The Denver Wreck.

As has already been reported in the Fort Worth Record and Dallas News, one of the most destructive wrecks in the history of that road occurred at midnight on Thursday of last week. The train, which carried the usual number of coaches except that there was only one sleeper, left Ft. Worth on time, pulled by two engines, but owing to the poor condition of the road bed considerable time was lost by the time the place where the wreck occurred was reached. In going around a long curve near Fruitland, a small village five miles south of Bowie, the sleeper and chair car left the track while going at a speed variously estimated at from 25 miles to 35 miles per hour, both crashing down a twenty-foot embankment.

While almost everyone in both cars were bruised considerably, only about forty of the number were anything like seriously hurt.

Those from Hereford who were on the ill-fated train were Dr. W. E. Robertson who occupied a seat in the chair car and who came out with a pretty badly crippled back, and the BRAND Editor who was returning from the meeting of the Northwest Texas Press Association at Mineral Wells and who occupied an upper front berth in the sleeper on the side on which the wreck occurred; but aside from minor bruises, mingled with a large measure of fright, no serious injuries were sustained.

The injured were all cared for at the different hotels of Bowie where medical aid was secured.

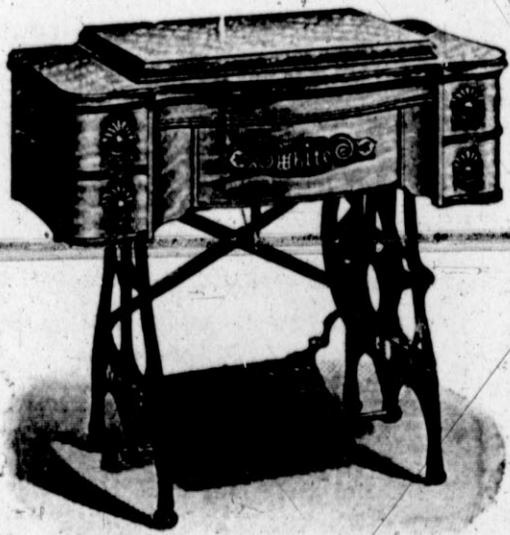
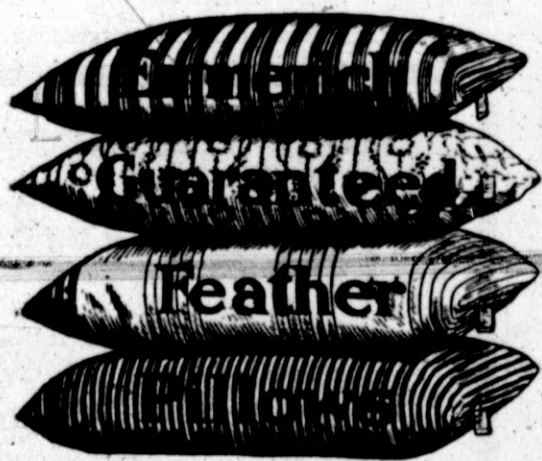

Before and After the Wreck.

Since coming home after the wreck I have been asked by numbers to give an account of the Denver wreck as I saw it, and the feelings of one under such trying circumstances. To begin with, it was an experience that I had never expected to have. I have traveled from East to West, from North to South, from the Great Lakes in the North to the southern portion of Mexico, from the Pacific to the Atlantic, have experienced travel on the trains in every way, from a box car to the finest of palace cars. The pleasure that I have had from my travels across broad expanses of prairie, winding around beautiful canyons where to the left you could look down into a gorge thousands of feet below, to the right, lift your eyes to the snow capped peaks thousands of feet above. Such scenery is beautiful; yet these faithful engines drew their cargo of delighted people--sight seers, home seekers, pleasure seekers. They have carried me faithfully to the most beautiful resorts throughout the United States; have assisted me in viewing the land of perpetual snow as well as perpetual spring time; have afforded me some of the greatest pleasures of my life; these mighty trains, the greatest civilizers of man except the Christian religion. These experiences that I have had inspired me with confidence, and have proved my greatest benefactors. With such confidence, I have always started

out on my journey with pleasant anticipations, never doubting, never fearing. Yet in all of our experiences in life we are forced to the conclusion that we can place too much confidence in the works of man.

When our car was thrown on the cross-ties, I looked around to see what it meant. Such expressions of horror as were pictured on the faces of all the passengers, I never had seen before. We were supposed to be running about forty miles per hour when our train jumped the track, run a few feet on the ties, toppled over a twenty foot embankment throwing me from one side of the car to the other. Then I realized, or thought I did, that we were face to face with death. A thought, then something struck me and I passed into oblivion temporarily. After regaining consciousness, looking over the wreck, we cannot help but pronounce it a miracle that there were not a great many more among the dead. Moral: If there is any thing rotten under the track on which you are running, a wreck is inevitable.

As the threshing season advances, it becomes more and more apparent that our local farmers have almost broken the record in the amount of wheat produced per acre. When the farmers of any section harvest over twenty bushels per acre, they evidently have something to boast of, but this amount is obtained so frequently here that it attracts no more than passing attention.

Among the flattering successes of this season are those reported by W. B. Arnold and R. J. Kibbe, whose ranches lie a few miles northwest and a mile north of Hereford, respectively.

The former obtained 1000 bushels from 34 acres which is about 28 1/2 bushels per acre; the latter's crop thrashed 22 1/2 bushels.

It will be interesting to note how rare the instances are in which the yield falls below twenty bushels.

The BRAND has had much to say

public school building which has
just been completed. Mr. Parmer,
who has done faithful and efficient
work in raising and collecting the
funds, tells us that about \$400 is yet
needed to finish paying the indebted-
ness.

We are told that while the major-
ity of the patrons have responded
freely and liberally to the call, yet
their remains 30 or 40 who refused
to contribute a penny.

We do not believe this condition
can remain as it is, for Deaf Smith
County people are not of that stripe
to impose the burden of educating
their children upon someone else.
We do not believe any man can be a
good citizen and withhold his entire
support from educational institutions.
The man that is worth most to his
community is the one who always
takes a pleasure in giving his means
to those enterprises which will lift
men and women to higher plains
in life.

This \$400 must be raised even if
those of us who have already contrib-
uted are compelled to increase our
subscriptions. If there are those
patrons who have not yet contrib-
uted, and there are, won't you
come forward and assist according
to your financial ability. The BRAND
will gladly receive the names of
those who wish to help.

HEREFORD is now taking on a
growth which is seldom witnessed by
a western town. With the advent
of the new railroad and a continued
development of our farm lands, we
may reasonably expect our popula-
tion to double within the next year
or so.

DANGEROUS CONDITION.

Judging from the number of
wrecks which have occurred on the
Denver Road within the past few
weeks, one would naturally be forced
to the conclusion that some radical
steps should be taken by that com-
pany looking to the betterment of
the condition of their road-bed. In
fact, one does not have to be re-
minded of the recent wrecks to be
brought into a full realization that
his life is greatly endangered in
passing over the line from Amarillo
to Ft. Worth; for it is one continuous
rocking and reeling and jumping to
such an extent that the traveling
public can feel no degree of safety
while on this road.

The Ft. Worth and Denver has
till now been fortunate in avoiding
disastrous wrecks, but unless they
begin the much needed work of im-
proving their road-bed and place
better and heavier material thereon,
they can expect nothing but for their
earnings to be consumed in the pay-
ment of damage suits. Even the
wrecks of the past month will cost
the Road many thousand dollars.

The fact of the matter is that the
Denver Road, together with other
western roads, is employing cheap
Mexican labor to keep their property
in repair when it is almost like
throwing that much money to the
winds. So long as this cheap,
shiftless labor is depended upon, we
can expect nothing but continued
wrecks, resulting in the loss of many
valuable lives.

We believe the Railroad Commis-
sion of Texas should either compel
the companies to keep their property
in a passable condition or else con-
demn it.

WHILE the BRAND editor does not
lay any claim to being a prophet,
yet he enjoys the privilege of seeing
land values gradually reaching the
figures which he predicted for them
two years ago. We have always
believed, as we do yet, that the
lands of the plains will naturally
seek the same level with the agri-
cultural lands of other sections of
the country, and it would be difficult
at present to cause anyone to see it
in a different light. We have con-
stantly insisted on our farmers
staying with their lands and develop-
ing them. Some have done this, and
are now in the enjoyment of the
fruits of labor and patience; others,
who disposed of their lands the first
opportunity, are now wondering what
induced them to commit so rash an
act. We now frequently hear it as-
serted that our lands are too high,
but it seems the majority of people
are not inclined to so think. They
are either worth \$25.00 per acre or
they are worth only a dollar. The
only thing to be considered is
whether or not they can be classed
as agricultural lands. The
splendid crops of the past few years
should forever settle this question.

THE best interests of Hereford
and surrounding counties demand
that we have a mill and elevator in
this city. This matter is one of
importance and should not be futh-
er overlooked.

LET'S watch our sanitation care-
fully and thus avoid the usual large
number of cases of typhoid fever
which frequent plains towns late in
the summer.

WORK BEGINS.

Surveying Crew Now at Work Locating the Panhandle Short Line Railroad.

On last Saturday morning in the presence of a large crowd of citizens, the first stake locating the Panhandle Short Line Road was driven by J. R. Ransom and his corps of surveyors who had arrived on the preceding day. As a starting point, the stake was driven just at the rear of the Hereford Lumber Co's property and the proposed line crosses the River just west of the Steam Laundry. From the starting, a line was surveyed west through the sparsely settled portion of the town, effecting a crossing with the Pecos Valley Road near the light plant. With this much accomplished, the north end of the survey will be allowed to rest till the southern end from Hereford to Sweetwater by way of Dimmitt and Lubbock has been located. The surveying crew, all told, consists of seven men who carry with them wagon and team and all the necessaries for comfortable camping. In response to a query from a BRAND reporter, Mr. Ransom stated that it would probably require six weeks to make a complete and accurate survey of the southern division. The party is now at work

in lower Castro County and is making good headway as they have a level open country over which to work. At the beginning of the survey on last Saturday, a photographer was present to take a photograph of the crew and spectators.

As to whether or not the road will be built is a question which yet remains to be answered. Mr. Ransom, who is spending and has already spent a considerable sum of money, has no land options and hence could not reasonably have any other motive than to build a railroad. The fact of the matter is that the company who first secures a charter for this proposed road will indeed be fortunate, as there is no more inviting field anywhere in the West than that through which the survey is being made.

We can see it no other way than that the road will be built!

Our Rainfall.

IMPRESSION CHANGED

General Passenger Agent E. P. Turner Tells the Ft. Worth Record of the Hidden Resources of our Great West.

E. P. Turner, general passenger agent of the Texas & Pacific railway, was in the city Saturday, having returned from the West after an extended trip along the line.
