## PLO Stronghold Under Siege A

Israeli tanks and armored troops rolled into west Beirut today, other units battled toward the PLO stronghold from the north and south, and artillery and gunboats hammered Yasser Arafat's guerrilla enclave from all sides in furious barrages that continued after 15 hours.

At least 50 people were killed and 730 wounded in the attack and the toll was expected to rise sharply, initial police reports cited by Lebanon's state radio said. The broadcast said most of the victims were civilians.

Israel said its forces suffered 20 soldiers wounded. two seriously, before the attack, and that as a result of the assault its armor captured a strip 60 yards deep and 600 yards long on a northsouth axis along the Green Line dividing guerrilla-held west Beirut from Christiancontrolled east Beirut.

Arafat called on every able Palestinian to take up arms and defend west Beirut, and President Elias Sarkis appealed to President Reagan to stop the fighting and protested "what is happening in Beirut where innocent civilians are being subjected to mass killing and destruction."

Reagan's top advisers met in Washington to discuss the assault, which White House

spokesman Larry Speakes said "makes virtually impossible the conduct of diplomatic efforts. We have expressed our profound concern to the government of Israel."

The Israeli military command said it had not launched "an all-out attempt at conquering the city" and the attacks were to show Israel "will not play the game by PLO-set rules.

It appeared the Israeli thrust was concentrated on the no man's land between the city's Moslem and Christian sectors, the seaport on the northern edge of the Palestine Liberation Organization redoubt in west

The Israeli attack, which began about midnight (6 p.m. EDT) and shattered the ninth cease-fire in two months of fighting, was covered by intense shelling.

"Hundreds of shells burst within yards of each other and within seconds, the entire southern belt of west Beirut was shrouded in smoke and flames," Associated Press correspondent Terry Anderson said of one 10-second Israeli barrage.

A letter from two lawyers to Dr. Robert Bernstein, state health commissioner, states that processing the out-ofstate waste violates state law.


Bernstein responded that he "had no quarrel" with ask-

ing Attorney General Mark White to interpret the law. As the health department interprets the law, Bernstein said, the state cannot regulate privately owned processing facilities by interfering in interstate commerce.

The letter from Austin lawyer Richard Lowerre and Houston lawyer James Blackburn states that the 1981 Legislature amended the Radioactive Materials Control Act to prohibit the processing of out-of-state nuclear waste

It is our position that the language (in the law) clearly applies to any private or publicly owned disposal or processing facility," the letter said.

"If the health department won't help us, we will ask Gov. (Bill) Clements. If he won't help, we'll ask Attorney General (Mark) White. If he won't help, we'll ask the courts," said Rossi.

## **Budget Vote Expected**

WASHINGTON AP - A proposed constitutional amendment requiring the government to live within its means is being jeopardized by the Senate's decision to tack on new restrictions on the national debt.

The Senate was expected to take a final vote today on the

balanced budget amendment sought by President Reagan.

But those on both sides of the issue said its fate was thrown in doubt by the Senate's unexpected 51-45 vote Tuesday adding a provision to make it harder for Congress to raise the national debt ceiling.

## Trapeze Artist Injured

DALLAS (AP) - Circus spokesmen say the stunt is one of the most dangerous in the Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey show - trapeze artist Gino Farfan flies through the air, somersaults 3½ times and grabs his father's legs.

But the athletic display of skill and timing turned into an accident Tuesday night before 15,000 people. Farfan slipped, collided with his father Armando Farfan, fell into a net and lay unconscious for several minutes.

"He fell head first into the net," said Tim Holst, performance director for the circus. "There was blood. There were some lacerations on the back of his neck." Farfan, who has been with

the circus for nine years, was rushed to the Baylor University Medical Center. A paramedic at the scene said he had a head injury, possibly a fracture of his skull or some

Doctors at Baylor were examining Farfan late Tuesday night to determine the extent of his injuries, said hospital night administrator Wilbur Smith.

Against Nuclear Freeze

#### Reagan Rallies Support freeze and setting an initial

WASHINGTON (AP) -President Reagan is trying to rally members of Congress to help fight a nuclear freeze proposal he says would perpetuate "dangerous inequalities in the nuclear balance."

The president summoned a group of Republican and Democratic members of Congress to the White House today, anticipating a close vote on the proposal to seek a freeze of nuclear weapons at current levels.

To help make his case. Reagan also invited Secretary of State George P. Shultz, Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger and Gen. John Vessey, the new chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

"The president wanted to demonstrate his continuing interest and the importance of this vote," said deputy

White House press secretary Larry Speakes, aboard Air Force One as the president returned to Washington from a two-day trip to Iowa and Connecticut.

While the president was on his way home, the White House made public a letter he wrote to Rep. Melvin Price, D-Ill., chairman of the House Armed Services Committee.

He said that the proposal advanced by Rep. Clement Zablocki, D-Wis., chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, "Will undermine our negotiating position with the Soviets" during the strategic arms reduction talks under way in Geneva by "placing the United States in a dangerous position of disadvantage and removing the incentive for serious negotiation by the Soviets."

"I hope you will urge your colleagues to reject this proposal," Reagan said to Price, urging support for a competing Republican plan that he said would "show the Soviet Union that the Congress supports our effort to accomplish meaningful arms reductions."

The Democratic bill, which has the backing of House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill. D-Mass., is expected to go to the House floor later this week. It calls in effect for an immediate freeze of all nuclear weapons systems as well as for formal approval of the Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty negotiated by the Carter administration but never ratified by the Senate.

Reagan has rejected that SALT II treaty but has said he would abide by its terms as long as the Soviets do.

#### Singer-Evangelist's Wife Pledges To Carry On

LINDALE, Texas (AP) - The widow of singer-evangelist Keith Green says she plans to publish some of her husband's recent songs and write his biography so people can grasp the "vision and burden" of his

Green and 11 other people died last week in a fiery plane crash near this East Texas town, about 90 miles east of Dallas.

Melody Green, speaking with reporters Tuesday for the first time since Green and two of their children were killed, said she and other followers at the Last Days Ministries plan to carry on with her husband's work.

She described her husband as a 'man who loved God and wanted the will of God in his life more than anything else.

"He wanted to make a difference in this world," Mrs. Green said. "He had a burning love and zeal for his work."

#### North Dallas Block Evacuated After

#### Gas Main Leak

DALLAS (AP) - About 30 North Dallas residents were allowed to return to their houses after being evacuated because of a natural gas mainline that was accidentally cut, fire officials said.

The residents from 14 houses were evacuated Tuesday afternoon when a worker cut the four-inch line while digging a swimming pool.

Firefighters and repair workers from the Lone Star Gas Co. clamped off the leak at 5:15 p.m., more than two hours after the line was cut by the backhoe operator.

One firefighter was overcome by gas fumes at the scene and was treated with oxygen, said Fire Department spokesman Bill Jernigan.

#### New Freight Container Announced make these six containers available to customers for

Development of a revolutionary new freight container for use in intermodal loading with a variety of protransportation has been anducts so we can accumulate nounced by Larry Cena, experience in actual president and chief executive officer of Santa Fe Railway, Chicago.

Cena said the company's goal was to develop a versatile container capable of improved equipment utiliza-tion and fuel efficiency. The 45-foot long prototype was fabricated from fiberglass to reduce weight, and has an aerodynamic exterior shaped approximately like a block letter "A". The unique container has been designed to be stacked two-high aboard Santa Fe's "Fuel Foiler" train. The two "legs" of the container straddle the "Fuel Foiler's" center sill and ride just above the rails, thus achieving a low center of gravity.

Cena said the "Fuel Foiler" container can accommodate up to 55 tons of bulk commodities or palletized packaged goods, and could easily be modified to handle liquids. "We do not expect that the 'Fuel Foiler' will make obsolete standard rectangular containers," he said, "but it has a good potential for meeting specific needs of certain shippers. A good example would be shipment of grain or coal to the Orient and manufactured goods on the return, thus achieving excellent utilization," he stated.

The prototype container is fitted with a trough hatch at the top for loading bulk materials, and gates at the bottom of each leg for speedy unloading. A grated deck inside allows bulk materials to flow through easily, and yet provides a level support for package goods. Standard forklift trucks can be driven inside.

"Development of the 'Fuel Foiler' represents a total systems approach to transportation," Cena noted. "Our plan was to develop a system to meet needs not being satisfied with conventional equipment." He noted that Santa Fe has also developed a special chassis to transport the container on rubber tires.

The new container incorporates excellent aerodynamic characteristics, Cena noted. In addition, when loaded aboard the "Fuel Foiler" rail cars there will be a minimum void between containers. This greatly reduces wind drag experienced from the open space between conventional containers, he said.

"Fuel Foiler" containers can be stacked six-high aboard ship or in staging areas. When in rail service they would be stacked twohigh when empty or loaded with light materials, but would not be double-stacked with bulk materials.





## Attorney Convicted In Poison Plot

HOUSTON (AP) - A prominent lawyer could be imprisoned up to 20 years for plotting to poison his crippled wife, who said she "begged and pleaded" with him to help her commit suicide.

William A. Chanslor Jr., 50. and his partly paralyzed wife, Sue, 42, hugged Tuesday after he was found guilty of conspiracy to murder and solicitation to murder. She wept during the embrace. He then wheeled her from the courtroom.

Chanslor had claimed he tried to obtain a lethal, almost untraceable poison because his wife, confined to a wheelchair since suffering a stroke in 1979, begged him to help her kill herself.

Prosecutors claimed in closing arguments that Mrs. Chanslor wanted to die because her husband showed no love for her, not because of physical pain.

'She had become a yoke and a burden on him," Assistant District Attorney Jim Lavine. "It was a mission of mercy - not for his wife, but for himself."

A state district court jury of seven men and five women deliberated for 21/2 hours Tuesday and found Chanslor guilty. Before delivering the verdict, the jurors listened twice again to tapes on which Chanslor told the man he seeking poison from that his wife would never commit

After polling the jurors on their verdict, McSpadden allowed the Chanslor to enter the spectator area of the courtroom and hug his wife. Chanslor, a founder and deacon of the Westbury Christian Church, refused to comment on the verdict as he and his wife left.

"Mrs. Chanslor is very upset and since the trial is still in progress, I have advised them not to make any statement," said defense attorney Robert C. Bennett.

"We are very upset and we don't agree with it," Bennett said about the verdict, "but that is something you learn to live with."

Defense lawyers admitted Chanslor solicited and bought two capsules he believed contained the deadly poison, but said he did so only because his wife wanted to commit suicide.

"Bill Chanslor never intended to murder his wife," Bennett had said in summa-

In testimony, Mrs. Chanslor acknowledged she said shortly after her husband's arrest that she had not asked him to help her kill herself. But she said she had made that statement because she did not believe authorities when they told her Chanslor was in jail.

Lavine, the prosecutor. said the "turning point" of the trial was Chanslor's own "unbelievable and inconsistent" testimony.

"I don't think his story was believable. He admitted to giving false statements to police and then was actually caught in a false statement to the jury. Once that was brought home to them in final arguments, I think that may have turned the tide," said

Prosecutors said that Chanslor, using the alias John G. Thompson, met with John Minnery, the author of a series of books entitled, "How To Kill," to obtain ricin, a deadly, hard-to-trace derivative of the castor bean.

Minnery, who Chanslor said referred to himself as 'Dr. Death," reported the request to police, who assigned an undercover detective to the case.

Chanslor was arrested April 21 outside a Houston hotel, carrying two marked capsules of what he believed to be ricin three times stronger than needed to kill a 200-pound cow. The pills actually were Vitamin C. \_

Before returning the verdict, jurors twice listened to secretly taped conservations between Chanslor, Minnery and undercover agent Keith Symons at a Toronto restaurant.

On the tape, Chanslor said to the two men that his wife would never commit suicide and told them, "The bitch is

really getting to me." Chanslor testified that he had talked that way because he thought the people he was meeting with were hardened killers and he wanted them to think he was like them.

## Defense Seeks To Suppress Eavesdropping Information

(AP) - Government lawyers are trying to prove FBI agents complied with wiretap laws in court-approved electronic eavesdropping in the investigation of the 1979 murder of U.S. District Judge John H. Wood Jr.

Defense attorneys have moved to bar from evidence tape recordings and transcripts of jailhouse conversations involving Jamiel "Jimmy" Chagra, 39; his wife, Elizabeth, 29; his brother, El Paso attorney Joseph Chagra, 35; and Charles V. Harrelson, 43, the man charged with shooting Wood on May 29, 1979.

The electronic eavesdropping, which defense attorneys said was illegal, took place in late 1980 and early 1981 during a massive investigation that resulted in the indictment of six people on April 15.

More testimony was expected today from organized crime expert Michael Defeo of the Justice Department. Defeo presided over the bugging of Jimmy Chagra's con-

> Chief U.S. District Judge William S. Sessions is to rule on the admissibility of the tapes at the end of the pretrial hearing, which began Monday.

Among 45 issues Sessions is to decide are defense motions to disqualify him from presiding at the Sept. 28 trial because Wood was his colleague, for changes of venue for all six defendants, and for severing the cases and trying them separately.

Jimmy Chagra is charged with paying Harrelson \$250,000 to shoot Wood because Chagra feared Wood would sentence him to life imprisonment on a 1979 narcotics charge. After Wood was killed, Sessions tried the case and sentenced Chagra to 30 years without parole.

Jimmy Chagra and Harrelson, serving 40 years on separate state offenses, are

charged with murder of a federal judge, punishable by mandatory life prison terms. Harrelson served a 15-year sentence for the 1968 kill-forhire slaying of Texas grain

dealer Sam Degelia Jr. The pair, Joe Chagra and Elizabeth Chagra are accused of conspiracy to murder Wood and to obstruct justice.

Harrelson's wife, Jo Ann, 41, was indicted on charges of perjury and conspiracy to obstruct justice. Elizabeth Chagra's father, Leon Nichols, 51, is accused of income tax evasion in the investigation.

Defeo testified Tuesday that FBI agents bugging the visiting room at Leavenworth were careful to excise from the tape recordings any conversations involving attorney-client or husbandwife privilege.

The Justice Department attorney said the precuations were relaxed only one time, and that was after agents recorded a Nov. 8, 1980, conversations between the

Wood's killing allegedly was discussed.

The Chagras talked about "Joe's effort to retrieve the weapon used to kill Judge Wood" and the conversation promptly was reported to FBI agents investigating Wood's murder, Defeo testified.


Also Tuesday, Sessions warned the dozen attorneys representing the six defendants not to talk to news reporters. He reminded them a letter he sent them at the outset imposing a gag rule.

Sessions introduced into evidence recent news articles from The Dallas Morning News and Dallas Times Herald and scolded Harrelson's lawyer, Tom Sharpe Jr., for remarks attributed to him.

The judge noted all six defendants were requesting a change of venue because of pre-trial publicity.

"At the same time you are adding fuel to the fire, if not gasoline, and providing the match" by talking to reporters, Sessions said.

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

The new man on the hot seat - the Yankees' third manager, this season - is Clyde King, former pilot of the San Francisco Giants and Atlanta Braves and one of five pitching coaches Steinbrenner has gone through this year in his madcap efforts to right what appears to be a sinking ship.

How long he will last is anybody's guess. After all, Steinbrenner promised Lemon a full season following last year's World Series loss to the Los Angeles Dodgers, only to fire him April 25, just 14 games into the 1982 campaign. He brought back Michael, who had been announced as the manager for

The 44-year-old Michael lasted 86 games, leaving with a 44-42 record after Lemon's 6-8 mark.

It wasn't meant to embarrass the team. That had already been done. ## FB Supports Grain Move

Chaloupka Reagan's announcement as a major step in resolving the "serious economic problems in agriculture" by permitting the U.S. to export "more grain than we have in the past."

Grain prices have been generally depressed due to an oversupply.

Wheat stocks on hand have increased by 506 million bushels in the past year. That represents a one-year increase of 15.4 percent. The price for wheat took a signifi-



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average price for wheat in June 1982 was \$3.70 a bushel, the price dipped to \$3.41 per viewed bushel this past June.

The total supply of wheat as of June was 3 billion, 784 million bushels. According to the USDA projections, the American need for wheat this year will be 872 million bushels. That means the U.S. has more than a four-year supply on hand to meet its domestic needs, which points up Chaloupka's contention that it is "necessary" for the

U.S. to export more wheat. Wheat export projections for this year are one billion. 850 million bushels.

The average prices for corn and grain sorghum, likewise, have plummeted during the past year.

The American Farm Bureau Federation contends that long-term agreements tend to limit sales.

Chaloupka observed that the Russians have historically been a "large purchaser" of American grain and that a continuation of that relation is "necessary to our economic area agriculture."

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## Corn Harvest May Be 'Whopper'

WASHINGTON (AP) - By most indications, this year's corn harvest may be another whopper, indicating a further buildup in U.S. grain supplies and more downward pressure on prices paid to farmers.

The Agriculture Department is scheduled to release its first official corn production estimate a week from today. The Aug. 11 report also will include USDA's first season estimates for soybeans, cotton and total wheat.

Procedures call for the department's Crop Reporting Board to issue production figures based on field conditions the first of the month. Thus, the production estimate of 1982 output of corn and the other crops will reflect the situation on Aug. 1.

A weekly report issued Tuesday by the government's Joint Agricultural Weather Facility, operated by the departments of Agriculture and Commerce, provided a rough idea of what to expect. It was for the period July 26 through Aug. 1.

The facility's weekly report, however, does not attempt to forecast actual production or crop yields - only the general condition of the

"Rainfall in eastern areas benefitted crops and pastures, but more is

needed," it said. "Soil moisture supplies were mostly adequate even though some shortages appeared in the northern plains, parts of the Corn Belt and Southeast."

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

Yes, I agree with your doctor that what he can do for you is limited unless you quit smoking.

There are things he might do if needed. He might want to protect you against any respiratory infections. That includes being sure you have a flu shot before the flu season begins. That is extreme-

ly important for anyone with chronic lung disease.

Anything else that can be done to aid your general health is important. That includes proper nutrition, and to the extent your condition permits some physical tion permits, some physical activity. Stretching exercis-

es for posture are important and aid chest wall function. You need to avoid all pollutants. The most important one is your cigarette but others can add to the problem.

DEAR DR. LAMB - I have been having trouble with leg cramps. For the past two years every night, around 4 a.m. I am awakened by painful cramps that last about 15 minutes. That is the end of my sleep for the

After the spasm subsides there will be a throbbing sensation in the call muscles. During the day the only time I have a cramp is from an extra strain, like stretching or reaching; then it will be in my foot.

I'm 67 and being treated for arthritis. Would potassium or some such element be lacking from my system? DEAR READER - I

would suggest that you stretch your ankle tendon every night before you go to bed. Face the wall and lean forward, putting stretch on your calf muscles. Also, put board at the bottom of the bed to hold the covers off the feet. Learn to sleep with your toes pulled up toward your shin, rather than letting the foot drop. The usual foot position with the toes down contributes to calf cramps. Wear long heavy socks at night to keep your legs warm.

You might need calcium. Many women in your age are not able to absorb calcium properly, which leads to bone problems. Or you could be low on potassium. Let your doctor check your chemistry. Perhaps you might increase your fresh fruit for potassium and fortified skim milk for calcium.

DEAR DR. LAMB - I am a 14-year-old girl and have a very embarrassing problem. I perspire a lot. My hands are almost constantly wet. I get nervous just talking to my friends. I can never shake someone's hand without my hand being wet. Whenever I even think of contact with anyone, I perspire. What can I do about this problem? Could it have anything to do with diet? I eat a fairly balanced diet. My underarms also perspire a lot. Please help

DEAR READER - A lot of people have the same complaint. For most people it is an underarm problem and that is why there is such a large market for antiper-

The problem often occurs at puberty but it can persist throughout life. The type you describe usually occurs during the daytime and not during sleep. It doesn't mean you have any underlying disease. Neither is it because of your diet, although spicy foods can cause people to

sweat. It is related to your involuntary nervous system autonomic nervous system). You don't have control over it, at least consciously.

For underarm problems.

you can use any number of the standard preparations. There isn't a dime's worth of difference among them and most contain aluminum chlorohydrate. I must say none is really effective and all leave something to be desired.

Sometimes medicines that block part of the autonomic nervous system, the same ones used to block nerves that stimulate the stomach to produce acid, will help control sweating. That may help with your palms. Your doctor might give you some to use for special occasions (Probanthine and Prantal). Nervousness releases adrenalin, which causes sweating. Inderal, which neutralizes this effect, may help some.

DEAR DR. LAMB - We have been using a coffee whitener on cereal as a cream substitute because it states on the label that it contains no cholesterol. But in one of your colur said coconut oil is worse than milk fat itself. The product we use is described as hydrogenated coconut oil and partially hydrogenated soy bean oil. You didn't say anything in your column about the latter. We also notice that coconut and palm oil are widely used in various bakery products.

DEAR READER - I'm glad you have started read-ing labels. Many coffee whiteners contain so much coconut oil that 60 percent of their calories are from saturated fat, the kind we try to avoid. An increased intake of saturated fat causes your body to produce more cholesterol. Palm oil can be equated to coconut oil. When a fat is hydrogenat-

ed, the manufacturer has added hydrogen to the fat which converts it to a saturated fat rather than an unsaturated fat. You lose the benefits of it being soybean oil or some other unsaturat-
