### INTERCOLLEGIATE DEBATE.

#### The Canadian College Defeated the Panhandle Christian College Last Friday Night.

On last Friday night, April 19th, the debate between the Panhandle Christian College of this place and the Canadian Academy of Canadian was "pulled off" in the College Auditorium. The subject was, "Resolved, that the Phillipines should be Given Immediate Independence," which was represented on the affirmative by Chas. S. McDonald and James P. Carr of the Canadian Academy, the negative by Earl Wilson and Elmer Dameron of the Panhandle Christian College.

After a few selections of piano and instrumental music, the "battle royal" began. Hon. G. W. Barcus

of Hereford, Rev. Wilson of Clarendon and Judge Buie of Canyon City were selected as judges. The debate was intensely interesting from start to finish and both sides of the question was handled with great skill. The boys showed that great preparation had been made and that they had spent a great deal of time and study on the question. They all acquitted themselves well and in a creditable manner to their respective colleges. At the close of the speeches the decision of the judges was rendered two to one in favor of the Canadian boys. Although the P. C. C. boys were defeated they brought great credit and honor to their institution in their first intercollegiate debate, and this will only serve to make them strive all the more in other contests.

The Canadian boys won a great many friends while here.

### Rain and Snow at Hereford.

Beginning last Friday night and continuing almost without intermission until Monday morning a good season of rain and snow fell at Hereford. The temperature reached as low as twenty-four degrees, but we had nothing like the zero weather that was reported from this place. The lowest temperature was reached at night, in the day time it being above the freezing point. The rain and snow has put a fine season in the ground, and without injuring vegetation, except of the tenderest growth.

This precipitation is worth millions of dollars to the Panhandle. Some of the farmers had begun to put on long faces on account of the continued dry spell, but now their countenances have changed and they say there is sufficient season in the ground to insure the small grain crop.

### SURVEYORS IN THE FIELD.

#### Full Corps at Work on Panhandle Short Line Railroad Out of Hereford.

Col. J. T. Ransom has let the contract for surveying this end of the Panhandle Short Line Railroad to Hans Helland, a civil engineer of Waxahachie. Mr. Helland has a full corps of surveyors and they have been at work all this week. Beginning at the Tierra Blanco river south of town in the early part of the week they have surveyed and set the stakes as far as Frio creek, about five miles south.

Mr. Helland is an expert civil engineer and has had a great deal of experience in railroad surveying. He was the original surveyor of the old Texas Central Railroad in East-

ern Texas, now known as the Texas Midland. Mr. Helland expects to reach Dimmitt with his surveying crew by the latter part of this week or the first of next.

Col. Ransom informs us that the grading contract will be let next Saturday or Monday and the work will be begun right away. He is keeping the letter of the contract by beginning the road "on or before the first of May." Actual work was begun about a month ago by grading across the Santa Fe road to the Tierra Blanco, and from there it will be taken up and graded south through the different counties that have entered into contract with Col. Ransom.

Grading outfits will be brought here in a very short time and the work, once well under way, will be pushed to completion rapidly.

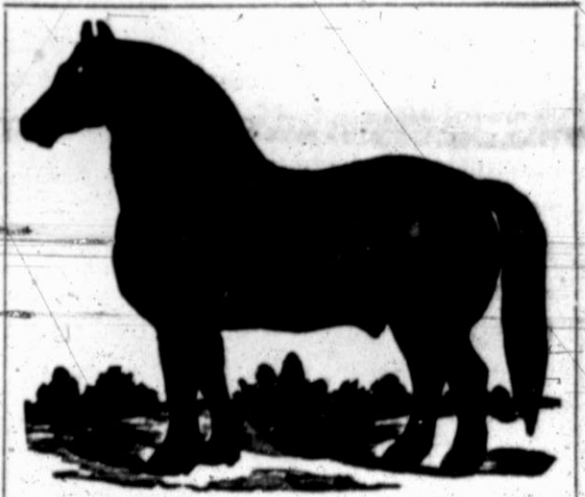

### CIVIC LEAGUE MEETING

#### Interesting Talks Made on Subjects of Civic Improvement.

The Civic League of Hereford met at the court house on Tuesday evening, April 16th. The meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. Taliaferro. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Under the head of the Report of Committees, Judge Gough, chairman of the committee on Constitution and By-Laws, asked for more time, which was granted.

A motion was made by Judge Gough to appoint three more committees, viz: A Street, a Park and a Public and a Public School Grounds Committee. The following were appointed:

Street Committee—L. A. Hough, chairman, J. P. Snyder, Mrs. W. H. Russell, Mrs. W. M. Cogdell and L. A. Stroud.

Public School and Public Grounds Committee—G. W. Barcus, chairman, T. J. Graves, Miss Pearl Turentine, Mrs. Irwin and Miss Dameron.

Park Committee—W. G. Ross, chairman, Mrs. Mounts, Mrs. Price,

L. P. Landrum and Mrs. Irwin.

There were a great many present who were absent at the former meeting and when asked to make short talks along the line of civic improvement responded readily. Several who had been absent in Northern and Eastern towns and others living elsewhere gave interesting talks. In the general discussions, among other things it was decided that the best way to have a sanitary pig-pen was to do without the pig. Other topics of interest were discussed.

Mr. Snyder said, in part: "Hereford looks better to me now than any place I have been. Am in favor of securing funds at an early date to carry on this good business. Sidewalks—there is where I am with you to the finish."

Mr. Meachum of Missouri:—"I am not a resident of your beautiful town and hesitate to suggest anything but if you people will push that side walk question and have nice crossings I am sure we could show more Missourians about your place and each would have to carry home a more pleasant remembrance of Hereford."

Gentleman from Minnesota:—"A stranger notices first the appearance

of your main street. It is wise to put down side walks now while strangers are visiting your town. Nice walks are a credit to a town this size. Now a person of Hereford might walk on side walks that are so uneven in safety but a gentleman from Minnesota could not." (Laughter.)

Mr. Grim of Coleman:—"If you will make Hereford attractive now, ten years later you will not recall with regret, 'Oh, if we had just thought of that ten years ago.' It is possible to have a vision of the beautiful city, not only a material city but with esthetic ideas. We do not like to hear if this place were as pretty as where I came from.' You can have it even more so. Let this place be known not only for the fine and numerous cattle, the waving wheat fields, or even for the many railroads which run through, but for a community of high ideas, culture and refinement. Hereford is one of the nicest towns I have ever seen. Other places are attractive but I want to say without any exception that Hereford is the most attractive town of all. Let me advise this club to take some art magazine along these lines and see what is being

done elsewhere. Keep on with your good work."

A great many other good things were said which added interest to the meeting. The meeting adjourned to meet at the court house next Monday night, April 29th, at 8:30.

**BATTLE OF SAN JACINTO**

**Anniversary of Texas Independence Observed by Banks and Postoffice.**

On account of the 21st of April coming on Sunday this year, Monday was observed as a holiday throughout the state of Texas. At this place only the banks and the postoffice took advantage of the holiday. It was observed generally, though, throughout the Northern, Eastern and Southern parts of the state by the public schools, and in a great many places by closing all of the stores in honor of the great event it commemorates.

We were asked by a great many people why the postoffice and banks were closed on that day, and for the benefit of a great many who have lately moved here from other states and are not familiar with Texas history, we give the following:

Seventy-one years from April 21st (last Sunday), was fought the great battle of San Jacinto between the Texans and Mexicans, and from which date is determined the independence of Texas. For a long time Texas had been struggling to free herself from the tyranny of the Mexican yoke and every Texas school boy and girl remembers full well the horrors of that long and unevenly matched contest. How our brave men were butchered at the Alamo, and ambushed and murdered at Goliad. Finally, when it seemed that everything possible had been done on the Texas side and when the Mexicans thought they had their adversaries whipped, our men under Houston determined to make one more hard struggle for liberty. The small band of Texans numbered only 743 raw recruits, while the Mexicans had between 1300 and 1400 well drilled regulars.

On the morning of the 20th of April Santa Anna was informed by a scout that the Texans were coming, and had already captured a number of the stragglers of his army. This took the Great Napoleon of the West, as he proudly called himself, by surprise and he dashed out of the city at full speed, shouting: "The enemy are coming! The enemy are coming!" This announcement and the mad and strange conduct of their general threw the Mexican army into great confusion. Finally order was restored and a line of battle was formed just outside the city, but

no enemy was in sight. At about 2 o'clock in the afternoon Houston and his handfull of men appeared and Santa Anna opened fire upon them with his small artillery, but with little result. After exchanging a few shots the Mexican skirmishers advanced but were received with a fire that promptly drove them back, amid the wild shouts and cries of the Texans. After exchanging a few more shots Santa Anna withdrew and established his camp in front of the deep marshes of the San Jacinto river.

On the morning of April 21st, after spending the night under double guard, the Texans arose early, cooked their breakfast and awaited the orders of their general. A council of war was held, after which Houston summoned Deaf Smith (for whom this county was named) and told him to cut Vince's bridge. The bridge was over Vince's bayou, a stream running into Buffalo bayou about eight miles above the camp, and over which both armies had to pass to get away from the position they held. Accordingly, Deaf Smith and his companion destroyed the bridge, "the only means of escape for either army, and made the coming battle a struggle for life and death."

In the afternoon Houston gave orders for his troops to form into line of battle. At 4 o'clock the order was given to advance, and the eager, restless Texans who had been waiting impatiently all day for the attack, moved forward with a rapid march and finally quickened their pace into a dead run. When near the enemy's fortifications, Deaf Smith dashed up on his horse and shouted: "You must fight for your lives! Vince's bridge has been cut down!" The Texans delivered a volley then dashed forward with terrific yells, "Remember the Alamo! Remember Goliad!" Santa Anna had given up all hope of an attack that day and was in his tent enjoying his "siesta" and many of his officers were lounging around lazily. They were taken entirely by surprise and thrown into the greatest confusion. Some of the Mexicans were driven into the marshes of the San Jacinto river and were there killed with little trouble. Others fled to Vince's bridge, hoping to escape, but it had been destroyed and they threw them-

selves into the angry stream and perished rather than to face the terrible foe in front. Six hundred and thirty Mexicans were killed and 208 wounded. Of the Texans, only six were killed and twenty-five wounded, General Houston being included in the latter.

Santa Anna escaped from the battle field but was captured the next day and was brought trembling before the wounded general, who assured the Great Napoleon of the West that he would be protected.

### Sustains Fracture of Skull.

As a result of a fracture of the skull, Jeff D. Johnson is lying unconscious and in a critical condition at his home, 203 Hawkins street. About 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon Johnson staggered into the office of Dr. J. E. Baldwin on Elm and Hawkins streets. He was unable to talk and soon fell into a stupor.

An examination developed that the nasal bones had been fractured and that the skull over the left eye was likewise broken. Dr. J. M. Neel was called and assisted in the diagnosis after examination. The injury appears to have been the result of a blow from some blunt instrument. The physicians suspect it was brass knucks. After preliminary treat-

ment Johnson was conveyed to his home.

How the blow was received is a mystery which the police are investigating. He had taken dinner at his home and at 1 o'clock started for the coal office of J. L. A. Thomas, where he is a bookkeeper. Nothing more was seen of him until he staggered into the office of Dr. Baldwin. He is without immediate family, his wife having died about a year ago. The only clew the police have is a murmured statement of the wounded man that he was struck by a young man, whose first name he did not give.—Dallas News.

Mr. Johnson is a brother of Dr. R. M. Johnson of Hereford. Dr. Johnson received the intelligence Wednesday that his brother died Tuesday evening from the injuries sustained.

### Jamestown Exposition Opens.

The Jamestown Exposition, commemorating the three hundredth anniversary of the English settlement in America, opened at Norfolk, Va., to-day, (Friday).

The exposition grounds and buildings are incomplete and in this condition are opened to the public with great pomp and ceremony. The program for to-day is so great and grand that it is said that the exposition visitors will not have time to take notice of the unfinished state of the buildings and grounds. President Roosevelt plays the principal role in the opening ceremonies and is the guest of honor for the day.

"The inception of the Jamestown Exposition sprang from a desire of the people, many of them descendants from that hardy English stock that settled among the Indians here three hundred years ago, to teach the traditions that have been handed down by those colonists."

When completed it will be almost all that is implied in the expression, 'A World's Fair,' but it will not stop there. Twenty-five States of the Union will trace their history from their earliest days to the present, and the exhibits will be sheltered by appropriate buildings. For instance, the Virginia State building is modeled after an ideal colonial mansion; Kentucky presents a replica of Fort Boone; Ohio shows Adena, the first stone house erected west of

the Alleghany Mountains; Connecticut reproduces the Talmage home, the first colonial mansion erected in that State, where General Washington held many of his councils of war."

The naval display will be one of the greatest features of the exposition. In this will be represented ships from all the leading navies of the world, besides the entire great Atlantic Fleet of our own navy under command of Rear Admiral Evans.

## SOMETHING WRONG.

The BRAND has never been accustomed to complaining of conditions unless it felt deeply impressed that there was a good and sufficient cause for complaint. Nor are we going to complain now, for there is no one to complain at. We just merely wish to state that there is something materially wrong with the sanitation of Hereford. Our city council has done its part well in seeing that local scavenger work has been properly executed, but local scavenger work will not keep a city of 4,000 people in a thoroughly sanitary condition. We believe now and have believed for some time that something else is needed in Hereford, but have not been quite able to ascertain what it is. We believe the best interests of our city would be subserved by having a sanitary expert come here and outline a few of the things most needed to remove the cause for fevers and other diseases traceable to unsanitation.

The Panhandle is by nature a healthful country and Hereford a healthful town; but sanitation, or rather unsanitation, is a problem which all towns of any consequence must sooner or later solve. If it requires a first-class sewerage system here as has been the case elsewhere, by all means we should have the sewerage system. At any rate it would cost but a nominal sum to have an expert on sanitation come and make a careful investigation and ascertain wherein we are wanting.

The News, published at Whitesboro, and by the way a good paper, came out in its last issue with a rather lengthy discussion of the way the drouth and green bugs have destroyed the grain crop in the vicinity of Wichita Falls and closes by saying: "Blessed is he who did not go West last fall." Now, really we are surprised that any North Texas paper could be guilty of even casting a reflection upon any portion of the West after the direful experiences of that part of the state the past few years. Texas is a great state from center to circumference, but we are compelled to agree with Horace Greely when he admonished the young men to go West. If the Grayson county farmers who read the News had come here last fall and invested their money, they would have made thirty-three and a third per cent from the enhancement in the value of lands, besides they would have had as fine small grain prospect as was ever seen anywhere in the state. A few of those farmers did this and are now rejoicing in their good fortune. The BRAND would exclaim, "Blessed is the man who had the good judgment and forethought to part company with the boll weevil and green bugs last fall and come to this favored West."

THE FOUR brick business houses, together with the two-story stone bank building, which are now under construction, causes our business street to present a different picture to that which has been before us for the past years. While Hereford has always been a good, wide-awake business point, yet the absence of substantial two-story brick buildings has detracted greatly from her real importance. The walls of the bank building and E. B. Black's furniture store are completed and work is progressing rapidly on the two-story buildings of T. M. Palmer and W. S. Higgins on South Dewey Avenue, as well as that of J. M. Bogard on North Dewey Avenue. These buildings, when completed, will supply a long-felt want in Hereford, as they will enable some of our leading merchants to transfer their merchandise from "shacks" to more inviting and commodious quarters.

THE efforts of every good citizen should be bent in the direction of making Hereford a town of 5,000 people by the commencement of 1908. With no cessation in our present growth, these figures will easily be reached. What we need is to stand united so that we may be prepared to look well to every interest of our community. The BRAND has always held Hereford in greatest confidence and we yet believe that a few more short years will give us the largest, the best and the prettiest city on the plains. Our people have succeeded well thus far, never allowing an enterprise which would be for our betterment to pass us by. With this same keen interest and vigilance, things of even greater import will come to us before we are aware. The thing and the only thing to do is to talk, work and pull for Hereford.

THE AGITATION which has been made the last few days over the state relating to the valuation of taxable property is creating considerable bitterness between North and South Texas, the former opposing a readjustment, the latter favoring it. This question concerns every portion of the state alike, and should be handled in a way which will give justice to all. The tax question is a difficult one, but it is evident that a uniform system should be enforced throughout the state so that the burden will fall equally upon all. We believe the intention of the Assessor for Deaf Smith County this year is to make his assessments at about 50

The recent rain and snow has assured a good oat and wheat crop in this section of the country. The precipitation was slow and steady but extended over a period of several days and nights, giving the ground an excellent season. Small grain had begun to suffer some on account of the dry weather and when the snow and cold weather came it was thought by some that it would all be killed, but upon investigation the contrary was found to be the case. ### Gambling Law Construed.

Austin, Texas, April 19—No more spinning the wheel for cigars, under the new anti-gambling law, says the Attorney General's department in the following opinion made public this morning:

"Hon. Ben Palmer, District Attorney, Twenty-Ninth Judicial District, Stephenville: Dear Sir—We are in receipt of your letter asking for a construction of House Bill No. 84 against gambling, which was recently enacted by the Thirtieth Legislature, and which is now a law. In your letter you say:

"There are quite a number of drug stores and other business houses in this district that keep on their show case a certain kind of slot machine which resembles a clock. A customer goes in and drops a nickel in the slot of this machine,

and it strikes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 or 6. If it strikes one time the customer gets one cigar, if it strikes twice he gets two cigars, and so on up to six, which is the limit. The dropping of the nickel in this machine and taking chance on winning the cigars, is this betting within the meaning of this act? Is it a violation of this act to keep and exhibit such a machine as described above?"

"I am of the opinion that both of your questions should be answered affirmatively. WM. E. HAWKINS, "Office Assistant Attorney General"
