Dancing Delayed; County Approves Budget

 Proponents of dancing at the Bull Barn were frustrated once again Monday as the County Commissioner's Court tabled action on that long-standing controversy.

due to one of the four commissioners being absent, and the court upped county taxes 17 percent as they approved the 1982-83 budget as submitted by County Auditor Alex Schroeter.
 With Pct. 3 Commissioner Bruce Coleman in Baltimore this week for a National Association of Counties Convention, the county fathers tabled action on the Bull Barn dancing question once more, citing a necessity for all four court members to be present

at a decision-making time on the question.
 Esther Dela Cruz, one of several interested citizens who attended the meeting expecting a decision, urged the court to appoint her to the "committee" which formulates the policy and rules for use of the Bull Barn should the court decide to ban dancing there.

County Judge Glen Nelson assured Mrs. Dela Cruz that her ideas and input as to the policies would be welcomed when, and if, the court needs them. Nelson said that the court may also hold a special called meeting to consider

the dancing question when Coleman returns from Maryland.
 Mrs. Dela Cruz told the court that she could not understand what was taking so long for them to make a decision, especially since a petition concerning dancing was presented to the court some nine weeks ago, and a special task force to find out the community's feelings on dancing at the Bull Barn made its report two weeks ago.

The task force reported that some 77 percent of the persons interviewed favored dancing at the county-owned facility.
 Pct. 4 Commissioner James Voyles said that he didn't think the court should rush into making a decision again and take a chance on getting something that won't work.

Mrs. Dela Cruz said that "we need this thing to be pushed... we don't need to wait any longer. If it (the policy change) is not done by September then it won't be worth it because we are working on our own hall."
 The Bull Barn space is needed by the San Jose Catholic Church, which wants to hold its annual *Fiestas Patrias* dances there. Those dances are held in September.

Clements Predicts Disaster Decision

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Gov. Bill Clements says the U.S. Department of Agriculture should fund disaster relief for weather-stricken High Plains farmers with some of the \$300 million it has earmarked for a cotton loan program.
 Under the cotton loan program, farmers trade their crops to the government in exchange for the loans, hoping prices will rise more than the amount of interest they pay.
 "There is money that we feel is available... I have my eye on it. I'm making a case for those moneys now that there's virtually no cotton to go in the loan," Clements told a group of farmers Monday.
 Farmers, businessmen and area agriculture officials are asking the federal government for an estimated \$100 million in disaster relief payments.
 Bankers estimate that up to half the area's farmers are threatened with bankruptcy because of bad weather this year and low prices last year.

At least half of this year's cotton crop has been destroyed by rain and hail, officials say.
 Clements told the farmers he expected the agriculture department to make a decision on the disaster relief by Wednesday.
 He said he was optimistic the government would approve some relief funding, but said the farmers "are not going to get 100 percent of what they want to get."
 "A series of options are available for us to use," Clements said. "It can take the form of low-interest loans on one hand or disaster grants on the other. But I think most are not interested in low-interest loans. A good many already have more loans than they can handle."
 Clements told the farmers they deserved the relief, even if their problems coincide with the federal government cutting its budget.
 "God doesn't run his calendar on the basis of the U.S. government's budget," the governor said.

Meeting the court will consider the dancing question at its July 26 meeting.
 The county fathers approved the 1982-83 budget, using

Reagan Offers Pared-Down Plan

BALTIMORE (AP) — President Reagan today offered a pared-down version of his "new federalism" plan to curb the power of a federal government that has been allowed to "mushroom out of control."

Farm Workers Urged To Work With Farmers

An outspoken church leader and a spokesman of the Texas Farm Workers Union (TFWU) urged area farm laborers to "come together to communicate with each other, understand one another's concerns, and learn to work with each other" at a rally Saturday at the old San Jose Catholic Church building.
 Amarillo Bishop Leroy Matthiesen was the featured speaker at the rally, which was attended by about 125 persons Saturday afternoon. Matthiesen, who is well known for his opposition to the Pantex Plant north of Amarillo, urged farm workers to work with area farmers to overcome their "common enemies" of big business and big government.

In a speech intended to drum up support for his revised proposal to shift control of three dozen federal programs to the states, Reagan said "significant changes have been made" in the plan.
 But he offered few details, and no specific indications of new plans to revitalize the economy.
 In a prepared speech to the National Association of Counties convention here, Reagan said he had dropped a proposed state takeover of the food stamp program as part of the "new federalism."
 He said the number of programs to be turned to the states has been reduced from nearly 50 to 35, and that 100 percent of the federal funds usually passed on to them.
 But Reagan's speech, which ran to more than 2,500 words, had few other details on the program, considered the most far-reaching restructuring of governmental initiatives since the New Deal.
 He warned that wholesale farm failures could lead to corporate ownership of huge amounts of land. The large corporations would have little concern for either the former owner of the land or the farm workers and would harm the remaining smaller growers, he said.
 Moya, West Texas Organizer for the TFWU, complained that farm workers will receive no government benefits even if farmers received disaster payments. "That's why we are here today. We've talked to the same people that the farmers talk to, and we can't

Banks' Assets Show Increase

Total assets at the two local banks were up some \$11 million dollars on June 30 over the same date a year ago according to figures released by those institutions. The two banks had a total of \$139,939,053.66 in assets, with the First National Bank showing assets of \$84,783,191.31, and Hereford State Bank showing assets of \$55,155,862.35.
 FNB's total assets jumped from \$79,770,370.58 on June 30, 1981, while HSB's assets rose from a \$48,961,075.06 figure on the same date.
 Likewise, the banks together showed increases in total deposits and net loans over the past year. First National Bank showed deposits of \$72,474,571.65 on June 30, \$4 million up from the \$68,792,686.36 the previous year. Hereford State Bank's

\$46,810,262.24 in deposits was also about \$4 million up from the \$42,179,045.25 on June 30, 1981.
 The Hereford State Bank showed a good jump in net loans for the past year, while First National showed but a slight increase. HSB showed \$33,736,060.94 in net loans over the past year, compared to \$28,656,275.80 the year before. FNB's \$47,730,529.83 in net loans this year was just above the \$47,730,529.83 in net loans this year was just above the \$47,301,502.41 a year before.
 Total deposits at both banks were \$129,284,833.89, some \$8 million above the previous year's total of \$121,971,731.61. Net loans cumulatively rose to \$81,466,590.77 this year from \$75,957,778.21 the year before.

'Miracle' Baby Is 'Just Fine'

METAIRIE, La. (AP) — The "miracle baby" who gave rescuers something to cheer about when she was pulled from the wreckage after a jetliner slammed into her family's home is doing "just fine," and appeared at a news conference with a teddy bear to prove it.
 The tiny survivor is still providing inspiration — to her relatives who are grieving the loss of her mother and sister in last week's crash.
 "It's got to be a miracle," said Gabriel Trahan, grandfather of 16-month-old Melissa Trahan. "We thought she was dead but God gave her back to us."
 Melissa, a blonde with hazel eyes who stands about 31 inches tall, met reporters Monday night with both sets of her grandparents, her doctor, and her family's pastor at East Jefferson General Hospital, where she is recovering from injuries including second-degree burns on both feet.
 Melissa's mother, Melanie, and 4-year-old sister Bridget died Friday when a Las Vegas-bound Pan Am 727 jetliner slammed into the family's home and a dozen others in Kenner, killing all 145 aboard the plane. Six others on the ground also were killed.
 Melissa, who was awakened to meet the press, carried a teddy bear with the inscription "God Loves You" on its tiny T-shirt. She fidgeted with a shiny coin and grasped at reporters' microphones.
 Her maternal grandmother, Gerry Smith, said Melissa was "fine, just fine. We are all going to make it because of her."

In addition to the foot burns, Melissa suffered minor bruises and abrasions, apparently when she fell from her bed and was trapped for two hours beneath a mattress and a carpet in the ruins of her home.
 She had been the first survivor found by rescue workers after Friday's crash. They broke into cheers and applause at the discovery.
 "She's doing fine. She's a spunky little girl who's been healing well," said her physician, Dr. Gus Colon, a plastic surgeon and burn specialist. "She'll need outpatient care and dressing for her burns."
 Melissa's only apparent discomfort is "she doesn't like it when we change her dressings," Colon said.
 He said there were unconfirmed reports that a burst water main may have soaked the child, helping her survive while the house burned down around her.
 She appeared with paternal grandparents Trahan and Joyce Trahan; maternal grandparents Melwin and Mrs. Smith; the Rev. Gene Richards, pastor of the Bridgedale Baptist Church in Metairie; and Colon.
 Her father, also named Gabriel, did not attend. The elder Trahan said his son "is in a situation that's hard to handle" and decided not to meet with reporters.

4-H'ers Active In Community Service

BY PENNY REINART County Extension Agent The 4-H motto - "make the best better" - is exemplified in the young people who excel in their achievement, citizenship and leadership projects. Activities in these programs, conducted by the Extension Service, range from sharing skills with mentally retarded youth and adults and organizing a summer program at a school for the deaf to conducting a highway clean-up campaign.

Interaction and involvement with others are stressed in the nation 4-H achievement program supported by Ford Motor Company fund, the citizenship program sponsored by The Coca-Cola Company, and the leadership program supported by Reader's Digest.

Among the most popular projects in the "Adopt a Grandparent Program," 4-H'ers not only become companions to senior citizens but also learn new perspectives from their elders. Many

senior citizens share traditional skills as volunteer leaders. Recognizing physical fitness is critical to good health, an Arizona 4-H club built a one-quarter mile jogging - exercise course that included 12 exercise areas interspersed along the track.

Upon completion, the youth gave the facility to the community for public use. In Mississippi, young people got practical citizenship experience by running the local government officers for a day. For one 4-H'er, the training she received as acting mayor convinced her that politics will not be her first career choice.

Another youth found the experiences of being the district attorney "unforgettable." Commented a local judge at the end of the day's program: "It's refreshing to see good kids. I was afraid the incentive to lead had died down. I was glad to see there are still youngsters willing to lead."

Ford, Coca-Cola and Reader's Digest provide awards and incentives arranged by the National 4-H Council, to outstanding 4-H'ers. Martin Takes No Back Seat

By WILL GRIMSLEY AP Special Correspondent MONTREAL (AP) — If there's anybody who can match Pete Rose lip for lip, kick for kick, grit for grit, it's Billy Martin. So, when Pete Rose takes the rostrum and starts telling the American League about the importance of giving not just 100 per cent — but 110 per cent — he has to reckon with Billy the Kid. Just ask George Steinbrenner, Reggie Jackson or the marshmallow salesman, Billy takes no sass from anybody.

"I don't think Pete Rose invented the killer instinct," the volatile manager of the Oakland A's said after checking in late Monday to take charge of the American League against the puffed-up National Leaguers in tonight's All-Star Game. "The killer instinct has been around a long time. When I played against the Dodgers..." He paused just long enough to let his audience reflect on those halcyon days in the early 1950s when the New York Yankees, with a scrappy second baseman named Billy

Martin, licked the Brooklyn Dodgers in three out of four World Series. "...the killer was dead." Rose, in fine fettle and chomping away on a mouthful of gum, had shaken up a noon press conference by casting a reflection on the fighting qualities of the opposing American League. The Nationals have won the last 10 straight and 18 of the last 19 in a dominance that has made the Americans somewhat paranoid. Rose had taken a cue from the AL's starting catcher and top vote-getter, Carlton Fisk, who had suggested that, after all, this was just a nice mid-season break which didn't count against anybody's personal records.

Fate Cost Stafford Championship Attempt

An AP Sports Analysis By ED SCHUYLER JR. AP Sports Writer Once the decision was announced, welterweight Roger Stafford quickly left the ring and strode purposely up an aisle toward the dressing room. He looked straight ahead, but in his mind's eye, Stafford had to be looking back. The 27-year-old was beaten Saturday by Milt McCrory at Phoenix, Ariz. But even before Stafford entered the ring, he had lost the most important decision of his career to fate. Last Nov. 7, Stafford, who had been fighting professionally and mostly winning, outpointed Pipino Cuevas, the former World Boxing Association champion, and earned a shot at the undisputed welterweight title held by Sugar Ray Leonard. Now that contract is just a piece of paper, even if Leonard fights again. The fight against Leonard was scheduled for May 14 at Buffalo, and Stafford planned to take advantage, not only of Leonard to become champion, but of his first major purse to get married. On Saturday, May 8, Leonard slipped out of Buffalo.

"I had the opportunity of my life for the undisputed championship, and it slipped right out my hands," recalled Stafford. The fight contract contained a six-month postponement clause. But Leonard might not fight again — period. Besides, Stafford couldn't sit around. He fights for a living and there were bills to be paid. There are some who might ask why did Stafford pick the unbeaten McCrory, why not fight lesser opponents and hope the fight with Leonard would happen? "I'm going to have to fight these guys (guys like McCrory and Don Curry)," said Stafford. "If I beat Milt McCrory I'll be No. 1 in the WBC (World Boxing Council) and

WBA," he said before Saturday's fight. That would have put in him in a controlling position if the title became vacant. He was ranked No. 1 by the WBA and No. 3 behind Cuevas and McCrory in the WBC. Then Stafford gave the real reason for fighting McCrory: "The network (CBS) won't buy anyone else." And the price was one that a man, who had just blown a big payday, couldn't turn down — reportedly \$175,000. It wasn't close — the 20-year-old McCrory, who stands 6-foot-1 and held a four-inch reach advantage of the 5-9 Stafford, controlled the fight and won by six points each on two official cards and five on the third. McCrory appeared on the obligatory postfight interview with the winner, and Stafford walked away — maybe from a title shot, although he doesn't lose his contender's role off one loss. It's just that now he isn't THE contender.

Leagues' Attitudes About All-Star Game Differ?

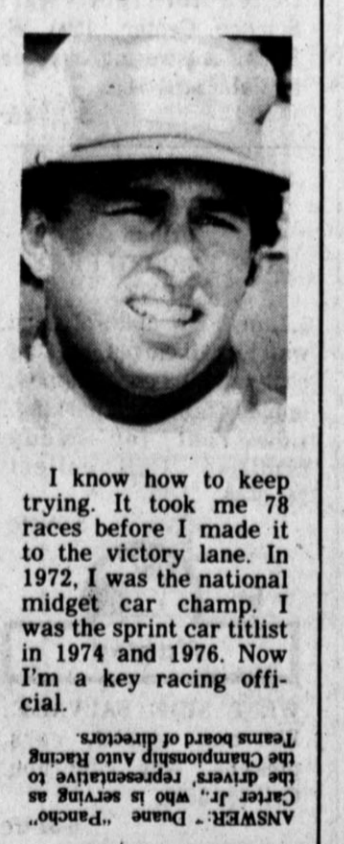
An AP Sports Analysis By JOHN NELSON AP Sports Writer Knock, knock. Who's there? Opportunity. Go away. And so it goes for the American League in baseball's coffee break, the mid-summer classic known as the All-Star Game. When the two leagues meet for the 53rd time in this clash tonight at Olympic Stadium in Montreal, the Nationals will be going for their 11th straight All-Star triumph. The NL has won 18 of the past 19 and leads the series 33-18-1. This little knock-knock joke isn't very funny anymore to American League President Lee MacPhail, who, along with all his All-Stars, must answer the same question each year. Why can't the American League win? Some believe the attitudes of the two leagues differ, the Americans being more blasé. Others have hypothesized that the National League has more depth. MacPhail called the NL streak an embarrassment and "one of the greatest miracles in sports." Can 10 in a row be an accident, a fluke? Carlton Fisk of the Chicago White Sox, nine-time AL All-Star, admits that attitude could have played a part. "I never really felt that winning or losing was the object of the All-Star Games ... maybe that is the problem," Fisk says. Pete Rose of Philadelphia, 16 times an NL All-Star, feels the Nationals have an edge in bench strength. "It's very, very even until you start to make replacements, and the American League is catching up in that aspect," Rose says. The facts seem to support Rose's theory. In its past five victories, the National League has rallied in the final four innings, long after the

starters had left. What other possible explanations are there? "Both sides have pride. There's nothing different there," says Al Oliver of the Montreal Expos, who has had a first-hand look at both sides in the All-Star dispute. "In the National League, though, I always thought there was an outward confidence among the players, all the players. Their personalities were more outgoing than in the American League. In the American League, there's

more laid-back talent. It's really strange," says Oliver, six times an All-Star, four times in the National League and twice in the AL. "The edge might just be that outwardness — more fire. Ex-Coach Reports NCAA Violations

ATLANTA (AP) — Former Georgia assistant football coach Wayne McDuffie says he broke two NCAA rules that cost the university a chance to sign a top prep player. But, he said, maybe it's best that George Smith of Coffee County, a 230-pound fullback, went to Texas A&M instead of becoming a Bulldog. "I felt he wanted to go to A&M all along," McDuffie said. "It was a case of a kid torn between what he wanted to do and what he thought he should do. "I think the whole situation is better for everybody the way things are now," McDuffie said. "I don't think George ever would have been happy at Georgia, and that being the case I don't think they would have been happy with him." McDuffie said he made an illegal visit to Smith and gave him a warmup suit — both violations of National Collegiate Athletic Association rules. "I was wrong and I regret it. I'd die if there were any

big consequences," said McDuffie, who now is a member of the Atlanta Falcons staff. "I hate that it happened," McDuffie said, "especially for Georgia people. If anybody wants a good, straight program the Georgia people do. And it all starts with Vince Dooley," head football coach and athletic director. The infractions are minor ones, McDuffie said, but "it was my responsibility to be aware of the rules and abide by them. There are rules and regulations you have to accept as a college recruiter. That's the way it is in football, the way it is in life. The little things beat you." McDuffie commented in an interview published in today's editions of The Atlanta Constitution. The first violation came Feb. 10, the first day a college is allowed to sign high school prospects to grants-in-aid under NCAA rules.
