-5A trophy over
each of those campaigns.
Samaniego has been spectacular this year, rushing for

963 yards on 160 totes, including 17 TDs. He has also cted on 61 of 133 pass at-

tempts for 1,191 yards and 17

Those 34 TDs are the basis of a Bel Air team which has averaged 43.9 points per game this year, and go a long way in making the Highlanders a 6-point

favorite tonight.

Bel Air, which was ranked fifth in the final AP 5A schoolboy poll, has other po-tions, however, in addition to Samaniego. Fullback Tommy Bonds (6-1, 200) has 1,164 yards and 15 TDs this year, and receivers Dewayne Bonds and Raul Prieto have 16 receptions each this season for 353 yards and 435 yards

Still, Cumpton and the Herd are aiming their penicillin at Samaniego. "We have a chance to win if we can control him," Cumpton said. 'We'll make some adjustments in our defense, and we may stunt more."

The main brunt of those stunts will be carried by Herd linebackers Ken Cosper, John Phibbs, and Freddy Garcia, who have led a stingy HHS defense all year long. Tackles Barry Josserand and Robert Gonzales will help anchor the middle, while standout ends Aubrey Richburg and Bruce Clark will be trying to contain the Highlanders wide.

The Hereford secondary,

while less than spectacular in last week's 42-30 bi-district win over Palo Duro, has been solid all year long. Safeties Mike Hill and Matt Collier combine with cornerbacks Charles McDowell and Shannon Ritchie in aiming at throwing a net over the Bel

Air aerial attack. The Highlanders' defense may be their sole weakness, Cumpton says. "We think we can move the ball on them and score some points," he said. We're going to have to keep the ball away from their

Hereford's tailback duo of Wayne High and Alfred Ball (1,155 yards, 15 TDs and 575 yards respectively) will be counted on to help quarter-back Alan Wartes control the ball tonight. Wartes has navigated the Whitefaces to a 19-3 mark over the past two years, and has hit on 57 of 128 passes for 919 yards and eight touchdowns this year. "He may be the best in that

Bacteria Can Kill 'Agent Orange'

WASHINGTON (AP) -Scientists have developed bacteria that they say can clean up land contaminated with Agent Orange, the weed killer used during the Vietnam War, and other her-

Researchers at the University of Illinois Medical Center in Chicago said Thursday that they bred a strain of bacteria that feeds on the major component of Agent

In using up the carbon in this component, a herbicide called

2,4,5-trichlorophenoxyacetic acid or 2,4,5-T, the microbes degrade the chemical and render it harmless, they said.

The scientists tested the microbes on soil contaminated with high concentrations of 2,4,5-T. When the bacteria were sprayed on the dirt weekly, they eventually removed up to 90 percent of the chemical, the scientists

Drs. Ananda Chakrabarty, Scott T. Kellogg and Deb K. Chatterjee developed the microbes, a strain of the bacterium pseudomonas cepacia.

In 1978, Chakrabarty and General Electric Co. became the first to receive a patent on a man-made life form, in that case, a bacterium that ate oil.

'Our new microbe also is a type that doesn't exist in nature," Chakrabarty said in a telephone interview. "The university is applying for a patent on the bug and the process used to make it, and we are in the process of

According to Speakes, Reagan also telephoned Paul Nitze, who will head the U.S. team in Geneva for talks beginning Monday with the Soviet Union on nuclear arms in Europe, to discuss "the seriousness of the U.S. propesal, our commitment to negotiate in good faith and the firm support which we have from our allies."

In the interview, Reagan noted that Brezhnev had rejected Reagan's public pronew missiles in Europe if the Soviets would dismantle their latest models aimed at Western Europe, and had offered a reduction in

deployments.
"Well, you start bargaining from there," Reagan said. "We'll negotiate in good faith, but we'll do everything

going for us in these negotiations is that this is the first time that we have sat at the table opposite them in which they've got some interest in coming together in the negotiation because we're not sily disarming ourselves," Reagan said.

On his responsibility for nuclear weapons, he said, "It is awesome. I don't have nightmares about it."

The broadcast, taped Tuesday, contained the first televised scenes of Reagan's the Pacific. Features included his collections of guns, belt buckles and hats and the president driving the interviewer in what she called "the scroungiest Jeep."

Reagan's daughter Patti, among friends and family also interviewed for the show, said that since the March 30 attempt on his life, there is something in his eyes now that I never have seen before ... when I see it then I have to confront his mortality, and I don't want to do that."

WASHINGTON (AP) -Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr., in a last-minute search for a compromise with Israel's foreign minister, is trying to find a way around an impasse with the Jewish state over European participation in a

peacekeeping force.
Haig scheduled a midmorning meeting at the State Department with Israeli Foreign Minister Yitzhak Shamir, who declared before taking an all-night flight from Tel Aviv that Europe's "con-

ditions are unacceptable." The Israeli government also sent a military team here to resume discussions at the Pentagon on new strategic ties with the United States.

A U.S. plan, submitted to the Israelis 10 days ago, called for stockpiling American medical supplies in Israel and some token military cooperation. It fell short of Prime Minister Menachem Begin's hopes for closer ties between the two countries.

The disputes over European peacekeepers and Middle East strategy are straining U.S.-Israeli relations again.

Inmates Claim Fire Ants Used To Control Weevils

HOUSTON (AP) - Two inmates have asked a federal judge to prohibit the Texas Department of Corrections from forcing prisoners to work in cotton fields that they contend were infested with fire ants in an experiment to control boll weevils.

The inmates contend the TDC and Texas A&M University planted fire ants in the fields at the Ellis Unit in Huntsville where inmates have worked for three years without being warned of the danger.

Patrick Stuart, 35, and Johnnie Lee Johnson Jr., 31, also said in their suit that prison officials failed to see that ant bites were properly treated.

The inmates, in the suit filed Nov. 13 in the court of U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice and tranferred to Houston this week, also are asking for \$100 million in damages. No judge has been assigned to hear the

Congressman Honored By Space Program

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) - Astronaut John W. Young honored the late U.S. Rep. Olin E. Teague by giving Texas A&M University a miniature United States flag was carried into space on the first voyage of the space shuttle Columbia.

Teague, well known for his support of the American space program dur-ing his congressional tenure, died early this year. He was a member of A&M's class of 1932 and a recepient of the school's Distinguished Alumnus

Award. "I remember Congressman Teague in the early 60s talking of his desire to send an American to the moon and bring him back," said Young, who cammanded the Columbia on its maiden flight. "It was the 'bring him back' part I liked the best."

The flag will go on permanent display at the Olin E. Teague Research Center, which was built with the help of a \$1 million grant from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

The laughter has gotten out of hand at the administration building and assistant superintendent for personnel Eddie Washington warned that "office congregating and merriment

will not be tolerated in the future." In a memo this week, Washington said "loud talking, laughing, loitering and excessive walking are not mannerisms of true professionals" and should be stopped.

And he warned that "future correspondence will be individual and more severe" if employees continue the practices.

Sambo's Closes 447 Restaurants

CARPINTERIA, Calif. (AP) - The closing of 447 Sambo's restaurants in 43 states and the resultant layoff of up to 10,000 employees in an attempt to ease the chain's financial crisis has left it with 667 facilities still operating, company officials said.

Arthur Dowd, Sambo's vice president, told The Associated Press Thursday that the closings were unrelated to a company decision Wednesday to consider declaring bankruptcy if lenders refuse to restructure the company's debt.

The November closing of 447 restaurants has laid off up to 10,000 employees, based on an average of 20 to 25 employees per restaurant, Dowd

Sambo's posted losses of \$77.8 million in 1979, \$11.6 million in 1980 and \$29 million in the first nine months of this year. Last month, the chain announced that it had failed to pay a \$4.8 million first installment on a \$100 million restructured lean.

The chain has sold 12 restaurants as part of its plan to raise cash during its financial emergency.

History Repeats Itself In Cowboys' 10-9 Victory

IRVING, Texas (AP) -History shows the turkey of the Dallas Cowboys' football team - the backup quarterback - can always look forward to Thanksgiving Day.

It was Thanksgiving Day in 1974 that Clint Longley came off the bench for the injured Roger Staubach to beat Washington 24-23 on a lastsecond touchdown pass.

Glenn Carano got his chance Thursday when Danny White was knocked out of the game in the second quarter and produced a 10-9 victory over the luckless Chicago Bears on a late fourth period touchdown

The victory put the Cowboys a half game ahead of Philadelphia in the National Conference Eastern Division with a 10-3 record while the Bears tumbled to 3-10. "We'll be able to swallow

our turkey tonight," said a thankful Dallas Coach Tom Landry.

White suffered bruised ribs when he was tackled while scrambling for a first down. Doctors said X-Rays proved negative and he may be available to play in 10 days against Baltimore.

"Glenn did just a great job," said Landry. "He was very tight in the first half but settled down in the second half.

"Danny is hurting and we still have to check on his arm more. He has some nerve damage or something ... he's hurting ... hopefully he will be back in 10 days."

After a 3-3 halftime deadlock, the Bears moved ahead 9-3 early in the fourth quarter on quarterback Vince Evans' two-yard touchdown run. However, Ed "Too Tall" Jones blocked John Roveto's extra point attempt to set the stage for a Carano-led comeback.

James Jones returned a

punt 17 yards to the Chicago 37. Carano scrambled for 11 yards and passed 15 yards to Ron Springs. Two plays later Springs scored from five yards out and Rafael Septien kicked the extra point.

Roveto's 49-yard field goal try with 31 seconds to play was wide right.

The loss spoiled a brilliant day by Chicago's Walter Payton, who rushed 38 times for 179 yards.

"It doesn't mean anything when you lose," said Payton. 'We lost."

"Payton is the best back in football," said Landry. "He has great strength and great running ability. We just couldn't stop him." Carano admitted "I was

nervous at the start. I started getting into the flow of things in the fourth quarter. He added, "It was a difficult feeling to have to play

under the circumstances. There was some confusion out there for awhile." Carano had only thrown 12

passes all year. He completed

6 of 15 Thursday for 131 vards, including a 55-yard completion to Tony Hill. White said of Carano: "He did a fantastic job in a trying

situation ... the pressure was on him." White said of the Cowboys' stretch drive "Every game

now is a playoff game." About his injury, White said "I don't think the hit was flagrant. I have 10 days until the next game to get the

soreness out." A crestfallen Chicago Coach Neill Armstrong said "Just when you've been in this game and think you've seen everything happen to you, something else happens to you - a blocked extra point keeps you from tying the game.

"I don't know what happened with that kick. The snap

and hold looked good ... our players are sick and disgusted with this loss."

Evans said "Dallas is a fine football team but we gave 'em a day's work ... there are

no quitters on this team." Chicago safety Doug Plank said he was amazed about how blase the Dallas fans were over the victory.

"If you were blind, you would have not known it was a football game going on out there," said Plank. "The fans in the Bermuda Triangle (Texas Stadium) are spoiled."

It was Dallas' 17th consecutive regular season victory in Texas Stadium. Dallas is now 7-3 against



How many of us have picked up the telephone only to hear something very similar to the sales pitch used above? Although some radio stations do co-sponsor "contests" like the one mentioned, what has usually happened is that a pro-motional firm has purchased extensive advertising from that station in exchange for the use of the station's call letters. The promoters, in most instances, have no other affiliation with the local

station. The free gifts are usually in the form of coupons that can be redeemed at area mer-chants. Many times an additional purchase is necessary and quite often, the merchants are no longer honoring the coupons for reasons of their

Before agreeing to accept the coupon book, do a little investigative work:

.Ask the caller if your money is completely refundable if you are dissatisfied with the book.

•Get the names of some of the businesses involved and call them to see if they are honoring the coupons.

.When the book is delivered, go through it carefully before purchasing it to see how many of the coupons are actually of use to you. A free tune-up is not going to do you any good if your car is a diesel. If yo

·Be certain that you get the names, addresses and phone numbers of the promoters. Insist on the permanent location of their business, not the local hotel room that is probably serving as their local base.

Do not hesitate to check with the Better Business Bureau or the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division to see if any complaints have been lodged against the promoters or the co-sponsors. Above all, if any difficulties arise, report them to the two agencies mentioned

Limiting lung cancer chances

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D.

DEAR DR. LAMB — My mother died recently at age 60 of lung cancer. She was a pack-a-day smoker for 35 years. She did not become ill until two months before her death, but her last days were horribly painful and her death from pulmonary edema was a hell on earth. If everyone witnessed suffering like this the cigarette companies would have to go out of business.

I am a 34-year-old female who stopped smoking four years ago after an 11-year habit of more than a pack a day. I know I will never smoke again. Does a former smoker's risk of lung cancer decrease as years go by or is the damage already done? Do I have an increased risk of lung cancer because my

of lung cancer because my mother had it? Is there a test one can take to diagnose the disease before symptoms

DEAR READER - Congratulations on stopping a very dangerous habit. Cancer of the lungs has long been the leading cause of cancer deaths in men and, as a larger population of women who have smoked for

en who have smoked for years develops, it threatens to become the leading cause of cancer deaths in women. The irony is that there is something better even than a cure for lung cancer. Probably more than 80 percent of all cases could be prevented. How? By everyone stopping smoking. This enormous cost

financially, physically and mentally is something we have the power to prevent.

It is true that if a person in your immediate family has cancer you are more likely to have a cancer if the right factors, or exposure, occur.

You will have some increased risk of lung cancer because of being a former smoker but each year that

is not very important. That is only true if a person quits, not if he just cuts down. The more a person smokes and the longer he smokes, the greater the risk. There are inhalation tests

to obtain sputum for study for early abnormal cells, but such tests are not widely used. Chest X-rays are help ful, but it is often too late when the cancer shows on X
