PANHANDLE SHORT LINE.

Meeting of Stockholders—New Directory Elected—Important Business Transacted.

At a meeting of the stockholders of the Panhandle Short Line Railway Company in the First National Bank building, Wednesday, January 8, important business was transacted pertaining to the road. A new Board of Directors was chosen as follows: J. T. Jowell, G. W. Irwin, G. A. F. Parker, W. G. Ross, C. W. Dodson, T. E. Shirely, all of Hereford; C. E. McLane of Dimmitt; J. H. Ransom of Denton; and A. D. Goodenough of Sulphur, Oklahoma.

Major W. A. Squires was present and made a talk explaining the purposes of the meeting and his connection with the road. Mr. A. D. Goodenough of Sulphur was also here and participated in the proceedings. The session was purely business in its character and no "hot air" machinery was running. There were present some twenty five or thirty men from Hereford and Dimmitt, every one of whom felt that the hour had come when more work and less talk was in demand.

By-laws governing the action of the Stockholders and the Board were adopted and other business transacted. After the meeting of the

stockholders, the Board of Directors met in executive session and elected the following officers to serve until the regular annual election: W. G. Ross, president; J. H. Ransom, first vice president; J. H. Ransom, second vice president; C. E. Edwards, secretary; C. W. Dodson, treasurer; A. D. Goodenough, general manager; W. A. Squires, asst. general manager.

The Brand is not going to say that work will be resumed on the road tomorrow or next week, because it does not know. This can be said, however, and the truth strictly adhered to. The men who now have charge of the road are going to push

the business in such a manner as to restore confidence among the people who want the road built; they are not going to make any big promises, but are going to use their knowledge of railroad building and their acquaintance with railroad people to further the interests of the road; they know what they are doing and every step taken by them will count towards the completion of the road. Dear Sir: The Trustees of the Fair Ground, Cobleskill, N. Y., were glad to pay 15 cents a gallon more for Devoc; and no wonder. Two other paint agents said it would take 150 gallons of their paint to cover the buildings.

POST OFFICE RECEIPTS.

Local Business of Uncle Sam Shows Large Increase in Business for the Year.

The Brand has obtained from C. Smith, postmaster for Hereford, a statement showing the total receipts for the last two years at the office. A careful analysis of the figures will be of interest to all as the business of the post office is a sure index to the growth of the town and country. It is, therefore, with some degree of pride that the Brand is able to publish in detail the business of Uncle Sam at the Hereford Post Office. The figures show that the increase of 1907 over 1906 amounted to \$1301.19 or more than 22 per cent.

If all other business enterprises within the city have had such an increase, the results could be nothing more than marvelous. An other thing about the statement shows that the financial flurry did not decrease the receipts but that the corresponding months of 1906 and 1907 are about the same.

ENJOINS PROHIBITION.

Beer House at Amarillo Files Injunction Suit in Judge Browning's Court.

The Anti-prohibitionists thru the medium of the Amarillo Beer and Ice Company filed an injunction suit against the publishers of the Amarillo Herald asking that the paper be restrained from publishing the order of the Commissioners' Court declaring the result of the recent prohibition election in Potter county. The company prays the court to restrain the further publication until the adjudication of a contest by some duly qualified person can be instituted upon the following grounds:

The plaintiff's claim that, though there were 300 names on the petition presented to the court asking for an election, there were 153 signers who had not paid their poll taxes;

That school trustees, road overseers and aldermen were officers in the election, which rendered it illegal;

That a number of voters were intimidated by influential citizens of Amarillo and prevented from casting their ballot as they desired;

That a large number of votes that were cast for prohibition were illegal; and

That being a corporation the company could not contest the election but asked for a restraining order.

INJUNCTION REFUSED.

From Daily Panhandle.

After a hearing that continued till late Saturday afternoon, Judge Browning refused the application of the Amarillo Beer & Ice Co. for an injunction restraining the publishers of the Weekly Herald from making final publication of the commissioners' court order putting prohibition in effect in Potter county.

In explaining his decision which was rendered immediately upon the

close of the argument by the attorneys, Judge Browning stated that he did not consider that the court had jurisdiction in the case presented by the application. The statute evidently contemplated, he said, that prohibition should be carried into effect after the judges and commissioners had declared the result of the election to be for prohibition and that the statute further contemplated the avoidance of all possible delays in carrying such law into effect. The granting of an injunction such as the plaintiff prayed for, he stated would have the effect of repealing the statute and the application therefor could not be granted by the court.

Reeder, Graham & Williams, attorneys for the plaintiff immediately gave notice of appeal, and will carry the case as soon as possible to the court of appeals. It will be presented before Chief Justice T. H. Connor and Associates Justice J. W. Stephens and Ocie Speer, at Fort Worth, but the date upon which it will be returned cannot be determined. It is not likely that such decision will be reached this week.

To the Farmers of Texas.
The attention of every farmer in Texas is called to the following points. When the tax assessor visits you in the near future, he will ask for the following information in regard to your crop:

1. The kind of crop planted.
2. The number of acres planted in each crop for the year 1907.
3. The total yield in bushels, gallons, tons, bales, or pounds as the crop is usually counted.
4. The estimated number of acres to be planted in the various crops for the year, 1908.

The tax assessor is required by law to collect this information for the new Department of Agriculture. The assessor does not receive one cent of pay for this work. From the letter below you will see what is the attitude of the assessors toward this subject, and why they have agreed to do the work even at a pecuniary loss to themselves.

Bonham, Texas, Dec. 17, 1907.
To the Commissioner of Agriculture, the Farmers' Organizations and the Tax Assessors of Texas:

The following question has been asked me:

"That, whereas House bill No. 274 of the Acts of the Thirtieth Legislature makes it the duty of tax assessors to take the agricultural statistics of the State, yet the said Legislature made no appropriation to pay for the work, now will the assessors do the work without compensation?"

While I feel the injustice done the assessors, and realize the labor it will require to collect and compile said statistics, yet I am willing to do any and all work imposed on the tax assessor's office. We will trust to some future Legislature to reimburse us.

The act of the Legislature that created the office of Commissioner of Agriculture that carries with it this necessary labor was called for by every farmers' organization in the State. It was made a law through their demands, but said act would be stripped of its usefulness unless we perform our part of the work.

While I acknowledge that there is a certain amount of patriotism due from all officials, yet it seems hard to place an overdue amount on the tax assessors. However, in view of the fact that we will be serving the interests of the farming public, the backbone of our country, the most vital element of all our people, therefore, I beg the hearty co-operation of all assessors in compliance with this law.

Let us try to bring about the benefits and information that is sought to be brought about by the above-named legislation.

Knowing the faithfulness of the assessors, I feel confident when I say we will do our whole duty.

Now, in turn, to make the extra work imposed on the assessors as small and as agreeable as possible, let every farmer be prepared to answer the above questions promptly and accurately. Do not wait until the assessor arrives to refresh your memory. Do it now.

In passing, I may note that this information has nothing at all to do with your taxes. It is for the use of the Department of Agriculture, and is collected for the good it will do the farmers.

This information will be useful to the farmer in determining what crops are likely to be most profitable to grow, and also in marketing the crops when grown.

Again urging all farmers to cooperate in making the collecting of these statistics complete and as expeditious as possible, I am, respectfully yours,

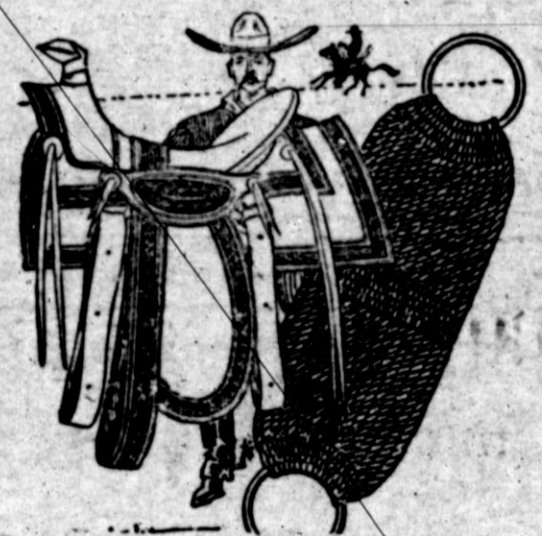

Washington, Jan. 6.—Among the 160 bills and resolutions introduced in the House during its half-hour session today were the following:

By Mr. Fulton of Oklahoma: Admitting free of duty all imports into the United States carried in vessels of American make and register.

By Mr. Wallace of Arkansas: Repealing the duty on wood pulp and printing paper.

By Mr. Clark of Florida: Prohibiting the transportation in the mails or the depositing in any mail receptacle of any newspaper, magazine or other publication containing the alleged facts of any divorce suit, murder case or other court proceeding of an indecent or immoral character or which tend to corrupt the young.

THE PANHANDLE GROWING.

Figures Given by Railroads Show Section is Now Being Rapidly Filled by Settlers.

Fort Worth, Tex.—From figures secured this afternoon at the Fort Worth and Denver offices from W. F. Sterely, general freight agent, the march of the agricultural man from all sections of the State as well as from almost every other State in the Union bids fair to exceed all records this year, all en route for the Panhandle district, where millions of acres formerly devoted solely to the raising of cattle are now being converted into farming lands.

During the month of November the Fort Worth and Denver lines alone hauled 299 emigrant cars to that section of the State, these figures representing 299 families choosing to cast their lots in farming pursuits in the new country, while the December records up until Christmas disclose shipments of cars to the number of 228.

The fiscal year of the Fort Worth and Denver alone, which ends June 30, 1907, shows that 1,548 cars were shipped, and in as much as the winter shipments are always the heaviest, it is conservative to estimate that the 1908 business will result in the establishment of another record.

January will produce, it is expected, the largest figures. During that month and the month previous the crops are gathered and rental contracts expire, enabling farmers to make all desired changes. Reaching into the Panhandle are the Rock Island, Santa Fe, Frisco and the Missouri, Kansas and Texas lines also, and as all of these lines report a large movement of farmers to the new section, the development of that section is looked upon as rapid.
