



Before accepting the position in Iraq. Heard had accepted an engineering post at the Pantex plant in Amarillo. He also farmed on his father's land south of Hereford, and leased the land before leaving for Baghdad.

He has been engaged in farming and dairy work in Hereford since 1940. An 'engineer by profession, he is a graduate of Hereford schools and the University of Wisconsin. He worked in Chicago for a number of years.

He served as Farm Bureau president and headed several civic groups while he lived in Hereford.

He first became interested in the Iraq oil industry when the Iraq government started its first refinery for making gasoline and oil in 1955. In 1957, the refinery administration opened its first lubricating oil plant.

A question and answer period followed Walders' address. During this time he explained that this employment service does not influence the setting of wages except in cases where there is flagrant exploitation or in some cases where the young people set too high a value on their work. Walders further explained that Youth Employment Service is not an infringement on adult labor and it is not subject to employment laws except in cases of permanent employment where work permits are required for those under 16. He also explained that in Amarillo his office is concerned only with the 13 to 19 age group. The bulk of applicants, he said come from the age group of 14

Bill Thompson, manager of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce called for action to be taken in the Hereford area, and Francis Hardwick, of Hereford moved that a committee be formed to find some feasible way to establish a youth employment service in Hereford.

The word, "expenditious", impressed me when I read it because I had never heard of it before, although I did know of several places in which it would fit. In view of the great furor in recent months concerning spending, it occurred to me that "It was a wonderful thing," there might be such a word so I hastened to the dictionary to find out. I did not find that word, but the nearest thing I could find to it was "expenditure". This means, "a laying

out of money; disbursement." There is no question but that the proponents of the Reorganization Act sold this bill of goods on the ground that it would reduce expenditures and promote economy.
