Clements Predicts Disaster Decision

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) -Gov. Bill Clements says the U.S. Department of Agriculture should fund disaster relief for weather-stricken High Plains farmers with some of the \$300 million it has earmarked for a cotton loan program.

Under the cotton loan program, farmers trade their crops to the government in exchange for the loans, hoping prices will rise more than the amount of interest they

"There is money that we feel is available ... I have my eye on it. I'm making a case for those moneys now that there's virtually no cotton to go in the loan," Clements told a group of farmers Monday.

Farmers, businessmen and area agriculture officials are asking the federal government for an estimated \$100 million in disaster relief payments.

Bankers estimate that up to half the area's farmers are threatened with bankruptcy because of bad weather this year and low prices last year.

Clements told the farmers

he expected the agriculture department to make a decision on the disaster relief by Wednesday.

He said he was optimistic the government would approve some relief funding, but said the farmers "are not going to get 100 percent of what they want to get." "A series of options are

available for us to use," Clements said. "It can take the form of low-interest loans on one hand or disaster grants on the other. But I think most are not interested in low-interest loans. A good many already have more loans than they can handle."

Clements told the farmers they deserved the relief, even if their problems coincide with the federal government cutting its budget.

"God doesn't run his calender on the basis of the U.S. government's budget," the governor said.

An outspoken church leader and a spokesman of the Texas Farm Workers Union (TFWU) urged area farm laborers to "come together to communicate with each other, understand one another's concerns, and learn to work with each other" at a rally Saturday at the old San Jose Catholic Church building.

Amarillo Bishop Leroy Matthiesen was the featured speaker at the rally, which was attended by about 125 persons Saturday afternoon. Matthiesen, who is well known for his opposition to the Pantex Plant north of Amarillo, urged farm workers to work with area farmers to overcome their "common enemies" of big business and big government.

'Miracle' Baby Is 'Just Fine'

METAIRIE, La. (AP) - The "miracle baby" who gave rescuers something to cheer about when she was pulled from the wreckage after a jetliner slammed into her family's home is doing "just fine," and appeared at a news conference with a teddy bear to prove it.

The tiny survivor is still providing inspiration - to her relatives who are grieving the loss of her mother and sister in last week's crash. "It's got to be a miracle," said Gabriel Trahan, grand-

father of 16-month-old Melissa Trahan. "We thought she was dead but God gave her back to us." Melissa, a blonde with hazel eyes who stands about 31

inches tall, met reporters Monday night with both sets of her grandparents, her doctor, and her family's pastor at East Jefferson General Hospital, where she is recovering from injuries including second-degree burns on both feet. Melissa's mother, Melanie, and 4-year-old sister Bridget died Friday when a Las Vegas-bound Pan Am 727 jetliner slammed into the family's home and a dozen

others in Kenner, killing all 145 aboard the plane. Six others on the ground also were killed. Melissa, who was awakened to meet the press, carried a teddy bear with the inscription "God Loves You" on its tiny T-shirt. She fidgeted with a shiny coin and grasped at

reporters' microphones. Her maternal grandmother, Gerry Smith, said Melissa was "fine, just fine. We are all going to make it because of

her." In addition to the foot burns, Melissa suffered minor bruises and abrasions, apparently when she fell from her bed and was trapped for two hours beneath a mattress and

a carpet in the ruins of her home. She had been the first survivor found by rescue workers after Friday's crash. They broke into cheers and applause

at the discovery. 'She's doing fine. She's a spunky little girl who's been healing well," said her physician, Dr. Gus Colon, a plastic surgeon and burn specialist. "She'll need outpatient care

and dressing for her burns." Melissa's only apparent discomfort is "she doesn't like

it when we change her dressings," Colon said. He said there were unconfirmed reports that a burst water main may have soaked the child, helping her sur-

vive while the house burned down around her. She appeared with paternal grandparents Trahan and Joyce Trahan; maternal grandparents Melwin and Mrs. Smith; the Rev. Gene Richards, pastor of the Bridgedale Baptist Church in Metairie; and Colon.

Her father, also named Gabriel, did not attend. The elder Trahan said his son "is in a situation that's hard to handle" and decided not to meet with reporters.

Goodyear Says Farewell

To 'America'

HOUSTON (AP) - The blimp America has been retired, having ferried dignitaries and celebrities, provided bird's eye views of the World Series and Super Bowl and cruised from coast to coast for more than a decade.

The silver-and-black blimp, built by The Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co., was rolled from its hangar north of Houston on Monday for a farewell flight.

Its replacement, also christened America, made its inaugural flight around the city beside the old blimp.

Goodyear officials retired America because the blimp's 202,000-cubic-foot fabric helium bag had begun to leak, said company spokesman Al Wasilewski.

Seven-Year-Old Undergoes First Of Many Operations

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) - A 7-year-old girl badly burned when a jetliner crashed into her suburban New Orleans neighborhood is undergoing a series of operation to remove damaged skin, a hospital spokesman says.

Rachel Schultz suffered thirddegree burns over 80 percent of her body when a Pan American 727 crashed into her Kenner, La., neighborhood

Friday, killing 153 people. She was flown by helicopter to the Shriners Burn Institute here.

On Monday, doctors began removing dead tissue and replacing it with skin from her head and abdomen and allografts, or skin taken from donors to temporarily cover the damaged areas, said Tim Winkler, the hospital's director of nursing.

Winkler said the girl probably will need similar operations every day for the next week.

The girl was alert and in "very critical but stable" condition following the opertion, Winkler said. "Her attitude is fantastic," he said.

Meanwhile, the hospital issued an alert Monday for skin donations.

Tim Van Osten, techical director of the skin bank, said the hospital was asking people with relatives who recently died to donate to the skin bank to help treat the young victim.

Van Osten said donor skin would not be taken from people still alive because they would have to be hospitalized. He said two or three donors, with blood types O or A negative, were needed for skin grafts.

The trail is designed for horses and climbs at a steady 15-to-30 degree slope most of the way to the top, Sevy said.

Climbing with Rogers were Dave Kiley, 29, of Los Angeles, Bobby Leyes, 30, of Raleigh, N.C., and Joe Moss, 32, of Dallas. Moss lost his legs in the Vietnam war and the other climbers are paralyzed from accidents.

Early in the trip, Moss' mobility outside his chair and his strong arms were proving handy. Several times, Moss climbed down out of his chair and, "walking" on his hands, pushed or pulled the other climbers over rough spots in the trail.

Park rangers, journalists and a film crew swelled the ranks of the hikers to a dozen along the trail, but the

Prowler In Queen's Bedroom Starts Security Shake-Up

LONDON (AP) — The prowler who crept into Queen Elizabeth II's bedroom and awoke her was brandishing a broken bloody ashtray and had secretly visited Buckingham Palace 12 times, British newspapers said today.

The front-page reports in the tabloids Daily Express and Sun were published after officials promised a shake-up of what they called "disgracefully lax" security at the royal residence.

Police say Michael Fagan, a 31-year-old drifter, evaded 43 soldiers, 24 police, 350 palace staff, dog patrols, surveillance cameras and electronic listening devices to enter the queen's bedroom.

Whitelaw, responsible for security for the royal family, told Parliament on Monday that the incident occurred early Friday. He praised "the calm way" the 56-year-old monarch reacted, but gave no

other details. Whitelaw said he was "shocked and staggered" by the breach of palace security - the fifth reported in a year.

unidentified sources. The Sun today quoted the intruder's family as saying he had made at least 12 night visits to the palace and seemed to think of the queen as his "girlfriend."

Government spokesman Lord Elton told the House of Lords on Monday the intruder was the same man charged last Saturday with a June 7 palace break-in.

Fagan, barefoot and wear-Home Secretary William ing a dirty T-shirt and blue jeans, was accused in magistrates' court of stealing a half bottle of wine from the palace. No mention was made at in court of the bedroom incident. He is being held awaiting trial at London's Brixton prison.

The Daily Express said the intruder got into the palace from a courtyard by climbing a drainpipe, moving a wire screen and climbing through a window leading to the royal family's private apartments.

'Resign To Run' Ruling Goes Back To Courts

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Attorney General Mark White says he will wait for the courts to rule on whether a recent U.S. Supreme Court decision means several Texas officeholders running for other offices have inadvertently resigned their posts or are ineligible candidates.

White had said he would issue an opinion in the case, but in a statement released Friday, he said he could not because of lawsuits filed by two affected candidates.

Earlier this month, the high court upheld the constitutionality of two Texas "resign to run" laws that said certain officeholders who have a year or more remaining in their terms automatically resign their posts if they run for another office.

Another provision upheld by the court says paid officeholders are not "eligible" for the Legislature during their current terms.

Lower courts had held otherwise, and several candidates ran for office on the presumption the lower court rulings would stand.

Harris County Sheriff Jack Heard, who ran for Houston mayor, and Bexar County Court Judge Caroline Spears, who won the Democratic

nomination for district judge, filed suit to stop enforcement of the law.

Heard had two years remaining in his term when he ran unsuccessfully for mayor last year. Spears announced her candidacy with more than a year left in her term, which is up in January.

Republican Secretary of State David Dean on Friday criticized White, Democratic nominee for governor, for "avoiding" issuing an opi-

Dean had sought White's opinion on whether officeholders whose current terms overlap with that of the legislative seat they seek are ineligible candidates, or whether simply declaring candidacy during their current term disqualifies them from running.

Dean also said it was up to White to declare sitting officeholders affected by the "automatic resignation" provision out of a job.

"I note that you, after several attempts, succeeded in not only having a lawsuit filed over the 'resign to run' provision of the Texas Constitution," Dean wrote White in a letter Dean released Friday, "but also having yourself named as a party to the lawsuit so you might avoid ruling on the question of whether or not certain officeholders had vacated their office under the 'resign to run' provision."

White responded with a press release later Friday saying he would not "give official opinions on any issue pending before the courts" because it would be 'presumptuous' and because a court decision would usurp his opinion

anyway. "Anyone who has any familiarity with either the law or with state government should be aware of these facts," White said.

53rd annual All-Star Game. A capacity crowd of almost 59,000 fans will jam handsome Olympic Stadium to watch the annual mid-season confrontation between the

'We're gonna win this time," pledged fiery Billy Martin, manager of the AL

If they do, it will be the first time since 1971 when a home

runs by Reggie Jackson, Harmon Killebrew and Frank Robinson led the AL to a 6-4 victory at Detroit. Killebrew and Robinson have long since retired but Jackson, elected as the starting right fielder in the fan balloting, will bat cleanup for the AL stars

California slugger with quality hitters. Kansas City third baseman George Brett will bat third and first baseman Cecil Cooper of Milwaukee, replacing injured Rod Carew of California, hits No.5.

Oakland's Rickey Henderson, on a record-shattering stolen-base pace with 84 swipes in 88 games, leads off,

followed by Fred Lynn of California. Behind Cooper, Martin has shortstop Robin Yount of Milwaukee, second baseman Bobby Grich of California and catcher Carlton Fisk of Chicago. Dennis Eckersley of Boston will be the starting pitcher.

Steve Rogers of Montreal. the NL's starting pitcher, winced when the AL lineup was recited.

"It's a quality ballclub," he said. "I breathed a sigh of relief that Rod Carew wasn't in the lineup. But putting in Cecil Cooper ... the last few years I've faced him, it's been like batting practice for

NL Manager Tom Lasorda of Los Angeles will lead off with Montreal speedster Tim Raines in left field followed by first baseman Pete Rose of Philadelphia, appearing in his 16th All-Star contest.

"I don't do too good in these games because I might bat two or three times and see different pitchers," said Rose, who is No.2 on the alltime hit list but only batting .226 in previous All-Star Games. "I have a lot of trouble with pitchers I have't

Then, turning to Eckersley. he added, "So you have a chance, Dennis, but if you are going to be thinking about me, Raines will be on third base before you look up."

Montreal's Andre Dawson in center field bats third for the NL followed by third baseman Mike Schmidt of Philadelphia and Montreal catcher Gary Carter, who led

all players in the fan balloting with 2,785,407 votes. Atlanta's Dale Murphy will hit sixth with shortstop Dave Concepcion of Cincinnati, second baseman Manny Trillo of Philadelphia and Rogers completing the starting lineup.

The losing streak has the AL perplexed. The Americans once led this series 12-4 but they've lost 18 of the last 19 and trail overall 33-18 with one tie.

"The press has done so much to blow up the losing streak that it's become more important to win," said Martin. "That's the attitude I'm going to take this year - to go out and win it."

Brett smiled at the mention of the streak.

"I'm only 0-6," he said. 'Some of these guys are 0-10."

Martin is 0-2, the losing manager in 1977 and 1978. Lasorda on the other hand, takes a perfect 2-0 All-Star mark into the game, winning in 1978 and 1979.

"I want the streak to continue," said Lasorda. "I expect them to play with the intensity to win. I remember my first year as a coach under Sparky Anderson. I was amazed at the desire and will the National League players have to win."

That was 1977, when the Nationals won 7-5 at Yankee Stadium, scoring two runs in the bottom of the ninth inning for the victory. That started a string of five games in which the National League has come from behind to win.

In 1978 at San Diego, it was four runs in the bottom of the eighth that produced a 7-3 NL triumph in Lasorda's first year as an All-Star manager. In 1979 at Seattle, again with Lasorda managing, the Nationals scored a run in the eighth to tie the game and another in the ninth to win it. 7-6. In last year's game at Cleveland, it was a two-run eighth that built a 5-4 victory.

"It always seems we wind up losing in the last few innings," said Fisk, the AL catcher. "I never thought the importance of this game should

be put on winning or losing." Three members of the original 1982 AL team -Jackson, Carew and Boston's Carl Yastrzemski - played in the 1971 game at Detroit.

That game was made particularly memorable by Jackson's pinch home run, a towering shot off a generator box atop Tiger Stadium, one of the longest balls ever hit in All-Star history. Martin was the AL's first-base coach and the NL Manager in that game was Anderson, serving as a coach under Martin on this year's AL team.

Faced with the prospect of parting with draft picks, team owners have been reluctant to sign free agents and there has been virtually no movement of players by that route. Only one free agent whose signing required compsensation, Norman Thomas, a cornerback who went from the St. Louis Cardinals to the Baltimore Colts in 1977, changed teams under the present system.

One the other hand, when such highly-rated free agents as Chicago Bears' star running back Walter Payton played out their contracts, no other teams made serious attempts to sign them.

Now, however, free agency has taken a backseat to the union's new tact, demanding that salaries and benefits be based on a fixed percentage of the gross — 55 percent is the figure most often mentioned. The owners are united in rejecting that concept.

The NFLPA says it will not allow players or their agents to discuss contracts with the teams after July 15 - unless a new agreement is reached. But the union also will not negotiate for those players. 



NEW YORK (AP) - It's been a year since Peter Gimbel set out to probe the wreck of the Andrea Doria, but his film documentary on the expedition is still in the cutting room and the luxury liner's safe sits unopened in a tank at the New York Aquarium.

Gimbel, a department store heir who has spent most of his

adult life going on adventures and making films about them, said Monday his documentary should be finished in mid-August and broadcast this fall.

Whoever buys the rights to the 90-minute documentary also gets to televise at its conclusion the opening of the Bank of Rome safe Gimbel retrieved from the wreck.


