What To Do For Dahila Mildew

Here is an answer to the many requests coming to members of the Hereford Garden club concerning the diseases of dahlias. It is prepared by Mrs. F. M. Kester, a dahlia fancier, who has had

wide experience in the cultivation and care of dahlias. Mildew seems to be giving the

most trouble to dahlia growers right' now. It usually appears sometime in July but may not be recognized as a disease until it is well advanced. Mildew attacks the lower leaves and branches first causing them to turn brown, dry up and die. It then gradually works upward, finally killing the whole plant unless effective treatment is begun in its early stages.

Regular spraying with an approved fungicide (I use Chlordane) or dustnig with wettable sulphur, is an effective control if thoroughly done so as to cover both upper and lower foliage surfaces. It should be started early in the season as a preventive rather than a cure.

If plants have already been killed, cut the tops off within a few inches of the ground. Leave tubers in the ground until after frost, then remove as usual and


