## Reinauer isn't quitting

"Despite some of the rumors that have been going around, I've never changed my mind one iota about growing grapes and the potential for the wine in Reinauer. Reinauer. Since he helped initiate the wet-dry lectien election of just more than a year ago, Reinauer said some people have Reinauer said some people have been saying he wasn't really going to have a winery been saying he wasn t really going hove a winery. The plant is located north of town on US 385 , just south north of town on US-385, just south of the Texas Highway Department the Texas Highway Department building. building. "We've "We've been testing the grapes every day and it appears the sugar every day and content will be right to try our first crush crush of grapes by Monday," Reinauer said Friday. He entimates Reinauer said Friday. He estimates the first year's harvest of grapes at roughly the first year's harvest of grapes at roughly 15 to 20 tons. .e he has four growers signed up in addition to his growers signed up in addition to his vineyard. vineyard. Dependin Depending on the quality of the grape crop, Reinauer thinks the first grape crop, Reinauer thinks the first bottles with the La Escarbada label might be appearing early next year. "I may be a little too hopeful, but we could have some by Christmas if the could have some by Christmas grapes are of superior quality," grapes are of superior quality." He will not bottle the wine this yea in his Hereford winery. Instead, he will haul the juice to another winery and lease the time for bottling his wine. He received all his other equip wine. He received all his other equip- ment a couple of weeks ago from Napa, Cal., and has been busy getNapa, Cal., and has been busy get- ting everything ready for the first "If I had decided to import juice from California, I could already have some ,wine under La Escarbada label," said Reinauer. He explains that he decided against that course that he decided against that course when he heard "rumbles" from other Texas wineries. "I have a contract with the Texas Department of Agriculture for a blend of imported juices provided that the wine is at least 80 percent Texas juice. I don't know if $I$ will use that option or not." Reinauer explains that quality is the all-important factor of the grapes. "The first year is always the least production year and the less superior quality, but we still have high hopes for our quality this first year. His best producer this year ap- pears to be the red Zinfandel grape. The only other variety that he will have in abundance is the Chenin Blanc for white wine. Reinauer said his grapes and those of the other growers are all varietals-that is there are no hybrids. The varietals bring a better price rewaer said he is paying his of a Lubbock winery. Prices on the varietals range from about $\$ 575$ to 1,200 a ton delivered to the winery, said Reinauer. The price varies on the sugar content and quality of the (S

If that question was posed in a survey of county citizens, we think the majority might choose the repository. That choice will not be offered, of course, but it serves to suggest the outrage which citizens have over the actions of the TRLA.
"Created to help poor people, the Legal Services Corporation instead has been pushing its own polititical agenda and evading efforts to reform it." That's a quote from an article titiled "Tax-Paid Lawyers Versus the Taxpayers" in the July issue of The Reader's Digest.
The legal service programs are part of an agency created by Congresss in 1974 to ald poor people who have problems with civil law. There are now more than 300 of these programis anvices Corporation.
While the Reader's Digest article points out that While the Reader's Digest article poins out trat many poor peop, $t$ hadd that Congressional critics-led by Sen. Orrin Hatch (R-Utah) and Sen. Jeremiah Denton ( R -Ala.)-charge the LSC lawyers have also diverted millions of dollars to lobbying and partisan political activities, even though these actions are specificaly forbidden by the LSC charter.
"Furthermore, ciftics say that many ISC officials have used various "test cases' to change public policies that should be determined by elected representatives. Such cases are very lengthy and very costly, and the taxpayers often end up paying both to bring the suti and to defend against.
Why is our tax money being spent for such litigation? The article states the congressional critics say the answer to that question lies in the poiitical radicalism officials involved in the legal services programs. Public officiais have been stymied in trying to hold ple, when five U.S. Senators sued the ISC in 1981 pilleging violations of Congressional restrictions against tax-funded poiltical activities, a federal judge ruled that under its charter, ISC is responsible for policing itself an no outaiders have the right to in terfere.
What can be done to get the LSC back on track? The Reader's Digest article says senate committee hear ings point to these needed reforms:

1. Make ISC a federal agency. Establishing it as a private, non-profit corporation was supposed to in sulate it from poiltics buty, instead, it has become in sulated from accountability.
2. Rewrite the LSC charter to close loopholes and include penalties for violating it.
3. Restore authority over the program to the 4. Expand programs offering delivery of service through private lawyers
4. Eliminate the national support centers, many of which have largely become centers for political activism.
If you agree with these proposals, you might write Senators Hatch and Denton in Washington, D.C.

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## Horse handling determines learning ability

LUBBOCK - How much a horse is earning ability, according to a researcher at Texas Tech University. Animal Sclence Professor James hat becomes accustomed to humans arly in life, should be better able to cope with new learning situations. Heard's research has not only been aboratry, but his results have also been cowboy tested.
"You don't want to handle a young horse so much that it becomes a pet, around people, well mannered an accepting of new situations," Heird
said.
Horse learning ability studies are elatively new but have become popular as the demand for more veraid. "The increased popularity of
orses is evident by the fact their numbers have tripled in the last 20 years," Heird said. "But now people want horses to be more than strong
and obedient, they want their horses to be athletic and able to learn new things quickly."
Heird's learn
Heird's learning tests were inspired, in part, because the eariy
management of horses varies so greatly. Some horses allowed to run rree on large ranches have virtually no interaction with humans until it is time to train them. Others, raised on
breeding farms, receive intense breeding farms, receive indenent and routine handling from birth, he said. In two separate maze tests, Heird ly not only had increased learning ability, but were less emotional. The horses tested were handled in varying degrees from not at all to as
much as five hours per week. much as five hours per week.
Those horses handled intermitt ly showed the most progress and greatest degree of learning. Those horses handled a great deal showed a
high degree of learning ability but high degree of learning abiity, but
tended to make more mistakes later in the test because they became bored with the task. Horses that had not been handied were poor learners easily distracted

An important step in ensuring that a child has proper nutrition is establishing meal patterns, McPher-
