## Baron Retains Crown In Title Match Saturday

Wrestling fans at the Bull Barn Saturday night saw the first world's championship match ever to be staged in a town as small as Hereford, when they witnessed the world junior heavy-weight match between champion Baron Michele Leone of Agruzzi, Italy, and George Curtis of Mississippi. Leone, who claims to be a member of European royalty, and looks like a member of European royalty, took no chances in this match but won just as soon as possible. He took the first fall in 15 minutes with his famous hold, the hangman hold.

Curtis however came back in the second to win in just 45 seconds with a body press following a series of drop kicks.

Leone finished the match by winning the third and deciding fall in eight minutes with another hangman hold.

This was a relentless match with no let-up anywhere. Neither of the men had much time to put on a show because each was too busy trying to figure out a way to wear down his opponent.

Billy Weidner of Amarillo was referee for the match and Dory Detton was the match maker. Dr. Mimms was the official doctor who inspected the wrestlers before they went into the ring. Johnny Pool was deputy commissioner, Guy Lawrence was official time keeper and the match was promoted by the Lions Club.

The first event of the evening was a two out of three fall, one hour time limit match between Ace Abbott of Abilene and Andre Drapp of France.

Abbott won the first fall in 25 minutes with a surborad and Drapp followed by winning the second fall in 10 minutes with a top body press.

Drapp also won the third fall in one and one-half minutes with a body jackknife.

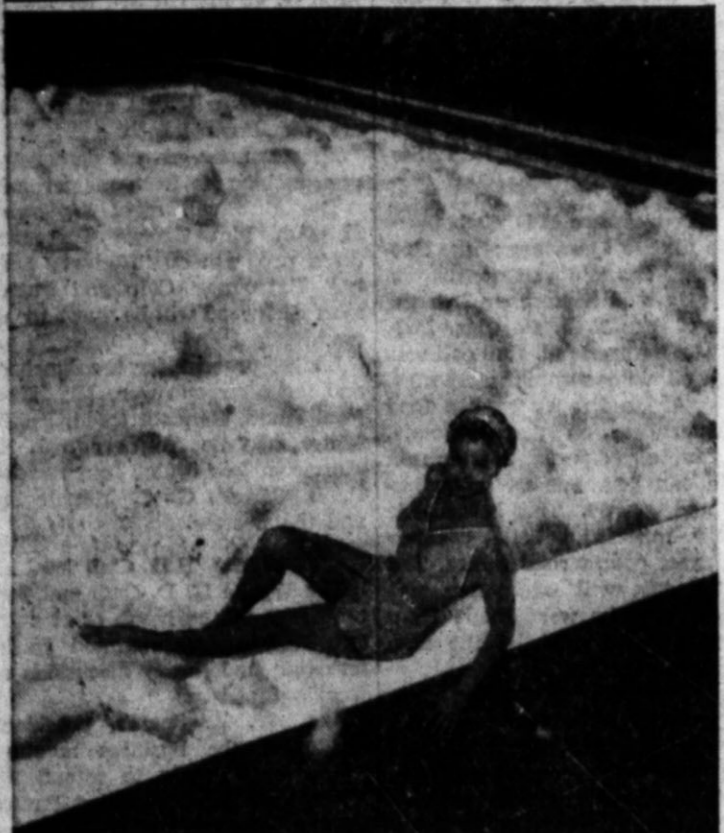

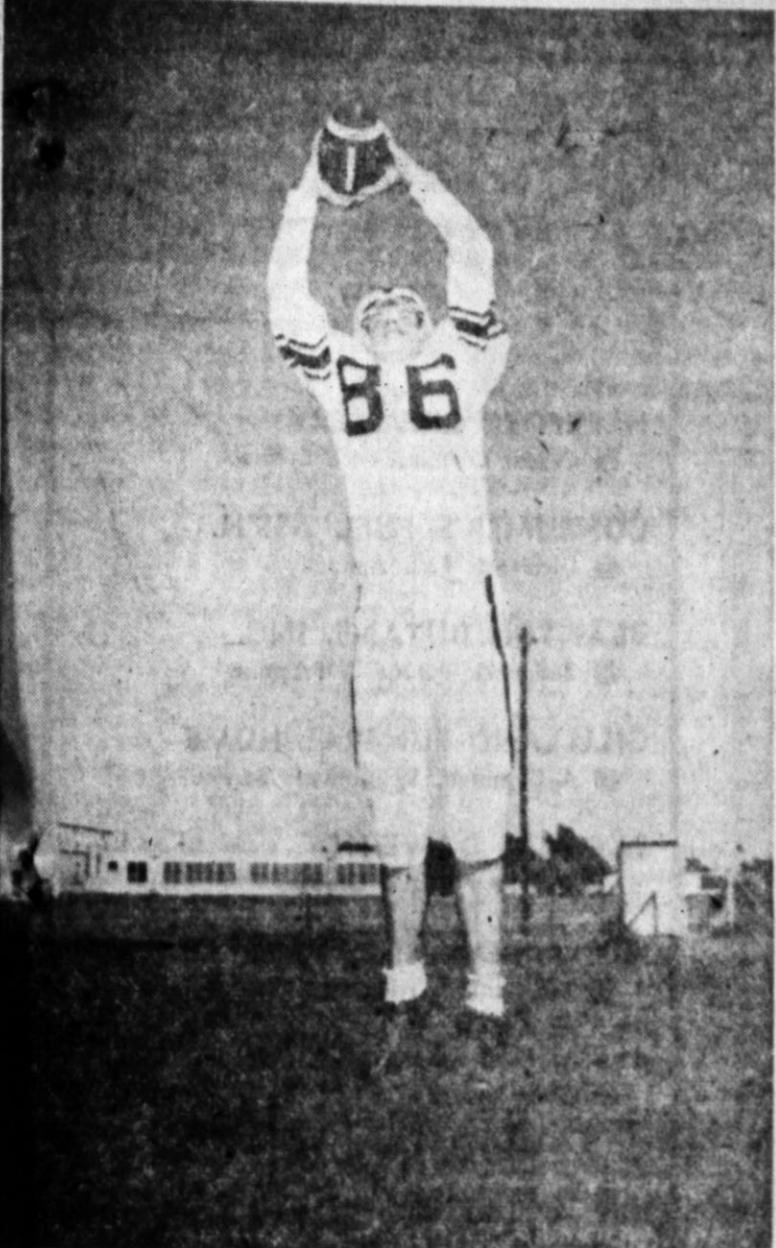

**Method:** Thaw lobster tails if frozen. Cut away thin undershell with kitchen scissors. Crack hard shell in middle back so lobster tails will lie flat and not curl in broiling. Melt butter; crush garlic and add. Place lobster tails, hard shell side up, about 3 or 4 inches from source of heat in preheated broiler; broil about 3 minutes. Turn lobster tails and dribble a little of the garlic butter over the lobster meat. Dust with paprika. Broil about 5 minutes longer or until lobster meat is opaque, cooked through and golden brown. Serve at once with rest of garlic butter.
