### Rain at Hereford.

In conversation with a number of farmers from different parts of the country, we learn that the rain Monday night was quite general, covering a large stretch of country contiguous to Hereford. Reports from Canyon, Amarillo and other points show that the rain extended to these places. At Amarillo, some damage was done by the wind. At Hereford the local weather station reports 1.25 inches, while seven miles south on the Dimmitt road, the report shows that at least 3 inches fell during the night. The lakes were filled and the Frio on Tuesday morning was running with a two foot rise. While the rain did not come in time to be of any benefit to fall wheat, it will be quite helpful to all spring wheat and forage crops.

### Panhandle Short Line.

In conversation with the contractors, the BRAND is informed by Witherspoon Bros. who have a large contract that their work is practically completed. Their work begins on the east bank of the Frio where the fill was over 22 feet high and extended towards Dimmitt for a distance of one and one-half miles. Contractors are at work within six miles of that place.

### New Opera House.

The new Opera House building is nearing completion. It is the largest business house so far erected in Hereford, being 50 by 100 feet and full two stories, the walls of brick with red pressed brick front, the main structural work being frame supported by iron columns and steel girders. The front will be finished with heavy plate glass and everything throughout the building will be in keeping. The first floor will be occupied by dry goods and grocery

establishments, the front of the second floor by the Hereford Telephone Exchange and business offices, while the rear 80 feet will be fitted up for a well-equipped play house. Arrangements have been made for a large and commodious stage and this as well as the auditorium will be put in shape to enable a first class entertainment to be given. Messrs. Palmer and Higgins, the owners and builders are to be congratulated in adding this substantial house to that block.

### Successful Farming.

J. N. Askren, who lives some ten miles from the city, was interviewed by a representative of the BRAND a few days ago and in the course of his remarks he gave his experience in raising wheat in the Panhandle. Mr. Askren has in this year nearly 100 acres, 70 acres in fall wheat and 130 in spring wheat. He spoke particularly of the spring crop and said that the ground was prepared last year after a feed crop was removed. In the first part of April this year, the ground was disked, the soil being in fair condition, and the drill used to seed the field. The snow in that month gave sufficient moisture to bring up the wheat, but did not have any rain on it until the latter part of May, when a good rain fell. During June one shower kept the crop growing and at this date, without another drop of rain, he claims that the crop will average more than 15 bushels at the lowest estimate. He planted the famous Qubunka wheat, of which the government gives a list of 27 varieties. He advises his farmer friends to plant some of this variety, not neglecting other kinds and to use every sensible method to retain the moisture that falls before the ground is seeded. He noted that the ground that had been planted to Indian corn, the previous year, will make a better than that which had been planted to maize or Kaffir. Mr. Askren says that the drouth of this year has demonstrated that the Panhandle will do what no other section of the country has ever claimed—that good crops of wheat and feed stuffs can be raised on a small amount of rainfall. He invites the friends of scientific farming to visit his farms and to examine the condition of the soil and crops and compare with the

growth of grass on the open. He contemplates putting in another section of wheat land as soon as possible and feels that he will be sure of a profitable crop.

### Swisher County to Celebrate.

The 17th anniversary of the organization of Swisher county will be celebrated at Tulia, the county seat, on July 17th. A general invitation has been sent out and a good old time is expected.

### New High School for Childress.

Childress is to have a new school building costing about \$15,000. The contract has already been let and will be constructed of brick. Our South Panhandle town is to be commended in taking this step and will serve as a stimulant to other towns to put up good school buildings. Hereford, at no distant day, will be compelled to provide better quarters for her schools.

#### AMARILLO WINS

Interstate Commission Holds Class Rates from Kansas City Unreasonable and Unjust.

Washington, July 2.—The Interstate Commerce Commission, in the case of the Nobles Bros Grocery Company of Amarillo, Tex., against the Fort Worth and Denver City Railway Company and others, today decided that the present class rates from Kansas City to Amarillo are unreasonable and unjust; that the commodity rates between these points should not exceed those from Kansas City to Fort Worth, and that the class rates from St. Louis to Amarillo may properly be higher than from St. Louis to Fort Worth. An order was entered fixing rates in accordance with this conclusion.

This special to the Dallas News will be of interest to all the Panhandle, as the ruling will affect the rates to all common points. The people of this section have long held that the freight rates from Kansas City were unreasonable as compared with the rates to Fort Worth and other points, and they will be gratified to learn that the Interstate Commission has, at last, taken the matter in hand.

J. H. Wood who has had charge of the street sprinkling has been greatly handicapped by the lack of a sufficient supply of water. The court house well was at first used and it proved to be inadequate; then the laundry well was tried, and as the machinery was not run all the time, on some days no water could be had; at last the railroad permitted him to use six tanks per day, but this did not answer when no additional water could be obtained elsewhere. The streets on an ordinary day requires about 20 or 25 tanks and it has been impossible for Mr. Wood to get this amount from all sources. Some have suggested the Tierra Blanco, but the distance will preclude the use of water from that stream, as but ten or eleven loads can be hauled in one day. The BRAND believes that Mr. Wood has done all that could be expected of anyone but he proposes to go further. If those who have subscribed to the sprinkling fund will continue on the list, he will put in a gasoline engine at some convenient well that will furnish enough water to do the work in a satisfactory manner. As far as is known all are willing to keep up their subscriptions. If Mr. Wood can be assured of this, he will put in the new outfit at once.

**FIRE COMPANY AGAIN.**

Some time ago the BRAND called attention to the need of a regular organized fire company with apparatus to fight the Volcan enemy. On some peaceful night our citizens will be awakened by the wild cry of fire! fire! only to face the fact that we have nothing with which we could hope to save a single building. Progressive in every other way, shall we stand still on this vital question? For fire to break out in any place would mean the loss of the entire block. The 20,000 Club will take this matter up at once and push the issue to a success. The Club of course, does not intend to make a purchase of apparatus, but it hopes to interest the city fathers and citizens so that they will see that ample provision is made for the protection of our homes and business houses.

For a long time it was commonly believed by the ranchmen and the few settlers who lived in the Panhandle, indeed, they unhesitatingly told that the soil would not produce the ordinary farming crops and that it would be impossible for one to make even a meager living as a farmer. The big ranchmen discouraged the stock farmer. They may have had

solid motives in this but still there was some truth in the statement and it would have been more nearly the truth if they had said that the ordinary farming methods would not succeed. The truth about Texas has never been properly told. Even in the central part of the state where now all the farmers are rich who own a section of black land, it was once thought that gardens could not be successfully grown. The earliest settlers would tell the new comers that there was no use trying to raise garden sass and hogs. Now that section of the state engages most extensively in truck gardening, some of the truck farms being worth as much as \$150 per acre even more. This same lesson must be learned in the Panhandle. It has been a hard fight to convince even a Texan that the Panhandle soil was preeminently suited to all kinds of crops. The successful efforts that have already been made by a few individual farmers should convince the most skeptic that our soil is adaptable to all high altitude plants. One of the greatest drawbacks to successful farming has been that little preparation has ever been made to do farming in a successful manner.

THE 20,000 Club is advertising for a number of industries that will be beneficial to the town as well as to the country around, but the Brand notes that one of the most urgent necessities has been overlooked—farmers who will actively till the soil. Factories and other business establishments are all needed, but the independent, intelligent farmers are most needed. The very towns of the Panhandle must largely depend upon the products of the soil. The natural advantages are many, but the richest and surest returns will be had by the proper and scientific handling of the soil. There is a disposition on the part of some to think lightly of soil culture, but the truth is about to dawn upon all that this branch of science, for it is a science, can no longer be neglected. Let no one be deceived that the business of farming is a mere past time and that good old mother Earth will yield her abundance to the sluggard. It is alright to induce your friends to invest in this country, but if you wish to be counted a benefactor, turn your attention to the farmers. With a farmer on every section or half section successfully raising grain and feed stuff with, a small herd of fine cattle, a few good horses and mules, a drove of marketable hogs, you will see this fair Panhandle country go forward with pace undreamed of by the uptoepan. Farmers and more still must be induced to come.

We noted in last week's issue of the Hereford BRAND that Editor Ray has sold that excellent paper to Messers Hawkins & Elliott, and wondered the whyfore thereof. It came a few days later in the form of two visiting cards, one of which reads "George Barnett Ray, June 20th, 1907," meaning that Bro. Ray is now the happy father of a brand new boy. Of course he could not be expected to fulfill the strenuous duties of an editor and properly look after the needs of that new boy, hence the sale of the newspaper, and we hereby extend our congratulations to all parties concerned.—Gray County Herald.

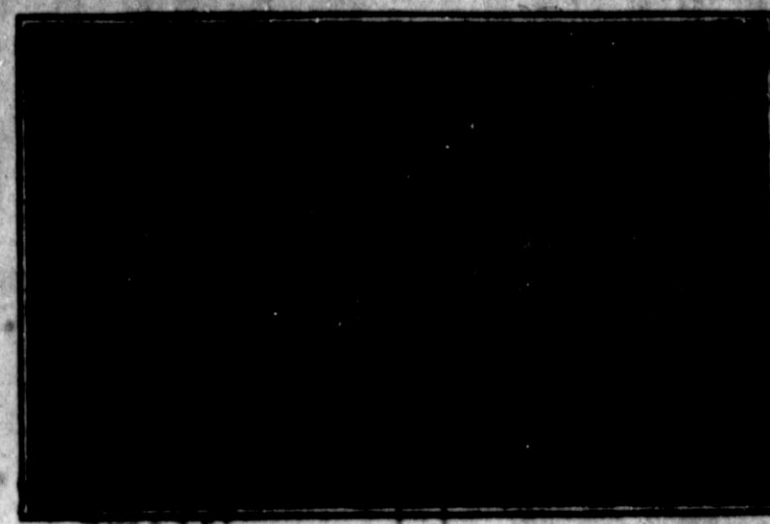
The 20,000 Club will hold its regular meeting on the second Friday night of each month according to the adopted by-laws. This will put the next meeting on next Friday night week, July 12.

### AN ORDINANCE

Declaring Pool and Billiard Halls a Public Nuisance.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Hereford:

Section 1. That the exhibiting, owning or managing of any pool or billiard tables, on which games of pool or billiards, or similar games are played in a public place or for profit, within the corporate limits of the city of Hereford, is hereby declared a public nuisance.

Section 2. Any person, firm or corporation exhibiting, owning or managing any pool or billiard table mentioned in the preceding section, shall be deemed guilty of maintaining a public nuisance and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than 10 dollars nor more than 100 dollars for each day such pool or billiard table shall be owned or exhibited.

The rule requiring that ordinances shall be read at three separate meetings of the council is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall go into full force and effect from the date of its publication.

### AN ORDINANCE

Pertaining to the Scavenger Work.

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or association of persons except the duly appointed city scavenger, to haul off any carcasses of animals, or to haul off garbage of any description within or from within the limits of the city of Hereford.

Section 2. Any person, firm, or association of persons violating any of the provisions of the preceding section, shall upon conviction be fined in any sum not less than five or more than fifty dollars.

Section 2. Any person firm or association of persons violating any of the provisions of the preceding section, shall upon conviction be fined in any sum not less than twenty dollars nor more than fifty dollars.

## A NEBRASKA WOMAN

Pleased With Hereford and the Panhandle.

In a letter to her home paper at Albion, Nebraska, Mrs. LaShelle of the Panhandle and Hereford country. She says:

Hereford, Texas, June 24, 1907. To the Albion Argus and Friends: Will Baker's letter to you from Albion, in your issue of June 8th, has prompted me to add a few words regarding the now famous Panhandle country. I have been in this part of the world since the first of the year and must most truly say that the longer I stay and the more I see of the more I like it.

Our town, Hereford, is called the most beautiful town in the Panhandle; the 1900 census only gave it 116 people, today it has over 3,500. There are now five new two-story brick business blocks building and Dewey Avenue, our main street, is macadamized; ten foot cement walks are also being laid on this street, and cement walks are being put in all over the residence portion. We have here the Hereford Christian College and a graded school, five good churches and good preachers. The Christian church has plans drawn for \$15,000.00 brick and stone church. There is not a saloon or a negro in the county, and gambling and drinking are strictly forbidden. The people here are above the

average in intelligence and sociability; everybody seems happy and prosperous. I know you will be surprised when I say that the three banks in Hereford have almost one million dollars on deposit. Hereford is the county seat of Deaf Smith county; is on the main line of the A. T. & S. F. railroad which in a short time will have their new road bed ballasted and laid with heavy steel rails, when this is finished, all through trains to California will pass through Hereford. The Panhandle Short Line, to run from Trinidad, Colo. to Big Springs, Texas. The shops, division point, round house and general offices will be located here. Plans are drawn for a \$35,000 brick and stone depot which the two roads are to build jointly. When finished this will be the finest railway station in the Panhandle.

The business men of our town have just organized a 20,000 Club, by 1910, with 176 charter members. They are planning to do a great many things for the development of Hereford and surrounding country. The ladies also have organized a Civic League and are offering prizes for the best kept lawn, etc.

Hereford is surrounded by the richest and very best agricultural land in the whole Panhandle district and all kinds of crops do well here. I just came in from an automobile ride and saw wheat being harvested that will make 25 bushels per acre,

and this is better than was ever raised on the new land of dear old Boone county when it was new like this country.

We are in the shallow water belt, the average depth being 45 feet. It is sheet water, pure, cold and soft, the supply being inexhaustible. Fine wells are put down at small cost. We have the most delightful winters and plowing can be done nearly every day through the winter months. The average rainfall from May to November, is twenty-three inches, this is taken from the government report, and it shows this average for the past seven years. There is no better country for a poor man; so I say come to the Panhandle, and especially to Hereford for a fine farm and home. I will gladly answer any inquiries about this country. 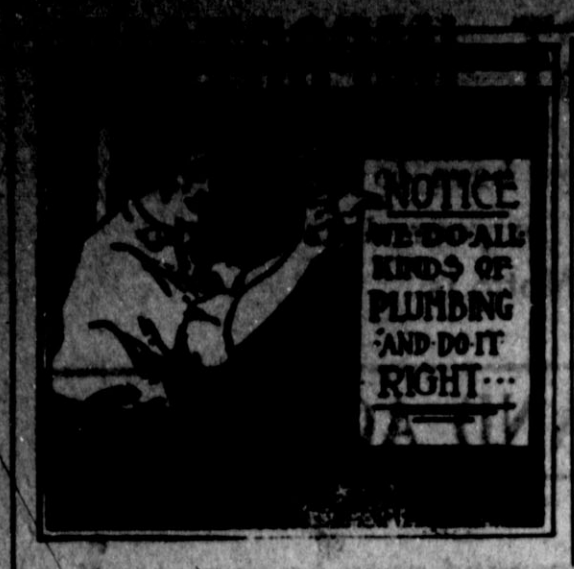
