Most Hereford stores and offices will stay open Saturday, the final day before Christmas. The usual big rush was on this week, meanwhile, as shoppers got their last minute gifts bought.

Monday. The Hereford Clinic will close at noon Saturday, and remained closed Sunday and Monday. Doctor service will be available at the hospital, however.

County Agent Warns Of Possible Heavy Infestation Of Grasshoppers

County Agent Hugh Clearman on Wednesday confirmed a Texas A&M College report that livestock producers and farmers in Deaf Smith County and other Panhandle counties should guard against possible widespread and damaging infestations of grasshoppers in 1956.

There has been a nine percent increase in stamp sales and a five percent increase in mail handled, Assistant Postmaster Elmer Patterson said.

Monday was the busiest day, there were 25,186 pieces of mail handled that day. Postmen delivered mail Sunday, too. That day they handled 4679 pieces of mail. Saturday 16,666 pieces were handled and Friday 18,003 pieces went through the local office.

NECESSITY, NOT CHOICE

Old Time County Cowboy And Wife Move After Half Century In Area

After spending half a century in Deaf Smith County, P. H. Gilliland, pioneer in the ranching and sheep industry, left last week to make his future home in Amarillo. He didn't leave by choice, however, for not until failing health made a change necessary, could he be persuaded to leave his old stomping ground.

Gilliland came to Deaf Smith County with his parents in 1904 and has made this his home since that time, except when in service in World War I. He was one of the old-time cowboys and was also rated as one of the best. In fact he had few other interests and since he gave up cow punching he has collected hundreds of items pertaining to early life in the West.

Through the years he became famous for his Chick Wagon Beans and at one time he patented the label and he and his wife did commercial canning. He loved to prepare the cowboy's favorite dish "Son of a Gun" for Pioneer Day celebrations, Veterans' get-togethers or other special occasions where old-timers gathered, and people would come for miles just to eat his "Son of a Gun."

He was married in 1920 to Miss Lavina Howton who shared in his enthusiasm for cattle and ranch life. She was a teacher in rural schools and they made their home in the Westway Community. They became active in all community affairs. He served on the School Board and both were active in the Baptist Church work of that community. She did much in promoting and securing a Home Demonstration agent for this county and assisted in organizing the Hereford Credit Association.

While serving as worthy matron of the Hereford chapter of the Order of Eastern Star she founded and organized the Assembly of the Order of Rainbow for Girls. She is a life member of the Pioneer Study Club and has taken great interest in the garden clubs of Hereford. She served as supervisory for the County Welfare projects during the depression.

The Gillilands bought the small farm on Harrison Highway in 1937 and operated a dairy until his health made the work impossible. He loves children and carried gum and candy in the milk truck at all times for the children on his route. Scores of children call him Uncle Pink.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Gilliland have been unable to carry on outside activities for the past few years because of health reasons, but have continued their main interest in people. They delight in giving a helping hand to those in need as well as serving as counselors to countless friends.

Early in the fall they traded their farm home for the Texas Lou Courts, 1901 West Sixth St., Amarillo, and last week they moved there to make their home and to operate the tourist courts.

'Misguided Youths' Cause Concern; Boys Are Beaten

A wave of juvenile trouble — including at least three beatings, 15 cases of rocks or shot out windows and five cases of petty thefts — has broken out in Hereford.

City Police Chief Leo Box said the trouble was brought to a head this weekend when three beatings took place. Two of the fights took place downtown and another on a school yard, according to police. All were at night.

Box said that a gang of youths was involved in each beating. He said about five boys ganged up on one boy in each case and "beat him up." One of the boys was treated for his injuries at the County Hospital.

The "misguided youths" believed involved in the delinquency are all believed to be 11, 12 or 13 years old. Box has a "suspect list" with the names of 21 boys on it.

Extent of the seriousness of the "trouble" was brought out when Box reported that two 22 pistols and a number of knives have been stolen from a local store. He said he believed the same youths that have been involved in the beatings took the weapons.

The youths are believed to be members of a club or clubs. At least 15 cases of windows in homes and cars being knocked out have been reported.

Box said that a number of his suspects have been "talked to" as well as their parents.

"We told them then that the next time we had any trouble with them they would go before the juvenile judge," Box stated.

Clearman pointed out that unfavorable weather and the presence of predators and grasshopper parasites could cut the anticipated infestation. But, he added, the situation should be carefully watched and plans made for an all-out control program.

The areas where heaviest populations are expected also has about the same acreage of cropland infested now, he pointed out.

According to the county agent, if the expected outbreaks occur in large areas controls should be applied between June 1 and July 15.

Rotarians Monday pledged \$1000 toward the cost of the proposed new children's wing at the Deaf Smith County Hospital.

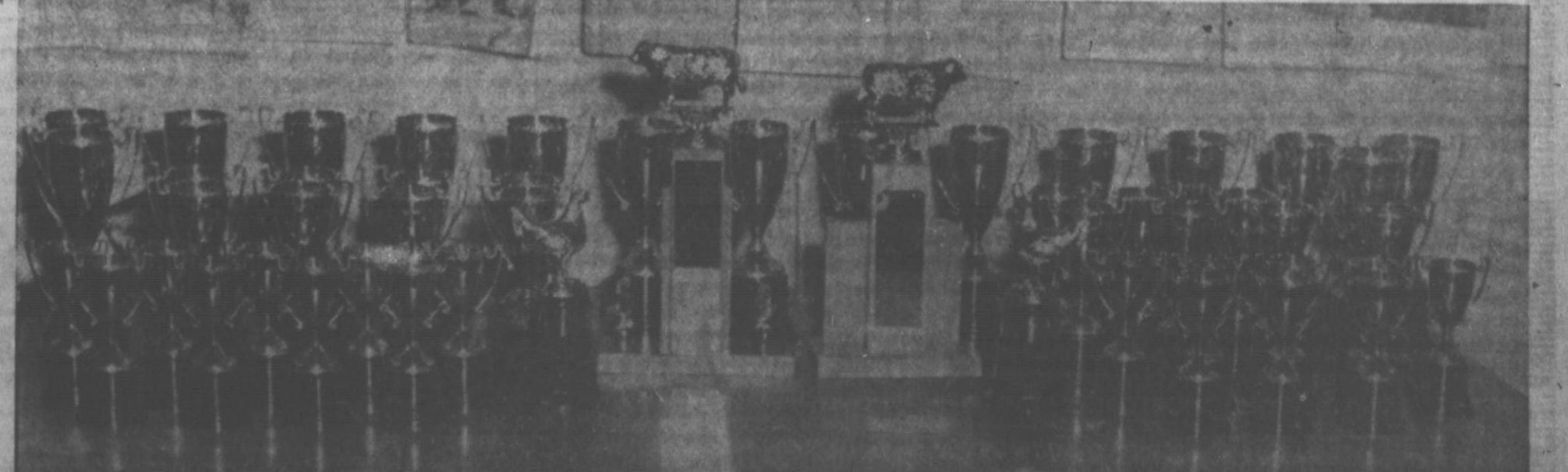

While a lot of boys and girls are hoping against hope for a bicycle this Christmas, there are others who like to get back the bikes which they received last Christmas.

Theft of bicycles in Hereford actually exceeds the number of cars stolen, according to officers. Furthermore, it is not a seasonal hazard but goes on throughout the entire 12 months. September and December are the worst months. If any, according to Chief Leo Box. Soon after school opened this year there was an outbreak of bicycle thefts from the school grounds. Right now, however, the bike grabbers seem to be working in the residential areas at night and, "Woe is the youngster who forgets and leaves his bike out on the front lawn."

Mostly, the bicycles are recovered — sometimes with a new coat of paint. Generally, they turn up at school and are recognized. Furthermore, they usually bring heartache to some youngster who has traded another item, or paid \$2 to \$5 for the bicycle. I heard that more than 100 bikes had been stolen this year, but Chief Box says he doubts if there have been that many — although he says it is possible, since there are usually from five to 10 a month. Anyway, it is quite a problem, although most of them are recovered.

Lester Galley says when he lived in Iowa the farmers had a rural fire truck and paid \$1 a month, per farm to the City for maintenance and operation. He says it was a special farm truck, equipped with power sprays and other methods especially designed for fire-fighting. It is our understanding, however, that the Hereford Volunteers have offered to man and to maintain such a truck without any charge — if the original truck could be arranged.

Fundamentally, people celebrate Christmas as the occasion of Christ's birthday. Such, at least, has always been my thinking on the subject — and it was with considerable surprise when I learned that most of our local pastors expect a decline in church attendance next Sunday, which is also Christmas Day. "I doubt if we will have one-tenth of our normal church attendance," said one pastor — and he appeared to be thoroughly sincere.

Otherwise devoted Christians, it seems, are prone to desert their pews upon the occasion of Christmas. Many pastors dread such years as 1955, when Christmas falls on Sunday. This hardly seems consistent, especially when you stop to recall that the very name of the occasion comes from Christ. Actually, it appears that Christmas should be the one time above all others when folks would go to church — whether they attend regularly at other times or not. It would require a unified effort, stemming from some organization such as the Ministerial Alliance, but the occasion could easily be diverted from a meager attendance day to record breaking crowds in the churches of all the Christian faiths. Such a campaign might be based on a slogan like, "I'll See You in Church — on Christmas."

Most of the pastors say "No" however. They say folks just won't come. Most of the pastors have delayed their own visiting a few hours to hold services, though, and they will be exceedingly happy to have large crowds next Sunday. How about it, let's all turn up in church Christmas Day? These old boys do a lot for us, for our fam-

ilies and for our community. Let's show them that we do appreciate the true meaning of Christmas by steering our visitors and guests right along with us.

Besides, you can probably eat a lot more at 2:30 or 3 o'clock than at 12 or 1 o'clock — and the blessing will have a truer meaning for the children, many of whom do not even connect Christmas with Christ and with the church.

Some 20 years ago usage of the word "Xmas" was common as a Christmas symbol, then folks began to frown upon the word as being sacrilegious. Actually, they were wrong, because the "X" comes from the Greek "Chi." However, the fad took hold — and today you hardly ever see the word "Xmas." It is definitely frowned upon in all magazine, newspapers and advertising circles. Consequently it has passed out of the picture. The slogan, "Put Christ back in Christmas," should be extended to include the church. Folks should definitely make a serious effort to attend the church of their choice next Sunday — Christmas Day!

Will Harris is one of the few people who has commented on a recent Brand editorial nominating Cal Farley for Governor of Texas. I had a letter from Cal and, as I predicted, he isn't too hot for the idea. However, he would have to run if the requests came pouring in on a large enough scale. Meanwhile, if people are lukewarm, it would be a definite mistake. The race would take a lot of money — and it would have to come from the people. Cal just doesn't have it. On the other hand, I still think we need an honest man. A dark horse. A people's choice. The professional politicians have worn out their welcome with me. They have things in a heck of a mess. I mentioned Cal chiefly because he was the only Texan I knew with all of the requirements. Maybe there is another one somewhere. Maybe I am all wet, again. Certainly, it would have to be one of those sleeping movements that catches on spontaneously, and spreads over the country if it is to be a success. So far, it hasn't been.

If I was flabbergasted over the news in Dr. Hill's book, which said the first collection in the Canyon museum was formerly housed in the Brand office, you can bet that Gayle Neal was even more upset upon reading the article. It happens, you see, that the Robert Elliott who donated the original exhibit, was his grandfather. His mother, Mrs. Leslie Neal was the daughter of Robert Elliott and, before her marriage, was Miss N'Anna Elliott. Gayle says that he knew that his grandfather was a collector of pioneer relics, but that he never dreamed that they provided the humble beginning of the Historical Museum.

Since that time, I have read some more in the book and find that the original collection no longer exists, having been destroyed by fire in 1914, when the only building the college boasted was razed. A well house and the president's home were the only two buildings remaining after the blaze.

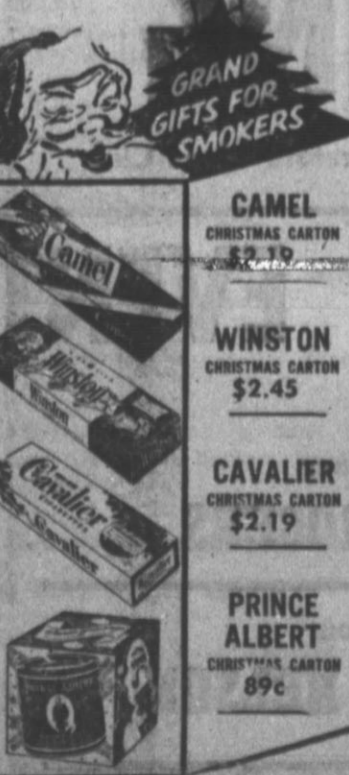

Household Tips

Tip for good cooks: Next time you are topping a cake or pie with walnut halves, brown the nuts very lightly in a little butter before using as the garnish.

Kitchen tongs turn bacon slices and sausage links nicely. Keep the tongs handy!

For weight watchers: a medium-sized banana contains about 95 calories.

Super ice cream sundae for home kitchens: two scoops of ice cream, a ladle full of maple or maple-flavored syrup, thawed frozen strawberries or pineapple, or crushed pineapple, chopped nuts, whipped cream, chocolate sprinkles. Definitely for the youngsters.

Add celery salt and Worcestershire sauce to a jar of blue cheese spread; use as a stuffing for small wedges of celery. Good served long with tomato juice.

For extra flavor, garnish potato salad with finely chopped green onion or chives.

Ever try adding a little vanilla to waffle or pancake batter?

You can make an ice cream cake at home. Bake an angelfood cake from a packaged mix and cut it into three crosswise layers. Spread two pints of slightly softened ice cream between two of the layers. Work fast now and cover the whole cake with two cups of whipped cream (sweetened and vanilla flavored). Freeze the ice cream cake and serve with a fruit sauce. You can vary the flavors of the ice cream and sauce to suit your taste.

A cup of uncooked rice will yield three to four cups of cooked rice, depending on the cooking method used.

Kitchen arithmetic: a cup of medium white sauce will be enough for a seven-ounce can of tuna when you are planning to serve the fish creamed.

Quick pie: line a pie plate with lady fingers and fill with a gelatin whipped mixture. Chill and top with whipped cream before serving. If you are using an orange flavored filling, garnish the whipped cream with shaved chocolate.

Next time you prepare corn pudding, add a little chopped green pepper and canned pimiento.

Don't smooth out a meringue when you are spreading it over a pie filling. Swoops and billows look pretty after the topping is browned!

Next time you prepare a beef and vegetable soup, tie a teaspoon of whole peppers in a piece of cheesecloth and add. Remove the peppercorns before serving.

Want to vary green snap beans? Add the cooked beans to a cream sauce and top with bits of crisply cooked bacon. Use bacon fat in making the cream sauce, if you like a lot of bacon flavor.

Easy tomato salad: cut the tomatoes in half and top each half with a mound of egg salad. Mash the eggs in making the salad so the mixture will make an easily managed topping. Serve the stuffed tomato halves on greens; pass French dressing or mayonnaise. A little minced or grated onion added to the egg salad will give it zip.

You can reheat cooked rice by covering it with water, bringing it just to a boil, and draining it well.

Small fry like cupcakes spread with peanut butter. Or use peanut butter as a spread for crackers.

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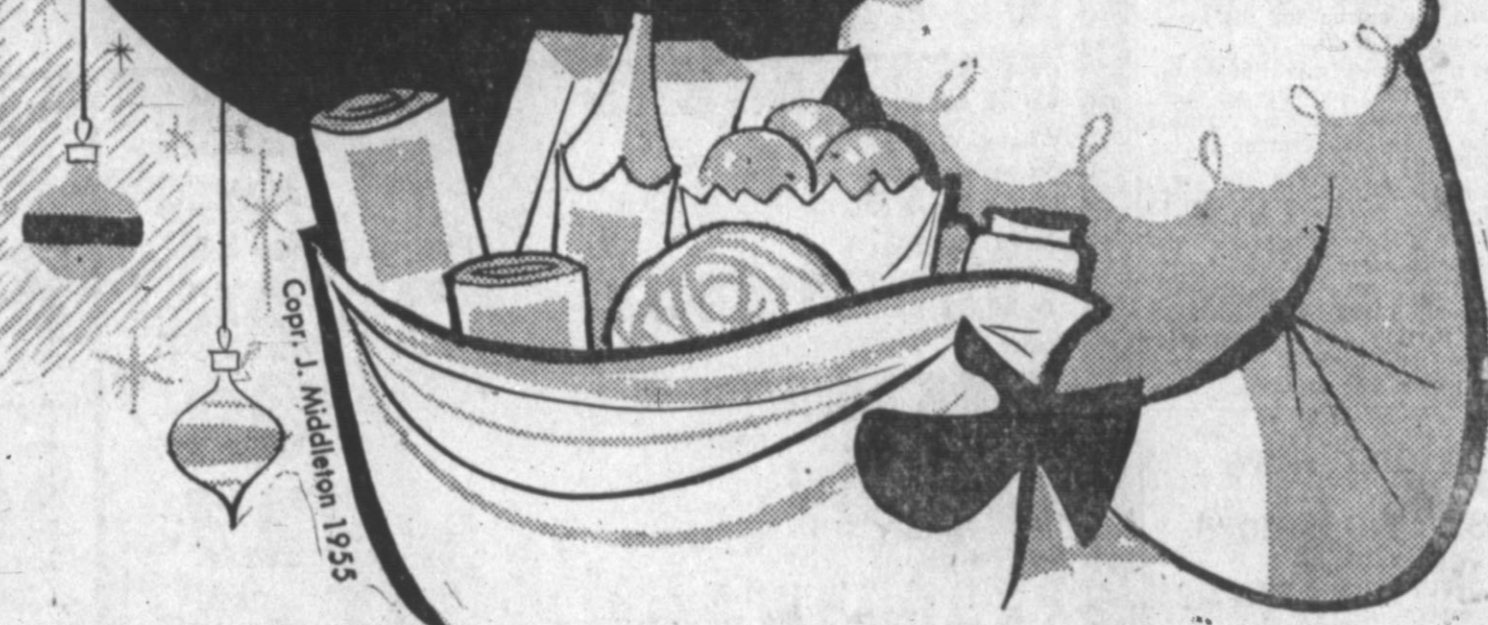

Copper Pictures Make Desired Gifts, Mrs. Petersen Finds

Lucky individuals are the members of Mrs. A. Petersen's family who will receive copper pictures for Christmas gifts this year.

Those for whom Mrs. Petersen has made the hand-tooled pictures from copper foil are her daughter-in-law and the two grandchildren.

For the children she has made pictures of horses and the companion pictures for their mother are attractively framed in wrought iron which is so popular in the modern decor. In spite of the material the frames are dainty in appearance and simple enough to fit into any room's furniture pattern.

Mrs. Petersen who is Selective Service clerk, first became interested in crafts when she received a ceramic plate as a gift from her sister in California back in 1949. Incidentally it was this plate that introduced ceramics as a hobby to many women in Hereford.

Mrs. Petersen expressed interest in learning to do the work to Mrs. Tom Draper, CHDA, and she in turn was able to bring to Hereford a woman from the North Plains to give instructions to those who were anxious to learn the art.

Since then Mrs. Petersen and a number of others have made many items from ceramics for their homes or for gifts. Others have been sold at special shows the last few years.

Mrs. Petersen first became interested in copper craft last spring when Mrs. Earl DeHart of the Cultural Home Demonstration Club gave special instructions in copper tooling to women of the county who were interested in learning the work.

It is a craft that requires a minimum of instruction but a good deal of painstaking care in the actual tooling as any mark made on the copper not included in the pattern

will show up as an error.

After the pattern is traced onto the sheet of copper, the first tooling of the design is done from the back. The sheet is then turned over and the design is finished from the front.

This is usually done on a piece of glass or some other hard surface and the final work with the tools is to smooth out the background before the design is antiquated with a solution of liver of sulphur to give the picture its high

lights and shadows.

The entire surface is gone over with steel wool to remove excess coloring and finger marks before a coat of clear dope is put on. Dull background paint is the last step before framing.

Mrs. Petersen is a busy person but the lovely gifts she has made for this year's Christmas presents are evidence of her interest and ability.

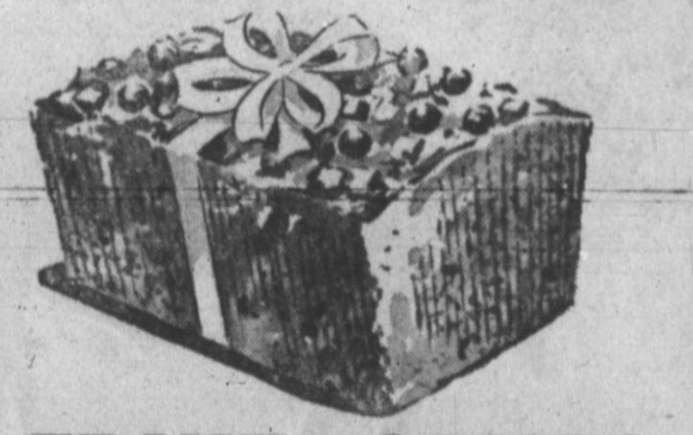

Home Repair Do's & Dont's

By Andrew C. Lang
REPLACING A THRESHOLD
DO . . . remember that a worn threshold (sometimes called a saddle) is unsightly, leaves a gap under the door and often is a safety hazard.

DO . . . pry up the old threshold carefully so that it can be removed in one piece—if possible—and used as a model in buying or making a new one.

DO . . . when the threshold will not come loose, split it with a chisel and a mallet; the pieces then will come up easily.

DO . . . purchase a threshold the same size as the old one or slightly larger so that the excess can be trimmed off to make a tight fit.

DO . . . in putting down the new threshold, stagger the nails on either side of the center section.

DON'T . . . neglect to remove the old nails; if you hammer them into the floor, they may loosen later on and push their way up into the new threshold.

DON'T . . . forget that, occasionally, the old threshold will not come up unless you first remove the door stop, the long strip of wood that runs vertically along the door jamb.

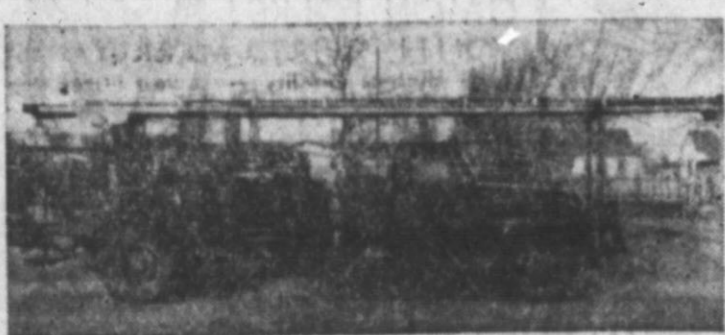

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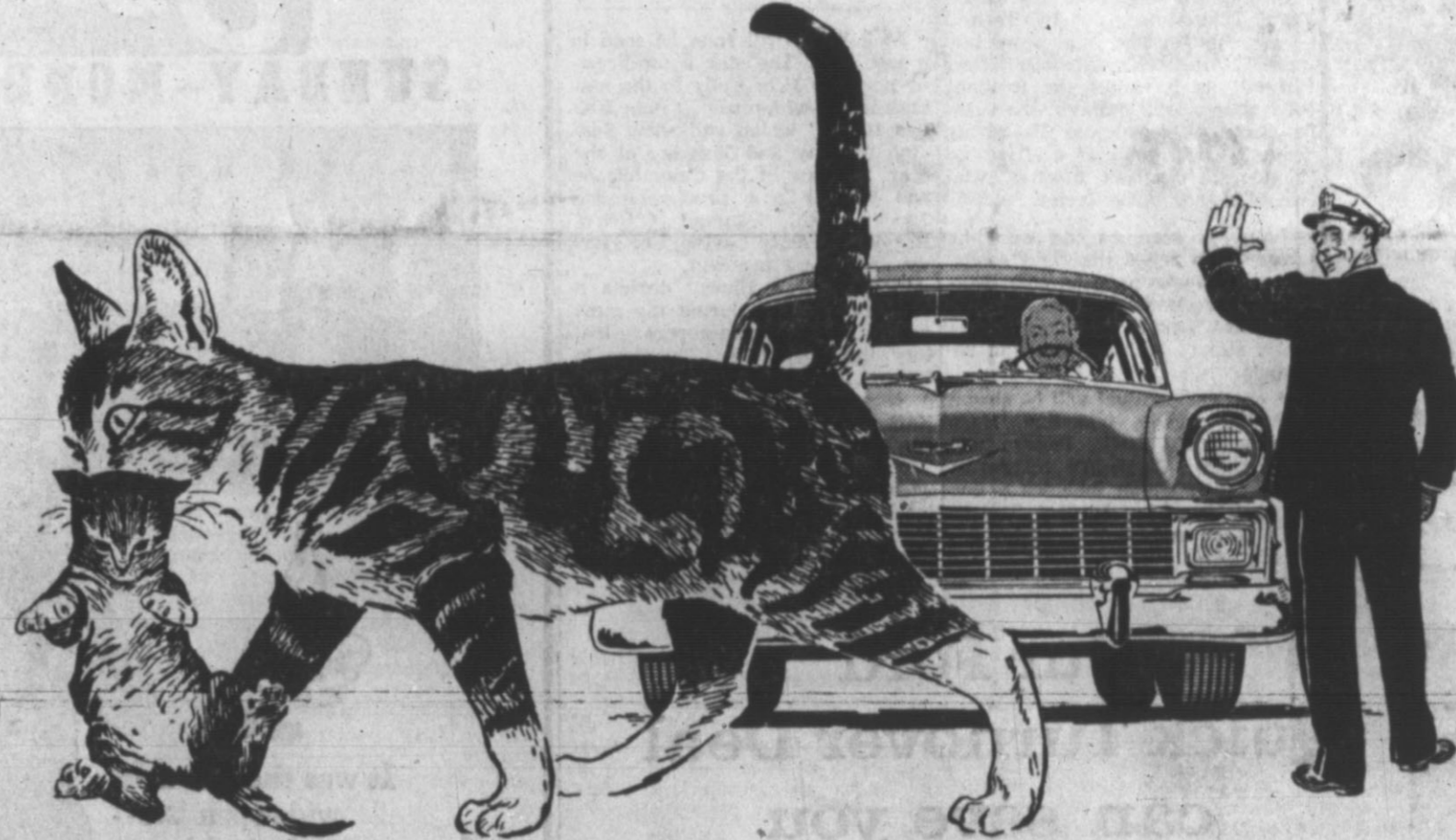
