By SPEEDY NIEMAN Deaf Smith County taxpayers last week were billed for more than $\$ 6.6$ million in taxes from seven taxing entities but, despite property reap- praisals earlier this year the total is praisals earier this year, $\$ 61,294$ more than last year. onl Although the total represents less than a one-percent increase over last year, the revaliation completed earlier this year has shifted the tax burden, Many ch yill see big hikes in city businesses wners and their taxes and the primary reason, according to chief appraiser Fred Fox, is water depletion. Fox, is water depletion. Here has been a big drop in the number of irrigated acres of farmland, said Fox; meaning that he land value dropped from $\$ 400$ an acre to $\$ 80$ an acre. Farmland is fre to $\$ 80$ an acre. Farmland is figured on ag value, rather than market value, and that created a loss of more than $\$ 156$ million in valuation this year, reported Fox. The ag value loss last year was about $\$ 49$ million. of the seven taxing entities, Hereford Independent School District mailed the largest bills with a total of $\$ 3,027,624$. While it repreesnts about 46 percent repreesnts about 46 percent of the $\$ 6.6$ million total district levy, the school's tax levy decreased by $\$ 52,477$ over last year. 852,477 over last year. Deaf Smith County Deaf Smith County was second in taxes levied at $\$ 1,978,741$ and this laxes levied at $\$ 1,978,741$ and this total increased by $\$ 101,162$ over last year-the largest increase of any taxing entity. LIBERTY, Texas (AP) - A Houston man who prosecutors said was "just a murder away from murdering asaint pacecusors seath by
 David Wayne DeeBlanc, 2 , of Houston deserved the death penally in stead of a ilif term in prison.
DeBlanc was convicted of capital murder Monday in the Feb. 19, mot toath oth the Rev. Henry Bouchie. The 6 Re-yearold priest and prayed in the rectory at Our Mother of Mercy Church in the East Texas town of Ames.
Several withesses testified that Deeblanc bragged about shooting he priest in the neck with a . 4 c caliber pistol. Prosecutors Mike Little and Jerry Andress argued Friday during vould continue to commit acts of violence. "He's just a murder away from murdering again," Little said.
The man who has no mercy comes to you "The man who has no mercy comes to you ... and asks you for mer-
Little told jurors to remember the slain priest as they deliberated -ver DeBlanc's punishment.
"Nobody deserves to die like Father Henry Bouchie died, alone and choking in his own blood," Little said. "When you consider this man's (DeBlanc) rights, consider the rights he took away from
Father Bouchie."

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Reagan administration, while boasting it has brought medical inflation under control, has ordered a $\$ 1.1$ billion increase in what the elderly will pay for hospital and
norsing care under Medicare next year, sparking calls for congres narsing care un
sional reforms. Rep. Edward R. Roybal, D-Caliif, chairman of the House Select Committee on Aging, on Friday called the increases "outrageous." Sen. John Heinz, R-Pa, chairman of the Senate Speciat Committe on Aging, introduced legislation to stop the " whopping increase. The administration this week ordered a 23 percent increase in the enter the hospital, boosting the current $\$ 400$ to $\$ 92$ beginning Jan. 1. Similar 23 percent increases were ordered for co-insurance payments after long-term hospitalization, for long-term care in skilled nursing facilities and for elderly people who need to dip into their once-in-a-lifetime

The increases are expected to directly affect some 8 million people.
The boost comes only two months after the administration virtual y declared victory in its battle to control medical inflation.

Flu season is on the way, but
researchers at Baylor College of Medicine's National Influenza Research Center say protection from
becoming ill is as close as a family physician.
Even though the 1985-86 influenza Even though the $1985-86$ influenza
season is expected to be relatively mild, everyone who is over age 65 or
has chronic heart or lung problems should get a flu vaccination before cool weather begins, said W. Paul
Glezen, M.D., a researcher at the flu Giezen,
center.
Those high-risk groups are most likely to suffer serious complications if they get the flu, Glezen said. "Health care workers should also contract the flu from their patients. The vaccine will prevent them from spreading the virus to other patients."

Landon, a machinist and owner of Lucero Manufacturing Company in Miles, has been the major contributor to the University of Texas
collection of herbarium plates collection of herbarium plates, a
method of preserving dried plants method of preserving dried plants
for study. It is the largest aquatic collection in the world, he said. Growing lilies is easy for Landon. He said he can sometimes make a li-
ly grow that no one else in the world can manage. "I I just have a knack for
it. If you know it. If you know what you are doing,
you can make things hat you can make things happen." Lilinies
can become dormant and shut down can become dorn
forever, he said.
Landon has often traveled to other countries to collect the native lilies. Unless Landon knows an aquatic
plant collector in a certain country it plant collector in a certain country, it
is the only way he can find the plants. He keeps the tubers or seeds to assure reproduction.
In the fountain, one of the lilies,
Nymphaea ampla, is the only plant Nymphaea ampla, is the only plant
of its kind growing in Texas. The of its kind growing in Texas. The
delicate white lily used to be native to Texas and it grew in the Rio Grande Valley, Landon said. It is now extinct here. Landon found the

## Solution: Put LSC out of business

The federally funded Legal Services Corporation had been a haven for left-liberal activists ever since it was established in 1974 by President Nixon-ironically, It was the last piece of eegisiation he signed into law Under the Carter admnistration, he is millions of tax center or

With the election of Ronald Reagan in 1980, the new administration set off to "defund the left," includin the ISC. But holdover Carter appointees at the LSC headquarters in Washington and officials of many of its "suo or so grantees across the country retaliated wit a survival campaign" to counter the administration plans and to squirre
Two recent studies-one by the U.S. General Accounting Office and the other by the Washington Lega Foundation-provide fascinating accounts of how LSC lawyers tried to circumvent the law, the Reagan administration and Congress.

These observations are further supported by an indepth report by the GAO on the establishment of "alternative" corporations by three legal-aid groups in Maine, Texas and Connecticut. The GAO says that the Maine groups have operated independently since 1981 and complied with the LSC Act and regulations. Not so, however, for the Texas and Connecticut lawyers. They used these "alternative" corporations to carry out activities otherwise banned by federal law while effectively retaining control over decision making. The GAO concluded that in Texas and Connecticut the establishment of these alternative corporations "has enabled the grant recipients to circumvent restrictions in the

The two studies demonstrate how far the LSC strayed from its original purpose of providing free, strayed from its original purpose of providing free, noncriminal legal services for the poor. Instead of handling landiord-tenant disputes, divorces and the like, these lawyers saw themselves as a po toal dollars.
to change society and public policy using tax to change society and pubiic policy, using lax doliars. to be held fully accountable. Until then, he says, "nonpartisan legal aid will continue to be more myth than reality.'
Under the American system there is no justification for tax money to be used to finance political activism, of either the right or the left. The fact that the LSC has attempted to hide behinda guise of public service demonstrates that even its activists know they are out side the bounds of american democratic practice There is one solution: Return to more traditional localized ways of aiding the poor and put the LSC out of business.

Snakeweed Can Cause Abortions, Weak Calves

Abortions of all forms of livestock, particularly cattle, can be caused by broom snakeweed. Calf losses of neariy five percent have been reported.
The problem is acute where cows must graze on sandy solls dominated by snakeweed. The weed is most toxic during leaf formation and can be fatal, though deaths occur less frequently than abortions.
Calves born to cows that have eaten a diet heavy in snakeweed often are weal and underweight. Calves born to cows that have eaten a diet heavy in snakeweed often are weak and underweight. Bob Henard, former extension director in New Mexico's Lea County, says that in his area abortion losses
can run 35 to 0 percent in a week's time. He says the calves are likely to be weak if the mothers hove can run 35 to 40 percent in a week's time.
