Pace of Inflation Halved

WASHINGTON (AP) -Renewed restraint in gasoline price hikes held July's consumer price increase to 7.3 percent, calculated annually, the government said today. The pace of inflation was nearly cut in half from the double-digit rates of the two preceding months.

July's moderate gain was also aided by a slowing of housing cost increases and by food prices holding dead

July's increase meant that, for the first seven months of the year, consumer prices have risen at an annual rate of 5.4 percent, considerably under the 8.9 percent posted for all of last year and the 12.4

For all of 1982, economists refiners earlier reported are predicting inflation of around 6 percent.

Much of the moderation, at least in July, was due to reverses in the gasoline price increases registered early in the summer. Gasoline prices last month

were up only 2 percent, less than half the 5.4 percent gain of June. The early-summer in-

creases had followed a general tightening in the worldwide oil surplus. But stocks have since risen anew.

Analysts say the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries has not been entirely successful in restricting members' oil production. Reflecting that, major

WASHINGTON (AP) -Top Reagan administration officials are meeting at the White House to consider France's direct challenge of a ban on use of American equipment for building a Soviet natural gas pipeline.

The Israeli military command reported in a terse statement that "heavy fighting" broke out north and east of Beirut between Syrian troops and Israeli-backed Christian militiamen. Blind Student Earns Doctorate in Physics

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Ten years ago, when Henry Schreiner was a sophomore at the University of Oklahoma, some counselors tried to talk Schreiner out of majoring in

Physics is a demanding field, they told him.

Now he has a doctorate from the University of Texas, and administrators say they are almost certain that Schreiner is the first blind student to earn a Ph.D. degree from the UT physics department.

"Blind people should try to do whatever they want to do," said Schreiner. "They have abilities like anyone else."

Schreiner was blinded when he was 12 by a virus that damaged his optic

Fatal Chainsaw Wound Believed Self-Inflicted

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - Lubbock County sheriff's department officials say they are certain a man whose throat was slashed by a chainsaw committed suicide, but a peace justice is withholding a cause of death

The body of Randall Lynn Thompson. 30, was found about 6 p.m. Sunday in a field north of Lubbock, said sheriff's department deputy Bill

A 16-inch, gasoline-powered chainsaw was found two feet away, still in the "on" position, Drewell said.

Thompson used the chainsaw to slit his jugular vein on the left side of his neck and cut his larynx, Drewell said.

"There's no doubt in our minds that the wound was self-inflicted," said sheriff's office administrator Don Stapleton. He said an inquest would be requested "because of the unusual weapon and circumstances surrounding" the death.

Justice of the Peace Earl Yarborough said he was withholding a ruling on the cause of death until he investigates the case further.

"We want to talk to (Thompson's) psychiatrist and he is out of town. It's going to be a while before this is cleared up," Yarborough said.

The psychiatrist, who officials declined to identify, was reported to be out of town until Sept. 7, officials

Senator Borrows Line From Brother's Speech

HOUSTON (AP) - U.S. Sen. Edward Kennedy borrowed a line from a speech his slain brother never got to deliver to illustrate the bond between Texas and the Democratic party.

The address was to have been given by President John F. Kennedy in Dallas the day he was assassinated Nov. 22, 1963.

"The historic bonds which unite

Texas and the Democratic Party are no temporary union of convenience," Kennedy read Monday. "We are united instead by a common history and heritage, a respect for the deeds

of the past and the needs of the future. "That is the kind of state Texas has always been, the kind of vision which Texas has always posessed and that is why Texas will always be basically Democrat," he read.

The Massachusetts Democratic, targeted by conservative groups for defeat in the November election, took time off from his own re-election campaign Monday to stump for Texas Democratic candidates.

He was scheduled leave Texas after attending a breakfast meeting today. Kennedy shared the stage at a party fundraiser Monday with former U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough, who was defeated in the 1970 primary by Lloyd

The group that left Monday, like those on the previous days, was seen off by crowds in west Beirut cheering and firing guns and pistols into the air. The convoy to the port was delayed about an hour when a car bomb exploded a mile away and PLO security officers checked the route. No one

was hurt in that blast.

The departure was delayed another hour while some guerrillas surrendered weapons not covered by the U.S.-negotiated agreement, which allows each guerrilla one pistol, rifle or machine

The draft of 1,095 guerrillas that sailed Sunday aboard the Cypriot ferry Sol Phryne for Tunisia took along 21 jeeps in violation of the agreement, causing the Israelis to hold up its departure for six hours. The ship was allowed to sail after the United States gave Israel its assurances that the vehicles would be taken off en route. The Sol Phryne put into Limassol, Cyprus, Monday for the unloading, then

resumed the voyage. In Washington, the U.S. government said it was satisfied the evacuation was proceeding without any ma-

jor setbacks but expressed concern over reports of cease-fire violations in eastern Lebanon. Israel charges that Palestinian guerrillas who took refuge there with Syrian troops in the Bekaa Valley are shooting at Israeli troops and trying to infiltrate their lines.

The farewell gunfire for the Palestinians in west Beirut Monday was matched by celebratory Christian barrages in east Beirut after the Lebanese Parliament elected 34-year-old Bashir Gemayel to succeed President Elias Sarkis on Sept. 23.

Gemayel, the only announced candidate and the commander of Lebanon's largest Christian militia, was elected despite a Moslem boycott that delayed the voting for two hours while his older brother rounded up a







Perry Ejected After Throwing Illegal Pitch

It took 21 years and countless accusations by frustrated batters before an

umpire finally ejected Gaylord Perry for throwing an illegal pitch.

The veteran Seattle righthander with 304 victories and a book entitled "Me and the Spitter" to his credit, had never been ejected for doctoring a baseball until Monday night.

The Boston Red Sox were leading 1-0 in the seventh inning - in a game they eventually won 4-3 to cut their deficit in the AL East to five games behind Milwaukee when umpire Dave Phillips thumbed Perry, 43.

"In my judgment, it was definitely an illegal pitch," said Phillips, who said he had

warned Perry numerous times in past years without ejecting him. "The ball came in and the bottom fell out." "It was just something that

sank," Perry said. "He just wanted to stick it to us and that's what he did," said Perry, who also called Phillips "a crusader. He just

wants to make a scene. He's

going to clean up the world." Red Sox Manager Ralph Houk said Perry had been throwing a greaseball so much during the game that "it was getting to be a farce. I'm a fan of Gaylord's, but he didn't use it that much in the

In other American League games, California edged Boston 6-5, Detroit tripped Oakland 5-1, Texas defeated Kansas City 5-2, New York nipped Toronto 4-3 and Cleveland trimmed Chicago

After Perry threw a called strike to Boston's Rick Miller, Phillips, the plate umpire, demanded to see the ball although Seattle catcher Jim Essian already had made his return delivery to Perry on

the mound. Phillips, who had warned Perry against doctoring the ball in the fifth inning, then ejected Perry without looking at the ball. His only previous ejection came early in his career when he was thumbed for bench jockeying.

Although the ejection was Perry's first for throwing an illegal pitch, opposing managers have claimed for most of his career that he has "loaded" his pitches with il-legal substances.

Perry admitted in his book that he used illegal pitches to find success in the major leagues, but he said he had

quit. After the ejection, Seattle rebounded from a 2-0 deficit with three runs in the seventh on Manny Castillo's sacrifice fly and a two-run homer by Al

But the Red Sox came back in the eighth on Reid Nichols' two-run homer that provided the margin of victory and handed Seattle its sixth

straight loss. Nichols socked an 0-2 pitch from Mariners reliever Bill Caudill, 10-5, into the left field seats after Dave Stapleton walked. Mark Clear, 10-7, got credit for the victory although he surrendered Cowens' homer.

Rangers 5, Royals 2

Dave Schmidt scattered 10 hits in 81-3 innings for his first major league win as a starter and Buddy Bell knocked in three runs as Texas defeated Kansas City and knocked the Royals two games behind California in the West.

Schmidt, 4-4, left the game with one out in the ninth after giving up an RBI single to John Wathan, but Danny Darwin came in to retire Willie Wilson on a game-ending double-play.

A fearful food allergy

DEAR DR. LAMB -Many years ago I was advised by a medical doctor that I was allergic to iodine because when I ate crustacean food, such as shrimp, lobster, turtle, I became

very sick for many hours. Recently I underwent an IVP and cystoscopy without complications and the urologist then told me he didn't believe that I was allergic to iodine.

I can eat tuna, oysters and other seafood which contain much more iodine than crustaceans without getting sick. Do you believe in allergy to internal iodine? If not, why do I get sick from devouring crustacean food? I've eaten shrimp and crab several times without knowing it and got very sick, so it definitely is not my imagination.

DEAR READER — The

reason the urologist thinks you are not allergic to iodine is probably because he used a dye containing iodine to do the studies of your kidney and bladder. Since you didn't have a reaction he believes iodine is not your problem. If he is correct, what is

your problem? It is the type of protein present in crusta-ceans, not their iodine

content. It is perfectly logical that if you are allergic to shrimp and lobster that you might not be allergic to oysters or other seafoods.

Food allergies can just cause asthma attacks or severe gastrointestinal reactions and even circulatory collapse that can be serious or fatal.

Anyone who has severe reactions to a food on an allergic basis should avoid that food entirely. Ingesting it can be dangerous. Which means you should never eat shrimp, lobster or the other foods that you know you are allergic to. You might want to consult with an allergist. He may wish to do some tests but I suspect he would be cautious about exposing you to shellfish.

DEAR DR. LAMB -Could you please tell me what "bronzing" is, what causes it and what can be

done about it? DEAR READER - I'll

assume you are not refer-ring to the cosmetic practice of using bronzers to make the skin look suntanned.

You probably refer to the pigment changes in the skin that lead to a darker color. The skin color is dependent upon the production of melanin, a pigment from special-ized cells in the skin called melanocytes. There are several conditions that stimulate them to overproduction of pigment. Often these are endocrine problems. A per-son with adrenal insufficiency may become bronzed because the pituitary gland under the brain increases its activity to stimulate a failing adrenal gland. The pitu-itary gland also stimulates the melanocytes at the same

Then there is a condition called bronze diabetes, caused by the body's excess retention of iron. The iron in the liver causes changes in liver function and diabetes.

Some medicines may also cause discoloration of the skin. Obviously, what should be done depends entirely on the cause. When adrenal insufficiency is the cause, hormone treatments to replace the adrenal hormone may stop the change.
