New U. S. Land Office

A branch of the U.S. Land Office will be eosned in the western part of Beaver county. Oklahoma, in a few days. The permanent dite has not yet been decided on, but it will be at a point about 30 miles northwest of Stratford, Texas, the nearest railroad point. Water in this section is to be had at from 5 to 100 feet. All varieties of soil is to be found here, and 160 acres of this land is worth more than 640 acres of the land along the Rock Island Railway near Guymon. A great deal of this section is underlaid with coal and a considerable body of it is rich in copper; both coal and copper mines are now being operated at a profit. Fine fruits and vegetables are raised here. It is apparently the natural home of cherries and strawberries. From 5,000 to 10,000 claims will be homesteaded at the new land office, which will make business there for a bank, newspaper, hotel, stores and other lines of business. If the business people would take more interest in their own affairs, especially in matters of legislation, such measures as the "Bryan Bill" would never be introduced. That measure was originated purely for political purposes and subsequent events have established that its passage would have done more to destroy the already muchly hampered cattle industry than anything which could

have been done.
