
Band Boys Have Fine Workout For Plainview Meet

He is a splendid es man individually, but nationally he knows little, and consequently many times the governmetal factors hat decide our flancial policies operate without either the guidance or the beck of public opinion. This is a more serious matter than might appear n the surface. Henry Ford, for example, suggests that the government issue ney backed not by the gold reserve bu by the power in the great rivers. It is contended that the security of power is more stable and beyond doubt a more cerain asset than metal. On the other hand, we find the gold worshippers who insist that the yellow meal is the only basis of national stab-Ility. Gold production, of course, is quite limited, footing up a most to a few hundred millions. But also it is a fact that the water power of the country is not an asset until it is harsed and put intelligently to work. When we come to consider the production of national wealth on which all credits must be based, we find that the farms of this country last year produced \$12,366,000,000; so that this ignoring of agriculture, this turning of the blic mind aside from the real Amerlean fundamentals means that the powers that are "monkeying with a buzz maw," playing fast and loose with the heart of the nation. J. M. GOLLEHON DIES


The community was saddened Wednesday morning when Mr. J. M. Gollehon passed away, after an illness of three weeks. Mr. Gollehon was a resident of Dimmitt several years and will be greatly missed by all who knew him. Mr. Gollehon was born Feb. 1, 1845, in Virginia, Died, April 26, 1922, in Dimmitt, Texas. The association made a vigorous ef-fort to secure additional members who would pledge themselves to pay \$100.00 each, hoping to be able to raise enough money to discharge all debts owing and to meet the note and interest about to fall vine. But owing to the unusual conditions prevailing, it was found absolutely impossible to procure new subscribers and members, although many expressed themselves as being willing to subscribe for additional shares if they could raise the money.

The interest and first note fell due and the hospital association was not able to meet them. It had now become apparent that the earnings of the hospital would afford a reasonable compensation for the services of a matron and manager, if the property could be rent free.

All of these conditions were made known to the Chamber of Commerce and the details were elaborately discussed and considered. The only possible and practical way out of the difficulty was to see if the people of the county would authorize a bond issue of \$15,000,00 and confer upon the Commissioners Court the authority to establish a county hospital, and effect this purpose by taking over the proper-

Unless a majority of the voters of the county favor this enterprise and vote for this bond issue, the hospital must

be soon closed. At this writing one hundred and thirly patients have received treatment in the institution. the Chicago Police Department for seventeen years. For seven years he was assigned to the investigations conducted by the Hull House, whose head is Miss Jane Adams. The investigation conducted by the

Chicago Crime Committee into the "Causes of Crime in Chicago" was handled by Mr. Loose. He also handled the investigation for the Chicago Vice Commission.

Much of Mr. Loose's work has resulted in legislation. The "Habit Forming Drug" investigation took the census of seventeen thousand drug users. The facts uncovered resulted in the Federal probe and the "Harrison Anti Narcotic Law" restricting the sale of habit forming drugs.

In the course of the work Mr. Loose

had many times literally to risk his ife. This was particularly true when ealing with drug addicts and the lower forms of criminals, many of whom are degenerates. Hence the five trips

to the hospital. "They never get away" is a fact that Mr. Loose emphasizes in his talk on criminals. He is a deective, not an entertainer. Seldom indeed has a lecture been given which has more of the dramatic. Yet Mr. Loose talks plain, everyday English. Many times he lapses, for illustration, into the jargon of the criminal world.
