June Weather Record.

Following is the weather record for June as given out by the U.S. Bureau at Amarillo:

Total movement of wind, 8819 miles or 124 miles per hour throughmonth, 5.53 inches. This is considerably above the average fall for the past ten years.

New School Building.

Preparing Ground—As for an onion bed, that is thoroughly. I break, then subsoil with subsoiler to a depth of from 16 to 18 inches, drawn by 6 to 8 mules. I then use disc harrow, then harrow of 2x12 planks, lapped like weatherboarding; then roll with steel roller before and after planting.

4. Time to plant—Best time is in the fall, September, October or November. In the spring, February is the best month; but whenever ground is in best condition.

5. Amount of seed-About 20 pounds to the acre. I find the wheelbarrow seeder to be the best.

6. Time of harvest—I cut first time when first blooms are seen, usually in April, last time in December. I use an eight-foot mower, because it requires a good, strong machine on account of strength of plant.
