## Time Limit On Well Drilling Announced Here

A time restriction on drilling of irrigation wells was recently adopted by directors of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, Tom McFarland, Manager announced this week.

The amendment reads: At a regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District held on May 4, 1953, an amendment was made to a previous regulation requiring the issuance of a permit for the drilling of a water well. The Board amended its previous regulation as follows:

"All well permits issued between February 1, 1953, and May 4, 1953, will become invalid if actual drilling operations have not begun within 120 days from May 3, 1953.

All well permits issued after May 3, 1953, shall become invalid after 120 days from the date of that permit's approval by the County Committee of the County in which the well will be drilled. If actual drilling operations have not begun within the specified time.

If the applicant can satisfy the County Committee by showing sufficient evidence that the drilling of the well applied for was detained by reasons beyond his control in excess of the 120-day limit, the County Committee may, under its own motion, grant the applicant an extension for an additional 120 days."

This amendment was a suggestion made to the Board of Directors by the 65 County Committees serving in the 13 counties in the High Plains District.

## Beauty at Home

Q. How can I add softness to my hair when shampooing?

A. Try adding a half-cup of vinegar to the last rinsing water.

Q. I have trouble keeping my lipstick on. What can I do about this?

A. You can use a foundation lotion over your lips. Let dry, then paint on a thin coat of color evenly, blot it, and powder over it lightly. Then apply a second coat of color. Blot it and press a piece of fresh cotton moistened with cologne or skin tonic over your lips.

Q. What kind of eyeshadow should I use on my rather sunken eyes?

A. You would probably do better to refrain from using any eyeshadow. Try using just a little clear Vaseline petroleum jelly blended from the middle of the upper lid toward the hairline.

Q. How can I add smoothness and transparency to my oily skin?

A. Use a powder foundation of either liquid powder or cake makeup. The latter is sponged on with a damp sponge or cotton pad. The

liquid powder should be stroked on and then blotted after blending on the skin with a damp cotton pad. If the sponge or pad is dampened with skin freshener, it helps greatly.

Q. What should a woman do about her hair after other has been taken for an operation?

A. Her hair needs regular good-sense scalp aids—massage and much brushing. She should not have her hair "permanented" for several months.

Q. I am troubled with ugly-looking enlarged pores around my chin and nose. How can I treat these?

A. A very good treatment for these is frequent and regular bathing of the affected areas with a little lukewarm water and borax.

Q. What is a good external treatment for pimples on my face?

A. Bathe the face at least twice daily with pure soap and water, rinsing thoroughly with very warm and then cold water. Use lanolin as a substitute for face cream, and as little powder as possible.

Q. Is there a way I can induce more glossiness in my hair?

A. Nothing is better for adding sheen to your tresses than giving the hair a brisk towel-rubbing after the shampoo, and then spending the ensuing 10 minutes giving it a good, vigorous brushing.

Q. What can I do about "veiny" looking hands?

A. Wash them with a good, pure soap and warm water, and apply some rich hand cream, holding the hands high and stroking them down toward the wrists to encourage the flow of blood away from the hands.

Q. What is a good abdomen-reducing exercise?

A. Lying flat on floor and keeping knees stiff, slowly raise one leg at a time until it is about four inches from the floor. Then lower slowly. Keep repeating this exercise. It's good!

### Hunting Dog Comes Through-- With Litter of 13 Puppies, Value \$3,900

 Corsicana, — Hugh Drane, Corsicana sportsman, knew he could expect a lot from his hunting dog. How much he didn't know.  
 What makes the Weimaraner unique?  
 Drane's purebred Luna of Rockledge gave birth to the 13 do-colored puppies on Feb. 12. That's a pretty large litter for any breed. For a Weimaraner it's almost phenomenal.  
 The big litter presented a peculiar feeding problem immediately after birth. Luna's standard equipment fell short of accommodating that many pups at one sitting. Mama Luna kept nine of them and "farmed out" the other four to a foster mother owned by another Corsicanan, Earl Presley.  
 Now all thirteen are back home with their mother at Drane's home, ready to grow up and increase the world's supply of Weimaraners.  
 You won't find much in the dog books on the Weimaraner. It was developed in the German city of Weimar, a cultural center, early in the 19th century, by a group of noblemen who wanted a dog-of-all-trades.  
 According to Drane, and others who own them, Weimaraners are smart, easily trained, adaptable to just about any situation. They can be trained to point and flush game, to retrieve, even out of water. There are none better as watch dogs. They are tolerant of children. If that isn't enough, any Weimaraner owner can add to the list of virtues.  
 Drane isn't going in for raising Weimaraners on a commercial scale. "I'm only raising this litter in order to give Arpin a pup."  
 Leon Arpin, Drane explains, is the owner of Rockledge Kennels in Montclair, New Jersey, Luna's birthplace. Father of the big litter here is Drane's Arcady Junior Ring whose sire was the 1951 national field-trails champion.  
 One of the lesser-known breeds in this country, the Weimaraner is gaining devotees. You still can't

pick one up for a song, so to speak.  
 Drane intends to sell most of the current litter. He hasn't quoted a price, but in most places the pups would bring up to \$300 each, very young and untrained. One of them a year or more old and in a more advanced degree of training, naturally would cost more.  
 The Weimaraner is a short-haired, big-boned, rugged dog that weighs from 75 to 85 pounds. Color varies from doe, in the pups to beige in most adults. Usually there are no other color markings. About the only variation accepted is an occasional white star marking on the chest.  
 The man who introduced the

Weimaraner to the United States, Drane says, was Howard Knight of Boston, who imported a pair from Germany shortly after World War I. In 1950 there were an estimated 1,500 in America.

Ownership of a Weimaraner carries with it a lot of obligations. You must join the Weimaraner Club of America, an organization of dog owners with a rigid set of rules designed for improvement of the breed and purity of the line.

The owners must agree to destroy pups that are deformed or otherwise imperfect at birth, and to do away with pups whose ancestry on either side isn't pure Weimaraner.

## Why The New Anti-Polio Weapon, Gamma Globulin, Must Be Rationed

Upon the shoulders of health authorities has fallen a heartbreaking responsibility. These officials must decide who shall—and who shall not—receive an injection of about two tablespoonfuls of clear amber fluid called gamma globulin. The children to whom the doctors give the nod will get the best protection now available against polio's crippling paralysis.

Individuals in the age groups most susceptible to polio. Barely one million doses of gamma globulin will be available to them.

Even in the areas stricken by epidemics GG must be reserved for those most exposed to infection.

Gamma globulin is the part of human blood that contains most of the disease-fighting antibodies that every individual develops in his constant brushes against germs

and viruses. First separated in 1944 by Harvard's Dr. Edward Cohn GG became an effective weapon against measles. It has saved thousands of lives in cases of widespread liver infection, epidemic hepatitis of jaundice. Now a limited supply is ready to work its magic on polio.

In June 1952 a polio epidemic ripened in Houston, Texas. Within a week and a half a team of 30 physicians and nurses had given GG obtained from the Red Cross to 16,500 youngsters under six; another control group of 16,500 received injections of gelatin which contained no antibodies.

Then the epidemic alarm sounded in Sioux City, Iowa, and South Sioux City, Neb. The first injection team flew north and quickly gave shots to 68 percent of all kids under 11 in the areas.

Last October The Journal of the American Medical Association reported on the tests: 59 of the nearly 25,000 children in Texas, Iowa, and Nebraska who had been given gelatin came down with polio; of the 25,000 who had received GG, only 25 developed the disease.

GG isn't perfect. Its immunity wears off after five to eight weeks, and some injected children were still stricken. But in most cases their paralysis was milder than usual and in all three mass tests GG cut the paralysis rate by more than half.

To meet the shortage of GG the Red Cross agreed to raise an extra \$7,000,000. Blood-processing plants which had been working only one shift five days a week were put on round-the-clock operation.

Last February the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis allotted \$11,000,000 to purchase all the globulin commercial producers could produce by next July.

In all, after setting aside the quantity needed to fight measles and hepatitis, there will be sufficient GG for one million polio inoculations—one shot for every 46 children in susceptible age groups.

Obviously some system of allotments was essential. An eminent committee of the National Research Council devised an allocation system that would insure protection to those most in need. First claim goes to members of the immediate families of polio victims. It is hoped this will prevent multiple polio infections which last year devastated scores of unfortunate families. Even in families hit by polio, GG will not be given to anyone over 30 years old except pregnant women, who are seven times as susceptible as other people of the same age.

Next priority will be children outside the family who have had close contact with polio victims during the infectious period. This applies to all children in camps, schools, and similar institutions in which even a single case occurs.

If 1953's epidemics are as severe as last year's—with 57,000 victims—these priority groups will consume all the available GG. If early epidemics, already breaking out in southern states, prove mild, it may be possible to distribute GG a little more freely in August and September.

Physicians may make their usual charges for injections. But, since both the blood and the money to process it have been contributed by the American people, through the Red Cross and the National

Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, no one will be asked to pay for the dose itself. Families unable to afford a physician will receive free care from hospitals or health departments.

Whether or not this plan works will depend upon the coolness and the common sense of parents.

Rule No. 1. If polio strikes in your neighborhood, consult your family doctor IMMEDIATELY. Nothing is to be gained by trying to get GG injections before the polio season. The protection works only for four to eight weeks.

Rule No 2 concerns the black market. Despite every precaution, unscrupulous racketeers will undoubtedly try to peddle real or faked GG shots to worried parents. Some of them may actually succeed in obtaining real GG from last year's drugstore supplies. Any parent who may be tempted by the black marketeers should remember that such crooks will not hesitate to dilute their illicit supplies, or to pass off inert gelatin solutions as real globulin.

If these rules are violated, the limited supply of GG may be exhausted early in the season—and then the danger can be acute. For each case that needs a shot and cannot get it may start a new chain of infection.

What of the future? Must we continue to rely on a weapon which at best, affords only limited protection AFTER polio outbreak has already hit?

GG is but the first of two payoffs on the more than \$30,000,000 of the people's contributions which have been poured into polio research by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. The second and far greater payoff—a vaccine that may protect all of us as effectively as we are now protected against small-pox—lies over the horizon.

Such a vaccine has been produced in the Pittsburgh virus-research laboratories of 39-year-old Dr. Jonas Salk. Injected into monkeys, it has stimulated production of polio antibodies. When these animals were later given inoculations of live polio virus not one of them got sick.

Before the vaccine can be widely used, however, two major hurdles must be overcome. First, mass tests similar to last year's GG experiments must prove the vaccine's safety and effectiveness. Second, plants must be built to produce tens of millions of doses of vaccine. Once this has been done virus-research experts confidently anticipate that polio will become a vanishing disease. But for the next few years, we will stand in the twilight zone. We are protected in large measure—but by no means completely—by the limited yet

still wonderful magic of gamma globulin.

One in every five Americans will eventually have cancer, American Institute of Cancer Society statisticians estimate.

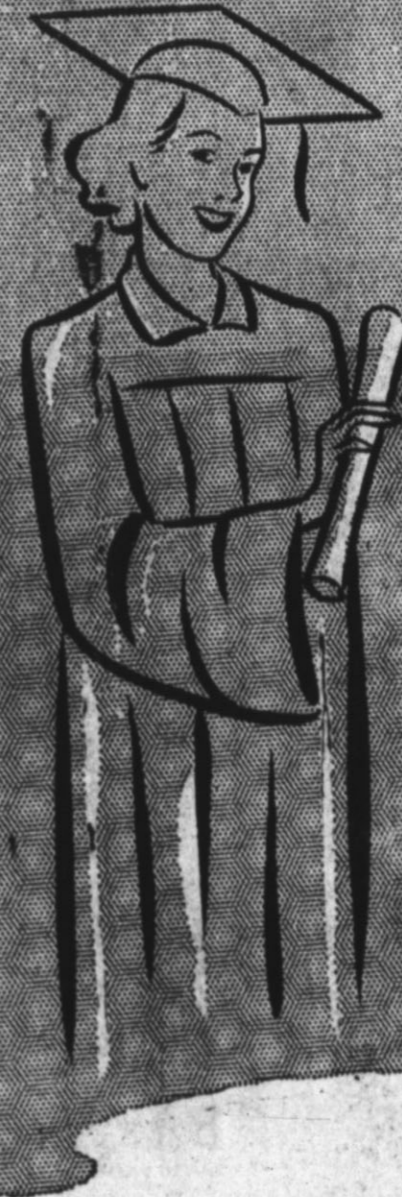


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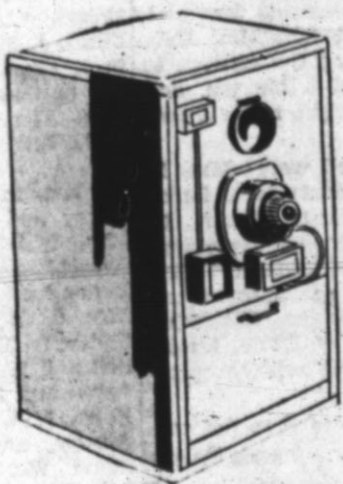

### Household Scrapbook

**The Traveling Bag**  
Shabby luggage can be renovated by giving it the following treatment. Wash with soap and water. When dry, rub thoroughly with an oiled rag. Then apply two coats of liquid shoe polish, of the desired color, followed by one coat of clear shellac. This last coat will hold the polish and give a glazed finish.

**Salt**  
Salt can be used for removing the black spots from dishes, and if placed over a fresh claret stain on the table linen the stain will be removed when laundered.

**Eggs**  
Eggs that are very dirty can be cleaned by washing them in a solution of baking soda and water, using a small vessel.

**Summer Dish Cloths**  
It is wise to keep two dish cloths in the summer. One can always be airing and sunning while the other is being used. Then there will be no danger of a sour-smelling dish cloth, which is so inclined to happen in the warm weather.

**Whipping Cream**  
If the cream is too thick for whipping, place the dish in another dish of cold water, then when chilled, place in a dish of hot water. It will whip easily.

**Window Glass**  
Mortar can be removed from window glass by rubbing with hot, strong vinegar.

**Tomato Skins**  
Use a fork for sticking holes into the bottom of a tomato, then hold it over a fire. The skin will crack and it can be peeled readily. The tomato will not be soft as it is when placed in boiling water.

**Odors**  
Odors in the refrigerator, cupboard or pantry can be removed by filling a dish with boiling water and dropping in a piece of charcoal.

**Labeling Tins**  
When putting up fruit or vegetables in tin cans, moisten the gummed label with glycerin and it will make it adhere to the tin.

**Cut Flowers**  
Cut flowers can be made to last longer if they are picked in the early morning or in the evening. Always use a sharp knife or scissors to prevent ragged edges, and a slanting cut is the best. Plunge the flowers immediately into water, and wait until they are well soaked before attempting to arrange them.

It was while she was attending Texas State College for Women at Denton, then called the College of Industrial Arts.

A proposal has been made, said Mrs. Schwartz, to consolidate friendship day with National Brotherhood Week, observed earlier in the year. The idea is to be brought up at the national assembly of the General Federation of Women's Club meeting here soon.

"I am strongly opposed to any change in the present observance of Friendship Day on March 7," Mrs. Schwartz said in an interview.

"It now commemorates her birthdate in 1837, and it recognizes her for the Christian guidance and financial assistance she gave countless young women in obtaining an education.

"She died in 1924, but her influence is felt now through the many M. Eleanor Brackenridge Clubs throughout the nation and in some foreign countries, organized to help worthy young women continue their education."

Mrs. Schwartz appeared on a Voice of America overseas broadcast marking March 7 this year as Friendship Day.

The American Cancer Society estimates that 225,000 Americans will die of cancer in 1953. More than 600 Americans die of cancer each day, American Cancer Society statistics show. An important goal of the American Cancer Society is to improve services to needy cancer patients.

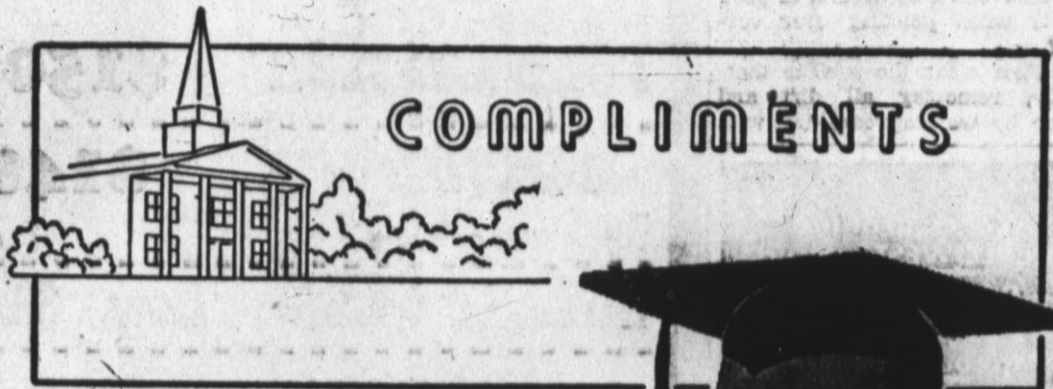

### How Can I?

Q. How can I aid digestion?

A. A good habit to acquire is to take two glasses of cold water before breakfast. This will aid considerably in digestion. However, some people prefer a glass of hot water, with or without the juice of a lemon, on arising.

Q. How can I avoid having permanent stains in garments?

A. Never press a garment that is stained, as this makes the stain permanent and it cannot be removed without professional help. The spots should be cleaned before pressing.

Q. How can I combat bed bugs?

A. Try beating together some corrosive sublimate and white of egg. Apply frequently with a feather to both bed and mattress.

Q. How can I keep parsley fresh for a long time?

A. If put into an airtight glass jar and then placed in the refrigerator it will stay green and fresh

for a long time. This is a much better way than trying to keep it in water, where it usually turns yellow within a day or two.

Q. How can I make a substitute for a shoe horn?

A. If no shoe horn is handy, lay a corner of a handkerchief into the shoe, and, grasping the remaining portion firmly, use in the same manner as a shoe horn.

Q. How can I prevent moths in a rug that is to be stored?

A. Sprinkle the rug with cayenne pepper and then roll it up in newspapers.

Q. How can I be certain of good results when painting over varnish?

A. First clean the surface thoroughly, removing all dirt and grease by washing carefully with

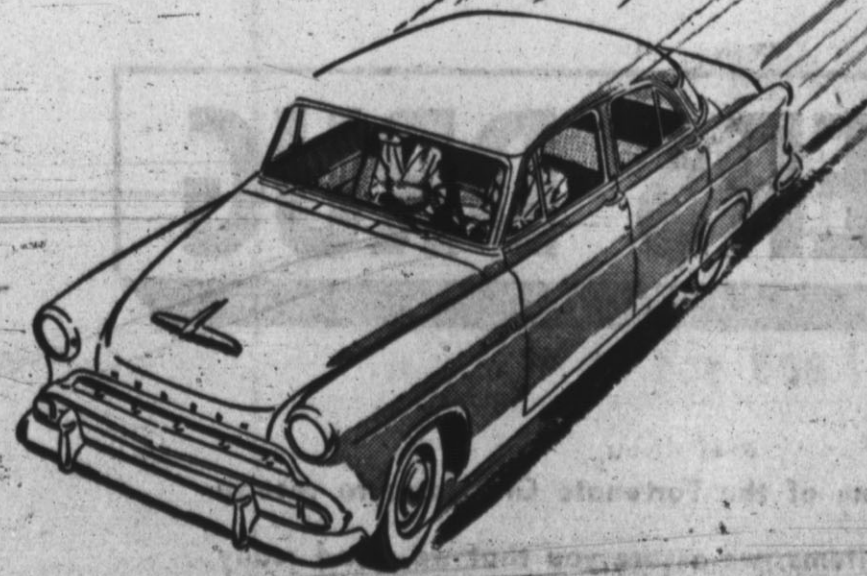
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# Northwest Hereford News

There would be a good yield from these irrigated crops, if there is no hail damage before now and harvest time.

Iron is an important nutrient needed in the diet of both the young and the old. Liver is a sure source of iron and some nutritionists say that it should be on the menu once a week.

Here is a new kind of liver dish that the Woodrow Ireland's enjoy. It is simple and easy to prepare and provides a different and interesting way of tempting the family. Here is Mrs. Ireland's recipe:

**Liver With Sour Cream**  
 1½ lbs. calf liver  
 1 medium sized onion chopped fine  
 1 cup sliced mushrooms  
 1½ cups sour cream  
 flour seasoned with salt and pepper

Have liver cut in slices ¼ inch thick. Remove skin and tubes carefully and wipe each slice with a damp cloth. Dredge in the seasoned flour.

Melt ¼ cup butter in deep skillet and brown liver and onion in skillet. When browned add mushrooms and sour cream, cover tightly and place in 350-F oven for 30 to 40 minutes. More salt and pepper may be added to suit the taste. Serves six generously.

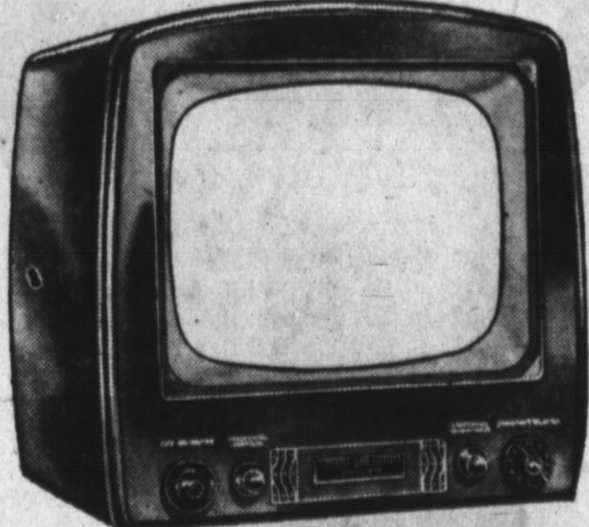

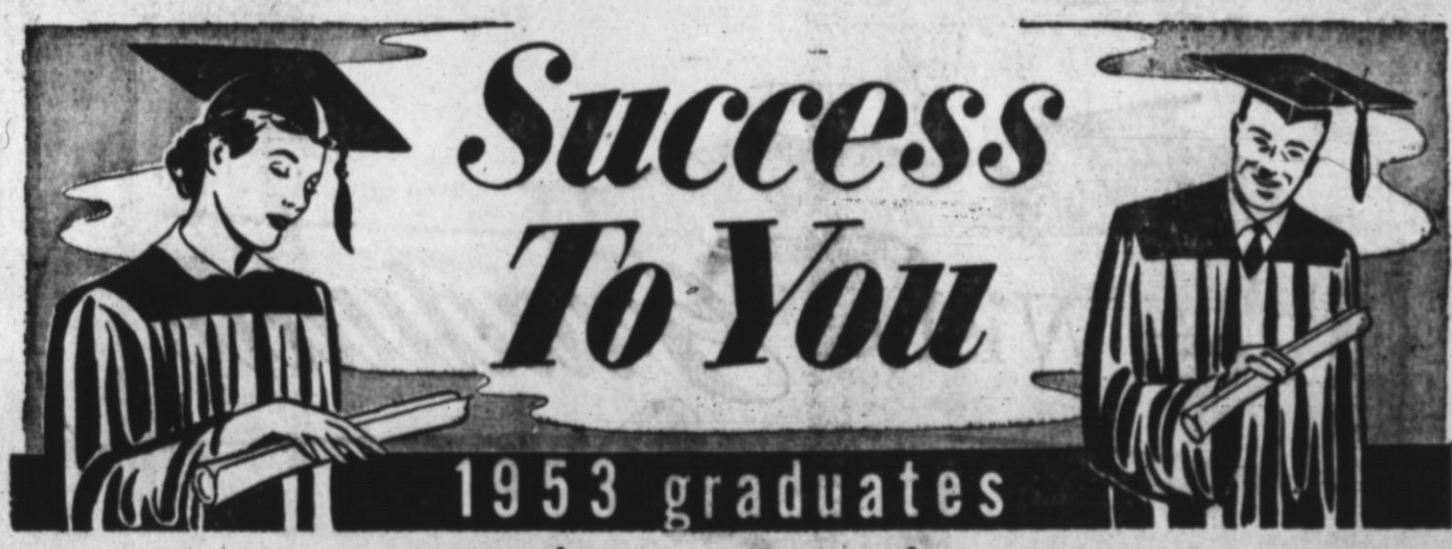

Cook large onions in boiling salted water until slightly tender (15 min.) Drain. Cool. Cut thin slices from root end. Hollow out centers, leaving 1/4 inch shell. Chop centers and combine with Mushroom Sauce. Use to fill onion shells. Top with buttered crumbs. Bake 1 hour moderate hot oven.

1 cup milk  
2 tablespoons flour  
1 1/2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
3-4 cup sliced mushrooms  
1 tablespoon fat  
Chopped onion

Melt butter or margarine in pan in the top part of a double boiler; remove from heat and stir our in to make a smooth paste. Add one third of the hot milk and stir until the mixture is smooth. Add the remainder of the liquid and salt, and cook until smooth and thick. The process takes about 10 to 15 minutes over direct heat, and about 25 to 30 minutes in a double boiler. Cook mushrooms in fat 5 minutes; add sauce and chopped onion; heat one minute.
