# GOOD SEASON

Rain, Snew and Sleet Durin Month of February Ample-Wheat and Orchards Much Benefited.

Following closely on the heels of the recent rains when nearly two inches of water fell including the now, last Monday night a heavy sleet from the northeast began to fall. This continued intermittantly up into the next day. The ground was covered with a layer of sleet. very much like coarse salt to a depth of about 2 inches. The water resulting from the sleet measured 0.65 inches. Thus snow, rain and sleet fell on three different occasions during the month, making a total for February amounting to 2.85 inches. Last year, 1910, the precipitation for the same month was 0.05; for 1909, only 0.08; for 1908, 1.00. The continued cloudy weather during the last ten days and the cold will assist in holding the moisture. The fruit will be benefited and the wheat which was up will be pushed into a rapid growth when the warm days come. Quanab Parker's Death Marks Passing of Last Pamous Chief.

The death of Quanah Parker, at his home fifteen miles from Lawton Okla., at the foot of the Wichita Mountains, February 16, marks the passing of the last of the great chiefs. Sitting Bull, Chief Joseph and Geronimo have passed into history and the grave of the chief of the Comanches. The great chief's life is romance. His mother was Cynthia Ann Parker, who came with her parents to Texas when but a child. The Parkers built Forf Parker in Parker county.

One night when the little girl was , the gate of the fort was left open. The Comanches swept in killed several of the family and carried Cynthia Ann into captivity. efforts to rescue her from the Indians failed. The outdoor life tanned her cheeks, she learned their language and adopted their customs and became the wife of the chief, Peta Nocona.

In 1860, twenty-four years after the massacre at Parker's Fort and the capture of the little girl, Col. Sul Ross with a band of rangers met the Comanches in the Pease river untry and administered a crust nthis Ass Parker, his white wife as taken back to civilization. was taken to the home of surviving members of the family, but never ceased to mourn for her warrior nusband.

Chief Quanah Parker always denied that his father was killed in the battle. He always claimed that he died a natural death.

It is said that Quanah Parker never embraced the religion of his mother, but at her funeral and just before his death expressed the hope that he might meet her with the white man's God.

Both Indian and civilized services were said above his grave. ...

Quanah Parker had many friends in Fort Worth, among them Capt. S. B. Burnett. The great Comanche often visited Captain Burnett's ranch on his hunting expeditions, and in turn Captain Burnett was his guest at the chief's home at the foot of the Wichita mountains.

It was 25 years ago next month that Ouanah Parker coming to Fort Worth with Yellow Bear, his best friend, came in contact with a civilzed custom that almost ended his career. The two comanches stopped at the Pickwick hotel, predecessor of the splendid new Westbrook.

When they retired that night, Yellow Bear blew out the gas. Next morning Yellow Bear was dead and Quanab Parker was carried from the room almost lifeless.

His last visit to Fort Worth was two years ago, when with a party of Indian braves he participated in the Fat Stock and Horse Show.

In Memoriam. The passing away of Mrs. Em R. Buttram he a loss to the com munity that deserves more than casual mention. For nineteen years she was a prominent figure in the social and the religious life of the county and her character left its impress on all who knew her. Mrs. Buttram, nee Emma Ritter Barnett, was born in Landerdale, Alabama April 27, 1842. In early womanhood, with her family, she removed to Arkansas and a few years later, Feb. 3, 1875, was married to James Logan. Mr. Logan died the same year, December. Of this union was born one child, a beautiful daughter Oct. 7th, 1879, Mrs. Logan became the wife of Jacob Buttram, and in 1892 with her husband and family came to this country to make i their home. Both husband and wife were much past the meridian of life, Mr. Buttram being sixty-eight. Severe pulmonary trouble caused him to leave the beautiful and com parable home in Arkansas and to found a new home in the west. He was one of nature's noblemen, and both husband and wife built for the future, as if young, and the work of their brave spirits, willing hands and sound judgement can be seen today. In all the planting, tending and beautifying of which they were so fond, the one garden that received the most attention and produced the most beautiful fruit and flowers, was the garden of the beart. Thus they lived and wrought until Nog.

1905, Mr. Buttram answered the call to sternal life and entered into joys. The Death Angel again appeared and claimed the only child of Mrs. Buttram, the late Mrs. daughters married and in her old age Mrs. Buttram was left alone, but her brave spirit would not be overcast. The newest thing in the way of sub-irrigation has been discovered by J. P. Clement who lives one mile west of Hereford. Last summer he gathered up a lot of cans and placed them end to end in a ditch about 3 feet from a sweet potato row. This tine of cans was connected with a hose by means of a small pipe and the water allowed to run in as the season demanded. When the potatoes were dug a good crop was harvested, but the unique feature of this story is that Mr. Clement raised two rows of potatoes instead of one. Several months, after digging his potatoes he decided to examine the can tiles and accordingly opened the ditch, when to his surprise, he found some good size potatoes near the cans, some 3 feet from the planted row. He accounted for this by saying the small feeding roots sought the moisture and extended their lengthto the line of cans where an additional lot of potatoes were grown. Who can beat this? Come to Hereford.






