U.S. Forces to Drill In Mideast Countries

WASHINGTON (AP) -The Pentagon formally announced today that U.S. ground, air and naval forces totaling more than 6,000 men will conduct wide-ranging military exercises for more than a month in Egypt, the Sudan, Oman and Somalia, the biggest such military drills in Middle Eastern countries so far.

The exercises, called Bright Star, come as the United States is attempting to demonstrate to nations in the area and to the Soviet Union that this country intends to protect its friends and its interests in that region.

Many of the details of the impending exercise this month and next have already become known and the Penannouncement tagon represented formal confirmation.

Defense officials have said that the exercise, a follow-up to a much smaller maneuver in Egypt a year ago, was in the planning stage before the assassination of Egyptian President Anwar Sadat Oct. 6 and that the plans have not been expanded since then.

The exercise will feature, among other things, a nonstop flight by six B-52 bombers from the United States to drop explosives on a weapons range in the Egyptian desert, returning without landing to their home bases at Minot and Grand Forks, N.D.

Also, a Marine landing in Oman, which holds a strategic position near the en-

trance to the Persian Gulf, will mark a first. However, defense officials said the Omanis have required the United States to scale down the size and scope of that exercise, limiting it to about 1,000 Marines from the Navy amphibious force standing of-

fshore. The original plan, pushed by American officials, called for an over-the-beach landing by a full Marine unit of about 1,800 men. Apparently, officials said, Oman wants to curb the extent of the U.S. operation to avoid any criticism from other Arab nations regarding it as too closely identified with the United States.

In Egypt, a force of about 4,000 U.S. troops, including two battalions of Army troops from the 24th Mechanized Infantry Division at Fort Stewart, Ga., and the other from the 82nd Airborne Division, will be the main units to take part in joint desert maneuvers with Egyptian troops about 20 miles from the Cairo West airbase.

The most dramatic part of the exercise will be an air drop by a battalion of paratroopers of the 82nd Airborne from Fort Bragg, N.C., on Nov. 14. Desert maneuvers involving the U.S. paratroopers, U.S. mechanized infantry and tanks, and Egyptian forces will be held for three days in the same

Troops will be flown from the United States, with the first combat units due to arrive in Egypt next Monday.

Brady to Attend Press Room Fete

WASHINGTON (AP) -Presidental press secretary James S. Brady will make his first public appearance since he was wounded by gunfire last March when he returns to the White House on Monday to help reopen the refurbish-

ed press room.

Except for a few daytime trips home or visits to friends, Brady has remained at George Washington University Hospital since he was critically wounded in the attempted assassination of President Reagan on March 30 outside a Washington of collapse.

Hotel. Brady's family hopes he will be released in time for Thanksgiving.

The press secretary's top deputy, Larry Speakes, told reporters today that Brady will help Reagan cut the ribbon formally opening the new briefing room and working quarters in the White House West Wing.

The press area was closed in August for a \$166,000 renovation, including structural reinforcement of the roof which government engineers said was in danger

U.S. Assures Morocco Joe Always Wanted Policeman's Job Of Military Backing

RABAT, Morocco (AP) -A U.S. military delegation led by Assistant Defense Secretary Francis J. West Jr. today assured American backing for Morocco in its war against the Marxist-led Polisario guerrilla move-

A similar assurance was given by the new U.S. Ambassador, Joseph Verner Reed, in presenting his credentials to King Hassan II in the mountain resort of Ifrane.

In a departure statement at Rabat airport after a threeday visit, West stressed the American view that the Polisario's recent escalation

of the war was likely to obstruct Hassan's proposal for a cease-fire and a referendum among the disputed territory's 100,000 inhabitants.

West and his 23-man delegation, including two generals, went on a one-day helicopter tour Thursday of the desert battle zone where Moroccan forces have fought the guerrillas for six years. The Polisario movement, backed by Algeria and Libya. is seeking the independence of the mineral-rich former Spanish Sahara territory annexed by Morocco in 1975.

Sgt. Joe Brown was one of those kids who, when you asked him what he wanted to be when he grew up, he would answer that he wanted to be a policeman.

He grew up and he became

a policeman After high school he came to Hereford from Poteet, a small town south of San Antonio, to visit his sister.

"I kind of liked the town," he said, "and I got a job at Caviness Packing Company. I worked there for 71/2 years."

He moved to Hereford on a Friday, met a girl named Annie on Saturday, and married her after the two dated for about a year and a half.

In 1972 the opportunity came for Brown to become a policeman. He was hired by the Hereford department and went to school.

"At first the money was real low. It was a \$300-a-month drop in salary," Brown recalled. "It was really hard to make ends meet. It was kind of hard for us at the beginning because we had to adjust. But, I always wanted to be a police officer since I was a little boy and the opportunity came up."

After about seven years as a patrolman, Brown had the chance to move into detective work when one of the investigators quit.

"After the years, you start investigation (as a patrolman) and you get interested. You learn more as you go along, you just pick it up," Brown said. "You learn what to look for in a crime scene, how to pick up evidence. You kind of pick up from the detective in front of

The big cases-ones with major human injury or loss--take monetary precedence over the small

"When something big comes in, we do work on the major cases," he said. "It may happen again, so you start working on them before someone else gets hurt."

"It's not that I'm saying the little cases like stolen bicycles and batteries aren't important," he explained. "It's just that on the bigger cases you really work."

Satisfaction from cracking a big case comes to Brown because "you feel so good because you've helped someone out."

When a crime needs investigated, detectives are called to the scene immediately, according to Brown, "We're really on call every day."

Since his job frequently calls him away, Brown likes to spend his hours off at home with his Annie and their two children, Joanne, 16, and (See BRANDING, page 2)

Elevator Blast Charges

To Be Dropped

HOUSTON (AP) - Charges will be dropped against two men accused of violating federal safety standards which contributed to a 1977 grain elevator explosion in Galveston that killed 18 people and injured 35 others, prosecutors said.

Frank Caulder, a former superintendent at Framers Export Co. elevator, and Robert Jones, former elevator manager, will not be re-tried on 24 misdemeanor criminal charges, said U.S. Attorney Dan Hedges.

Caulder and Jones were tried earlier this year, but the jury could not agree on a verdict

Justice Department attorneys in Washington and Houston decided Thursday to drop the charges, Hedges said.

'We took our best shot and they jury was split," Hedges said, adding defense attorneys would be better prepared to counter government arguments at a second trial.

In the first trial, both defendants testified measures were taken to correct safety problems at the facility. Design of a more sophisticated system to eliminate explosive grain dust was 60 percent complete at the time of the Dec. 27, 1977, explosion.

The European Commission was extremely disappointed to learn of the intention of the U.S. Department of Commerce to take a step that could lead to countervailing duties against steel exports from France and Belgium," said a statement from the commission, the Common Market's executive branch

Noting that the U.S. decision was made in the midst of diplomatic discussions on the issue, the statement added. 'The American authorities preferred to take a dangerous and disputable path."

The Common Market was reacting to an announcement in Washington that anti-dumping cases would be filed against foreign steelmakers. Among them, according to the Commission are, Belgium and France.

Nothing Unusual In Hassle Between Haig; Official

WASHINGTON (AP) There is nothing unusual about the discord between Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. and the unidentified White House official he accuses of waging "a guerrilla campaign" to undercut

There was no end of friction before Henry A. Kissinger took the dual role of secretary of state and national security affairs adviser under Richard M. Nixon. And there has been plenty of friction since, no matter the ad-

Haig's hassle is with Richard V. Allen, President Reagan's assistant for national security affairs. That's what they're saying, albeit anonymously, at the State Department. Allen says they are wrong and that Haig knows it. "I know it is not I, and Haig knows it is not I," he

Assuming that is so, there would seem to be a problem at the White House, since a bureaucratic guerrilla is saying bad things about the secretary of state and nobody seems to know who it is.

Reagan's spokesmen say the president doesn't know and isn't trying to find out. "He has put the matter to rest," said David Gergen. It would rest easier if Haig

had not sent his spokesman, Dean Fischer, to confirm publicly that he believes somebody in the White House is out to get him. Fischer would not say whom Haig suspects.

Thus Haig validated the reports which Reagan calls unfounded and potentially destructive. It is not the first time Haig has gone public with a complaint about White House matters.

And for all Reagan's expressions of confidence in his secretary of state, he has acted before to cut short power struggles among aides. That's what led him to fire his 1980 campaign manager, John P. Sears.

The latest Haig controversy began with a report by columnist Jack Anderson that Reagan was disappointed in the secretary of state, had lost confidence in him and might replace him by next summer White House aides learned

of the column before it was due to be published. Haig and Reagan both called Anderson. Reagan said it wasn't so. Haig said the report of presidential displeasure was the handiwork of a top White



Holmes Predicts Kayo

Larry Holmes had just predicted he would knock out Renaldo Snipes in defense of the World Boxing Council heavyweight championship tonight when a member of Snipes' camp shouted, "Pro-· mises, promises."

Holmes turned and faced the heckler, then said, "Don't worry about it, I keep mine."

The champion is such a strong favorite to there is no betting line on the fight.

The 25-year-old Snipes has won all 22 of his pro fights, 11 by knockout, but he was a controversial winner of a split decision after being knocked down twice in his last bout against Gerrie Coetzee Aug. 9: And he is at big disadvantages in both general experience and experience in a big fights to Holmes, who was 32 Tuesday.



kle the entire inside surface with table salt. If the glass is not completely grease-free ("beer-clean"), the salt will not stick

to the surface of the glass, leaving bare spots. If the glass is

beer-clean, the salt will coat the entire inner surface of the

glass. Then just rinse away the salt thoroughly, and pour

Mr. Minadeo also suggests softening your glass-washing water if your water is hard. Minerals in hard water will

leave stains and films on the glass, which can also prevent

beer foam from clinging. He also says glasses should be drip-

Watch your wallet

DEAR DR. LAMB - I have a friend who thinks you can cure everything with vitamin E. She takes it all the time. According to her, if you take vitamin E you will never have to see a doctor. She says it will prevent heart attacks, blood clots, strokes and arthritis.

She also says it is the best agent available to prevent aging. She tells me that is why she looks younger than most women her age, but she doesn't look a day younger than I do and I'm a year older than she is. I told her that one day and she got huffy and said just wait 10 years and if I could still see I'd know the difference.

What is the truth, Dr. Lamb? Will vitamin E do all these things for you and, if so, why don't more doctors

recommend it?
DEAR READER - Usually when an item is claimed to work miracles it is time to watch your wallet. Those kinds of claims are reminiscent of the old-time medicine shows that sold snake oil to the gullible. Vitamin E does have some

very useful purposes. It does help control leg cramps in some people - depending upon what causes the leg cramps. It is useless in oth-

ers with cramps. It does not cure arthritis or prevent it. It does not cure or prevent heart disease. It was once believed to be helpful in pre-venting blood clotting but it was discovered the agent affecting blood clotting was the substance the vitamin E was packaged in as a medi-cine, not the vitamin E itself. There are very good medicines available to control blood clotting today and vitamin E has no place in

Vitamin E is an antioxidant and in laboratory studies may help prevent cellu-lar aging. That is a long way from what it does in humans. And you should get vitamin E from a well-balanced diet. To prevent aging you will do better to follow more practical measures such as staying lean, not smoking, eating a good diet

and staying active.

DEAR DR. LAMB — I am a 65-year-old man with a hoarseness that has not gone away for a month. There is no lump on my vocal cords but the doctor seems concerned. Would you explain why please? He feels a person of my age should stay in the house, rest and not talk. I am getting tired of both the hoarseness and the treatment. I gave up alcohol because that see


DEAR READER - Anyone who has unexplained hoarseness for more than two weeks should have an examination. That includes direct examination of the larynx by looking down into the larynx with a light. Persistent hoarseness can be a sign of throat cancer. That is why your doctor is

Often throat cancer is not diagnosed in its early stages even after several examina-tions. For that reason if the tions. For that reason if the condition is not resolved, I think it is best to see a specialist in ear, nose and throat diseases and be sure that whoever examines you looks down your throat into the larynx. Incidentally, men who drink a lot and smoke are the ones at greatest risk of throat cancer.


