Many people ask me, "In a telephone conversation, who should end the call?"





#### Korean Vets Now To Get Combat Pay Of \$45

Combat pay of \$45 per month, retroactive to June 27, 1950, was approved as a rider to the defense department appropriation bill in the closing hours of the second session of the 82nd Congress.

The act provides for combat pay at the rate of \$45 per month for all members of the Army. Navy, Air Corps and Coast Guard for combat service in the Korean Combat Zone.

To be entitled to Combat pay during a month, the service member must have been subjected to hostile fire for not less than six days during the month while serving with a combat unit of regimental size or smaller, or in a vessel or air craft. However, if the member received incentive or special pay for aviation, submarne, parachute, medical or dental duty, etc during a month, he is not entitled to combat pay for that month.
