TWENTY THOUSAND CLUB.

One Hundred Citizens Take Stock in the Enterprise.

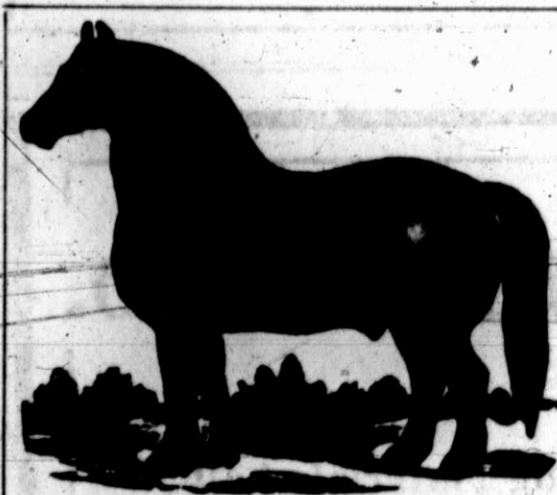

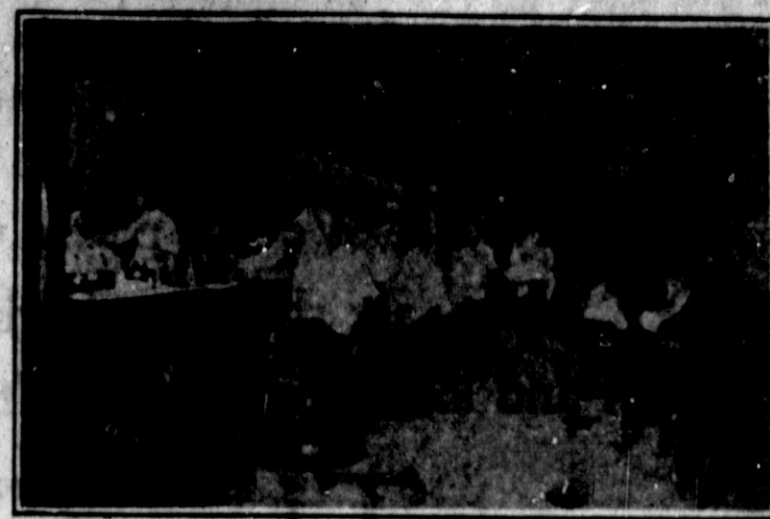
