



Everybody seems to be speculating on Texas Tech's chances of not getting into the Southwest Conference instead of their chances of getting in.

When out of the clear blue sky, Southern Methodist changed their mind and decided to vote for Tech, the deal seemed on ice But now as time draws near, Tech boosters seem to be uneasy. Their fears are apparently groundless, however.

The basis of the fears is that Baylor will submit Houston this time. Tech backers fear the issue will be clouded by this fact. However, Baylor has offered Houston before. This didn't hurt them any. Last summer when Houston was offered the Red Raiders got their highest vote-five. Houston wasn't even sec-

The situation as it is, Baylor would like to have both schools in the conference. So there appears to be little chance that bringng up Houston at the same time as Tech will hurt Tech's chances

Everything says that Tech will make it this time. Five schools have said yes to the Raiders. Five schools have already scheduled them on a permanent basis in football and another—Arkansas is holding open Thanksgiving week for a game with Tech when and if the big West Texas college is voted into the conference. Rice officials have said that they will vote against Tech but if they are voted in will put the Raiders on its schedule as soon as

Best indications are that the vote will be 5 to 2 next week when the faculty committee of the conference brings Tech up for membership consideration. Arkansas hasn't said which way it will vote and the general experience with conference schools is that when they won't say, then they are going to vote against something. The vote may come out of the committee room as unanimous, however. There would be no point in Rice and Arkansas opposing Tech when it already has made the grade.

Houston would be a good member of the conference but there is small prospect that it will get enough backing to even bring it up for vote. Houston is a different situation from Tech. It is the same city as a member of the conference—Rice. Tech isn't even close to one.

Another thing that will work against Houston is the roundrobin football schedule which Baylor has ascertained will be continued by the conference. Six of the seven members have said publicly they will want to continue this system whereby each member plays every other member. 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
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

#### **ASC** Terminates **Wind Erosion** Chiseling May 15.

Applications for cost sharing on chiseling for wind erosion will be terminated after May 15, according to the Agriculture Stabilization Committee which met Thursday blowing down to a minimum by afternoon in regular session at the use of the practice, and by starting ASC office.

Pointing out that the action was being taken because the committee believed that the worst of the blow season was over, they announced that 150,000 acres had already been chiseled in the pro-gram which cost \$107,000 of the year's budget.

Faust Collier, ASC manager, explained "The committee realizes the benefit of the practice and knows that any chiseling done has enormous potential value in conservation of moisture, but since







sons who died in traffic mishaps in Texas last year, the highest number of fatalities, in rural and urban accidents ever recorded, Texas death rate per mile was less than it has been, according to the

Texans drove 391/2 billion vehicle miles last year, and racked up a death rate of 6.4 which means that 6.4 persons were killed for each 100 million motor vehicle iles traveled.

Speeding too fast for conditions, vas listed as the major causative factor in rural accidents, followed by driving while drinking as the next greatest.

Intersections Most Dangerous According to statistics, the intersection of highways and local treets is the worst spot for rural traffic accidents, and collisions at such corners account for nearly 10 percent of all rural accidents. Regarding road conditions, the greatest hazard was roads that are slippery because they are wet and roads under construction.

Interestingly enough, almost onethird of all fatal accidents last year involved ears that were one year old or less. They accounted for 32 percent of all wrecks, with cars two years old jumping down to 12 percent of the total, and from then on, there was a steadily decreasing percentage except that cars 10 years old or older accounted for six percent of all accidents Early Twenties, Most Accidents

Statistics showed also that the nost dangerous age to be a driver was 23, because more 23 year olds were involved in accidents than drivers of any other age. But more 26 year olds were involved in fatal accidents, account-

ing for 79 deaths in rural accidents alone. In fact, the age group from 18 through 26 accounted for 27 percent of all accidents and for more than 28 percent of all fatal

The worst time of day to travel rural roads is between- 7 and 8 p.m., for eight percent of all fatal accidents occur during that period of the day. In fact, 34 percent of all accidents occur between 5 and 10
