AUSTIN-The Executive Sec- have a part in final decisions. retary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission was notified July 30 of U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service approval of recommended mourning dove hunting regulations for Texas.

He also was advised by telegram that the fall waterfowl regulations for Texas will be approved probably on August 8.

The Federal agency has final authority over dove and water-4 0 1 0 fowl regulations since doves, 4 2 2 0 ducks and geese are migratory. It approved a 40-day mourning 39 15 19 6 dove hunting season for North Texas beginning September 1 and 28. a 40-day season for South Texas

beginning October 1. Shooting will be restricted to afternoons, beginning at 12 o'clock noon and ending at sunset. The limits are ten birds per day and ten in possession

The washington agency also approved the whitewing season as recommended by the commission for September 12, 14 and 16, shooting to begin at 4 p. m. and to last until sunset. The limit is the same as mourning doves.







Summer Swine Management Is Important

COLLEGE STATION-Neglecting the pig crop now can cause trouble this fall. Growing pigs need attention during the hot summer months if they are to be ready for the early fall market, says E. M. Regenbrecht, swine husbandman for the Texas Agricultural Extension service.

Plenty of shade, water and a balanced diet are musts for growing pigs in the summer time. But because of the rush of farm work and shortage of labor, the pigs are often not provided with even the essentials for proper growth. vided it is large enough, is en- Growing pigs also need a supple-

Regenbrecht recommends running the pigs on a legume pasture if possible. If legumes are not available, he likes sudan. Pigs on good pasture are not likely to become infested with worms and will be healthy. Protein requirements, too, can be cut in half by using pasture.

The easiest and surest way to have water in the hog lot at all times is with an automatic watering system. Pigs need much more water during the summer months and unless plenty of good, clean and preferably cool water is available at all times, they will not do good.

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
