
"curb cops" with only a penney in it. A five-word obscene message was scribbled on the meter ticket, given in the 100 block on Main St.



## Cotton Volume Highest Yet At Classing Office

LUBBOCK (Special) — Cotton grades and a verage staple length remained about the same last week, but micronaire readings continued to decline, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Classing Office of the USDA.

Volume of cotton received at the three South Plains USDA Classing Offices was the highest for any week this season. The three offices received approximately 50,000 's a m ple s daily and classed 292,200 samples during the week ending Friday.

#### Nearly One Million

This brought the season's total to 932,300. At this date last year the three offices had classed 1,102,000 samples. Estimates indicate that between 60 and 70 per cent of this year's crop is now out of the fields.

During the past week 76 per cent of the cotton classed at the Lubbock Classing Office was in the White grades and 24 per cent in the Light Spotted grades, and 24 per cent in the Light Spotted grades.

Middling cotton made up only 4 per cent of the total. Strict Low Middling Plus 1 per cent. Strict Low Middling 52 per cent. Low Middling Plus 7 per cent. Low Middling 10 per cent. Strict Good Ordinary Plus and Strict Middling Light Spotted 12 per cent. Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 11 per cent and Low Middling Light Spotted 1 per cent.

#### Staple Length

Average staple length remaineff about the same with eighty per cent of all cotton classed being 15/16 of an inch and shorter. The previous week 77 per cent was 15/16 of an inch and shorter.

Micronaire readings continued to decline sharply during the week. Sixty-three per cent of all cotton tested in the Lubbock Office was in the desirable category of 3.5 and better. The previous week 72 per cent of all cotton tested was in this category.

Average prices paid for the most predominant q u a 1 i t i e s were : Strict Low Middling 29/32 - 26.85, Strict Low Middling 15/16 - 27.35, Strict Low Middling 31/32 - 27.80, Middling Light Spotted 29/32 - 27.25, Middling Light Spotted 15/16 - 27.65, Middling Light Spotted 31/32 - 28.20, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 29/32 - 26.25, Strict Low Middling Light



Spotted 15/16 - 26.75; Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 31/32 -27.00,

Prices paid farmers for cottonseed ranged from \$47 to \$55 per ton. This was an average increase of \$1.20 per ton.






